

CONSOLIDATED COMMUNITY FUNDING POOL Fiscal Years 2015-2016 PROGRAM DESCRIPTIONS

The descriptions presented below represent the scope of service proposed by the non-profit organizations for the funding level requested. The capacity of services will be adjusted based on actual funds awarded.

Food for Others/Fairfax

Food for Others

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The program provides emergency and supplemental food to low income residents of Fairfax County through three distribution programs. The emergency food/USDA program provides clients referred by county staff and other service providers with food estimated to last 3-5 days allowing time for other sources of assistance to be arranged or the crisis to pass. Clients meeting the income eligibility guidelines may return monthly for USDA commodities at the Merrifield warehouse. A second supplementary food program distributes food on weeknights to 14 high-poverty neighborhoods (13 regular sites and 1 mobile) in the county. The third program is the bulk distribution program that provides food to more than 29 community-based organizations. These organizations then deliver food to the elderly, homebound, homeless and others in need.

Successful Start

Falls Church McLean's Childrens Center

Regions 2, 3

Falls Church McLean's Children's Center provides full day early childhood educational programming to low income families with children between the ages of 2 to 5.

Adult Career Pathways

Northern Virginia Community College Educational Foundation, Inc.

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

Northern Virginia Community College (NVCC) provides services to adults that are low-income, unemployed or face other barriers to college access. This population includes adults who recently received their high school credential through non-traditional Fairfax County Public Schools (FCPS) programs and wish to transition to NVCC. The program will also serve work-eligible immigrants who have developed their English skills but remain stuck in low-wage work, and adults who went directly into the workforce after high school but now find themselves stuck in dead end jobs.

Year-Long Entrepreneur Incubator

Empowered Women International

Region 3

The Year-Long Entrepreneur Incubator program will create jobs and entrepreneurial opportunities for immigrant, refugee and low-income women. The program will be delivered in two parts. Part one includes entrepreneur training which teaches the fundamentals of creating and managing a microenterprise and consists of 60 hours of classroom training. Part two includes growing a business and business acceleration which delivers nine months of targeted business assistance and mentoring to accelerate business and sustainability. In addition, wraparound services (that are personalized and focus on the complex needs of the clients) are offered. These services include client intake and assessment, mentoring services, referral and advocacy on behalf of the client to job agencies, educational institutions, legal services, mental health and social support services and collaboration with other agencies.

Emergency Services: Keeping Families At Home

Good Shepherd Housing & Family Services

Region 1

This program provides financial assistance to families that are facing evictions and/or disconnection of basic utility services such as gas and electricity. The program also offers assistance to for rental security deposits.

**Advocating in Court for the Best Interests of Children in Crisis due to Abuse and Neglect
Fairfax Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA), Inc.**

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

Fairfax CASA recruits, screens, trains and supervises citizen volunteers to serve as Court Appointed Special Advocates for children who are placed under the Courts supervision. The CASA volunteers will conduct independent investigations, monitor each case assigned, write and submit a written report to the juvenile judge hearing the case, provide recommendations to the judge regarding the child's best interest and assist the legal representative for each case.

Family Assistance Program

Bethany House of Northern Virginia

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

Bethany House of Northern Virginia provides emergency housing and supportive services to women and children who are victims of Domestic Violence. Services include individualized case management, food assistance, clothing assistance, legal assistance, information and referrals and community outreach.

Family Assistance

Our Daily Bread

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

Our Daily Bread's Family Assistance Program provides emergency food, financial assistance as well as financial literacy training to working families and individuals at or below 200% of the federal poverty level residing in all four regions of Fairfax County.

Homes for the Working Poor, Disabled and Elderly

Good Shepherd Housing & Family Services

Region 1

This proposal addresses the need for housing for homeless families and individuals to help them achieve stability and self-sufficiency. The project will offer affordable housing stability through rental of a Good Shepherd property or connection with a partner landlord. The program will also provide supportive services, such as credit counseling/money management and other life skills that promote self-sufficiency.

Family Assistance Crisis Prevention/Intervention

Herndon-Reston FISH, Inc.

Region 3

Herndon-Reston FISH provides emergency financial assistance for rent/mortgage and utilities to individuals who are experiencing a crisis. Additionally, the program provides holiday food and gift boxes to eligible participants. Financial Literacy workshops are offered to help participants develop the tools necessary to manage their household budgets.

Immigration Legal Services

Just Neighbors Ministry, Inc.

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

Just Neighbors Ministry proposes to provide legal immigration services to low-income immigrants and refugees that reside in Fairfax County. The program will assist clients through advice and legal counsel to help them reunite with their family members, escape domestic violence (when applicable), and obtain employment authorization.

Volunteer Home Repair Program

Rebuilding Together Arlington/Fairfax/Falls Church, Inc.

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The Rebuilding Together program works in all regions of Fairfax County to make critical housing repairs for homeowners who are low-income seniors, persons with physical or intellectual disabilities, at no cost to the homeowners. The repairs are needed to remove barriers to safety and/or accessibility, as well as to provide routine necessary to preserve safe, healthy, energy efficient homes and stable communities.

Living Independently for Tomorrow (LIFT)

Community Residences, Inc.

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

RYS, Inc. provides transitional housing services to homeless and “at-risk” youth between the ages of 17-21. The Lift Program serves runaway youth as well as youth who are aging out of the foster care system. The program provides supportive services including life skills training, goal setting and linkages to community resources (i.e. Medicaid, mental health, employment counseling etc).

Housing for Homeless Families

Homestretch Incorporated

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The program will provide subsidized housing and support services (case management, employment counseling and budget counseling, life skills training, child enrichment and community service links) to homeless families.

Annandale Safe Youth Project

Alternative House

Region 2

Alternative House provides after-school programming to youth in grades 4th through 6th who reside in the Annandale area. Services will include:

- Homework Assistance
- Tutoring
- Community Service Opportunities
- Supervised Recreational Activities and Field Trips

Building for the Future

Wesley Housing Development Corporation

Region 2

Social and academic programs and services will be provided to pre-kindergarten, after-school and teen youth at community centers located in 2 culturally diverse affordable housing apartment communities, one in Lincolnia and the other in Falls Church. The communities include 502 households, 59% of which are headed by single parents and the majority of which are immigrants speaking English is a second language. The programs and services assist students to overcome multiple risk factors to achieve academic success, including poverty, low education of parents, chronic family stress and language barriers.

WFCM Food Pantry

Western Fairfax Christian Ministries (WFCM)

Region 4

Western Fairfax Christian Ministries’ Emergency Services Program provides a year-round food pantry to families in areas of Region 4 (zipcodes 20120, 20121, 20122, 20124, 20151, 22033 and 22039). The majority of clients served (95%) are referred from Coordinated Services Planning (CSP). Walk-in clients will be scheduled with a trained counselor for an eligibility intake session. The pantry offers appointments every week day and two evenings per week. Clients are eligible to shop once per month, up to 12 times per year, selecting their own food from the available food stock. The clients’ food allotments are based on family size and the clients must adhere to program protocols in selecting their food stock. The pantry is also a distribution site for USDA food and eligible clients can receive extra items through The Emergency Food Assistance Program.

