PERSONAL PROPERTY TAX BILLS ARE IN THE MAIL

The 2012 Personal Property (car) Tax bills are being mailed to Fairfax County residents, with payment due by Friday, October 5. There is no vehicle decal, unless you are a resident within the town limits of Clifton and Herndon and then you are required to purchase a decal from your town. More information on the Personal Property (car) Tax can be found at www.fairfaxcounty.gov/dta or call 703-222-8234 (TTY 703-222-7594).

Note: Seniors 65 or older or individuals who are totally disabled may qualify for relief from some taxes and fees based on income and assets, excluding the home and up to one acre of land. In addition, disabled veterans may be eligible for personal property (car) tax relief. For more information, call 703-222-8234 (TTY 703-222-7594).

Online- The most convenient way to pay your tax is online. Go to www.fairfaxcounty.gov/dta and follow the directions.

By Mail- Detach the bottom of your bill and send in the full amount by check written to County of Fairfax. Do Not Send Correspondence with your bill. Send an email to wwwdta@fairfaxcounty.gov, or write to DTA, 12000 Government Center

Parkway, Suite 223, Fairfax, VA 22035.

Pay With Cash- Pay by cash at the customer service desk at any Northern Virginia Shoppers Food location, or at other participating retailers. For a list of retailers who accept your tax payment, visit www.globalexpress.net, click on store locator. You must have your bill and pay the exact amount due; a \$1.25 processing fee will be charged by Global Express per transaction.

In Person – (Long lines are possible close to the October 5 deadline.)

Pay in person at the Government Center, 12000 Government Center Parkway, Suite 223, Fairfax, VA 22035, Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. (open Thursdays until 6:30 p.m.). You are encouraged to pay by mail or online to avoid standing in line.

Electronic Check- Access www.fairfaxcounty.gov/dta and pay by electronic check. Provide information from your check and your bank account will be automatically debited.

Credit Card- Call 703-222-6740, (TTY 711) to pay by telephone or go to www.fairfaxcounty.gov/dta to pay online. A processing fee is charged for credit card payments (as allowed by state law).

Discover Card Only - You can also use Discover with a graduated service charge by calling 703-222-8234 (TTY 703-222-7594), or by paying in person at the Fairfax County Government Center, 12000 Government Center Parkway, Suite 223, Fairfax, VA 22035. Long lines are possible at the Government Center close to the October 5 deadline.

At Banks- Pay at any of the following banks in Fairfax County only:

- Bank of America (check or cash)
- SunTrust (check or cash)
- Wells Fargo (checks; cash from Wells Fargo customers only)

You must have your bill and pay the exact amount due. Credit cards are not accepted.

BRADDOCK DOGS ASSOCIATION IS LOOKING FOR COMMUNITY SUPPORT

Braddock Dogs Association, a volunteer group dedicated to the development and maintenance of off-leash dog areas (OLDA) within the Braddock District, is working towards the development of a new OLDA at Monticello Park on Guinea Road, between the intersections of Burke Road and Bronte Drive. The dog area is part of the Monticello Park Master Plan, which also includes a walking trail loop around the park, a new playground, and a skate spot for older children and teenagers.

Adding the OLDA to the upgraded Monticello Park Master Plan depends on approval of the Park Bond at the November election and Braddock Dogs must raise an estimated \$15,000 to cover construction costs. While no funds can be collected prior to Bond approval, Braddock Dogs is seeking pledges that can be contributed if the bond referen-

dum is passed.

BE PREPARED: MEDICAL NEEDS REGISTRY

The Medical Needs Registry contains the names and addresses of individuals with medical needs. The medical needs registry is an emergency preparedness tool and will be used by Fairfax County officials for communicating with people with medical needs, pre-event emergency planning, and for evacuating and sheltering during actual emergencies. There is no guarantee that services will be provided, nor does registration guarantee that services will be received on a preferential basis.

The registry may be used for any emergency requiring evacuation, such as flooding, hurricanes or hazardous material spills, and gas leaks. This information will be available to emergency planners and will facilitate the County's planning, response and recovery efforts. Even though you are on this registry, you should call 9-1-1 in the event of a life-threatening situation.

During a major crisis or emergency, Fairfax County uses the award winning Community Emergency Alert Network (CEAN) to deliver important emergency alerts, notifications and updates. Fairfax County Government offers the Medical Needs Registry and the CEAN as a public service. The Registry and CEAN will be used in conjunction with other public notification methods, such as cable Channel 16, the Fairfax County Government Web site, the Fairfax County Government Emergency Information Line (703-817-7771, TTY 711) and area media. Registration is voluntary and all information collected will be kept private and confidential and securely stored. THOUSAND CANKERS DISEASE QUARANTINE IMPOSED FOR FAIRFAX COUNTY

The Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services expanded the Thousand Cankers Disease (TCD) quarantine to include Fairfax County where TCD was detected. The quarantine is necessary to prevent the spread of the disease which attacks walnut trees.

