

# A message from Kathy Smith

There were several pedestrian fatalities in our county last year. Read below about what drivers, cyclists, and pedestrians can do to make the roads safer for everyone. Pedestrian safety is a top priority for the Board of Supervisors and we designated \$110 million in federal, state, and county funding under direction of the Fairfax County Department of Transportation (FCDOT) to construct pedestrian improvements in high-priority areas of Fairfax County. 

## **Give Input on Fairfax County Parkway Widening**

The Virginia Department of Transportation will hold a public information meeting Monday, January 7, 2019 (if cancelled due to inclement weather, the meeting will be rescheduled for Monday, January 14) on plans to widen and make other improvements to about five miles of the Fairfax County Parkway (Route 286) between Route 29 (Lee Highway) and Route 123 (Ox Road).

The proposed preliminary design includes:


- Widening Fairfax County Parkway from four to six lanes
- Building a new interchange at Popes Head Road and the future Shirley
  Gate Road extension
- Improving the Route 123 interchange, as well as the Fairfax County Parkway/Burke Centre Parkway intersection
- Improving the existing Fairfax County Parkway Trail and creating a new shared-use path to make the trail continuous within the project limits

Stop by between 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. at Robinson Secondary School to learn more about the project and review proposed plans. VDOT staff will be available to answer questions. A presentation will being at 7:00 p.m.

# Know Which Holiday Gifts Are Welcome in Parks



While it is fun to head outside to try out new holiday gifts, it is important to know the rules before bringing holiday gifts into parks.

#### Here are some tips:

- Drones are allowed but you must comply with Federal Aviation
  Administration directives. To find out all the rules and regulations you
  must follow safely and responsibly to use drones in parks, click here.
- Projectiles are prohibited, including: bows and arrows, Tasers, spears, slingshots, dart devices, and other high-speed missile projectiles.
- Knives with a blade more than four inches in length are prohibited, unless it is being used to prepare food.
- Metal detectors may only be used with the FCPA's express written permission.
- Keep your new furry friend on a leash, and no visiting a dog park until they are at least four months old and not in heat.
- New pony? Stay in designated equestrian/riding areas.
- Feel free to try out the new fishing rod, but you must comply with
  Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries laws and park rules.
- Keep bicycles and skis on established trails, walkways, and roadways.
  No off-trail use.

## **Energy Saving Tips: Lighting**

#### These low- and no-cost tips can help you save energy:

- Always turn off lights when leaving a room!
  - Install timers, sensors, or other controls to automatically turn lights off for you.
- Install dimmers to save electricity when light levels can be lowered.
  Before installing, check that the dimmers are compatible with the light bulbs you want to use.
- Purchase ENERGY STAR® qualified LEDs (light emitting diodes) when buying new light bulbs, and replace incandescent bulbs with LEDs in frequently used areas. LEDs consume the least amount of energy, have the longest expected lifetime, and are the cheapest option over

the lifetime of the lamp. Compared to incandescent bulbs or even CFLs, LEDs give off very little heat. This makes LEDs safer to touch, less of a fire hazard, and easier on your home cooling bill. LEDs do not contain mercury, so they are safer to handle and dispose of. For more information about LEDs and choosing the right bulb for your home, click <a href="here">here</a>.

## **Tree Care Spotlight**



**Hemlock Wooly Adelgid** 

In the 1950's a particularly nasty invasive insect called the hemlock wooly adelgid (HWA) arrived in the U.S. on infested ornamental hemlock trees. This insect feeds on the sap of hemlock trees (Tsuga sp.). The American species (Eastern and Carolina hemlocks) have no defense against this invasive pest

and will eventually be killed. Hemlocks are slow growing and very long lived trees and have been nearly wiped out in the nearby Shenandoah National Park.

The hemlock wooly adelgid (*Adelges tsugae*) looks like white clumps on the undersides of branches of hemlocks (pictured). Each fluffy spot is actually a group of aphid-like insects covered by a white wax to protect them from predators.

Symptoms of infestation include yellow, chlorotic needles or needle loss, loss of tree vigor and dead branches. Hemlock wooly adelgid is a relatively slow killer and may take up to ten years before a tree succumbs.

If you find HWA on your trees, there are several control options which include the systemic insecticides imidacloprid and azadirachtin for larger trees, insecticidal soap, or dormant/horticultural oil for trees where the whole canopy is accessible. Make sure to follow the directions on the label when using any insecticide.
