If not you, who? Small things.

◆ Plant a tree in a hole big enough to accommodate all the roots, but not too big. Ideally the crown of the tree (the part where the trunk turns into roots) will end up at the same level as the soil surface. Add enough soil to the hole to keep the roots from drying out and to keep the tree in place.

If not you, who? Small things.

◆ Tree pruning is an art and a science. Thankfully, trees are usually quite forgiving of small errors, but over pruning or topping a tree can be fatal to the tree. Careful pruning can solve a lot of tree health issues before large problems develop. Most trees can survive without pruning, but to keep a tree in an urban yard, pruning is a better solution than chopping it down. Prune in winter for greatest success. Cuts should be made where branches meet other branches or the tree trunk, perpendicular to the ground.

If not you, who? Small things.

◆ The tree you plant will probably outlive you. With that in mind, pick the planting location carefully. Consider sun exposure, prevailing winds, water availability, soil drainage, common pests. Plant five feet from other trees or shrubs, six feet away from sidewalks, walls, neighbors and underground cables, and 10 feet from under overhead utility cables and power lines to ensure enough space.
