# Virginia Sales Tax Holiday This Weekend



#### When is it?:

**August 3-5, 2018.** The 3-day sales tax holiday starts the first Friday in August at 12:01 a.m. and ends the following Sunday at 11:59 p.m.

#### What is it?:

During the sales tax holiday, you can buy qualifying school supplies, clothing, footwear, hurricane and emergency preparedness items, and Energy Star™ and WaterSense™ products without paying sales tax.

## What items are eligible?:

- School supplies, clothing, and footwear
- Hurricane and emergency preparedness products
- Energy Star<sup>™</sup> and WaterSense<sup>™</sup> products

# Overnight Closures and Lane Shifts on I-66 East in Centreville Area This Week

Overnight lane closures on eastbound I-66 between Route 29 in Centreville and Stringfellow Road began on Tuesday, July 31, and will continue through the weekend. This work is needed to shift lanes toward the inside median to create work zones for construction on the Transform 66 Outside the Beltway project.

Three left lanes of eastbound I-66 will be closed between Route 29 in Centreville and Stringfellow Road so that crews can remove lane markings and make long-term lane shifts. Occasional 15-minute stoppages and slowdowns along eastbound I-66 will occur. Work is scheduled for:

- Saturday, August 4 9:00 p.m. to 9:00 a.m.
- Sunday, August 5 8:00 p.m. to 5:00 a.m.

Additionally, the ramp from Route 28 to eastbound I-66 will be narrowed to a single lane from Saturday, August 4, at 9:00 p.m. to Monday, August 6, at 4:00 a.m., with intermittent 15-minute stoppages and slowdowns during overnight periods.

All work is weather dependent and will be rescheduled if inclement weather occurs.

The I-66 Outside the Beltway Express Lanes are expected to open in December 2022.

# Collect for Kids School Supply & Backpack Drive



In an effort to ensure that every child in the school district is prepared for school, Fairfax County Public Schools (FCPS) has again joined forces with Collect for Kids, a consortium of not-for-profit, for-profit, and government organizations promoting and coordinating school supply and backpack drives to benefit FCPS students. The drive will provide school supplies for the 2018-19 school year for students who qualify for free and reduced-price meals. Roughly 55,000 FCPS students receive free and reduced-price meals and many need help acquiring school supplies and backpacks.


### This year, there are two ways donors may support this effort:

- Monetary Donations: <u>Contributions can be made online</u> through the generous support of the Foundation for FCPS and their support of Collect for Kids effort. Donations will be used to purchase school supply kits in bulk at special pricing.
- Backpack Donations: New backpacks can be brought to a variety of locations in August, including two FCPS administration buildings, any Apple Federal Credit Union location in Fairfax County, and to some not-for-profit partners, including Britepaths, Cornerstones, and Western Fairfax Christian Ministries. Search under Get Involved on the Collect for Kids website for addresses and guidance on the types of backpacks needed.

So that students have the supplies necessary to succeed on the first day of school, the majority of the Collect for Kids activities occur **between July 16 and August**17. Monetary donations are accepted year round, and backpacks are accepted through August.

# Survey for Young Adults: Help Target Drug Prevention Efforts



In an effort to better target opioid and other drug prevention efforts, the <u>Fairfax-Falls Church Community Services Board</u> (CSB) is seeking opinions of young adults between the ages of 18-25. The <u>survey</u> is anonymous and voluntary, and asks questions about use of alcohol, prescription drugs, and heroin. The survey takes no more than five minutes to complete.

An initiative of the Partnership for Success and the OMNI Institute, an organization that works to help organize substance use campaigns, the survey seeks comparison data from residents in various areas across the Commonwealth of Virginia concerning attitudes, knowledge, and drug use of young people.



# **Tree Care Spotlight**



Funds Available to Plant Trees on County Properties & Common Open Spaces

The Tree Preservation and Planting Fund was established to support projects to preserve existing trees and plant new trees by County agencies and non-profit tree planting organizations on both public properties and homeowner association commonly-owned open space. Homeowner associations can partner with non-

profits to submit project proposals and schools can also apply to fund projects with Tree Preservation and Planting Funds. Proposals are reviewed by an inter-agency panel including representatives from Fairfax County Urban Forest Management Division, Stormwater Planning Division, Tree Commission, and NoVA Soil and Water Conservation District. In addition to the environmental benefits that trees provide such as improved air and water quality, stormwater management, and protecting soils, research also shows that there are numerous and important socio-economic and health benefits that trees provide <a href="http://depts.washington.edu/hhwb/">http://depts.washington.edu/hhwb/</a>. A direct benefit of trees to homeowners is increased property values. Homes that are adjacent to naturalistic parks and open spaces are valued at 8-20% higher than comparable properties. Living near green areas, having a view of vegetation, and spending time in urban natural settings can reduce stress, and contribute to enhanced wellness for city dwellers. Pieter Anthony Sheehan, Director of the Division of Environmental Health, Fairfax County Health Department, says: "Urban forests play an extremely important, multifaceted role in maintaining and improving not only the economic and environmental quality conditions of communities but the health of their inhabitants."

Schools are more frequently integrating nature into education, often using gardens or outdoor classrooms. Nature-based, experiential learning can support education about environmental stewardship, math, science, natural and plant processes, ecology, soil, recycling, reuse of materials, plant propagation, food and nutrition, and language arts. A preliminary study of schools that use the Environment as an Integrating Context for learning (EIC) suggests those EIC students tend to academically outperform their peers at traditional schools.

Planting projects are wonderful opportunities to increase property values, raise awareness of the many benefits of trees and teach stewardship to younger generations who will benefit most from trees planted today.
