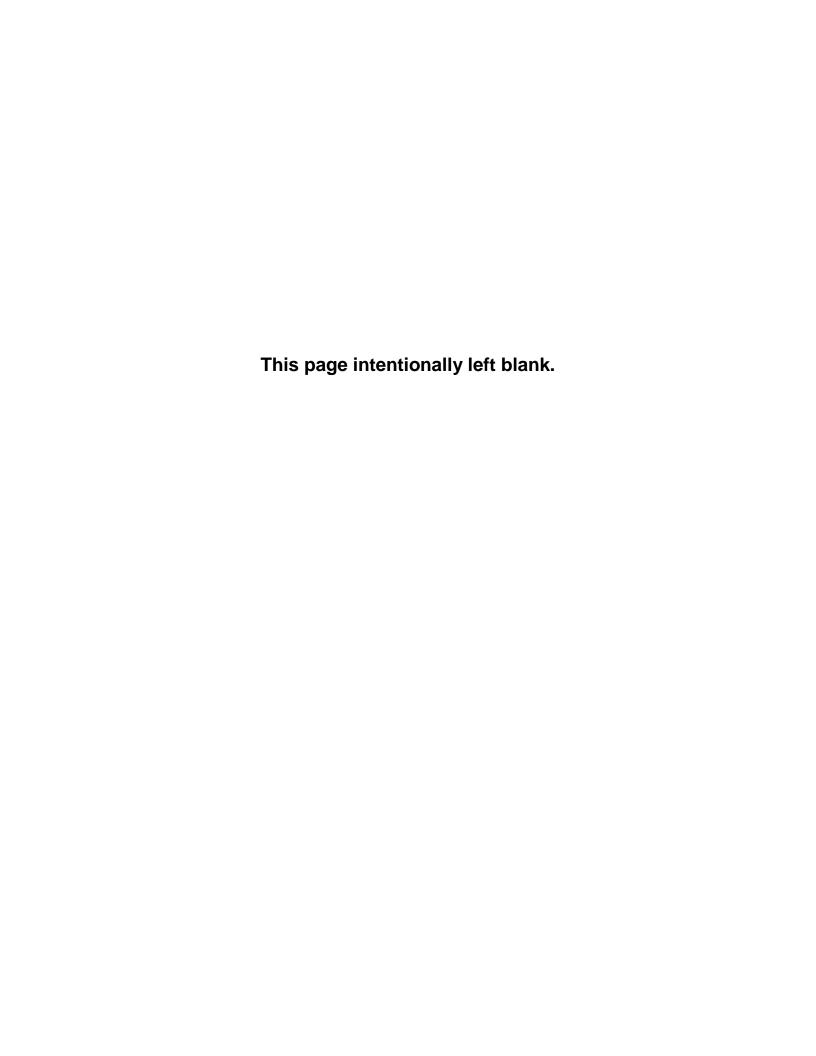

<u>Infrastructure Overview- Trails (with presentation)</u>

The Park Authority infrastructure continues to age without adequate resources to maintain, replace, renovate, and address the deferred maintenance. Over the next year staff will continue to update the Board on the condition some of the agency's most popular park amenities and the maintenance and resource challenges moving forward.

Staff will provide an overview of the current condition of the Park Authority trails to include information on the lifecycle status of the agency's trail inventory, examples of the current conditions and needed repairs and improvements. Staff will also share the history of funding for maintenance and the estimated funding requirements to repair and renovate trails in order to bring them up to acceptable standards moving forward.



Trails-Needs Assessment


- "Physical condition ratings of 'excellent' are below that of the national benchmark" (34%).
 - □ Trails self-assessed at **2%** "excellent".
- Needs Assessment estimated \$6.367 M "Critical" repair need in next 1-5 years, or \$1.28M annually.








Trails-By Supervisor District

TrailsCondition Descriptions

Excellent

New section, recent repairs made, no noticeable wear.

Good

Only surface cracks and normal wear present, repairs not needed.

Fair

- □ Trail has no more than 5 years before repairs are needed.
- Cracks are at least half the depth of total asphalt depth.
- "Alligator" affect present.
- Erosion of shoulder.

Poor

- □ Trail needs immediate repairs.
- Users averting area or proceeding with caution.











TrailsOverall Condition Assessments








Estimated Renovation Needs Over Next 5 Years







Trails-FY18 Budget Request

- Current material funding: \$181 per mile.
- To maintain and improve the most important and valued amenity identified in the park system we requested \$400,000 in material funding, resulting in \$1,412 per mile.
 - Additionally requested 4 seasonal staff to assist with trail maintenance at \$82,000.
 - □ Total Budget Request **\$482,000**.
