Dairy Days at the Sully Historic Site



Discover the "whey" of the dairy at Sully Historic Site as you lend a hand to churn butter and crank ice cream. Sample the cool, creamy treats and then play historic games on the south lawn for a taste of 18th century life. New this year, along with the churning of vanilla ice cream will be a second, special summer flavor.

Learn the history of ice cream in America that goes back to the 18th century. According to the International Dairy Foods Association, historic records indicate that George Washington spent approximately \$200 for ice cream during the summer of 1790. In 1813, Dolley Madison served strawberry ice cream at President Madison's second inaugural banquet at the White House. At Sully, the Lee's received an "ice cream mould of tin" in 1802.

Yard Waste Message

Bagging Yard Waste in Plastic is NOT Fantastic

Instead of collecting yard waste in plastic bags, consider using reusable containers, paper bags, and bundling branches. Using plastic bags for collection of yard waste is not a sustainable or cost effective practice.

Plastic Bags are Environmentally Unfriendly

Manufacturing plastic bags consumes energy and non-renewable natural resources, and the bags “junk up the works” at our regional yard waste processing facilities. Using plastic bags for yard waste is expensive because it requires removing the material from the bags before it can be processed, which adds significant equipment, labor, and disposal costs.

Plastic Bags are Inefficient

An estimated 20 percent of yard waste is lost because it clings to the plastic bags that must be disposed of as waste. When breaking open the bags, small pieces of plastic make their way into the compost, compromising quality and resulting in reduced revenues.



Paper Bags are Biodegradable

While paper bags may cost a little more than plastic bags, their use reduces overall environmental impacts and processing costs. Not only are paper bags

manufactured from a renewable resource and use less energy to manufacture, they break down naturally when composted.

Using paper bags or reusable containers instead of plastic is a win-win for the facilities that manage our yard waste and those who ultimately use these products to improve the health of soil and the look of their yards

Recycling Yard Waste is Required



Fairfax County's Solid Waste Management Program is responsible for ensuring trash and recycling are properly managed. This is accomplished by implementing the county's solid waste management ordinance, Chapter 109.1, which defines yard waste as brush, leaves and grass, and requires that these materials be recycled.

Special Extended Hours in Preparation for the School Year

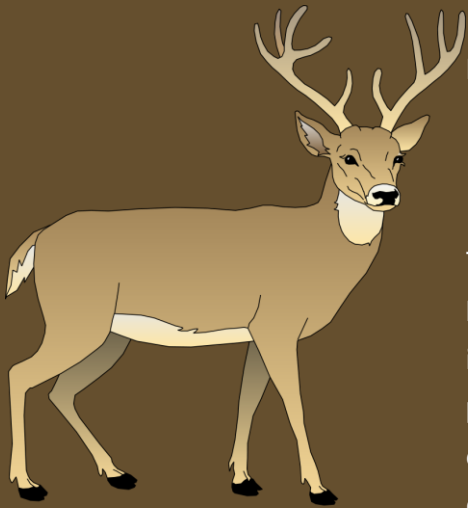
For your convenience the Health Department is offering extended walk-in hours for school-required immunizations and tuberculosis screening at [all clinic sites](#):

Public Meetings for the Fairfax County Deer Management Program will be held Tuesday, August 16, 7 p.m. at the Mount Vernon District Station, 2511 Parkers Lane, Alexandria, Community Room.

The Fairfax County Deer Management Program helps to curtail the impacts of overabundant deer including thousands of deer-vehicle collisions, potential spread of diseases, and environmental damage attributed to deer that can impact the entire ecosystem.

The program uses the most safe, effective, and sustainable deer management methods currently permitted by the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries. These methods include archery, managed shotgun hunts, and sharpshooting.
