

CLERK'S BOARD SUMMARY

REPORT OF ACTIONS OF THE FAIRFAX COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

MONDAY October 22, 2001

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The meeting was called to order at 9:35 a.m., with all Members being present, with the exception of Supervisor Connolly and Supervisor Mendelsohn, and with Chairman Hanley presiding.

Supervisor Connolly and Supervisor Mendelsohn arrived at 9:45 a.m.

Others present were Anthony H. Griffin, County Executive; David P. Bobzien, County Attorney; Catherine A. Chianese, Assistant to the County Executive; Christina M. Manning, Assistant to the County Executive; Nancy Vehrs, Clerk to the Board of Supervisors; and Patti M. Hicks, Deputy Clerk to the Board of Supervisors.

BOARD MATTERS

1. **MOMENT OF SILENCE** (Tape 1)

Chairman Hanley asked everyone to keep in thoughts and prayers the family of Mr. Myron Smith who died last week. Mr. Smith was an important member of the Greenbriar community and his extensive contributions to transportation and community goals will be missed.

Chairman Hanley asked everyone to keep in thoughts and prayers the family of the patient at the Inova Fairfax Hospital who is not a Fairfax County resident but has been identified with inhalation anthrax. Chairman Hanley emphasized that while anthrax is not contagious, fear is; consequently, individuals who believe that they may have symptoms and could have been exposed to anthrax should contact the County's Anthrax Information Line at 703-246-3796, which is in operation seven days a week, from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m.

Supervisor Hudgins asked everyone to keep in thoughts and prayers the family of Mr. Thomas R. Osberg, a resident of Reston, who recently died. Mr. Osberg was instrumental in establishing the Hunter Mill Land Use Committee.

Supervisor Gross asked everyone to keep in thoughts and prayers the family of Mr. Harry Van Cleve, who was a resident of Pinecrest. Mr. Van Cleve not only had a career as a distinguished attorney for the federal government, but he also was a driving force behind the Friends of Green Spring and served on the Adult Rehabilitation Center of the Salvation Army in Mason District.

Supervisor Gross asked everyone to keep in thoughts and prayers the family of Mr. Pedro C. Ortiz, who died last week. Mr. Ortiz, was an architect and distinguished painter.

Supervisor Connolly asked unanimous consent that the Board direct staff to publicize on all appropriate literature and forms that State regulations require all projects that require a erosion and sediment control plan to have an individual who has been certified a responsible land disturber to be in overall charge of the grading and maintenance of the erosion and sediment plan. This is a County requirement because it is a State requirement. Without objection, it was so ordered.

Following further discussion, with input from Mr. Friedman, the question was called on the motion to approve the Administrative Items and it carried by unanimous vote, Supervisor Bulova, Supervisor Connolly, Supervisor Frey, Supervisor Gross, Supervisor Hudgins, Supervisor Hyland, Supervisor Kauffman, Supervisor McConnell, Supervisor Mendelsohn, and Chairman Hanley voting "AYE."

31. **EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS MEETINGS** (Tape 6)

Chairman Hanley reminded the Board that in preparation for and to allay fears for Y2K, the County had conducted a series of informational meetings around the County addressing issues of emergency preparedness. She asserted that it is time to conduct such meetings again in light of the events of September 11, 2001, and subsequent unsettling events. Citizens need a forum to hear from and ask questions of County public safety, health care, transportation, and public works and utilities officials about emergency preparedness.

Chairman Hanley noted that the County Executive established an Emergency Management Coordinating Committee to coordinate plans and responses and that such information should be shared with the public and private sector. Accordingly, she relinquished the Chair to Vice-Chairman Hyland and moved that the Board direct the County Executive, working with the Office of Public Affairs and all the public and private agencies previously mentioned, as well as any others who would be appropriate, to schedule at least four public meetings in different areas of the County as soon as possible to give citizens an opportunity to hear from and question public officials. Supervisor McConnell seconded the motion.

Following discussion, Supervisor Kauffman announced that the Lee District Association of Citizens Associations meeting scheduled for Wednesday, October 24 at 7:30 p.m. at the Franconia Police Station will be addressing this issue.