Homeless Youth Initiative

Alternative House

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

Alternative House provides small housing subsidies to homeless young people who are between the ages of 18 and 21 and are enrolled in high school. The services provided by the Homeless Youth Initiative include:

- Helping homeless youth locate safe, affordable housing.
- Providing a rent subsidy sufficient to allow the youth to maintain housing while attending school, when needed.
- Providing assistance with food and clothing when necessary.
- Provide case management, life skills training, educational supports and mental health assistance to achieve graduation from high school.

Violence Prevention and Intervention

Northern Virginia Family Service

Regions 1, 2, 3

The program is designed to teach vulnerable immigrant youth and families strategies to prevent family and community violence and to provide neighborhood-based services that aid in their recovery from the traumatic effects of exposure to violence, so that they can become self-sufficient and contributing members of their new communities. Services include case management, individual and family therapeutic counseling, intensive group-based services for parents and children, and youth life skill building workshops. The program has current sites established in Herndon and Bailey's Crossroads/Culmore and seeking to establish a new site in either Reston, Annandale or the Route 1 Corridor.

SafeSpot Trauma Crisis Counseling

The Safe Children Foundation DBA SafeSpot Children's Advocacy Center of Fairfax

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The SafeSpot Trauma Crisis Counseling program will assist children under the age of 18 in acquiring vital coping mechanisms following child sexual or physical abuse. Services will include forensic interviews, victim advocacy, referrals for medical evaluation, on-site trauma crisis counseling and referrals to other mental health services (as required). Counselors will utilize trauma-focused cognitive behavioral therapy, a short-term treatment that focuses on the following areas; relaxation techniques to manage anxiety, parenting skill to effectively manage behavioral issues, ways to identify and cope with maladaptive thoughts, improved parent-child communication skills and steps to remain safe and continue recovery. Additionally, counselors will assess each child's behavioral and emotional symptoms, develop a specific action plan and measure the child's and parents' ability to successfully implement the therapeutic skills.

SafeSpot Children's Advocacy Center of Fairfax

The Safe Children Foundation DBA SafeSpot Children's Advocacy Center of Fairfax

Regions 1,2,3,4

The SafeSpot Children's Advocacy Center (CAC) of Fairfax provides victim-centered and counseling services that will respond to the needs of children who have been sexually and physically abused. Professionals and agencies will come together as a multidisciplinary team to create a child-focused approach to child abuse cases. Partner agencies will include Fairfax County Police Department, Department of Family Services, Office of the Commonwealth's Attorney, Inova-Fairfax Hospital for Children and Fairfax-Falls Church Community Services Board. The CAC will serve children under the age of 18; services will include forensic interviews, victim advocacy and support and referrals for medical evaluation and mental health treatment through linkages with partner agencies.

Preventing and Ending Homelessness (formerly Emergency Services and Supportive Housing)

FACETS

Regions 1, 4

FACETS provides a comprehensive continuum of services for low income and/or homeless individuals and families that ranges from crisis intervention services to providing supports to obtain self-sufficiency. FACETS will serve a wide range of clients from those that are unsheltered and living in places that are not meant for habitation, to those that are in permanent housing. The program will provide outreach services to meet basic needs during times of crisis and educate clients about additional resources that they can access to meet their needs. Case management services are designed to engage clients in action planning so that they can take measurable steps toward self-sufficiency, including obtaining and maintaining permanent housing.

Bryant Early Learning Center

United Community Ministries

Region 1

United Community Ministries (UCM) provides affordable early child care services to families with children between the ages of 6 weeks to 5 years. The target population served resides in the Region 1 area of Fairfax County. Services include developmental screenings and assessments, developmentally appropriate curriculum, nutritious meals and snacks, parent education workshops and parent involvement activities.

Autism Initiative

ServiceSource

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

For the FY 2015-2016 contract cycle, Service Source's has proposed the Autism Initiative Program, also known as Total Employment Concepts 2000 (TEC 2000). This proposed new TEC 2000 program plans to help Fairfax County individuals, primarily youth, with autism to improve self-sufficiency, quality of life and community integration through employment. The strategies will include job preparation, situational assessments, internships, work experience, job coaching and follow-along support. Service Source will partner with the Department of Aging and Rehabilitative Services (DARS), Fairfax County Public Schools, Autism Society of Northern Virginia and other community organizations to create a fabric of service delivery that promotes long-term self-sufficiency.

Sliding Scale Fee, Minimal Fee & No Fee Mental Health Counseling Program

Women's Center, The

Regions 2, 3, 4

For the FY15-16 contract cycle, the Women's Center's, proposed Sliding Scale Fee, Minimal Fee & No fee Mental Health Counseling Program plans to provide sliding scale fee, minimal fee and no fee counseling to the financially disadvantaged and low income families at the Vienna office location and at nonprofit partner sites. In addition, the program will provide free therapy services to the community's poorest and often greatest suffering individuals and families on site at Shelter House and Crisislink. Fees will be kept affordable with no program client paying more than \$44 per therapy session. The estimated number of individuals to be served during the contract cycle will be 560 with an 80% achievable outcome.

Northern Virginia Pro Bono Law Center

Fairfax Law Foundation

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The Northern Virginia Pro Bono Law Center provides access to free civil legal services (from brief advice and counsel, to court appearances) to poverty and low-income individuals and families in all four regions of Fairfax County, Virginia. Free civil legal services include emphasis on the following areas: domestic relations – such as contested and uncontested divorces and child custody disputes; housing – preservation of tenant's access to safe, decent and affordable housing through the prevention of evictions and other adverse actions, requiring rental housing to meet habitability and other minimum standards; employment – counseling individuals, including day laborers, who experience unlawful termination, wage/hour claims, job discrimination and unemployment claims; and, consumer – the program handles a spectrum of issues, including fraud, credit card and medical/hospital debt and collections, contracts, warranties etc. The staff of the Law Center trains and supports private local attorneys, who work at other paying jobs, enabling and encouraging them to become volunteers and donate their time to help others with legal issues. The goal of the program is to improve and maintain individual and family health stability to attain self-sufficiency.

Integrated Immigrant Services Program

Grace Ministries of the United Methodist Church

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

Grace Ministries provides emergency assistance through the distribution of food, clothing and other basic necessities on a monthly basis in the Bailey's Crossroads, Centreville, Burke and Herndon areas of the county through its Integrated Immigrant Service Program. The program also provides job training programs that combine focused ESL instruction and job skills in the areas of Personal Care Aide (PCA) training as well as Certified Nurse's Aide (CNA) training.

