ANTHONY VELLUCCI & MONICA JACKSON NAMED LORD AND LADY FAIRFAX

The tradition of honoring the Lords and Ladies Fairfax began in 1984 as a way to recognize the accomplishments of outstanding citizens of Fairfax County. Each member of the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors selects two people from his or her district who have demonstrated outstanding volunteer service, heroism, or other special accomplishments to receive the award.

Anthony Vellucci is the Braddock District Representative to the Park Authority Board and has been instrumental in advancing park projects and issues for Braddock District residents, such as a new playground for Old Forge/Surrey Square.

He worked tirelessly to transform the defunct Kings West Swim Club into a neighborhood park, including organizing a community naming contest resulting in Rabbit Branch Park. For the last five years, after having been the president of the Kings Park West Civic Association, he has been the driving force behind the KPW Road Raiders - a group of neighborhood volunteers that clean up common areas ensuring community attractiveness.

He has assisted in helping Braddock Dogs to organize and execute a Memorandum of Understanding with Park Authority; and arranging for Braddock Dogs to provide refreshments at Braddock Nights to raise funds for the imminent Off Leash Dog Area at Monticello Park. Earlier this year he volunteered to take on the Presidency of the Friends of Lake Accotink Park (FLAP), guiding this 110 member organization which encompasses over 12 neighboring community and civic associations.

Monica Jackson operates Jackson Child Care; a 5-Star licensed Family Day Home for children three to 10 years.

In addition to offering affordable quality child care services, Ms. Jackson spent over 30 years helping others develop the skills they need to build successful businesses.

She recently worked with the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors to ensure that licensed care providers have the required knowledge and resources to offer safe and nurturing learning environments in accordance with zoning ordinance.

As past, president of the Virginia Alliance of Family Child Care Associations and current Vice Chairman of the Fairfax Child Care Advisory Council, Ms. Jackson spearheads numerous initiatives to empower local professionals to adopt the most up-to-date teaching techniques and childcare best practices. Her work at George Mason University and around the state has increased awareness of groundbreaking research, as well as funding, training, and opportunities for Virginians of all ages.

JOIN THE NEIGHBORHOOD SPEEDING INITIATIVE

As you may recall, last year the Board of Supervisors approved funding for my initiative against neighborhood speeding. This initiative will provide the beginnings of an enhanced public outreach effort asking people to slow down, obey the speed limit, and follow safe driving practices. You and I know that neighborhood speeding is a primary concern of our neighbors. The Police Department tells us that most speeding in a neighborhood is done by its own residents. Therefore, it is imperative for us to take the lead in convincing our neighbors to drive safely.

When I was civic association president, our community found success in the concept of “voluntary compliance.” Residents made the joint commitment to learn about, and follow, the law. I believe this concept can help us work together to combat neighborhood speeding.

I have created a draft resolution that I ask you to consider placing before your neighborhood association for approval. Of course, passage of a resolution is not enough, but along with follow up through your regular channels of neighborhood communication we can make a difference. If you will join me in this effort to seek the voluntary compliance of our residents to traffic laws and safe driving practices, I believe we can make strong progress on this issue.

I will issue certificates of participation to each neighborhood which adopts a safe driving initiative or resolution along the lines of what I provide here. I hope you will join me in this important effort.

WOODGLEN LAKE DREDGING READY FOR BID

Final design plans are now approved for the dredging of Woodglen Lake. Construction funding has been formally allocated in the County's FY2015 budget which begins July 1, and the project is now ready for bid. County staff will invite potential contractors to a meeting to review the specifications for the project in mid-June and hope to issue the Request for Proposals by the end of June. Allowing for county staff review and Board approval of the contract, this project should be under construction by October 1. Contractors will have the option of bidding the project as either a wet dredge (barge in the lake removing sediment) or a dry dredge (drawing down the lake). Residents interested in seeing a "dry dredge" in process are invited to visit Huntsman Lake in the Springfield District at: 9150 Dorothy Lane, off the Fairfax County Parkway and Huntsman Blvd.