Following further discussion, with input from Anthony H. Griffin, County Executive, the question was called on the motion, which carried by a vote of nine, Supervisor McConnell being out of the room.

32. <u>SUPPORT OF RAIL TO DULLES AIRPORT</u> (Tape 6)

Chairman Hanley distributed to the Board copies of a letter from the County's three congressmen to Secretary of Transportation Norman Mineta in which they had requested the Secretary to expedite (rail) transit to Dulles Airport. Accordingly, she moved that the Board go on record in support of their effort. Supervisor Connolly seconded the motion.

Following discussion, the question was called on the motion, which carried by a vote of nine, Supervisor McConnell being out of the room.

33. LETTER TO SENATOR JOHN WARNER REGARDING THE EFFECTS OF DISASTER OPERATIONS (Tape 6)

Chairman Hanley distributed to the Board copies of a letter to Senator John Warner regarding the effects of disaster operations. The letter included a compilation of cost estimates by department.

34. <u>EFFECTS OF CLOSURE OF WOODLAWN ROAD AT FORT BELVOIR</u> (Tape 6)

Supervisor Kauffman asked unanimous consent that the Board direct staff to draft a letter to Senator Warner expressing the Board's concerns regarding the closure of Woodlawn Road to through traffic and requesting the review and evaluation of the necessity of keeping that roadway closed because of its critical role in the flow of area traffic. Discussion ensued.

Supervisor Hyland stated that the road closure affected a voting location because voters would have to show picture identification to drive on the road to access the location.

Supervisor Connolly noted that the National Capital Area Chapter of the American Red Cross closed its Loehmann's Plaza location and opened an office at Fort Belvoir. He asked unanimous consent that the Board direct staff to determine whether the access points at Fort Belvoir have affected the ability of the National Capital Area Chapter of the American Red Cross to function in that location. Without objection, it was so ordered.

Supervisor Kauffman moved that the Board direct staff to draft a letter from the Chairman to Senator Warner and the entire local Congressional Delegation reemphasizing all of the three aforementioned points. Supervisor Connolly seconded the motion, which carried by a vote of nine, Supervisor McConnell being out of the room.

35. **AMERICAN INDIAN HERITAGE MONTH** (Tape 6)

Chairman Hanley announced that November is nationally recognized as American Indian Heritage Month. Accordingly, she moved that the Board direct staff to invite representatives of the Office of Equity Programs and the American Indian community to appear before the Board on November 19, 2001, to receive a proclamation declaring November as "American Indian Heritage Month" in Fairfax County. Supervisor Connolly seconded the motion, which carried by a vote of nine, Supervisor McConnell being out of the room.

36. **<u>POSTCARDS</u>** (Tape 6)

Chairman Hanley stated that it had been called to her attention, both by constituents and staff, that there is a paucity in the selection of postcards available for purchase at the Government Center's Maps and Publications' gift shop. She asked unanimous consent that the Board direct staff to review the feasibility of expanding the selection of postcards available including those available at the Park Authority's gift shops.

Supervisor Connolly asked to amend the request to direct staff to determine whether the gift shop can include the Fairfax fire back for sale as well, and this was accepted.

Without objection, the request, as amended, was so ordered.

37. **<u>RECOGNITION OF MR. NED FOSTER</u>** (Tape 6)

Chairman Hanley stated that the Little Rocky Run Homeowners Association contacted her to request that the Board recognize the volunteer efforts of Mr. Ned Foster. Accordingly, she moved that the Board direct staff to prepare and send a certificate of recognition to Mr. Foster for his ten years of volunteer efforts to preserve Little Rocky Run. Supervisor Bulova seconded the motion, which carrried by a vote of nine, Supervisor McConnell being out of the room.

38. FAIRFAX COUNTY COMBINED CHARITABLE CAMPAIGN 2001 (Tape 6)

Chairman Hanley announced that Deputy County Executive Verdia L. Haywood is serving as this year's chairman of the Fairfax-Falls Church United Way Campaign. The Fairfax County Combined Charitable Campaign kicked off on Friday October 12, 2001, to encourage employee participation. Employees are once again being called upon to "give back" to meet the needs of the community.