Wraparound Family Caregiver Support

Alzheimer's Family Day Center

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

Alzheimer's Family Day Center provides Adult Day Care services for individuals identified with Alzheimer's disease or other forms of Dementia. The program will provide full-day services (up to 10 hours per day/ five days per week) for clients which would enable their caregivers to maintain employment and to be able to take care of other household responsibilities. The services would also help clients to remain in their home environment with their family members and to remain in their communities. The program staff will work with caregivers to develop an Individual Care Plan for clients to determine each participant's level of functioning

and set goals to address areas such as communication, mobility, personal care, nutrition, medication administration, cognitive ability, psycho-social and behavioral issues.

ADDRESS: Aggressive Dynamic Debt Reduction Elimination and Savings Strategies

Homestretch Incorporated

Regions 1, 2, 3

This program provides financial management education, budget and credit counseling, debt reduction and savings assistance, with on-site child care, for homeless residents in order to help them become self-sufficient.

Progreso Adult Education & Literacy Program

United Community Ministries

Region 1

The Progreso Adult Education & Literacy Program will provide ESL and Citizenship classes through its Progreso Adult & Literacy Program. This project will serve immigrant clients who reside in the Region 1 area of Fairfax County.

Family Child Care Educator Training and Workforce Development

Infant Toddler Family Day Care

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

Infant Toddler Family Day Care provides training and support services to low-income immigrants which will help them to obtain the skills needed to open a family child care business in their home.

Project Hope

PRS, Inc.

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

PRS, Inc. provides long-term supportive counseling and employment services to individuals living with mental illness. CCFP funding will be used to continue to existing services through recovery-oriented intensive skills training, supportive counseling and positive behavioral supports to persons living with mental illness who reside in public housing or participate in the housing choice voucher program within the four regions of Fairfax County. The goal of the program is to help clients to increase their independent living skills; learn to effectively manage symptoms of mental illness and medication, as well as learn to manage their budget in order to meet their monthly expenses.

Project Step

Ethiopian Community Development Council, Inc./African Community Center (ECDC/ACC)

Regions 1, 2

The goal of ECDC/ACC's Step Project is to promote self-sufficiency among refugee, asylee, and immigrant newcomers residing in Fairfax County by offering a comprehensive array of social services with an emphasis on individual empowerment. The program will provide the following services:

- Employment Workshops and Individual Mentoring
- Immigration Legal Assistance
- Information and Referrals
- Transportation Support
- Translation and Interpretation Services

Basic Needs

United Community Ministries

Region 1

United Community Ministries (UCM) provides emergency assistance to individuals and families in need who are facing the threat of homelessness, utility disconnection, hunger and/or poverty. The program's Basic Needs project will provide financial assistance to help clients avoid eviction or utility disconnection. Additionally, the program will provide food assistance.

Springfield Safe Youth Project

Alternative House

Region 1

This program provides after-school programming to youth in grades 4th through 6th who reside in the Springfield area. Services include:

- Homework Assistance
- Tutoring
- Community Service Opportunities
- Supervised Recreational Activities and Field Trips

Challenge to Change
OAR of Fairfax County
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The program provides assistance necessary to help ex-offenders and their families to overcome the crises resulting from arrest, incarceration and release and to obtain self sufficiency after criminal justice system involvement. These goals are achieved by providing: direct assistance, employment services, skills training/educational classes, violence intervention, case management, mentoring, alternatives to incarceration, and information and referrals. Services are also designed to reduce recidivism by challenging the attitudes, beliefs, and actions that lead to criminal behavior and by providing the opportunities, alternatives and resources necessary for success.

SkillSource- Sheriff Employment Center
SkillSource Group, Inc., The
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The SkillsSource Group provides employment counseling to inmates that are incarcerated at the Fairfax County Jail who are preparing to re-enter the community and the workforce. The organization will assist inmates with job search, resume development, GED preparation and other supportive services. Additionally, the program will work with area employers to identify and place inmates into various employment opportunities.

Herndon Enrichment Program
Cornerstones, Inc.
Region 3

The Herndon Enrichment Program provides programs and services in Region 3 to address poor academic performances by students at Clearview Elementary, Dranesville Elementary, Herndon Elementary and Hutchison Elementary schools, which serve high percentages of low-income and/or immigrant students and have high student failure rates in science and math. Programming will include (1) free after-school homework assistance for 2nd – 5th grades by professional teachers, and (2) programming to help parents understand educational requirements & opportunities and provide information on other topics, such as human trafficking.

Access to Self-Sufficiency through Extensive Training and Services (ASSETS)
Business Development Assistance Group, Inc.
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

This program provides assistance and training for those who want to become self-sufficient through business ownership. The target populations are older workers 50 or older and/or Fairfax County citizens who speak a language other than English at home. Services include educational programs and technical assistance including one-on-one counseling, self-employment training and/or provision of resource information/referrals. Services are primarily offered at the Annandale office, but through a partnership with SkillSource Group, the program will provide countywide services.

Healthy Lifestyles: Burke Road
Community Residences, Inc.
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

Community Residences provides a wellness program for six (6) clients with disabilities who reside at its new housing site located in Burke, VA. The program will facilitate behavioral changes through individualized goal setting, active goal implementation, nutrition education, physical exercise and group support. The program will help transition individuals into a living environment that affords greater independence and responsibility.

Power Pack Program
Food for Others
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The Food for Others' Power Pack Program (P3) seeks to alleviate weekend hunger in FCPS elementary school students. The program will accomplish this in two ways: 1) Food for Others (FFO) will provide direct services to schools (supplemental weekend food in the form of power packs delivered to schools for counselors to

discreetly distribute to students in need; 2) The program will be implemented in collaboration with Our Daily Bread (ODB), who will provide supportive services to schools to establish self-sustaining weekend food programs. The joint FFO/ODB program will work directly with School Social Workers or designated representatives to establish how many students need service and what other services they may already be receiving.

Pathways to Success

Western Fairfax Christian Ministries (WFCM)

Region 4

Western Fairfax Christian Ministries' Pathways to Success program is designed to give WFCM counselors a year period to provide intense mentoring for borderline low-income households with children who don't qualify for most aid programs. Program services focus on assisting 12 households per year by providing financial training, budgeting assistance, food/clothing vouchers and reducing amounts of supplemental aid to help clients pay back debt. The program services are designed to assist clients in adhering to a budget, paying bills, developing a financial reserve, seeking improved income through new skills or higher education and make habit changes that will lead to financial control and increased self-sufficiency.

Client Emergency Services

Western Fairfax Christian Ministries (WFCM)

Region 4

Western Fairfax Christian Ministries' Emergency Services Program provides financial assistance to families in Centreville, Chantilly, Clifton, Fair Oaks, and Fairfax Station areas of Region 4. The majority of clients served (95%) are referred from Coordinated Services Planning (CSP). Client support consists of emergency financial assistance up to \$600 annually to help with rental payments to keep clients from becoming homeless and \$300 for assistance with utility payments to keep services from being disconnected. Counselors will advocate to other community organizations if client needs exceed the resources of WFCM.

Assistance Services and Pantry Program

Cornerstones, Inc.