WAKEFIELD RUN STREAM RESTORATION COMPLETED

What was once a degraded, eroding and unstable stream is now a restored waterway with meanders and gentle slopes, planted banks, and shorter, more effective rip-rap outfalls.

The natural channel design methods used by the team in the Wakefield Run Stream have restored the stream to a gem in the neighborhood.

Supervisor Cook attended a ribbon cutting ceremonies to mark the completion of this project in Mid-May.

The Wakefield Run Stream Restoration project established a stable channel with meanders and gentle slopes, planted banks, and shorter, more effective rip-rap outfalls along 820 linear feet this tributary. In addition, the flood plain that was no longer functioning

properly due to highly-eroded stream banks has been recreated. The project team installed various structures to slow down the flow of water during flooding events, including root wads,



logs, and rock steps and vanes. Imported sand and gravel were used to create a new stream bed. Native vegetation was planted to promote natural reforestation of the site. Each year the restored stream will prevent 40 pounds of phosphorous, 355 pounds of nitrogen, and 76,000 pounds of suspended solids from entering Accotink Creek. A steel bridge

along the Cross County Trail that had been severely eroded was also repaired by the Park Authority.

Technology for Trees, Rain Gardens & Stormwater

Virginia Tech Tree ID Smart Phone App

Virginia Tech Tree Identification brings the award winning Virginia Tech tree information to your Android smart phone. It contains fact sheets for 969 woody plants from all over North America with an in depth description, range map and thousands of color images of leaves, flowers, fruit, twigs, bark and form. Users can narrow the species list for any location in North America using the phone's GPS, network signal or any entered address or zip code. Rain Garden Smart Phone App

The UConn Center for Land Use Education and Research (CLEAR) has developed a Rain Garden smart phone app that is now available for download from iTunes. The app is targeted to homeowners and contractors, and leads the user through the proper siting, sizing, construction, planting and maintenance of a rain garden. It includes nifty tools to help the user figure out the proper size of the garden, find out about local soil conditions, get a handle on the price of construction, and customize a plant list that will delight the eye while soaking up stormwater. In addition, there are 6 short video segments explaining various aspects of rain garden care and feeding. The app is only for iPhones at the moment, but there will be an Android version out soon. Also, the imagery and plants are specific to CT, but they are starting work on a national version that will have extensive databases for each area of the country. The National Stormwater Calculator Lets You Estimate Your Stormwater Load

Stormwater runoff is one of the biggest sources of pollution and stream degradation in the DC Metro area. The EPA's National Stormwater Calculator will allow you to estimate the annual volume of stormwater created on your property and how much you can reduce through the use of Low Impact Development (LID) practices. MEALS TAX COMMENTS

Chairman Bulova convened a task force to review the pros and cons associated with a meals tax in Fairfax County. The mission of the task force is to consider and prepare a report to the Board of Supervisors to evaluate: Whether or not to proceed with a referendum for a meals tax; If the Board proceeds with a referendum, when the question should be put to the voters (i.e. what year); If a referendum will be considered, should it address how the revenue could be used – and if so, for what purpose.

The Meals Tax Committee will meet once more before presenting their findings to the Board of Supervisors. The meeting will take place June 11, 7:30 p.m., Conference Room 232 of the Fairfax County Government Center.

BRADDOCK ROAD WIDENING UPDATE

The citizen's committee convened to examine potentially widening Braddock Road has met twice and now adjourned for the summer. The topics addressed were the overarching ideas and concluded with the County putting forth a Request for Proposals (RFP) for the study to be undertaken. TRANSPORTATION BOND TO BE ON NOV. 4 BALLOT

On Nov. 4, Fairfax County voters will be asked to vote yes or no on a \$100 million transportation bond referendum.

If approved, the county will sell bonds to pay its contractual obligation to fund improvements to the County's transportation infrastructure. If not approved, the county will need to cut other programs and services to pay for its required contribution.