Chairman Hanley challenged each Board Member and the Clerk to solicit participation from their offices in a quest for the highest percentage of participation. Accordingly, she asked unanimous consent that the Board direct the Clerk to distribute additional pledge cards and campaign brochures to each Board Member's office to assist in expanding employee participation. Without objection, it was so ordered.

39. **GASOLINE PRICES** (Tape 6)

Chairman Hanley stated that she had received an inquiry from a citizen asking why gasoline prices were so much higher in Fairfax County than in other jurisdictions.

Following discussion, with input from Anthony H. Griffin, County Executive, Chairman Hanley asked unanimous consent that the Board direct staff to determine why there is a disparity in prices. Without objection, it was so ordered.

40. "<u>DE" DAY PRESENTATION</u> (Tape 6)

Chairman Hanley stated that she had received a request from the League of Women Voters to announce that on Saturday, October 27, 2001, from 10 a.m. – 12 noon in the Board Auditorium of the Government Center there will be a presentation of "Choices After DE-Day January 1, 2002," program. "DE-Day" refers to electric deregulation day.

41. POLICY FOR SCHOOL ABSENCES RELATING TO APPEARANCES BEFORE THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS (Tape 6)

With reference to presentations earlier in the meeting, Chairman Hanley asked unanimous consent that the Board direct staff to determine in writing the School Policy regarding excused and unexcused absences for students who appear before the Board for recognition.

Following discussion, with input from Anthony H. Griffin, County Executive, the request was so ordered.

Vice-Chairman Hyland returned the gavel to Chairman Hanley.

42. **LANGLEY HIGH SCHOOL WINS STATE GOLF TITLE** (Tape 7)

Supervisor Mendelsohn announced that the Langley High School golf team won the State golf title.

Supervisor Mendelsohn asked unanimous consent that the Board direct staff to invite the team to appear before the Board to be recognized for their accomplishment. Without objection, it was so ordered.

43. <u>RECOGNITION OF VOLUNTEER FIRE AND RESCUE COMPANIES</u> (Tape 7)

Supervisor Mendelsohn said that for the last two Board meetings, the Board has been recognizing public safety employees for their response to the events of September 11, 2001.

Supervisor Mendelsohn noted that there are volunteer fire and rescue companies and over 200 active, operational fire and rescue volunteers in Fairfax County. These volunteers supplement the Fire and Rescue Department by contributing tens of thousands of hours of volunteer service and purchasing millions of dollars of equipment each year.

Supervisor Mendelsohn said that fire and rescue volunteers from Fairfax County gave over 4,000 hours total in the time frame of September 11 and 12, 2001. He added that many volunteers even remained on duty, away from their families and paying jobs, for 36 hours straight.

Many of these extra units were deployed to McLean, eastern Fairfax County, and Arlington County to fill in for the numerous units that were fighting the inferno at the Pentagon. In addition, at least four volunteer units were called to work at the scene of the Pentagon incident.

Therefore, Supervisor Mendelsohn asked unanimous consent that the Board recognize the outstanding service given to the citizens of Fairfax County by their volunteer firefighters and emergency medical technicians during this national tragedy. Without objection, it was ordered.

Supervisor Connolly announced that on Saturday, the Tysons Corner Center kicked off a yearlong effort on behalf of the volunteer fire departments. He said that they have created kiosks throughout the mall with information and photographs. He distributed to Board Members a self-mailer for contributions.

44. <u>RECOGNITION OF OFFICER ISAAC HOOPII OF THE PENTAGON'S</u> <u>BOMB-SNIFFING CANINE UNIT</u> (Tape 7)

Supervisor Mendelsohn said the courageous acts of one of his constituents have been the subject of newspaper articles and television coverage over the past several weeks. The actions of Officer Isaac Hoopii of the Pentagon's bombsniffing canine unit in responding as a virtual guardian angel in rescuing survivors of the Pentagon disaster were certainly acts of heroism that deserve special recognition. He distributed to Board Members copies of newspaper articles and a letter from Senator Daniel Akaka detailing these acts of heroism and the response from one of the survivors who owes his life to the efforts of Officer Hoopii.

