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Braddock Road Study Moving Forward

Fairfax County is working with the community to evaluate improvements for the Braddock Road corridor, between Guinea Road and I-495. Potential improvements may include additional travel lanes, HOV lanes, HOT lanes, pedestrian and bicycle improvements, and intersection improvements.

You may recall that in November 2014, Fairfax County selected RK&K consulting to conduct a study of the proposed project area to recommend a plan for increasing the capacity of the Braddock Road corridor. In particular, the study will be addressing the following potential projects: the construction of one HOV lane in each direction from Burke Lake Road to I-495, the construction of one general purpose lane in each direction from Guinea Road to Burke Lake Road, and the construction of a transit center along Braddock Road near the Kings Park Shopping Center. RK&K will also study a “no-build” option for comparison with each design option.



Supervisor Cook has served on Fairfax County Board of Supervisors since 2009 and lives in Kings Park with his wife and children.

Proposed Fiscal Year 2016 Budget Update

On February 17, the County Executive presented his proposed Fiscal Year 2016 Advertised Budget Plan to the Board of Supervisors. Supervisor Cook held two meetings during the month of March to allow community members to share their thoughts and concerns about this budget season. The first meeting which was co-hosted by the Braddock District Council, took place on March 11th. At the second town hall meeting on March 17th, County Executive Ed Long presented the budget at Frost Middle School. Supervisor Cook received helpful feedback at both meetings, and he will continue to work with all residents to create and pass a fiscally responsible budget that meets the needs of Fairfax County.

At the board meeting on March 3rd, the Board of Supervisors voted on whether to raise the salaries of future supervisors by \$20,000 a year. While Supervisor Cook did not vote for the pay raise, it was still passed by a 6-4 vote. This is the first pay increase since 2008 and it will be effective beginning on January 1, 2016.

Supervisor Cook has presented three budget consideration items to the Board. Supervisor Cook has requested that funding for the County Grass Ordinance be restored and that funding for two new Probation Officer positions for the Veterans Treatment Docket be considered. Lastly, Supervisor Cook requested that funding for the National Army Museum also be added as a budget consideration item.

U-Haul It. (RZ 2015-BR-001, and SE 2015-BR-001)

Representatives from the Ravensworth Farm and North Springfield Communities received a presentation from U-Haul on March 26th about their Special Exception application to adapt the interior of an existing vacant warehouse at 5271 and 5285 Port Royal Road in the Ravensworth Industrial area at a Floor Area Ratio of .90. The Braddock District Land Use Committee also received a presentation on March 17th. In addition, the applicant seeks to rezone this property from I-4 to I-5 to allow the truck rental use. In response to questions from the community, residents were told that there would be an elevator installed to insure that most units were accessible, that unit holders with unique needs would have 24 hour key card access, and that use of the storage units usually generated an average of 12-24 trips per month. Fifty percent of the 900-1,000 units will be climate controlled ranging in size from 5x15 to 10-15 square feet. Two of the four decorative parapets will have lit signs with the word U-HAUL, but these signs will be turned off at 11:00 p.m. The trash dumpster will be inside the building and sufficient parking for customers and trucks will be provided on-site. The company has an agreement with Goodwill to dispose of abandoned or unwanted furniture. A public hearing before the Planning Commission is currently scheduled for May 21st. 

Woodglen Lake Dredging Project Begins

On March 18, Supervisor Cook hosted a “Pardon our Dust” meeting as a kickoff to the start of formal dredge operations at Woodglen Lake. Woodglen is part of the PL-566 network of lakes created in Fairfax County in the 1970s to provide flood control in hopes of reducing the threat to loss of life and property for the many households, major roads, and railroad lines that are downstream of the lake. The lake currently receives about 1,200 cubic yards of sediment annually from nearby streams, gradually filling the headwaters with deposits from a square mile drainage area.



A contract to remove 34,500 cubic yards of sediment and restore the shoreline over a period of seven months has now been awarded to ASI Constructors, Inc. which has recently completed the successful removal of sediment from Huntsman Lake in Springfield. The contract cost is \$3.1 million. Sediment will be taken to a county-owned facility in Lorton. Staff is currently completing a drawdown of the lake at a rate of about six inches per day. A fish-shocking was completed in November, and the majority of the fish were removed to Lake Accotink at that time. A second attempt will be made shortly to remove any remaining fish who were already too deep to be reached in the fall. Once the dredge is completed, the county has an agreement with the Department of Game and Inland Fisheries to restock the lake over a period of three years to fully establish species of different sizes.

A Notice to Proceed will be issued April 7th, although removal of sediment will not begin before May 1st. The contractor requires several weeks to build a staging site and an access road from the lakebed. One of the major unresolved concerns raised by the community at the meeting was regarding truck traffic to and from the site. A Maintenance of Traffic Plan (MOT) will be provided by the contractor and made available to the community and VDOT for review and comment during the week of April 6th. Any resident who provides the office with an email address will receive a copy of this Plan. Comments will be accepted and provided to the County Capital Facilities Division and to VDOT for analysis. The comment period will close on Monday, April 13th.
