





GLOSSARY OF TERMS

- ADJUSTED GROSS INCOME is reported on State of Virginia Income Tax Returns.

 It includes gross income from all sources (not specifically excluded) minus certain deductions. Examples of major sources of income that are excluded include Social Security benefits and employer contributions for private pension and health programs. The data cover all people required to file a return and include persons with incomes below filing requirements who were subject to tax withholding and claimed a refund.
- AREA JURISDICTIONS are any grouping of jurisdictions which does not constitute the Washington Metropolitan Region or the Washington SMSA.
- ASSESSED VALUE refers to the estimated value of property for use in taxation.
- AT-PLACE EMPLOYMENT refers to the jobs that are filled and are located within a particular area.
- AVERAGE HOUSEHOLD SIZE refers to the average number of persons residing within a household in a particular area. It is computed by dividing the total population in households (excluding group quarters, such as nursing homes) by the total number of households in that area.
- BIRTH RATE refers to the number of births per 1,000 persons in the population within a specified time period.
- CALENDAR YEAR refers to a one-year period beginning on January 1 and ending on December 31.
- CIVILIAN LABOR FORCE includes all persons 16 years old and over who are either employed or unemployed but actively looking for work and available to accept employment.
- CONSUMER PRICE INDEX (CPI) is a concept developed by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. It is used to measure average changes in prices over time of a fixed market basket of goods and services. The particular index used for the Washington, D.C. area, the CPI for all urban consumers, covers approximately 80 percent of the total noninstitutionalized civilian population. The CPI reference year is 1967. This means that if the market basket costs \$281.60 in 1982 in the Washington, D.C. area, these same goods and services originally cost \$100.00 in 1967.
- <u>DEATH RATE</u> refers to the number of deaths per 1,000 persons in the population within a specified time period.
- <u>DEVELOPMENT PROCESS</u> includes the rezoning of land, site plan submission and review, the issuance of building permits, and the construction of the physical structures. A structure is considered to be in the development process from the first request for rezoning of land to the issuance of a Residential or Non-Residential Use Permit.

- <u>DISPOSABLE PERSONAL INCOME</u> consists of personal income minus personal taxes (federal, state, and local), non-tax payments (such as fines, fees, and penalties), and personal contributions to social insurance.
- <u>EFFECTIVE INTEREST RATE</u> is the contract interest rate and additional fee (such as points) assumed by the buyer at the time of purchase, amortized throughout the projected life of the loan.
- EMPLOYED persons are civilians in the labor force 16 years old and over who are currently holding jobs.
- A FAMILY consists of a householder and one or more persons living in the same household who are related to the householder by blood, marriage, or adoption.
- FAMILY INCOME is a concept developed by the U.S. Bureau of the Census. It refers to the combined gross money income of all members of a family living in the same household.
- A FINANCIAL INSTITUTION is any business which accepts money deposits.

 Included are savings and loan associations, credit unions (known as thrift institutions), and commercial banks.
- FISCAL YEAR refers to a one-year period beginning on July 1 and ending on June 30 of the year cited.
- <u>FORECASTS</u> are projections tempered by policy estimates which strive to reconcile past and current trends with current and anticipated policy.
- GEOGRAPHIC MOBILITY refers to the residence in 1975 of all persons 5 years of age and older who lived in Fairfax County on April 1, 1980.
- GROSS FLOOR AREA is the area within the perimeter of the outside walls of a building taking into account the number of stories contained in the structure. Space used for interior features, such as stairwells and elevator shafts, is included in the gross floor area.
- A HOUSEHOLD includes all persons who occupy a single housing unit. A household may be comprised of one or more families, one or more unrelated individuals, or a combination of families and unrelated individuals.
- HOUSEHOLDER refers to the individual in whose name the home is owned or rented; or any household adult member over 15 years old if the owner or renter is not present. At any given time, only one person may be considered as the householder, although the home may be jointly owned or rented.