The bond would fund improvements, including:

- Bicycle wayfinding signage along Fairfax County Parkway
- Construction of a walk way on the east side of Rolling Road from Roxbury Ave to Tuttle Rd.
- Additional walkway construction and turn lanes
- Large-scale roadway projects, transit facilities, and spot/intersection improvements.

COOLING ASSISTANCE

Fairfax County residents who need help to keep their homes cool this summer and prevent a health emergency resulting from extreme heat may be able to get assistance from two programs, which are administered by the county's Department of Family Services (DFS). Cooling Assistance is a federally funded program that helps eligible low-income households with at least one person considered especially vulnerable to heat—a child under age six; a person with a disability; or an adult age 60 or older—with the costs of cooling their homes. Applications for the 2014 Cooling Assistance Program will be accepted June 16-August 15. LAND USE UPDATE

During May, three informational meetings were hosted by the Department of Planning and Zoning to hear from the community on a proposal to regulate **group assemblage in private homes**. This proposal was developed by staff as a result of complaints from residents regarding frequent large gatherings at neighborhood homes which can sometimes create parking, noise, and other issues of concern. Currently, the Zoning Ordinance does not identify guidelines for the frequency or scale at which group assembly is considered to be a permitted “accessory use” to a dwelling. Now that these meetings are completed, staff will report later this month on what comments were received at a meeting of Board’s Development Process Subcommittee. Applicants for **Garden World (RZ/FDP-2014-BR-007)**, **Burke Junction (RZ/FDP-2014-BR-009)** and the **Twinbrook Subdivision (RZ-2014-BR-001)** continue to work with staff from the Department of Planning and Zoning to refine their proposals and address issues of parking, density, tree preservation and stormwater. All projects continue on track for public hearings before the Planning Commission in either late summer (Twinbrook) or early fall (Garden World and Burke Junction). On May 18, the Braddock District Land Use and Environment Committee heard its first presentation on the proposal for Burke Junction and has formed a subcommittee to work with the applicant.

Land Use Committee seeks new members. The **Braddock District Land Use and Environment Committee** is currently looking to replace several members who are either leaving the area or have other commitments that will not enable them to continue on the Committee. The Committee formally reviews applications for new members each June. Meetings are held in the Supervisor’s Community Room at the Kings Park Library on the Third Tuesday of each month. Members are expected to commit to one year of service and to serve on at least one subcommittee studying an application. An application form can be found on Supervisor Cook’s website at: <http://www.fairfaxcounty.gov/braddock> under Community Information. No prior experience in land use is required. The committee advises the Supervisor and the Planning Commissioner or applications that are made for changes to land use in Braddock District.

Fairfax Center Planning Work Group will hear an analysis by staff of possible changes to land bays T, U and V on the periphery of the Fairfax Center Planning District on June 30. This staff analysis will discuss potential impacts for changes to the Comprehensive Plan for this area under the new Fairfax Forward plan review process. Kings Park Shopping Center - Supervisor Cook hosted a community information meeting on May 29 with Regency Centers, the owner of the shopping center, to discuss the details of the upcoming renovation at the Shopping Center. Giant Food will officially close on June 19 and the Veterinary Hospital will be demolished. Utility relocation will begin July 1 and façade renovation will begin right after 4th of July weekend. Alan Roth, Senior Vice President for Regency, presented details on the renovation which includes an expansion of the Giant to over 50,000 square feet, new LED lighting, an expanded sidewalk on both Rolling Road and Burke Lake Road and the addition of a new patio area for outdoor dining. The second floor community room will also be renovated. Giant will bring in its own crews to build its store, schedule for completion in the Spring of 2015 while the rest of the center will be completed around Thanksgiving, 2014. All stores will remain open during construction. Residents at the meeting expressed concerns about the lack of wireless access in many parts of the Shopping Center and asked the owners to consider a smoking ban in the patio area.
