**Aggressive Dynamic Debt Reduction Elimination and Savings Strategies
(ADDRESS)**

Homestretch, Inc.

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

This project will provide financial education to help homeless families become self-sufficient. The need addressed is removing obstacles to self-sufficiency for homeless families. The population served is homeless adults in Fairfax County and the cities of Fairfax and Falls Church.

Administration of Affordable Housing in Fairfax County

Wesley Housing Development Corporation

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

This project involves supporting costs of on-going and future efforts to acquire, preserve, rehabilitate, and construct affordable housing in Fairfax County.

Adult Health Program

Northern Virginia Family Service

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The program will meet the urgent care needs of low income clients by ensuring they are linked to affordable community based medical and dental providers and receive financial assistance when necessary to access medical providers or prescription medication.

Affordable Rental and Supportive Housing Program Administration

Robert Pierre Johnson Housing Development Corporation of the National Capital Area

Regions 1, 2

This proposal is for the administration of a project that will provide safe, appropriate and affordable housing for four individuals with special needs and 32 small families.

Annandale Safe Youth Project

Alternative House

Region 2

This is a new proposal that addresses the need for after school programs for youth in the Annandale area of Fairfax County. The goal of the project is to prevent high risk youth from being drawn into gang involvement, drug use, sexual behavior and substance abuse and to promote their staying in school, achieving good grades and aspiring to a higher education. The activities are designed to address the needs of the youth between the ages of 9-11 and the families and will include tutoring, computer training, multi-generational groups, health programs, anger management groups, gender sensitivity groups, homework help, recreational opportunities, substance abuse prevention groups, community service, acculturation groups, Girl Power and individual and family counseling.

APD Housing Administration
Alliance for the Physically Disabled, Inc.
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The program will provide housing with full time personal assistance services to care for low income adults with severe physical disabilities.

The Asian Youth Empowerment Project
Boat People SOS (BPSOS)
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The project will expand its current after school program to provide a safe, adult supervised environment to prevent youth gang recruitment and use a science-based approach to gang prevention. The goal of the project is to equip youth with knowledge and skills to make safe and healthy decisions, empower Asian youth to take on leadership roles and involve parents/families in their children's education. The main thrust of the program is to form youth clubs at Poe and Glasgow Middle Schools and Jeb Stuart, Annandale and Falls Church High Schools. The activities will be categorized into four areas: service planning projects, educational and training workshops, parent and family engagement, leadership training and a year-end awards recognition ceremony. At least 20 students from each school will be served in the first year and 30 in the second year.

Asian American Domestic Violence Project
Legal Services of Northern Virginia
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

This proposal addresses the need for legal representation to Korean American victims of domestic violence. This is a collaborative effort between Legal Services of Northern Virginia (LSNV) and the Asian Pacific American Legal Resource Center (APALRC). The project will be staffed by one Korean-speaking attorney who will be supported by LSNV's family law attorneys. Ongoing support will also be provided through the use of bilingual law students volunteers who staff the APALRC legal intake hotline. The project proposes to serve 50-75 Asian immigrants during each of the two years. Services will include provision of linguistically and culturally appropriate legal services, establishment of a pro bono network of 5-10 Asian American attorneys, presentation of two eight-hour training, collaboration with Asian social service agencies to provide services such as safety planning, peer support, emergency transportation, mental health counseling and life skills development.

Basic Needs
Lorton Community Action Center
Region 1

The program will provide basic needs to the low income residents of the Lorton area. Services will include the provision of food, clothing, furniture; information and referral; emergency financial assistance and seasonal assistance. Funds will be use for staff and support.

Basic Needs Program
United Community Ministries, Inc.
Region 1

The program will provide emergency food assistance, emergency financial assistance for rent, utilities, medical care, case management services designed to develop self-

sufficiency, community outreach services, household items and furniture and clothing.

Beth El House
Beth El House, Inc.