Region 3

Cornerstones will expand its former Emergency & Self-Sufficiency Services program to provide services to low income households in Region 3. The services will include: (1) supplemental food & toiletries, (2) referrals to other internal and external resources, (3) financial assistance for rent/utilities, as appropriate, (4) navigational assistance & wellness support services to identify needs and establish action plans, (5) application counseling related to the Affordable Care Act Health Insurance Marketplace, and (6) life skills trainings and classes.

Northern Virginia Community College Restorative Dental Clinic

Northern Virginia Community College Education Foundation, Inc.

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

Restorative Dental Clinic proposes to provide affordable dental services to uninsured residents of Northern Virginia. Services will include routine dental care, dental treatment planning and emergency dental services.

Assisting Young Mothers

Alternative House

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The Assisting Young Mothers program provides transitional housing services to a minimum of ten young women between the ages of 16 and 22 who are pregnant or parenting and experiencing homelessness or the threat of homelessness. The young women and their children are enrolled in the program for a period of 18 months during which time they will participate in Independent Life Skills training, parenting workshops, and other related supportive services.

Great Futures: Education & Career Development

Boys & Girls Clubs of Greater Washington, Inc.

Regions 1, 3

The program is designed to focus on the core program areas of education and career development which includes Career Launch, Junior Staff Career Development and Money Matters. The program will assist youth ages 13-18 in five distinct programs designed to help them develop job skills training that will prepare them for future roles as human service professionals or volunteer leaders.

Emergency Needs Assistance
Ecumenical Community Helping Others (ECHO), Inc.
Regions 1, 2, 4

ECHO is an all-volunteer run organization that serves the emergency needs and basic human needs of residents in zip codes 22151, 22152, 22153, 22015, plus most of 22150 and part of 22312. The program provides emergency financial assistance to cover utility bills to avert cut-off of services and rental/mortgage expenses to avoid eviction. The agency collaborates closely with Fairfax County social workers and other nonprofit agencies to develop the necessary means to alleviate utility and housing debts. Financial assistance is dispensed by volunteer counselors who are available by appointment only.

Promising Futures
Wesley Housing Development Corporation
Region 2

This program provides on-site services for adult residents of 2 culturally diverse affordable housing apartment communities, one in Lincolnia and the other in Falls Church. The services are designed to increase housing stability and increase employment. Services will include eviction intervention/prevention; information; counseling; referrals; financial literacy programs; services to increase employability, job readiness and job search; ESOL classes and access to business center resources; food distribution; immigration and refugee assistance; and income tax assistance. Wesley has an agreement with George Mason University Department of Social Work to provide a master's degree student intern to assist with the provision of housing stability services. The immigration/refugee and tax services will be offered in partnership with the Ethiopian Community Development Council and, its subsidiary, The Enterprise Development Group.

Training Futures
Northern Virginia Family Service
Regions 3, 4

The program prepares underemployed or unemployed low-income clients for new careers in the business or health care sectors with livable wages, benefits, and opportunities for continued career growth. During the 24 week training, students participate in 16 weeks of intensive office/computer skills training, 3 weeks of skills application in an internship with a local company and 5 weeks of job search training and marketing. Training includes MS Office, keyboarding, internet skills, business-oriented math, communication and soft skills associated with finding and retaining employment. The Training Futures program also developed a collaborative partnership with Northern Virginia Community College. Through this partnership, enrolled Training Future clients had the opportunity to gain up to 18 college credits for their work at TF and obtain the "Business Technology Certificate."

Emergency Food Program
Falls Church Community Service Council, Inc.
Region 2

The Falls Church Community Services Council, comprised of a coalition of 19 faith communities, provides for the emergency food needs people in the Falls Church area (comprised of four zipcodes: 22042, 22043, 22044, and 22046). The program receives requests for food assistance from ministers, and county social workers. The volunteer food delivery teams then deliver basic, fresh (perishable) items, such as milk, bread, eggs, meats, vegetables, as well as non-perishables to clients' homes.

Mt. Vernon Village VII
Good Shepherd Housing & Family Services
Region 1

This program will acquire four units of scattered site housing and rent those units at prices affordable to households earning up to 50% of the Area Median Income (AMI) in Fairfax County. Tenants placed in this housing will also receive supportive services such as budget counseling, financial assistance (as needed) and life skills training to improve their independence and self-sufficiency.

Financial Assistance Fund
Alzheimer's Family Day Center
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

Alzheimer's Family Day Center will provide financial assistance to 25 clients who are eligible for Adult Day Care services. This program serves individuals identified with Alzheimer's disease or other forms of Dementia. The Financial Assistance Fund will support families who cannot afford to pay for services.

Northern Virginia Dental Clinic
Northern Virginia Dental Clinic, Inc.
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The Northern Virginia Dental Clinic provides dental services to low income adults (at or below 200% of federal poverty) who are referred by local nonprofit agencies and local jurisdictions, including Fairfax County. The program provides comprehensive examinations, treatment plans, oral cancer screenings, restorative services, oral surgery, biopsies, periodontics, dentures/crowns, endodontics, cleanings, and emergency interventions. Services are provided by part-time paid as well as volunteer dentists, hygienists and assistants. A partnership with local colleges and universities supplies the program with dental assistant and hygienist interns, externs and eventual staff. Volunteer dentists and hygienists are recruited from their respective professional associations.

Adult Health Partnership
Northern Virginia Family Service
Region 2

Northern Virginia Family Service's Adult Health Partnership program is part of the larger NVFS Health Access Assistance Team (HAAT) that conducts outreach, enrollment and case management linkage activities to an array of health care safety net resources. The program provides uninsured clients with incomes under the 250% of the Federal Poverty Level by providing them with linkages to oral health services. In addition to scheduling clients for pro bono and low to no cost oral health care at the Northern Virginia Dental Clinic and Northern Virginia Community College, the program maintains a private dental provider network of 59 practices comprised of over 150 dentists located through Northern Virginia. Clients can receive up to \$80 in direct assistance to pay for treatment of their dental needs.

Virginia Ely Senior Rental Assistance
Catholics for Housing, Inc.
Regions 1, 3

The Virginia Ely Senior Rental Assistance Program provides financial assistance to seniors who qualify to live in Fairfax County retirement facilities, except that their income is insufficient to meet the income requirements of the county. The Program requires the participants to pay 40% of their income towards their rent and Catholics for Housing will pay the balance of the monthly rent. By providing rental assistance, the elderly can maintain their independence in a safe and healthy environment because they no longer need to choose between paying for rent and their other basic necessities. Seniors receiving financial assistance through the program reside at one of four facilities located in Fairfax County, which include: Gum Springs Glen, Little River Glen, Morris Glen and Herndon Harbor House I and II.

