DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

This was a year of tremendous change and growth for the Fairfax County Animal Shelter.

In October, we opened our second campus in Lorton. This facility allows us to substantially grow the geographic reach and impact of our work for the residents of Fairfax County and their pets. Not only are we able to create even more families through adoption, but the second campus provides a hub for essential services, including behavior and training support, veterinary medical care, pet supplies and other critical services that help keep pets with their families. We enjoyed connecting with families and their pets in the southern part of the county who accessed our services and programs for the first time this past year.

We also grew our team, adding 31 additional staff to support the opening of the Lorton Campus. We expanded our volunteer opportunities, allowing us to provide additional enrichment, exercise and attention to our shelter animals and support to people and their pets through the Pet Resource Center. I am incredibly proud of the creativity, resilience and commitment demonstrated by our staff and volunteer community during a year of so much change.

Like most shelters around the United States, we faced an unprecedented surge in animal intakes. We encountered more than a 20% increase in animals coming into our care over the previous year. Many of the animals entering our doors experienced complex medical and behavioral needs that required specialized care and additional resources.

Despite these challenges, the Fairfax County Animal Shelter never turned away an animal in need and our commitment to providing the highest quality of care did not waver. In 2023, we identified and removed barriers in our adoption process, expanded our foster team, boosted promotions and marketing of our adoptable pets, and partnered with more community organizations to broaden the

Amidst these transformations, our enduring commitment to improving the lives and well-being of both pets and people, one life, one need and one animal at a time, remained steadfast. These achievements would not have been possible without the dedication of our amazing fosters and volunteers, the expertise of our veterinary team, the generous support of the Friends of Fairfax County Animal Shelter and the unwavering support of our wonderful community.

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A YEAR OF CHANGE

In 2023, the Fairfax County Animal Shelter experienced significant growth, with the opening of the Lorton Campus increasing our capacity to serve the community. We launched new programs that expanded the services offered to people and pets in the community. Simultaneously, we introduced additional staff and cultivated a more diverse team, reflecting the vibrant community we serve. Here are some of the exciting enhancements that we made:

- We hired and promoted 31 people to support the Lorton Campus and expand community programs.
- 27% of our new hires are individuals from ethnically diverse backgrounds.

The Lorton Campus includes:

- Fear Free[™] Shelter Program design features that focus on the mental and emotional well-being of shelter pets.
- An upgraded veterinary suite, approximately four times larger than the existing veterinary suite at the Michael R. Frey Campus on West Ox Road.

With expanded capabilities, we will provide even more services for pets, including blood work, ultrasounds, digital X-rays and full dental surgeries.

- **20,000-square-foot** outdoor space with **seven** individually fenced dog play yards.
- 44 double-sided dog kennels, including an isolation kennel with windows for natural light.
- 42 cat condos with multiple levels, exposure to natural light and a view to the outside word.
- Two catios that offer cats the best of both worlds: a secure outdoor space where they can enjoy the sights and sounds of nature and snooze in the sun.
- Four small animal rooms equipped with adaptable modular cages, allowing for configuration tailored to varying species.

KEEPING PETS & FAMILIES TOGETHER

The mission of the Fairfax County **Pet Resource Center** is to preserve the bond of Fairfax County residents with their companion animals and to safeguard complete family units. The Pet Resource Center offers several programs and services to carry out its mission.

VACCINE AND MICROCHIP CLINICS

Fairfax County Animal Shelter hosts monthly clinics at both of our campuses. Our clinics offer Fairfax County residents an opportunity to vaccinate and/or microchip their pet(s) in an accessible and affordable way.

PET PANTRY

Our pet pantry provides pet food and supplies to Fairfax County residents who need assistance caring for their pet(s) or are facing hardship.

PETHAVEN PROGRAM

Domestic violence and animal abuse are often connected. The Fairfax County Animal Shelter offers a discreet, short-term pet care option for pet guardians who need to leave a bad situation. The goal of this program is to allow pet guardians to not worry about the safety of their pets while finding a safe place for themselves.

THERESA'S STORY

The Perez family found themselves grappling with the challenges of Theresa, their cat, displaying behaviors associated with being in heat. Faced with the prospect of surrendering

her, the family reached out to the Fairfax County Animal Shelter. The Customer Care staff promptly referred them to the Pet Resource Center for assistance.



In discussions with our Pet Resource

Center Manager, the Perez family was presented with a proactive solution. Instead of surrendering Theresa, they were offered the option of having her spayed to mitigate the behavioral issues. Eager to keep Theresa as a cherished member of their family, the Perez family happily agreed to the proposal.

In addition to spay surgery, Theresa received vaccinations for rabies and FVRCP, along with a microchip for identification purposes.

Recognizing the need for Theresa's FVRCP booster, the Pet Resource Center provided the Perez family with a voucher to attend the upcoming Vaccine and Microchip clinic. This ensured that Theresa would receive the necessary follow-up vaccinations and preventive care.

Thanks to the support of the Fairfax County Animal Shelter's Pet Resource Center, the Perez family successfully addressed Theresa's behavioral challenges and prioritized her overall health. The Perez family was very thankful and happy to not have to part with Theresa and we were thrilled to keep this wonderful family together.



VOLUNTEERS SHOW UP

If there is anything that we can count on through all the changes and growth that we have gone through, it is our volunteers. Whether they are here to socialize with cats, walk dogs, help wash our countless dirty dishes, or are out in the community helping with events or taking dogs out for a long hike, our volunteers show up. In fact, in 2023, they showed up with 41% more hours of service given than in the previous year!
























COMPASSIONATE JOURNEYS

DALLAS



WE GET BY WITH A LOT OF HELP FROM OUR FRIENDS

Friends of the Fairfax County Animal Shelter (Friends) is the 501 (c) (3) nonprofit fundraising partner of the Fairfax County Animal Shelter. With the support of many pet-loving donors and volunteers, Friends funds important needs beyond what the shelter's budget can provide. Here is what 2023 looked like for Friends, thanks to your support:

58 pets provided with dental care to improve overall health, reduce pain and help set up pets and their adopters for success totaling \$58,155

46 pets provided with medical treatment, including emergency life-saving medical care totaling \$79,777

1.895 dogs and puppies, 1,640 cats and kittens and 182 rabbits received parasite prevention, totaling \$83,682

Adopters of **851** dogs and **1,312** cats provided with supplies that included leashes for dogs and collars with personalized tags, totaling **\$25,156**

30 pets highlighted on Friends' social media as part of the Friends Spotlight Program

\$8,579 for enrichment items, shelter support and training, etc.

480 community cats were spayed/ neutered, vaccinated, ear-tipped and examined as part of the shelter's TNR program with \$36,848 from Friends