Regulated items that may not be moved out of Fairfax County include all walnut plants and plant parts of walnut, including logs, stumps, firewood, roots, branches, mulch and chips.

TCD is a fungus (*Geosmithia morbida*) spread by the walnut twig beetle (*Pityophthorus juglandis*) that causes small cankers or open wounds on the trunks and branches of walnut trees. The beetle introduces the

fungus while it tunnels beneath the bark. As more beetles attack the tree, the number of cankers increases until they coalesce to girdle twigs and branches, restricting movement of nutrients and eventually killing the tree. Neither the beetle nor the fungus is native to the eastern United States. Thinning or dead branches initially occur at the top of the tree which then dies from the top down. Trees may be infected for many years before showing symptoms. There is no preventive or curative treatment for the disease. Once established, TCD has the potential to spread to areas that are not infested, either through natural means or through the human movement of infested walnut items.



BRADDOCK DISTRICT LAND USE UPDATE

On July 31, the Board of Supervisors voted unanimously to approve the construction of a new **Public Safety Center** adjacent to the Herrity Building at the Government Center, to replace the 40 year old Massey Building on Rt. 123. The 275,000 square foot building and 850 car garage will accommodate the needs of the Police and Fire Departments through 2030. Since the Community Information Meeting on March 26 significant improvements were made in the preliminary design. They include:

- Pedestrian and Bicycle Improvements:** A five foot sidewalk along the applicant's frontage on the north side of Legato will be constructed, and an 8 foot asphalt trail will connect to that sidewalk extending under Monument Drive; providing pedestrian access to Fairfax Corner. A trail from the Monument Drive bus stop will be retained and a bus shelter with trash pickup will be provided. Bike racks will be provided for visitors off the existing traffic circle; for Herrity Building employees in the existing garage and for public safety employees in the new garage.

- Cars entering the Garage from Legato Road:** Residents were concerned that vehicles entering the garage from Legato Road would back up traffic during morning peak hours. The project has now been designed with two entrance gates into the secure garage and a 61 foot access drive to queue vehicles.

- Traffic Signal at Post Forest and Legato:** A new signal will be installed prior to the final occupancy of the new building;

- Garage lighting and screening** will be designed to reduce or eliminate glare and a device will be installed to lower lighting levels between the hours of 11 p.m. and 6 a.m. In addition a green screen that will buffer the bulk of new 5 story garage from the residential properties across Legato Road is being provided.

- Green Features:** Up to four Rain Gardens and up to 10,000 square foot green roof and commitment to seek LEED's silver certification is included. Landscaping will minimize grassy areas and focus on non-invasive native plantings.

- Wayfinding and signage:** Within one year of occupancy, a comprehensive sign plan to direct visitors throughout the complex will be developed.

SHIRLEY GATE ROAD (TARIQ KHAN)

was the subject of a formal presentation before the Braddock District Land Use Committee and members of the Board of the Cloisters subdivision on July 31. A subcommittee of the Land Use Committee will focus on this three house subdivision and make recommendations. A full Community Information Meeting will be scheduled in September.

The Braddock District Land Use Committee held an organizational meeting on July 31 to develop the policies and procedures under which it will operate. The Committee has voted to hold its regular meetings on the Third Tuesday of each month, and most meetings will take place in Braddock Hall. The meetings will be open to the public. UNIVERSITY MALL SIGN PLAN

As part of its proposed redevelopment, the University Mall has filed an application with the county to complete a Comprehensive Sign Plan on its entire property. This plan (SEA 87-A-086-03) would cover all free standing signs, other owner related signs and new tenant signage. This project was accepted for processing in May and is scheduled to come before the Planning Commission on October 4.

HOME CHILD CARE PROVIDERS IN FAIRFAX COUNTY TO EXPERIENCE CHANGES IN THE NEXT YEAR

As Fairfax County and the Commonwealth of Virginia update regulations for child care providers there will be various changes to the current system. Currently, County Zoning permits care for up to seven children in a single family home and care for up to five children is permitted in a townhome, apartment, or mobile home. Additional children up to a maximum of 10 and/or additional non-resident assistants may be allowed with special permit approval from the Board of Zoning Appeals (BZA). Currently, State regulations for health and safety permit care for up to 12 children in a single family home. Providers must comply with both County Zoning and State regulations. The different numbers create some confusion. Therefore the County will consider changing its zoning rules. What child care providers can expect in the coming months is:

- The State will continue to issue renewal licenses for the existing number of children but any "contact with local zoning administrator" forms that are submitted to the zoning office will note the County limitations/requirements on the form.
- There will be no enforcement of County limits until these issues are resolved unless there is a health and safety risk present.
- County staff will prepare a draft zoning ordinance amendment that would increase the maximum numbers of children with approval of a special permit from 10 to 12. It would also seek to reduce the special permit application fee and would review the standards by which special permit requests are considered.
- County staff will present an amendment to the Board for authorization to advertise and schedule public hearings sometime in October.
- The Planning Commission (PC) public hearing is expected to be held sometime in November and the Planning Commission will make a recommendation to the Board of Supervisors.