Culmore Safe Youth Project
Alternative House
Region 2

Alternative House proposes to provide after-school programming to youth in grades 4th through 6th, who reside in the Culmore/Bailey's Crossroads communities. Services include the following:

- Homework assistance
- Tutoring
- Supervised field trips
- Educational workshops
- Nutritious snacks

Connections for Hope Partnership
Cornerstones, Inc.
Region 3

Connections for Hope Partnership (C4HP), is a public/private partnership established through a collaborative integrated services model, seeking to better address the rapidly growing needs of a culturally diverse community in the greater Herndon area. This partnership operates out of three closely located facilities in Herndon. These are the Herndon Neighborhood Resource Center and the Connections for Hope Partnership

office, both working closely with Healthworks for Northern Virginia, the federally qualified health center in Herndon. Services included through partner agencies include: youth and adult medical care (HealthWorks Herndon), immigration services (Just Neighbors), adult tutoring and ESOL services (Literacy Council), computer training (Computer C.O.R.E., homework assistance (Vecinos Unidos) and employment services (Cornerstones).

Financial Self Sufficiency Project

Korean Community Service Center of Greater Washington

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The program will provide job readiness services to low-income Korean immigrants, along with wraparound services for both jobseekers and their families, designed to help empower them to become self-sufficient. The programs will address the priority of self-sufficiency through a multi-pronged approach that has four main goals: 1) the program will increase job readiness through individualized job counseling, job training courses, career seminars and an annual career fair, 2) increase access to financial security through comprehensive case management services, living cost reduction assistance, housing services and emergency financial assistance, 3) increase accessibility to affordable health care by enrolling uninsured clients into Affordable Care Act health insurance programs or Medicaid/Medicare programs, providing primary health care services and an annual health fair, and 4) community education (citizenship preparation, first-time home buyer, and financial literacy classes).

Protecting Vulnerable Immigrant Women and Girls Fleeing Gender-Based Violence

Tahirih Justice Center

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

Tahirih Justice Center provides immigration legal services to women and girls living in Fairfax County that are fleeing gender-based violence. This program will assist the clients in obtaining the following legal documents: VAWA Petitions, U-Visa Petitions, T-Visa Petitions, Gender-based Asylum applications, Special Juvenile Status applications and Derivative Petitions which reunite children with their mothers after they obtain their legal status. Additionally, the program will provide the clients with legal representation in family law matters such as child custody, spousal support petitions, protective orders and divorce modification or enforcement of said matters.

Dental Program

HealthWorks for Northern Virginia Herndon

Regions 3, 4

The program will provide low income individuals residing in Northwestern Fairfax County, who lack health insurance as well as low income children with Medicaid, with a dental home in order to deliver dental services to improve their overall health status. Patients will have the opportunity to achieve and maintain oral health through access to an effective system of health services that promote prevention, health promotion, and education within their medical home. The program will provide acute, chronic, restorative (endodontics, dentures) and preventive health services including regular comprehensive oral health assessment and care, individualized preventative care based on periodontal risk assessments, education on proper nutrition and home care and referrals to specialists when necessary.

Career Navigation- Fairfax

Davis Memorial Goodwill Industries d/b/a Goodwill of Greater Washington

Regions 1, 2

Goodwill's Career Navigation serves low income unemployed individuals in regions 1 and 2 of Fairfax County with employment skills and job placement services to achieve self-sufficiency. The Career Navigation Program is an intensive three-week employment readiness and customer service training program that enables unemployed individuals to improve their job search and employability skills. The program also offers the Security and Protective Services track which is accredited by the Northern Virginia Community College and prepares students for entry-level positions in the security industry. The goal of the Career Navigation Program is to help reduce the number of unemployed individuals living in poverty within Fairfax County by improving their employment and job readiness skills in order to navigate and re-enter the competitive job market.

Mental Health Resource Project (MHRP)
Korean Community Service Center of Greater Washington
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The Korean Community Service Center of Greater Washington's Mental Health Resource Project addresses the complex needs of Korean immigrants in Fairfax County including the need for quality mental health and well-being. Program activities include crisis intervention, individualized mental health counseling, psychiatric treatment, alcohol/substance abuse counseling, depression screening & intervention for seniors, art therapy for youth, community outreach and mental health capacity building.

Work Center
United Community Ministries
Region 1

United Community Ministries (UCM) provides workforce development services to residents of Fairfax County that live in the Region 1 area. Services include the following:

- Access to computers
- Education and literacy classes
- Individual job coaching
- Job skills training
- Job placement

Culmore Youth Outreach Program
Alternative House
Region 2

Alternative House provides after-school programming to youth in grades 7th through 12th who reside in the Culmore/Bailey's Crossroads communities. Services include:

- Homework Assistance
- Tutoring
- Character Building Workshops
- Community Service Opportunities
- Job Training
- Assistance in Applying for College
- Recreational and Cultural Activities

Hermanos y Hermanas Mayores Latino Outreach Initiative
Big Brothers Big Sisters of the National Capital Area
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

Big Brothers, Big Sisters of the National Capital Area provides mentoring services to Latino youth between the ages of 8-18. The program staff recruits and trains volunteer mentors and matches them with at-risk youth. The volunteer mentors provide the youth with homework assistance and social recreational activities.

Northern Virginia Rides
Jewish Council for the Aging of Greater Washington, Inc.
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The Northern Virginia Rides program provides ride coordination and marketing/outreach support for clients of community-based organizations. The program will use volunteer drivers, a web-based software system and a hub approach to run the program efficiently; accessible to participating organizations. An important component of the program is the evaluation and assessment which includes data collection and analyses for program participants as well as for volunteer drivers and supporting organizations. The overall goal of the program is to increase the availability of driving services to non-driving seniors.

Legal Aid- Housing & Employment
Legal Services of Northern Virginia
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

Legal Services of Northern Virginia's, Housing and Employment program provides low-income residents of Fairfax County with legal representation & advocacy, outreach and education to prevent homelessness as well as legal advice regarding wrongful termination or any workplace conditions that could lead to separation from employment (sexual harassment, loss of transportation, wage garnishments, etc.). It is critical that low-income families and individuals have access to the assistance of counsel when facing civil legal problems concerning

such basic concerns as shelter and income. Specific problems encountered by low-income Fairfax County residents include: evictions, housing code violations and poor living conditions, the potential loss of housing subsidies or public housing rights, housing or employment discrimination, illegal termination of employment and denial of just compensation for labor. The Legal Aid – Housing and Employment Program’s goal is to alleviate crisis situations for low-income individuals and families and promote self-sufficiency.

Refugee Self-Sufficiency (RSS) Program
Lutheran Social Services of the National Capital Area
Regions 1, 2, 4

Lutheran Social Services of the National Capital Area provides intensive case management and employment services to low-income refugee families with unemployed heads of households who are at-risk of homelessness. The program assists families in securing permanent housing and finding employment.

Domestic Violence System Advocacy
Women's Center, The
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The Women’s Center has been serving Fairfax County for nearly 40 years providing essential counseling, education and support to empower women, men and children facing crises, trauma and transitions to navigate these challenges successfully and achieve healthy, safe and productive lives.