Region 1

This project addresses the need for case management and social services to mothers and children enrolled in their transitional housing program. Bethel El will provide a case manager to work with the families to provide mental health and health services, parenting skills, money management, individual and group counseling, job counseling, job search skills and access to education.

Bilingual Housing Rehabilitation Specialist

Town of Herndon

Region 3

This project will provide technical support, program administration, design and outreach for housing rehabilitation and neighborhood improvement in the Town of Herndon. The population addressed is lower income residents and the limited English speaking population.

Bryant Early Learning Center
United Community Ministries, Inc.

Region 1

The program proposes to provide affordable a comprehensive child development program which includes infant and toddler care for low and moderate income parents living or working in Fairfax County. Services will include childcare for 98 children, quarterly service plans, health and developmental screenings, kindergarten readiness assessments, parent workshops, advisory council meetings, multicultural programming, field trips and special events, music and movement instruction and linkages to needed resources.

Buckman Road After-School Support Program
Community Preservation and Development Corporation

Region 1

This project will provide intensive reading assistance and implement the KidBiz program, a technology based program for children in grades 2nd through 8th. Homework assistance will also be offered through this project as well as technology education which is integrated into all content areas to help reinforce learning. This project will seek to assist children from low-income families and ESOL students to increase their reading and math skills.

Buckman Road Career and Skills Program
Community Preservation and Development Corporation

Region 1

This project will provide low-income immigrant and non-immigrants office skills training with an emphasis on Microsoft Office, Windows, the Internet, soft skills and job placement. The course will cover technology, job search and employability. A career coach will be assigned to clients to help them develop career, education, training and personal development goals.

Building for the Future
Wesley Housing Development Corporation
Region 2

This project involves providing self sufficiency and basic needs through computer skills training. The need is low and moderate income individuals and newcomers in need of community resources and access to technology in order to improve their computer literacy skills and support their families. The population served is low-income individuals and families which are located in affordable multi-family complexes with high immigrant populations and diverse ethnic backgrounds.

Cedar Ridge Community Center Program
Reston Interfaith, Inc.
Region 3

This project will provide services and referrals to a 198 site-based Section 8 development in the County. Needs are at-risk of loss of housing due to lack of communication, employment, and life skills. The population served is the residents of Cedar Ridge Apartments, a project-based Section 8 development. The programs developed and offered are on site and done in collaboration with other County and nonprofit agencies.

Challenge to Change
OAR of Fairfax County, Inc.
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

This program provides services to offenders, ex-offenders and their families. The services are designed to enhance the skills of families and individuals so that they can achieve self-sufficiency, health, stability and independence. Services include direct assistance, case management and counseling/mentoring services.

Chantilly Mews Family Preservation Project
Black Women United for Action
Region 2

This project will provide mentoring services, life skills education, tutoring, family enrichment and college preparatory assistance for residents of Chantilly Mews and surrounding neighborhoods.

Clifton Presbyterian Church Senior/Adult Respite Center
Clifton Presbyterian Church and Preschool
Region 4

This proposal addresses the need for a senior/adult respite center for frail and disabled persons who need assistance or supervision during the day. The goal is to assist clients to maintain their highest level of functioning, support emotional and physical independence and heighten self-esteem. The project proposes to provide planned organized activities which will include music therapy, field trips, guest lecturers, peer support, holiday events, caregiver support groups and physical therapy. The program will serve 10 clients in both years.

Community Development and Homeownership Among Hispanic Families
Hispanic Committee of Virginia
Regions 1,2,3,4

This project will address CCFP priority areas 1 and 2 by providing training in the areas of English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL), citizenship and civic

participation classes, financial literacy and homebuyer counseling for low income immigrant families living in Fairfax County.

**Community and Family Initiatives (CFI)
Center for Multicultural Human Services**

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The project will provide emergency basic needs assistance, case management and educational assistance to low income people. Services will include emergency food, clothing, transportation, holiday food/presents, and language translation services. Educational programs will include ESOL, children's enrichment programs, life skills workshops and immigration and citizenship services. The target population is low income immigrants.