Therefore, Supervisor Mendelsohn moved that the Board direct staff to invite Officer Hoopii and his family to appear before the Board at a date to be determined to be recognized and congratulated for Officer Hoopii's remarkable acts of professionalism and heroism in response to the events of September 11, 2001. Supervisor Hyland seconded the motion and it carried by a vote of nine, Supervisor McConnell being out of the room.

45. INTENT TO DEFER THE PUBLIC HEARING ON SPECIAL EXCEPTION AMENDMENT APPLICATION SEA 91-L-053-5 (WASHINGTON METROPOLITAN AREA TRANSIT AUTHORITY) (LEE DISTRICT) (Tape 7)

Supervisor Kauffman announced his intent later in the meeting, at the appropriate time, to defer the public hearing on Special Exception Amendment Application SEA 91-L-053-5 until November 19, 2001, at 3:30 p.m.

(NOTE: Later in the meeting the public hearing was formally deferred. See Clerk's Summary Item CL#78.)

46. **<u>CRESTWOOD ELEMENTARY SCHOOL</u>** (Tape 7)

Supervisor Kauffman said that the children of Crestwood Elementary School have been recognized by the President of the United States for their hard work and generosity in raising money for the America's Fund for Afghan children.

Supervisor Kauffman said that on October 16, 2001, ten Crestwood children, led by Principal Patricia Zissios, met President Bush and presented him and the American Red Cross with a check for \$2,000. The children raised the money through their school's annual wrapping sale. The money was raised in one week by a school where more than 35 percent of the 525 children are on free or reduced lunch.

Supervisor Kauffman moved that the Board direct staff to invite Dr. Zissios, teaching staff, parents and children to appear before the Board on November 19,

2001, to be recognized for their efforts. Supervisor Hyland seconded the motion and it carried by a vote of nine, Supervisor McConnell being out of the room.

47. WAIVER OF FEES FOR USE OF SHOWMOBILE (Tape 7)

Supervisor Kauffman said that American Legion Post 176 and the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 7327 sponsor an annual Veterans Day celebration. This year, the celebration will include a dedication ceremony for the new Amherst Street Bridge Veterans Memorial and a performance by the Coast Guard brass ensemble.

Supervisor Kauffman said that to honor the veterans, the bridge will be fitted on each end with bronze plaques commemorating each of the five military services. The dedication ceremony will be conducted at 11 a.m. on Sunday, November 11, 2001. He extended an open invitation to Board Members and all citizens who wish to attend this event on the National observance of Veterans Day.

Supervisor Kauffman noted that the County's Showmobile has been reserved for this event. In recognition of the contribution to community and patriotic spirit that this event brings, Supervisor Kauffman moved that the Board waive the fees associated with the use of the Showmobile for this occasion. Supervisor Bulova seconded the motion and it carried by a vote of eight, Supervisor Connolly and Supervisor McConnell being out of the room.

48. **VACATION OF LENCLAIR STREET** (Tape 7)

Supervisor Kauffman said that the public hearing on the vacation of a portion of Lenclair Street was deferred at the last Board meeting. The deferral was necessary to gather more information from the applicant and to allow the applicant to meet with the Groveton Civic Association before Board action.

Supervisor Kauffman moved that the Board authorize the advertisement of a public hearing to be held before the Board on December 3, 2001, regarding the vacation of Lenclair Street. Supervisor Bulova seconded the motion and it carried by a vote of eight, Supervisor Connolly and Supervisor McConnell being out of the room.

49. LEE DISTRICT TOWN MEETING AND TOUR DE LEE (Tape 7)

Supervisor Kauffman invited Board Members and members of the community to join him and Lee District residents during the weekend of October 27-28, 2001, as they continue their work of ensuring a sustainable community.

On Saturday, October 27, 2001, Supervisor Kauffman will host a district-wide town meeting at Lane Elementary School. The town meeting will begin at 10 a.m. with speakers representing the County, State, and community.

Supervisor Kauffman noted that on Sunday, October 28, the second annual Tour de Lee will be held. The Tour de Lee is a bicycle event geared to riders of all abilities. Its purpose is to promote family and fun and to showcase the bicycle opportunities in Fairfax County's Lee District.

