Slave Quarter One main room house for up to 10 enslaved workers to live.
One Room School House Small school building, moved to Sully from Haymarket, Virginia.
Plaque from the Daughters of the American Revolution Commemorates Sully's importance to Fairfax County.
Well The original historic well, about 40 feet deep, has a cover, hand crank and wooden bucket.
Kitchen With stone flooring and a large hearth, the enslaved cook, Thornton, made meals for the Lee family and their guests.
Dairy Building Stone building with three trenches built into the floor to allow the spring water to keep milk, eggs, and other foods cool all year around.
Laundry With wooden flooring and a giant cauldron, Patty and Madame Juba washed and ironed clothes and other items for the Lee Family and their Guests.
Chair Rock According to oral tradition, this rock was part of the stoned steps that have been moved to the north side of the house.
Squirrel Weathervane A harbinger of fair and foul weather, the Lee family probably had a weathervane but this one is just a modern decoration.
Smoke House This windowless building was where meats were preserved by means of salting and smoking. It has 5 small holes to allow smoke to slowly exit the building.
Cemetery Not the original burial ground for the Lee Family, both Richard and Elizabeth were reinterred here from Congressional Cemetery in 1973.