**Construction Training Opportunities Program (CTOP)
Northern Virginia Family Service**

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The program helps unemployed and under-employed clients achieve self sufficiency by providing construction related employment skills training and support services.

**Culmore Safe Youth Project
Alternative House**

Region 2

The Culmore Safe Youth project will address CCFP funding priority 3 by providing services to 30 at risk youth in grades 4th through 6th for a minimum of 13 hours per week. The program will provide tutoring, computer training, individual and group counseling and supervised recreational activities. Although Alternative House has a center for teens ages 12 to 18, the Safe Youth Project will address the specific needs of children between the ages of 9 to 11. This project will promote parent involvement so that parents will become actively involved in their children's lives and healthy parent/child relationships will be fostered.

**Culmore Youth Outreach
Alternative House**

Region 2

The Culmore Youth Outreach Project will provide services to 250 at-risk youth in the areas of counseling, homework assistance, supervised recreation, job training and community service opportunities in an effort to help youth gain the knowledge, skills and abilities to make sound decisions. This project will serve low income youth in grades 7th through 12th, who live in the Culmore area of Bailey's Crossroads. The project will provide activities that will prevent youth from joining gangs and it will create opportunities that will promote positive self esteem, build character and teach youth problem solving skills which will help them to make appropriate decisions.

**Day Labor Project
Reston Interfaith, Inc.**

Region 3

This project will provide day laborers, who have until recently congregated at a 7-11 in Herndon, an alternative spot to access employers. Other services will include direct assistance, clothing, medical service, advocacy and training/apprenticeships.

Education for Independence

ACE Foundation

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

This project addresses the need for a workforce development program for low-income single parents, single pregnant women and displaced homemakers to attain self-sufficiency. The program will provide career development workshops that include career planning, vocational interests and ability assessment, career directions, job seeking skills and techniques and setting the stage for future success.

Emergency and Basic Human Needs Services

ECHO

Regions 1, 2, 3

The all-volunteer program will provide emergency and basic human needs assistance to low income clients in the Springfield and Burke areas. This includes food, financial assistance, clothing and house wares. Most clients are Hispanic and many are immigrants from Asia, Africa and the Middle East. Emergency financial assistance will cover housing, utility, medical and pharmaceuticals.

Emergency and Self-Sufficiency Services Program: Resources for Moving Ahead

Reston Interfaith, Inc.

Region 3, 4

This project involves case management to address emergency and supplemental food donations, financial assistance, case management, clothing, and holiday food baskets/gifts. The need addressed is prevention of homelessness by an unexpected financial crisis. The population served is low and low-moderate income people in the northwestern area of Fairfax County.

Emergency Assistance: Rent, Utilities, Medicine, and Special Needs

Falls Church Community Service Council, Inc.

Region 2

This all-volunteer program will provide low income clients emergency financial assistance for rent, utilities, medicines, and special needs. It will also provide funding for the agency's furniture program and some administrative expenses. Clients are referred by county social workers and churches.

Emergency Food

Falls Church Community Service Council, Inc.

Region 2

This all-volunteer program provides food for one week of meals to families and individuals in crisis. A special feature of the program is that it delivers the food to clients. The agency provides this service because it has identified transportation to the pantry as a barrier to service. Many of its clients have disabilities, family demands or insufficient public transportation. Referrals are received from county social workers and pastors. Food is delivered on the day of the request, Monday-Friday.

Emergency Services – Keeping families at Home

Good Shepherd Housing and Family Services, Inc.

Region 1

This project will provide counseling and grants to allow clients in short-term crises to avoid eviction or utility disconnection, which are basic needs. The population

served is low-income residents of south Fairfax County who can support themselves once their immediate crises are resolved.

Emergency Services Program
Western Fairfax Christian Ministries
Region 4

The program will provide emergency financial assistance, food, transportation, clothing and furnishings for low income families located in Western Fairfax. The goal of the project is to prevent homelessness and hunger. The program will add a second social worker, preferably one who is fluent in Spanish, to the project in FY 2007 and 2008. The program will also hire a staff member with a background in non-profit marketing to help assist in the expansion of their corporate sponsorship program.