Supervisor Kauffman said that this year the tour is being expanded to include three routes. All rides will end at Lee District Park where the Franconia police station bike team will stage a bike rodeo for children and there will be plenty of refreshments.

50. **ROBERTS PARKWAY OVERPASS DEDICATION CEREMONY** (Tape 7)

Supervisor Bulova expressed her appreciation to Chairman Hanley for attending the Roberts Parkway Overpass dedication ceremony that was held on Saturday, October 20, 2001. She provided a brief history of the project.

Supervisor Bulova asked unanimous consent that the Board direct staff to invite members of the task force to appear before the Board to be recognized for their work on this project. Without objection, it was so ordered.

A brief discussion ensued.

51. **BRADDOCK DISTRICT OFFICE** (Tape 7)

(NOTE: Earlier in the meeting there was discussion of this item. See Clerk's Summary Item CL#5.)

Supervisor Bulova invited Board Members to participate in the festivities for the opening of the new Braddock District office that has been constructed adjacent to the Kings Park Library.

Supervisor Bulova said that the festivities will begin at 11 a.m. on Wednesday, October 24, 2001, and the ceremony will begin at 11:30 a.m. She added that festivities would conclude by 1 p.m.

52. **FROST PLAYERS** (Tape 7)

Supervisor Bulova referred to an article in the *Connection* newspaper regarding the Frost Players which included a photograph of Supervisor Connolly who has a part in the play Arsenic and Old Lace. The play is being held at Frost Intermediate School with two remaining dates - October 26-27, 2001, at 7:30 p.m.

53. CONCURRENT PROCESSING OF THE SITE PLAN ASSOCIATED WITH THE SPECIAL EXCEPTION APPLICATION FILED BY PIZZA HUT LOCATED AT 8708 LITTLE RIVER TURNPIKE (Tape 7)

Supervisor Gross said that Pizza Hut has filed a special exception application for property located at 8708 Little River Turnpike, at Tax Map 59-3((7))17A. To facilitate the process, the applicant has requested that the site plan be reviewed concurrently.

Supervisor Gross moved that the Board direct staff to process the site plan associated with this application concurrently. This motion should not be construed as a favorable recommendation on the special exception application by the Board and does not relieve the applicant of compliance with the provisions of any applicable ordinances, regulations, or adopted standards. Supervisor Connolly seconded the motion and it carried by a vote of seven, Supervisor Kauffman, Supervisor McConnell, and Supervisor Mendelsohn being out of the room.

54. <u>CONCURRENT PROCESSING FOR SPECIAL EXCEPTION</u> <u>APPLICATION SE 01-M-036</u> (Tape 7)

Supervisor Gross said that the Pinecrest School has filed Special Exception Application SE 01-M-036, for property located at 4015 Annandale Road. To facilitate the process, the applicant has requested that the site plan be reviewed concurrently.

Supervisor Gross moved that the Board direct staff to process the site plan associated with this application concurrently. This motion should not be construed as a favorable recommendation on the special exception application by the Board and does not relieve the applicant of compliance with the provisions of any applicable ordinances, regulations, or adopted standards. Supervisor Connolly seconded the motion and it carried by a vote of seven, Supervisor Hyland, Supervisor McConnell, and Supervisor Mendelsohn being out of the room.

55. **<u>CHARACTER COUNTS! WEEK</u>** (Tape 7)

Supervisor Gross announced that the week of October 21-27, 2001, is Character Counts! Week and is celebrated throughout the country as an opportunity to focus on the character education of the youth.

Supervisor Hudgins said that she announced the event at activities held at the Reston Town Center on Saturday, October 20, 2001. She said that Reston Association, Reston Community Center, the YMCA, the Reston Citizens Association, and the Greater Reston Chamber of Commerce were recognized for reaffirming their commitment to this effort.

56. **<u>NETWORK AGAINST FAMILY ABUSE (NAFA)</u>** (Tape 7)

Supervisor Gross announced that the Domestic Violence Coalition would become the NAFA. The renamed Coalition will bring a new focus and new vitality to an already successful Coalition. This Coalition is composed of almost 25 public agencies, organizations, and individuals whose mission is to work towards the elimination of domestic violence and to denounce violence in all forms.

