Preparations Underway for Increased Ridership Sunday at Vienna Metro Station



We are expecting increased ridership at the Vienna Metro Station on Sunday. Several groups associated with rallies in Charlottesville on Saturday, the 11th of August, intend to travel to Fairfax County to use the Orange Line to travel into the District of Columbia. To ensure the safety of the public and out of an abundance of caution, there will be a large police presence at the Vienna Metro Station between 12:00 p.m. and 10:00 p.m. on Sunday, August 12.

Chief Roessler today stated, "The Fairfax County Police Department is working diligently with other area law enforcement agencies to maintain a safe environment for everyone to freely express their First Amendment rights. We also want to ensure the safety of our residents and those passing through our county."

Sully Takes Swift Action to Protect Migratory Birds



The first residents of Sully lived there more than 200 years ago, but today Sully Historic Site is home to a new family: chimney swifts. These small, migratory birds recently moved into the chimney of the original 18th century kitchen and made a temporary home.

Chimney swifts migrate in the fall to Peru or elsewhere in the Amazon Basin in South America. They are protected by the Migratory Bird Treaty Act of 1918, making it illegal to disturb the birds, their nests or eggs. To protect the birds for the next six to eight weeks, Sully will do its part with some minor programming changes.

The original kitchen hearth and chimney have been usable for centuries, and Sully kitchen programs often include a hearth fire to demonstrate the kitchen use. However, to prevent disturbing the birds' nesting cycle, no fires will be lit until they leave.

Although Sully Historic Site's primary focus is on the preservation of the historic structures and resources, as part of the Fairfax County Park Authority, Sully takes pride in doing its part to protect natural resources as well.



Metrorail Orange, Blue, and Silver Line Passengers Should Consider Travel Alternatives



Beginning Saturday, August 11, 2018, through Sunday, August 26, 2018, Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA) will conduct <u>around the clock construction on a segment of the Metrorail Orange, Blue and Silver lines</u> resulting in limited capacity, and possible crowding and delays.

Weekday service highlights:

- Silver Line trains will operate between Wiehle-Reston East and Largo Town
 Center every 20 minutes at all times.
- Orange Line trains will operate between Vienna and New Carrollton every 20 minutes at all times.
- Blue Line trains will operate between Franconia-Springfield and Arlington Cemetery every 16 minutes during rush hour periods; every 12 minutes midday and evenings; every 20 minutes after 10:00 p.m.
- During rush hour, additional Yellow Line trains will operate between
 Franconia-Springfield and Greenbelt every 16 minutes for added capacity

- into D.C., and to accommodate Blue Line customers traveling between Virginia and Downtown D.C.
- No rail or bus service between Rosslyn and Arlington Cemetery. Use the Yellow Line and transfer to/from the Orange or Silver lines at L'Enfant Plaza.

Know Your Travel Options and Plan Now:

To avoid gridlock, Fairfax County commuters are urged to consider the use of alternative travel options such as express bus connections, carpooling, slugging, and biking. Employers are also strongly encouraged to allow telework and flexible schedules, whenever possible.

There are 4,000+ spaces currently available at <u>Park-and-Rides</u> (with access to HOV and <u>HOT lanes</u>), across Fairfax County for catching an express bus, a VRE train, a carpool/vanpool, or to form a slug line. If you currently park and ride from Vienna, Dunn Loring, West Falls Church, East Falls Church or Wiehle-Reston East stations, consider using alternate connections, or Yellow/Blue Line facilities.

Most Park-and-Ride facilities also offer bike lockers and rooms, and all Fairfax Connector buses feature bike racks for easy <u>transfer from trails to transit</u>.

The Buzz About a New (and Free) Statewide Beehive Program



After a sharp decline in beehives across Virginia, you can help rebuild the critical local buzz that's needed.

Virginia's recently established **Beehive Distribution Program provides beehives to both new and established beekeepers** in an effort to increase the number of actively managed bee colonies.

"Last winter, Virginia lost 59.5 percent of its hives," said Keith Tignor, state apiarist. "The Beehive Distribution Program will help counteract those dramatic losses by assisting beekeepers in establishing new hives."

The program provides beehive equipment directly to eligible beekeepers. Residents of Virginia who are 18 years of age or older are eligible to receive up to three beehive units per year. Individuals who receive a beehive unit will be registered as beekeepers, allowing for periodic inspection of beehives

New Regional Agreement Lights the Way for LED Streetlights in Fairfax County



Fairfax County helped to lead the effort to create a new regional agreement with Dominion Energy that lights the way for converting existing streetlights to more energy- efficient LEDs.

The agreement makes transitioning to LEDs less expensive for local governments and offers more options in the future.

Dominion installs, owns, operates, and maintains most of the <u>nearly 58,000</u> <u>streetlights in Fairfax County</u>. The new agreement presents an opportunity to begin

converting these lights to LEDs, according to county officials. The county would be responsible for paying to replace existing high-pressure sodium, metal halide and mercury vapor streetlights with LEDs.

LED streetlights use 40 to 60 percent less electricity when compared to conventional streetlights, and they last up to three to four times longer.

Fairfax County also recently adopted a <u>new, broader operational energy strategy</u> that aims to significantly lower utility bills and carbon emissions. This strategy will cut energy consumption in county buildings and facilities by 20 percent per square foot over 10 years.

Caring for the Trees in Our 427 County Parks



Responsible for tree care in all 427 county parks, the <u>Park Authority's</u> Forestry Operations has a unique role in our county.

"Ideally, the job would be a mixture of pruning, tree health management, specialized young tree care, and tree removals," explains Scott Diffenderfer, the Park Authority's urban forestry manager. "Sadly, tree removal accounts for 99 percent of our work."

Challenges: Pests and Weather:

The <u>emerald ash borer</u>, which attacks ash trees, accounts for many of the removals. Since the start of 2015, Forestry has taken down nearly 1,000 ash trees and the work has only just begun. In addition to the ash trees, Forestry took down

approximately 2,900 more trees. More than 1,000 were oaks.

Weather conditions, especially high summer temperatures and extreme drought have a big impact on a tree's health. In the spring of 2016, the area had a late frost, and it is likely this frost took place at the same time as oak bud break began.


How the Work Gets Done:

Tree chippers, dump trucks, stump grinders, aerial lift, a variety of chainsaws and numerous hand tools, ropes, and hardware are the tools of the trade for the staff, which can vary from four to eight due to seasonal employee changes. They work from 6:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., primarily doing tree removals. Other jobs can include trail clearing, tree pruning, and storm response.

Work is scheduled based on priority. Priority 1 usually indicates a high-risk tree or limb that needs to be removed. Spring through July are typically the busiest times for crews.