Newcomer Self Sufficiency Program
Newcomer Community Service Center
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

This proposal addresses the need for services for immigrants and refugees to become self sufficient in the U.S. The proposed project provides the following services: immigration services and citizenship counseling, employment services, ESL instruction, case management, and information and referral services. The case management component is new this year.

ESL Program for Job Seekers
Progreso Hispano
Region 1

The program will provide ESL classes to beginners, intermediate and advanced learners. The program will focus on employment. The target population is immigrant workers who live along the Route One corridor and are in need of English proficiency to advance in the workplace.

Facing Forward
DaVinci's Attic
Regions 2, 3, 4

The program is an expansion of an existing art program in limited use within Fairfax County, sponsored by the Department of Recreation and Therapeutic Services. The project is designed to make the creative process accessible to teens as a tool for increasing self awareness, accountability and connectivity through the use of different art activities. Youth will experience quilting, watercolor abstracts, acrylic on canvas, pastel on fabrics, pen and ink watercolor, plaster masks, mobile construction and self portraits. It will provide weekly, after school, small group activities and an intensive two-week summer program.

Fairfax Medication Program
Northern Virginia Family Service
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The proposal will provide low-income people lacking prescription coverage with intensive targeted assistance in applying to pharmaceutical companies for free, ongoing medication for chronic illnesses. The targeted population includes children and adults without insurance coverage for medications.

**Fairfax Resource Mothers Program
Northern Virginia Urban League
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4**

This project will provide pre and post natal intervention support services designed to promote the health of teens at risk of delivering infants with low birth weight. The project will serve 150 teen clients and the infant through the child's third birthday.

150 - Bid 94 – Family Child Care Provider Training and Workforce Development Project

Infant/Toddler Family Day Care

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

This project provides childcare provider training. The program will assist the emerging low-income immigrant population develop the skills needed to be self-sufficient and increase the availability of highly trained childcare providers. Program activities include a workplace ESOL program specially designed for the child care profession as well as a mentoring, first aid including CPR, safety and nutrition, financial assistance, professional development, parent orientations, marketing, and self-evaluation. Mentors also enroll at NOVA to increase education and skills and are encouraged to pursue an Associate Degree. The training programs and supports will help immigrants establish independent family child care businesses in their homes.

**195 - Bid 44 - Family Emergency Assistance
Annandale Christian Community for Action (ACCA)**

Region 2

The all-volunteer program provides emergency financial assistance for rent, security deposits, utility bills, prescriptions, medical dental services and other non-food needs such as gas, work tools, clothes, furniture storage, etc. Referrals are from county social workers, churches non profit social service agencies and shelters.

**156 - Bid 71 – Family Enrichment Services
FACETS (Fairfax Area Christian Emergency & Transitional Services, Inc.)**

Region 4

The proposed services will be provided to adults, youth and teens in four apartment complexes: Barros Circle, Ragan Oaks, Robinson Square and an expansion into Yorkville Cooperative. Programs for youth will include boys and girls groups (Girl Power) which supports development in the areas of self esteem, decision making, education, responsibility and prevention of at-risk behavior; college prep assist high school youth with S.A.T. preparation, college admissions and securing financial aid; one-to-one tutoring, homework and youth study, exploring the arts (volunteers help children improve basic academic skills, practice social skills and gain an appreciation for art and music, indoor play, youth night (discussion groups, activities and community projects), camps and field trips, mentoring. Programs for adults will include parent/child enrichment (parenting program), ESL classes, computer classes (computer and Internet education, job search, interviewing skills, and entry-level office skills) a circle of neighbors (monthly programs which may include first time homeowners workshops, nutrition, money management, parenting and leadership development).

