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

And the best thing of all, the CSA Consent can now be in effect from the date of signature until the child reaches the age of 18 or until the end of the child and family's participation in CSA services. Case managers will no longer have to worry about keeping up with expired consents!

FAIRFAX COUNTY YOUTH ADVISORY COUNCIL (YAC)

Youth deserve to be equal partners in creating change.

Healthy Minds Fairfax and JSSA are creating a Youth Advisory Council. The council will be made up of youth who are 14-22 years old who live in Fairfax County. Youth will also need to have lived experience navigating systems such as Foster Care, Juvenile Justice, mental/behavioral health programs and Homeless Services.

Participants will receive training and support to use their life expertise to inform and foster change in Fairfax County. Council Members will be asked to dedicate an average of seven hours a month and serve a one year term. Participants will attend in meetings, participate in trainings, share their experiences and opinions, and engage in advocacy opportunities. In return Council Members will receive:

- An hourly stipend of \$9.50
- Reimbursement for childcare expenses
- Assistance with transportation as needed
- Trainings on advocacy and leadership
- Marketable experience for future employment or education opportunities.

Applicants do not need any prior experience with clubs or on committees. Accommodations will be made to ensure anyone interested can complete the application process.

HEALTHY MINDS FAIRFAX TRANSITIONS PROGRAM

JSSA provides care coordination, linkages to community resources and supports, and peer-to-peer support for transition-age youth (16-25 years of age) who are:

- Experiencing intensive needs across multitude life domains
- Not currently being served by other care coordination or case management programs.

The program is provided free of charge to any eligible residents of Fairfax County.

Program Features

- An individualized, strengths-based, team-based, collaborative approach to service coordination
- A youth-driven process that provides support for information and referral, skill training, and the development of sustainable resources and supports to meet identified needs
- A trained care coordinator to meet with the youth and develop a team to identify needs and strengths and facilitate connections to services and supports
- Access to peer support to assist youth in developing skills, knowledge, and abilities.

ALIGNING THE CANS WITH THE CSA SERVICE REQUEST

You have written a thoughtful, descriptive, and focused narrative in your CSA request that explains the needs, goals, and reason for requested services. You've gathered information from the family, the team and service providers to score the CANS—capturing the youth and family's strengths and areas of need. But are the CANS assessment and the CSA service request working together to accurately reflect the MAP developed by the team?

To ensure alignment across your documentation, it can be helpful to use the narrative to review the CANS assessment. Before closing the CANS in CANVaS, look at the scores and review them against what you have written. Does the CANS represent what the team discussed (MAP), the narrative you have written, and the strengths and intervention needs of the family?

If all the documentation is in alignment and the CANS is accurately depicting the reality of the situation then close the assessment and prepare the documents to come forward to CSA. This is a helpful way to ensure all the information provided is consistent and will best inform the Utilization Review team.

ENTERING CANS RATINGS IN CANVAS

Case managers are expected to enter CANS (Child and Adolescents Needs and Strengths) ratings into the state information system— CANVaS. Visit the Office for Children's Services website for CANVaS training videos and user manual https://www.csa.virginia.gov/Cans/ Index.

Creating a CANVaS account is easy ... just complete the <u>CANVaS New Case</u> <u>Manager Account form</u> and return it to CSA along with your CANS Training Certificate.

REMINDER: CANS "BUBBLE" FORMS NO LONGER BEING USED

As you know, the use of the state CANVaS system is required for all CANS assessments. Therefore, the CANS "bubble sheet" forms on the CSA website(s) were removed from the CSA websites on September 1, 2021. If you have not yet created a CANVaS account, please take the time to create one as soon as possible by following the steps outlined above.

RESIDENTIAL TREATMENT (RTC) PLACEMENT POLICY REMINDER

As of September 1, 2021, case managers who are placing youth in residential facilities need to complete the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services' (DBHDS) form when a child or youth has not been placed within 30 days of FAPT meeting and approval of such services.



Exceptions

An exception to the above requirement is made if a youth is placed in detention and/or if the team is attempting a community-based plan prior to pursuing residential treatment.

- For a youth who is placed in detention, the 30-day time count stops while the youth is placed in detention and resumes upon release from detention.
- For a youth whom FAPT has approved residential treatment and/or an intensive community-based plan and the team determines it is best to attempt community-based services first, the 30-day count begins when the team begins the search for residential treatment.

Questions/Concerns About Possible Fraud?

If you have concerns about service delivery, the Service Summaries distributed by CSA are a good mechanism for reporting those concerns. CSA program staff are also always available to discuss any questions or concerns you may have.

Additionally, a more formal process can be followed by contacting the Fairfax County Fraud Hotline at 703.787.3243 to report an allegation. The calls are reviewed and followed up on by the Internal Audit Office.