Fathers in Touch
Capital Youth Empowerment Program
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The Fathers in Touch program consists of two components classroom and monthly activities. The 12-week classroom component is based on the National Fatherhood Initiative’s 24/7 Dad curriculum which teaches fathers self-awareness, caring for self, fathering skills and relationship skills. The goal is for fathers to shift their attitudes of parenting from negative to positive. The program provides fatherhood enrichment services to low-income fathers involved in abuse and neglect cases, child support delinquency, child protective services concerns, custody and visitation cases. The program will incorporate monthly activities to give fathers the opportunity to practice the skills they learn in the classroom within a supervised setting to bring them closer to re-uniting with their children.

Nutrition/Hygiene
Annandale Christian Community for Action (ACCA Inc.)
Region 2

ACCA’s Nutrition/Hygiene program operates on the grounds of the Child Development Center in Annandale and serves low-income individuals and families in Annandale, Lincolnia, Baileys Crossroads and Culmore areas. It is stocked with fresh, frozen, dried and canned goods as well as personal care items and diapers. Clients will receive a 10-14 days supply of food and hygiene essentials.

Job Skills Training- Computer Literacy and Educational Pathways
Computer C.O.R.E.
Regions 2, 4

Computer CORE works to help low-income adults acquire the technological and life skills to enable them to pursue career aspirations. CORE's program includes training in Microsoft Office, keyboarding, job search assistance (resume development & interview preparation), tutoring and skills building workshops. The trainees also have the opportunity to increase their employability by earning 7-13 college credits for their CORE coursework through Northern Virginia Community College.

Forward Steps
United Community Ministries
Region 1

United Community Ministries (UCM) provides after-school programming to youth between the ages of 6-18 who reside in the Region 1 area of Fairfax County. Services include tutoring, enrichment activities for youth, field trips and parent involvement activities.

Adult Basic Literacy and Beginning English Language Programs
Literacy Council of Northern Virginia

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The Literacy Council of Northern Virginia (LCNV) provides beginning level literacy and English language through four programs: basic adult literacy tutoring helps students who need assistance with reading and writing; ESOL tutoring provides one-on-one assistance to students needing help speaking and understanding English; family learning program provides classroom ESOL instruction to adults and their children; ESOL learning centers provides classroom based beginning level English language and literacy education with a life-skills focused curriculum.

Pathways to Self-Sufficiency

Pathway Homes, Inc.

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The project will serve 50 of the seriously mentally ill, co-occurring and homeless population who require highly intensive supportive services in order to maintain stability in the community. The goal of the project is to integrate these individuals into the community, normalize their lives as much as possible by providing an environment which protects personal privacy and promotes personal dignity, and improve the quality of their lives by providing non-time limited housing linked to appropriate supportive and rehabilitative services.

Family Stabilization & Self-Sufficiency

Family Preservation and Strengthening Services

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

Family Preservation & Strengthening Services provides rental assistance and intensive case management services to low-income families to help them to become stabilized and attain self-sufficiency. The participants will enroll in the program for up to a period of three years.

Crisis Intervention

Lorton Community Action Center

Regions 3, 4

The Crisis Intervention Program is designed to fill a gap for individuals and families in need within the Lorton area. The program offers emergency food, seasonal assistance, furniture assistance and financial assistance for rent and utility bills.

Island Walk After School Support Program (IWP)

Community Preservation and Development Corporation (CPDC)

Region 1

The Island Walk After School Program (IWP) provides intensive literacy support, English language support and academic and homework assistance to the residents of the Island Walk Affordable Housing community located in Reston VA. The components of the after-school program includes tutoring sessions in reading and other areas identified for improvements to students in 1st to 5th grades, individualized tutoring based on student homework and academic needs to secondary school students and individualized support to elementary school youth in 1st to 6th grades.

Integrated Primary Medical and Behavioral Health

HealthWorks for Northern Virginia Herndon

Region 3

HealthWorks for Northern Virginia addresses the need for quality health care services for low-income persons lacking access to health care services, with a primary focus upon the Northwestern area of Fairfax County: Herndon, Reston, Chantilly and Centreville. The program provides comprehensive primary and behavioral health care to all patients, ages 0 and up regardless of ability to pay. Specialty services will include the treatment of diabetes, hypertension, asthma and depression.

Supporting Teenagers through Empowerment and Prevention Services (STEPS)

Korean Community Service Center of Greater Washington (KCSC)

Regions 3, 4

KCSC will provide a multipronged program to Korean youth focusing on prevention, intervention and empowerment services. Prevention services will include educational workshops for both youth and their families on internet addiction, communication skills and financial literacy. Intervention services will include

in-depth counseling services to address addiction or behavior issues. Empowerment services will include volunteer opportunity placement services and motivational seminars to promote social acculturation and leadership development.

Beth El House Transitional Housing

Beth El House, Inc.

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

Beth El House provides safe and secure housing to homeless women and their children, many of whom are victims of domestic violence, for two years per family, while they develop the skills that will help them move towards self-sufficiency. The apartments are located in the Route 1 area, close to public transportation, schools and shopping. Services provided include job counseling, budgeting assistance, individual clinical therapy and monthly Mothers' Meetings focused on parenting skills, stress management, basic life skills and peer support.

Multicultural Human Services

Northern Virginia Family Service

Region 1

Northern Virginia Family Service's Multicultural Human Services program provides critical mental health and social service programs to English-limited immigrant and refugee individuals and families living in Fairfax County, for whom existing services are inaccessible due to language and cultural barriers. The program is designed to utilize a holistic approach to address clients' mental health needs, including those clients who are victims of domestic violence, human trafficking, torture and other trauma.

Stable Long Term Housing for Chronically Homeless Adults

New Hope Housing, Inc.

Region 2

New Hope Housing provides 31 beds of permanent supportive housing in scattered locations for former chronically homeless adults who, as a result of their severe disabling conditions (such as mental illness, cognitive impairments and/or substance abuse), are unable to comply with the requirements for entry into other housing programs and are likely to use expensive public services such as emergency rooms, detox programs, jails and psychiatric hospitals.

Microenterprise Program

ECDC Enterprise Development Group

Region 1

This program provides direct technical assistance and micro-loans to low and moderate income individuals.

Homeless Case Management

Lamb Center, The

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The Lamb Center (TLC) provides services six days per week at its day-time drop in program to assist homeless individuals primarily in all four regions of Fairfax County with food, personal hygiene and case management services. Other services provided by the program include employment counseling and job placement assistance, individual counseling and recovery planning, transportation assistance, help to acquire or re-acquire valid IDs, referrals to a variety of housing, medical and county services. The service model at the TLC depends heavily on building relationships of trust over time with the clients. The goals of the program is to assist clients with obtaining a GED, secure employment, participate in substance abuse recovery and, obtain and maintain stable housing.

Pathways to Long-Term Supportive Services

Pathway Homes, Inc.

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The purpose of the project is to serve 50 seriously mentally ill, co-occurring and homeless individuals who require highly intensive supportive services and have continued long-term needs. The goal of the project is to integrate these individuals into the community, normalize their lives as much as possible by providing an environment which protects personal privacy and promotes personal dignity, and improve the quality of their lives by providing non-time limited housing linked to appropriate supportive and rehabilitative services.