Supervisor Gross moved that the Board direct staff to:

- Prepare a proclamation to recognize the Coalition, past and present, for its tremendous work.
- Invite Jewell Mikula and Debbie Harrison, the co-chairs of the NAFA, and any other appropriate individuals, community-based organizations and County agencies to receive the proclamation at the November 19, 2001, Board meeting.

Supervisor Connolly seconded the motion and it carried by a vote of seven, Supervisor Hyland, Supervisor McConnell, and Supervisor Mendelsohn being out of the room.

57. **ANNANDALE FALL FESTIVAL PARADE** (Tape 7)

Supervisor Gross announced that it is the time of year for one of the great Fairfax County traditions - the Annual Fall Festival Parade in downtown Annandale. The parade will be held on Saturday, October 27, 2001, kicking off at 10 a.m. on Columbia Pike. The Annandale Chamber of Commerce has announced that the Grand Marshals of the parade will be the heroic firefighters from Fairfax and Arlington Counties, the District of Columbia, and New York City, who answered the call to duty at the Pentagon and the World Trade Center.

Supervisor Gross invited Board Members and everyone in Fairfax County to attend.

58. **<u>GREG ROY COMMUNITY</u>** (Tape 7)

Supervisor Hudgins said that in February of this year the Board approved the rezoning necessary to facilitate the redevelopment of the Greg Roy community. The vacation and abandonment of existing public rights-of-way known as Greg Roy Lane, Roy Road, Fox Hunt Lane, and a portion of Fox Mill Road, which presently serve lots that were historically known as the Greg-Roy subdivision, were contemplated by and are a requirement of the approved rezoning.

Supervisor Hudgins moved that the Board authorize the advertisement of a public hearing to be held before the Board on December 3, 2001, for the vacation and abandonment of existing public rights-of-way known as Greg Roy Lane, Roy

Road, Fox Hunt Lane, and a portion of Fox Mill Road. Supervisor Connolly seconded the motion and it carried by a vote of seven, Supervisor Hyland, Supervisor McConnell, and Supervisor Mendelsohn being out of the room.

59. HICKORY CLUSTER REVITALIZATION (Tape 7)

Supervisor Hudgins said that a series of exhibits, lectures, and walking tours would celebrate the completion of the Hickory Cluster Revitalization Project. This project is an amazing example of commitment by residents and the community to preserve and renovate one of Reston's oldest townhouse clusters. Hickory Cluster revitalization is a story of struggles and achievements in an aging new town.

Supervisor Hudgins invited all within and beyond the community to the activities from October 26, 2001, through November 25, 2001, that will include the history of the renowned Goodman architecture to the lessons learned from the revitalization process.

60. **RESTON COMMUNITY CENTER BOARD OF GOVERNORS** (Tape 7)

- (APPTS) Supervisor Hudgins said that on October 20, 2001, the Reston Community Center held its annual preference poll election for its Board of Governors. The following individuals were elected to serve three-year terms on the Reston Community Center Board of Governors:
 - Ms. Beverly A. Cosham
 - Mr. Terry Smith
 - Ms. Mariana Tafur

In addition the following were elected to serve one-year terms as youth representatives:

- Ms. Julia Bellis
- Ms. Lorele Kirchner

Therefore, Supervisor Hudgins moved that the Board confirm the appointments/re-appointments of the above individuals to serve on the Reston Community Center's Board of Governors so that the new members can be seated at the next Board of Governors' meeting. Supervisor Connolly seconded the motion and it carried by a vote of seven, Supervisor Hyland, Supervisor McConnell, and Supervisor Mendelsohn being out of the room.

61. **<u>RESTON DOG PARK OPENS</u>** (Tape 7)

Supervisor Hudgins announced the opening of the Reston Dog Park at Baron Cameron Avenue.

62. <u>COMMUNITY SAMPLER</u> (Tape 7)

Supervisor Hudgins announced that on Tuesday, October 23, 2001, a meeting on the community sampler will be held at the Reston Community Center. She added that all the residents are invited to attend and participate in the discussion.

