



## **ABOUT THE SWMP**

The Solid Waste Management Plan addresses all trash & recycling for the next 20 years.

### INTEGRATED MANAGEMENT

Solid waste includes almost everything we throw away or recycle, including yard waste, brush, household trash, recyclables, commercial trash, industrial waste, and construction debris.

An integrated management system controls everything that happens to solid waste: collection, transfer, recycling, and disposal. The SWMP will identify and plan for all aspects of a high-quality integrated solid waste management system for Fairfax County.

#### LONG-RANGE PLANNING

The SWMP will project waste management needs for our expanding population, regulatory requirements, & technological developments for the next 20 years. This will help us use the SWMP process to identify strategies to preserve our environmental quality of life.