**Legal Aid- Families and Consumers
Legal Services of Northern Virginia
Regions 3, 4**

Legal Services of Northern Virginia's, Legal Aid-Families & Consumers Program, provides legal advice, counsel and/or representation to low-income families and individuals in all four regions of Fairfax County. The program enables residents to gain access to the assistance of counsel when facing critical civil legal problems concerning such basic necessities as food, shelter, medical care, education, income, family stability and personal safety. The goal of the program is to alleviate crisis situations for low-income families and individuals through the assistance of legal counsel in order to achieve self-sufficiency.

**Ayuda's Children's Program
Ayuda**

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The Children's Program at Ayuda provides holistic legal and social services to immigrant children who are victims of abuse, neglect, abandonment and other crimes within Fairfax County. The services include agency's staff attorneys providing children with legal advice and counsel as well as extended representation in immigration, protection order and family law matters. In addition, Ayuda's social workers provide clinical case management to enable children to access social services supports and other short-term activities such as securing emergency shelter, assistance in accessing transitional housing and emergency help. Ayuda's Childrens Program's goal is to ensure that child victims are able to overcome the trauma of their experiences and build safe, self-sufficient lives.

**Vamos Adelante
Northern Virginia Family Service (NVFS)
Regions 2, 4**

The program provides crisis intervention and self-sufficiency services to immigrant families living in Fairfax County. Through the program's Crisis Intervention services, NVFS case managers provide short-term, transactional case management services to clients who apply for public benefits or other community resources, to address clients' needs through direct assistance, and to read/translate documents into English. Self-Sufficiency services focus on helping clients achieve greater financial stability and become active members of American society.

**Brain Injury Services' Senior Specialist Program
Brain Injury Services
Region 2**

Brain Injury Services (BIS), Seniors Specialist program provides specialized case management services to address the complex needs of older adults in regions 1, 2 and 4 of Fairfax County with brain injuries, including referrals, education programs and long-term rehab support services to maximize recovery and re-integration back to the community. BIS contracts with a neuropsychologist to lead a support group for the families of survivors to help them become better caregivers. The group is population focused and provides education on how to manage situations as they arise. The ultimate goal is for older adults with brain injury to remain in their home community/community.

**Artemis House
Shelter House, Inc.
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4**

Artemis House is a domestic violence shelter operating under contract with Fairfax County at an undisclosed location. The program provides crisis intervention to individuals and families, in all four regions of the county, who are homeless after fleeing domestic violence as well as assisting in their stabilization to achieve self-sufficiency within 45 days. Through rapid client engagement, comprehensive case management and the provision of crucial supportive services, the program helps clients develop an enduring safety plan to protect them when they return to the community. Artemis House also helps clients cultivate skills and connections to help them remain independent of their abusers and cultivate increasing self-sufficiency.

**Community Case Management Program
Shelter House, Inc.**

Region 1

Shelter House's Community Case Management Program prevents vulnerable individuals and families within all four regions of Fairfax County from becoming homeless. All clients receive case management services which include financial assistance, budget counseling and linkages with needed community resources. Prevention and diversion clients, who are individuals and families at risk of losing their homes, receive the program's support to resolve the problem or are diverted into affordable housing. Rapid re-housing clients, who are individuals and families rapidly re-housed from the emergency shelters, receive the program's support to sustain their new permanent housing successfully.

Strengthening Juvenile Restorative Justice in Fairfax County: A Collaboration to Build Safer Communities

Northern Virginia Mediation Service, Inc.

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The Strengthening Juvenile Restorative Justice in Fairfax County: A Collaboration to Build Safer Communities program integrates services with the county resources to identify at-risk youth. The program will provide facilitation and coordination services which includes screening for case appropriateness, introduction to the process and scheduling, participant and family willingness to participate and case management. The program focuses on first time offenders of misdemeanor and discipline offenses. The structured process (called an RJ conference) is aimed at preventing future reoccurrence and teaching juveniles thinking and behavioral skills such as problem solving, conflict resolution, constructive communication, personal accountability and self-sufficiency. The program will guide juveniles, parents, and school/community to address and repair harm caused by juvenile offenses. The Restorative Justice Conference program will target youth from Mt. Vernon High School located in the southern part of the county.

Department of Assistive and Rehabilitative Services

Brain Injury Services

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

Brain Injury Services Assistive Technology Program serves survivors of brain injuries in Fairfax County to help overcome barriers in the workplace, home and community leading to independence. Assistive Technology, as defined by Brain Injury Services, is any piece of equipment that helps individuals with disabilities, move, communicate or otherwise function in their daily lives. The goal of the program is for survivors to accomplish targeted goals, including independent living, community impact and productive living.

Ongoing Assistance

Lorton Community Action Center

Region 2

The program provides weekly food assistance, supportive financial assistance in the form of recurring rental or utility assistance to keep at-risked families housed, school supplies/backpacks for children and seasonal food/gift assistance. This support eases the stressors for families in the Lorton area with a household member who is disabled and/or a senior. Clients served under this program can receive financial assistance more frequently and at a higher amount than is capable under the organization's Crisis Intervention program. Regular contact with LCAC's Case Manager, Food Program Manager, or Bilingual Case Worker ensures that households are sustained and thrive.

JCCNV Special Needs Camps

The Jewish Community Center of Northern Virginia, Inc.

Region 3

The Jewish Community Center of Northern Virginia offers Special Needs Camps for children with ADHD, Autism and other spectrum disorders. The program will serve 40 individuals total in two Camp Kadima four-week sessions (Grades 1-6) and one session of Camp Chaverim (Grades 7-9). Camp Kadima and Camp Chaverim focus on empowering campers to successfully and independently navigate the social world by providing a therapeutically supported complement of strategies and activities for improving social communication skills among children with a variety of communication challenges. Camp Kadima incorporates therapeutic support and didactic instruction with a research-validated inclusion model. Camp Chaverim offers an inclusive summer camp environment with appropriate levels of trained supportive staff, but does not offer social skills instruction.

**Self-Sufficiency Through Health, Housing and Social Services
Vietnamese Resettlement Association, Inc.**

Region 3

The Vietnamese Resettlement Association, Inc. (VRA) provides assistance to low-income Asians with limited English at its drop-in center in the Willston Center. The assistance includes preventative health care (mammograms and cervical cancer screening), individualized case management and assistance in locating/applying for affordable housing options. The staff and volunteers assist clients in dealing with the linguistic, cultural and socio-economic barriers that hinder their ability to progress towards self-sufficiency.

Emergency Assistance

Falls Church Community Service Council, Inc.

Region 3

The Falls Church Community Services Council, comprised of a coalition of 19 faith communities, provides for the basic and emergency needs people in the Falls Church area. The program receives requests for assistance from ministers, and county social workers. Financial assistance is available for rent, utility and special needs (prescriptions, gasoline, car repairs, emergency dental or medical assistance, etc.). FCS also provides furniture to clients transitioning from homelessness.