63. <u>SPECIAL EXCEPTION APPLICATION SE 01-P-019, CRAVEN'S</u> <u>NURSERY</u> (Tape 8)

(A) Supervisor Connolly stated that Mr. Paul Craven submitted Special Exception Application SE 01-P-019 for which a public hearing was held before the Planning Commission on September 12, 2001. The Planning Commission is scheduled to make its recommendation on November 29, 2001. To ensure that this matter is resolved quickly, the public hearing to be held before the Board must be scheduled.

> Accordingly, Supervisor Connolly moved that the Board direct staff to schedule the public hearing to be held before the Board for Special Exception Application SE 01-P-019 on January 7, 2002, at 4:30 p.m. Chairman Hanley seconded the motion, which carried by a vote of seven, Supervisor Hyland, Supervisor McConnell, and Supervisor Mendelsohn being out of the room.

64. **<u>SULLY STATION SHOPPING CENTER APPLICATIONS</u>** (Tape 8)

Supervisor Frey stated that Sully Station Shopping Center representatives have submitted a special exception application along with two proffered condition amendments and a final development plan amendment to permit fast food restaurants within the shopping center. These applications have been submitted to rectify problems with existing uses within the center and to permit Popeyes Restaurant as an in-line restaurant. He said that staff has indicated that the applications are in conformance with the Zoning Ordinance and in harmony with the Comprehensive Plan. He noted that, to date, no citizen opposition has been raised.

Accordingly, Supervisor Frey moved that the Board direct staff to schedule public hearings to be held before the Board for Special Exception Application SE 01-Y-040, Proffered Condition Amendment Applications PCA 85-S-013 and PCA 84-S-027, and Final Development Plan Amendment Application FDPA 84-S-027-4 for the earliest possible date following the Planning Commission public hearings. He noted that the applicants understand that this motion will not prejudice the consideration of the applications in any way. Chairman Hanley seconded the motion, which carried by a vote of eight, Supervisor McConnell and Supervisor Mendelsohn being out of the room.

65.

NATIONAL MUSEUM OF THE UNITED STATES ARMY TO BE LOCATED AT FORT BELVOIR, VIRGINIA (Tape 8)

Supervisor Hyland distributed copies of a press release regarding the selection of Fort Belvoir as the site of the National Museum of the United States Army. He expressed appreciation to everyone involved with achieving this selection, including Thomas E. White, Secretary of the Army, and members of Congress.

On behalf of the Board, Supervisor Kauffman commended Supervisor Hyland for his efforts to win this selection.

66. **<u>REVITALIZATION POLICY PLAN AMENDMENT</u>** (Tape 8)

With reference to his written Board Matter on the subject of a revitalization Policy Plan amendment, Supervisor Hyland moved that the Board:

- Authorize an Out-of-Turn Plan Amendment to consider changes to the Comprehensive Plan.
- Direct staff to schedule a public hearing in February 2002.

Supervisor Hyland said that the changes would help guide the County's efforts to revitalize older commercial areas and adjacent neighborhoods. He noted that the changes include, among others, a new section in the Policy Plan on revitalization, revisions to the revitalization goals, and modifications to the definition of "revitalization" in the Plan's glossary.

Supervisor Kauffman seconded the motion, which carried by a vote of nine, Supervisor Mendelsohn being out of the room.

Discussion ensued with input from Eileen McLane, Deputy Zoning Administrator, Department of Planning and Zoning, David P. Bobzien, County Attorney, and Pamela K. Pelto, Assistant County Attorney.

Following the public hearing, which included testimony by three speakers, additional discussion ensued with input from Mr. Bobzien, Ms. Pelto, and Ms. McLane.

Supervisor Connolly moved to defer indefinitely the decision on proposed amendments to the Code of the County of Fairfax, Chapter 112 (Zoning Ordinance), regarding home child care facilities, to address the following issues:

- Allowing 12 children versus 10
- Whether the permitted person is the actual person that operates the child care facility and is present at the facility

Supervisor Hyland seconded the motion.

Supervisor McConnell asked to amend the motion to refer the issue to the Legislative Committee to inquire whether traffic issues and age of children could be included in the legislation. This was accepted.

The question was called on the motion, as amended, and it carried by unanimous vote.