- ILLEGITIMATE BIRTHS are births of infants whose mothers were not married to their fathers at the time of birth or any time during the preceding ten months.
- INDEX CRIMES are any of the seven most serious felonies whose frequency of occurrence is regularly analyzed to provide an index of the general level of criminal activity.
- INFANT DEATHS are deaths of children under 1 year of age.
- <u>LABOR FORCE</u> includes all persons 16 years old and over who are either employed or unemployed but actively looking for work and available to accept employment, plus the members of the Armed Forces.
- MEDIAN refers to the middle value. The median divides a distribution into two equal parts, one half having values above and one half having values below the middle value.
- MONEY INCOME is a concept developed by the U.S. Bureau of the Census. It is the amount of income before deductions for personal income taxes, Social Security, bond purchases, union dues, Medicare deductions, et cetera. Excluded is money received for the sale of personal property, capital gains, imputed and in-kind income, gifts and inheritances, and other types of lump-sum receipts. Money income is similar to personal income except money income excludes imputed and in-kind income.
- NATURAL INCREASE is defined as the total births minus the total deaths.
- <u>NET DEBT</u> is the difference between total long-term indebtedness and self-supporting debt. Net debt is paid from the general funds, that is, from tax revenues. Self-supporting debt, such as sewer bonds, is paid for by usage fees or taxes.
- NET IN-MIGRATION is defined as the excess of people moving into an area over people moving out of the area.
- PER CAPITA INCOME is the average amount of total personal income available to each person residing within an area. It is computed by dividing the total personal income earned by residents within an area by the total population within that area.

- PERSONAL INCOME is a concept developed by the U.S. Bureau of Economic Analysis. It is a broader income concept than adjusted gross income or money income. Personal income consists of wage and salary disbursements, profits from businesses that are not corporations, net rental income, dividends, personal interest income, and transfer payments (such as pensions and welfare assistance). It includes wages and salaries paid in-kind, the net rental value of owner-occupied houses, and the net value of food and fuel produced on farms. Capital gains are not included because they are not attributable to current economic activity.
- <u>PLANNING DISTRICTS</u> are the 14 areas into which the County is divided for planning purposes. The planning districts' boundaries do not change.
- <u>POVERTY THRESHOLDS</u> are based on the Social Security Administration's definition of the minimum income that allows for a nutritionally adequate diet and adequate housing. It allows for differences in the size and composition of families. The poverty income cutoffs are revised annually to allow for changes in the cost of living as reflected in the Consumer Price Index.
- PREMATURE BIRTHS are babies born after a gestation period of less than 37 weeks weighing 5 pounds 8 ounces or less.
- <u>PROJECTIONS</u> are numbers based upon trend analyses utilizing statistical techniques.
- RELATIVE PRICE LEVEL INDICES FOR VIRGINIA refer to five categories of costs: food and beverages; housing; apparel and upkeep; transportation; and other goods and services. A sample of prices for each individual item is collected for each of the eight Virginia metropolitan areas.
- RESIDENT EMPLOYMENT refers to the employment of an area's residents, as compared to at-place employment which refers to the number of persons employed in an area whether or not they reside in the area.
- SELF-SUPPORTING DEBT is paid by means of service charges and not from the County General Fund. Included in this category are sanitary district bonds and integrated sewer system bonds.
- A SHOPPING CENTER is a group of commercial establishments with on-site parking which is planned, developed, owned, and/or managed as a unit and which is related in location, size, and type of shops to the trade area which it serves.
- SCHOOL MEMBERSHIP is the sum of all public school students present and absent from school on a specific date.

- SUPERVISOR DISTRICT is one of eight areas of roughly equal population which is represented by an elected Supervisor. The districts are changed at least every ten years according to changes in population.
- TAXABLE SALES reflect deposits of Virginia sales tax revenues, adjusted for the dealer discount, rather than actual sales reported by the dealer.
- TOWN is a quasi-independent political subdivision of a County. Fairfax County has three towns: Herndon, Vienna, and Clifton.
- <u>UNEMPLOYED PERSONS</u> are civilians in the labor force 16 years old and over who do not hold jobs but are actively looking for work and available to accept employment.
- UNEMPLOYMENT RATE is the percentage of the labor force that is unemployed.
- <u>URBAN FAMILY BUDGET</u> is a concept developed by the U.S. Bureau of Labor. The costs of three hypothetical lists of goods and services are provided that portray three relative standards of living described as lower, intermediate, and higher. These costs do not represent how families actually do or should spend their money but how they tend to spend their money.
- VACANCY RATE is the percentage of total housing units that are unoccupied.
- WASHINGTON METROPOLITAN REGION, as defined by the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments, includes the District of Columbia; the Maryland Counties of Montgomery and Prince George's; the Virginia Cities of Alexandria, Fairfax, Falls Church, Manassas, and Manassas Park; and the Virginia Counties of Fairfax, Arlington, Loudoun, and Prince William.
- WASHINGTON SMSA refers to the Washington, D.C., 1980 Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area as defined by the U.S. Bureau of the Census. This area includes all jurisdictions in the Washington Metropolitan Region (see above) plus Charles County, Maryland (as of 1973).

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
