

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#### **GLOSSARY OF TERMS**


- ADJUSTED GROSS INCOME is reported on State of Virginia Income Tax Returns. It includes gross income from all sources (not specifically excluded) minus certain deductions. Examples of major sources of income that are excluded include Social Security benefits and employer contributions for private pension and health programs. The data cover all people required to file a return and include persons with incomes below filing requirements who were subject to tax withholding and claimed a refund.
- ASSESSED VALUE refers to the estimated value of property for use in taxation.
- AT-PLACE EMPLOYMENT refers to jobs that are filled and are located within a particular area.
- AVERAGE HOUSEHOLD SIZE refers to the number of persons residing within a household.

  It is computed by dividing the total population in households by the total number of households.
- BIRTH RATE refers to the number of births per 1,000 persons in the population.
- CALENDAR YEAR refers to a one-year period beginning on January 1 and ending on December 31.
- CONSUMER PRICE INDEX (CPI) is a concept developed by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. It is used to measure average changes in prices of goods and services usually purchased by urban wage earners and clerical workers from a designated reference date (1967, which equals 100.0). A CPI of 195.2 means that prices for that good or service has increased by 95.2 percent since 1967.
- DEATH RATE refers to the number of deaths per 1,000 persons in the population.
- DEPOSITS are monies held within both checking and savings accounts.
- DEVELOPMENT PIPELINE refers to the entire land development process and includes the rezoning of land, site plan submission and review, the issuance of building permits, and the construction of the physical structures.
- <u>DISPOSABLE PERSONAL INCOME</u> consists of personal income minus personal taxes

  (Federal, State, and local), nontax payments (such as fines, fees, and penalties),
  and personal contributions to social insurance. Generally, it is equivalent to
  "effective buying income."
- EFFECTIVE BUYING INCOME is a concept developed by Sales and Marketing Management. It consists of personal income minus personal taxes (Federal, State, and local), nontax payments (such as fines, fees, and penalties), personal contributions to social insurance, and compensation paid to military and diplomatic personnel stationed overseas. Generally, it is equivalent to "disposable personal income."
- EMPLOYED persons are civilians in the labor force 16 years old and over who are employed.


- A FAMILY consists of a household head and one or more persons living in the same household who are related to the head by blood, marriage, or legal adoption.
- FAMILY INCOME is a concept developed by the U.S. Bureau of the Census. It refers to the combined gross money income of all members of a family.
- A FINANCIAL INSTITUTION is any business which accepts money deposits. Included are savings and loan associations and credit unions (known as thrift institutions) and commercial banks.
- FISCAL YEAR refers to a one-year period beginning on July 1 and ending on June 30 of the year cited.
- GEOGRAPHIC MOBILITY refers to the movement of the head of household, comparing his or her place of residence during different time periods.
- GROSS FLOOR AREA is the area within the perimeter of the outside walls of a building taking into account the number of stories contained in the structure. Space used for interior features such as stairwells and elevator shafts is included in the gross floor area.
- A HOUSEHOLD includes all persons who occupy a single housing unit. A household may be comprised of one or more families, one or more unrelated individuals, or a combination of families and unrelated individuals.
- ILLEGITIMATE BIRTHS are births of infants whose mothers were not married to their fathers at the time of birth or any time during the preceding ten months.
- INFANT DEATHS are deaths of children under one year of age.
- LABOR FORCE includes all persons 16 years old and over who are either employed or unemployed but actively looking for work and are available to accept employment, plus the members of the Armed Forces.
- MEDIAN refers to the value which divides a distribution into two equal parts, one half having values above the median, and half having values below this level.
- MONEY INCOME is a concept developed by the U.S. Bureau of the Census. It is the amount of income before deductions for personal income taxes, Social Security, bond purchases, union dues, medicare deductions, et cetera. Excluded is money received for the sale of personal property, capital gains, imputed and in-kind income, gifts and inheritances, and other types of lump-sum receipts. Money income is similar to personal income except money income excludes imputed and in-kind income.
- NET IN-MIGRATION is defined as the excess of people moving into an area over people moving out of the area.
- PER CAPITA INCOME is the average amount of total personal income available to each person residing within an area. It is computed by dividing the total personal income earned by residents within an area by the total population within the area.

- PERSONAL INCOME is a concept developed by the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis. It is a broader income concept than adjusted gross income or money income. Personal income consists of wage and salary disbursements, proprietor's income, net rental income, dividends, personal interest income, and transfer payments (such as pensions and welfare assistance). It includes wages and salaries paid inkind, the net rental value of owner-occupied houses, the net value of food and fuel produced on farms, and imputed interest received by persons from financial intermediaries. Capital gains are not included because they are not attributable to current economic activity.
- POVERTY LEVELS are based on the Social Security Administration's definition of the minimum income that allows for a nutritionally adequate diet and adequate housing. It allows for differences in the size and composition of families and for differences in the cost of living between farm and nonfarm families. The poverty income cutoffs are revised annually to allow for changes in the cost of living as reflected in the Consumer Price Index.
- PRIVATE DEMAND DEPOSITS are monies held within personal checking accounts, usually in commercial banks.
- PRIVATE TIME and SAVINGS DEPOSITS are monies held within personal savings accounts.
- RESIDENT EMPLOYMENT refers to the employment of an area's residents, as compared to at-place employment which refers to the number of persons employed in an area whether or not they reside in the area.
- A SHOPPING CENTER is a group of commercial establishments with on-site parking which is planned, developed, owned, and/or managed as a unit and which is related in location, size, and type of shops to the trade area which it serves.
- SCHOOL MEMBERSHIP is the sum of all students present and absent from school on a specific date.
- <u>UNEMPLOYED PERSONS</u> are civilians in the labor force 16 years old and over who do not hold jobs but are actively looking for work and are available to accept employment.
- <u>UNEMPLOYMENT RATE</u> is the percentage of the labor force that is unemployed.
- URBAN FAMILY BUDGET is a concept developed by the U.S. Bureau of Labor. The costs of three hypothetical lists of goods and services are provided that portray three relative standards of living—described as lower, intermediate, and higher. These costs do not represent how families actually do or should spend their money but how they tend to spend their money.
- VACANCY RATE is the percentage of total housing units that are unoccupied.
- WASHINGTON SMSA refers to the Washington, D.C., Standard Metropolitan Statistical
  Area as defined by the U.S. Bureau of the Census. This area includes the
  District of Columbia; the Maryland Counties of Charles (as of 1973),
  Montgomery, and Prince George's; the Virginia Cities of Alexandria, Fairfax,
  Falls Church, Manassas, and Manassas Park; and the Virginia Counties of Fairfax,
  Arlington, Loudoun, and Prince William.






# STANDARD METROPOLITAN STATISTICAL AREA\*