Accessible Medication Program

Northern Virginia Family Service

Region 1

The Accessible Medication Program serves Fairfax County residents who lack prescription drug coverage, whose income level is at or below 200% of FPL, and who have a chronic illness. Clients are provided assistance in applying for and receiving free medications through Prescription Assistance Programs. The program developed agreements to have staff co-located at the Health Works of Northern Virginia, a Federally Qualified Health Center located in Herndon and the Alexandria Neighborhood Health Services serving clients in South County.

Cost Efficient Housing for CSB Services

Community Havens, Inc.

Region 2

Community Havens is requesting funding to be used to acquire 2 three bedroom units in or near Vienna. The units will be used to as supportive housing for 6 extremely low income residents with serious mental illness. Supportive services will be provided by the Community Service Board (CSB). The residents will be relocated from units currently being leased by the CSB. Rents for these units will be lower than those currently paid by the CSB.

Building Communities of Promise

Wesley Housing Development Corporation

Region 1

Wesley proposes to provide services and programs for 117 residents of 2 housing communities in Region 3 for extremely low-income seniors and persons with severe physical disabilities and/or traumatic brain injury in order to promote housing stability, health and wellness, and lifelong learning.

Basic Needs: Emergency Financial Assistance/Furniture Storage

Annandale Christian Community for Action (ACCA Inc.)

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

ACCA's Family Emergency Assistance& Furniture program provides emergency financial assistance to low income families/individuals. ACCA works with Fairfax County's Coordinated Services Planning (CSP), school social workers and member churches to provide low income people in crisis with financial assistance to pay emergency rents, prescriptions, utility bills and miscellaneous needs such as car repairs, gas, etc. Referrals are sent by email to volunteer "money captains" working from their homes or places of employment. In addition to financial assistance, ACCA operates a furniture program that distributes new and slightly used furniture to needy families/individuals.

SPARC Connects
Specially Adapted Resource Clubs
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The SPARC Connects program provides individuals with disabilities (including individuals with Autism) with vocational learning, support and opportunities through the development of inter and intra-personal skills, strategies, and coping mechanisms. SPARC will offer three components: life skill development, community service and entrepreneurial projects. The program consists of stations where participants self-direct their choice of activities and includes a computer lab, library, instructional/demonstration kitchen, horticulture, gross motor, small animal habitat, conference, sensory integration and respite station. Each station will support individual goals of communication, literacy, life skills development, sensory integration, interest exploration, active-learning/leisure interests. In addition, SPARC will partner with the Jewish Social Service Agency (JSSA) to conduct groups that address vocational learning, explore feeling and coping strategies for work settings, business field trips and shadowing.

Homes for the Homeless Transitional Housing Program
Christian Relief Services, Inc.
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The program provides supportive services and case management to tenants of transitional housing units throughout the county. Case management is provided by Christian Relief Services or by a sponsoring agency and is provided to help clients progress towards self-sufficiency and permanent housing.

CS Affordable Housing Administration
Cornerstones, Inc.
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

Cornerstones provides administrative staffing and services for (1) management of 53 scattered site housing units used as affordable housing for homeless, at risk and very low/low income households in Region 3, with supportive social services, including a case manager, assessment, service plan, resources for increased self-sufficiency and referrals to other agencies/community resources; (2) oversight and asset management of 48 rental units at the Apartments at North Point, a subsidized modern income community; and (3) exploration of opportunities for the preservation, development and management of additional affordable housing.

Emergency Relief Services
Koinonia Foundation, Inc., The
Region 3

Koinonia Foundation provides emergency financial assistance, food and clothing to individuals in need of services who reside in the Greater Franconia/Kingstowne area. Financial assistance will be provided to clients once annually to help them avoid eviction or utility disconnection.

Education for Independence
ACE Foundation
Region 1

The Education for Independence program proposes to provide job-training and career counseling services to low-income, single parents, single pregnant women and displaced homemakers to attain economic self-sufficiency. The clients choose a course of study and attend classes through the Adult and Community Education program based in Fairfax County Public Schools. ACE offers certificate programs and career preparation classes at various locations within Fairfax County. The goal of this project is to assist clients in developing the skills needed to obtain and sustain gainful employment.

Legal Assistance for Immigrants- Employment
Legal Aid Justice Center
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The Legal Aid Justice Center's (LAJC) Legal Assistance for Immigrants-Employment program uses a multi-pronged approach that includes legal assistance, education and organizing and advocacy to assist low-wage immigrant workers with their efforts to defend their rights in the workplace and recover lost wages. LAJC bilingual attorneys provide free legal assistance including consultation and advice, assistance with pro se court proceedings, assistance with an monitoring of the filing of complaints with the Virginia Department of Labor and Industry, or extended legal representation including trial in state or federal court. The program also provides basic advice, information and referrals to clients seeking legal and other information and services in

Northern Virginia, while Community Educators conduct regular outreach in an effort to educate clients about workers' rights, the legal system and where to seek assistance if needed.

**Project Independence- Helping Fairfax-Burke Seniors Age in Place
Shepherd's Center of Fairfax-Burke**

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The Shepherd's Center of Fairfax-Burke (SCFP) provides a variety of programs to meet the diverse needs of seniors living independently in the Fairfax- Burke community. The provide provides a variety of enrichment and socialization services including: Adventures in Learning, Lunch 'n Life, and exercise classes. Additionally, the program offers accompanied transportation to medical appointments and free companion shopping transportation to grocery stores.

**Cedar Ridge Community Center
Cornerstones, Inc.**

Regions 2, 4

Cornerstones offers programs and services to the residents of the Cedar Ridge Apartments, a housing complex for extremely low to low income tenants. The programs and services include: (1) onsite educational life skills and vocational workshops for all ages, information & referral and transportation, which will result increased participant knowledge, more positive health choices and attainment of established goals; (2) wellness support information and referral for accessing emergency and other resources available through Cornerstones and other community sources, which will result in participant attainment of established goals toward prevention and self-sufficiency; and (3) programmatic opportunities for healthy choice decisions making, such as fitness clubs, diabetes self-management education and community garden plots, which will result in increased participant knowledge and achievement of established health choices goals.

HCCMS

Housing and Community Services of Northern Virginia

Regions 1, 2, 4

The Housing Counseling and Case Management Services program provides counseling, emergency rental and utilities payment assistance, and case management services to low income families in lower Alexandria, Lorton, Ft. Belvoir, Springfield, Burke and Centreville. Clients are in imminent danger of losing their home or are experiencing a financial crisis that may lead to the loss of their housing. All referrals for financial assistance are made by the County's Coordinated Services Planning. The program provides short-term and long-term case management to assist families to manage the crisis and achieve stability. Case management services include assessment, assistance in developing a family budget, assistance in finding affordable housing, help securing financial assistance with rent, mortgage, and utilities, and referral to community based services.