122 - Bid 118 – Family Learning Program and Fairfax County Library Collaboration and One-to-One Tutoring

Literacy Council of Northern Virginia

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

This project will provide individual Basic Literacy and ESL tutoring programs for adults who are functionally illiterate and low income immigrant families and their school aged children, ages 2 to 12. The program seeks to implement a new initiative aimed at establishing two new Family Learning Programs in cooperation with Fairfax County Public Libraries.

189 - Bid 5 - Family Renewal Program

United Community Ministries, Inc.

Region 1

The program will assist low income families who are homeless or at threat of homelessness to achieve stable housing, prevent child abuse, improve parenting skills, improve life skills and promote well child care. The population served will be low income families living in the Route One area of Fairfax County.

103 - Bid 90 – Food for Others

Food for Others, Inc.

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The program will assure basic needs for food are met throughout Fairfax County. Referrals will be made by county social workers and other social service providers. Clients will receive free groceries and USDA commodities. The program will also provide foods to community-based organizations for distribution to their clients. The target population is very low income residents for Fairfax County.

205 - Bid 104 -Food Outreach and Family Assistance

Our Daily Bread, Inc.

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

This project will provide food, financial assistance and mentoring to low income families, people with disabilities and newcomers to the United States. This project will provide weekly grocery deliveries and emergency groceries to clients through the food outreach program. It will also provide financial assistance for rent, utility assistance and other items such as medications. One-on-one mentoring will provide guidance for clients to learn ways to reduce debt. The project will also offer ESOL classes to newcomers from other countries.

191 - Bid 45 - Food/Nutrition/Hygiene

Annandale Christian Community for Action (ACCA)

Region 2

This all-volunteer program will deliver 1-14 days worth of food and household products to low income individuals and families. Deliveries continue until the family stabilizes either on its own or with the assistance of entitlement programs. Deliveries are also made to the homeless people at shelters. Referrals come from county social workers, school social workers, member churches and other non profits. Many clients have limited English proficiency, are elderly and/or have disabilities.

For Immediate Sympathetic Help

Fairfax Fish, Inc.

Regions 2, 4

This project will provide food, transportation and financial assistance for rental assistance and utilities in an effort to help families meet their basic needs.

Guest House**Friends of Guest House, Inc.****Regions 1, 2, 3, 4**

The program proposes to provide a transitional residence for female ex-offenders and support services to help them transition from prison life. The women will be provided with a safe, structured living environment in a group home setting. In addition, they will receive weekly training sessions that focus on topics such as anger management, healthy relationships, health and wellness, financial matters, conflict resolution and employment related issue. Aftercare services (job and home visits, individual and group meeting with the counselor) are provided for 6-9 months.

Healthy Kids!**The Joy of Sports Foundation (JSF)****Regions 1, 2, 3, 4**

The project will serve 150 youth, ages 5 to 11 and 100 parents and teachers will be trained through the Healthy Kids workshops and the proposed Training Academy. Sports based educational programming will be provided children, parents and teachers.

Helping Troubled Teens by Strengthening Families**Jewish Social service Agency (JSSA)****Regions 1, 2, 3, 4**

The project will focus on troubled teens and their families. Services will include individual and family therapy, group therapy for teens, anger management, conflict resolution, parenting education and support groups, referrals for other mental health services as needed. Educational support groups will be offered to parents and will focus on gangs, health services, job services and community resources for families.

Hermanos y Hermanas Mayores Latino Outreach Initiative**Big Brothers Big Sisters of the National Capital Area****Regions 2, 3, 4**

The program will provide mentoring services for at-risk Latino youth ages 8 to 18. The mentoring services will be provided at least six hours a week in the community based program and one hour per week in the school based program.

Herndon Elementary Enrichment Program**Reston Interfaith, Inc.****Region 3**

This project involves helping low income 3rd-6th graders with basic math, reading, and writing skills. Students are referred by teachers through the IEP process. The program targets five elementary schools in the Herndon-Oak Hill-Reston area of the County where up to 43.75% of students receive a subsidized or free school lunch.

Herndon-Reston FISH**Herndon-Reston FISH, Inc.****Region 3**

This project will address CCFP funding priority area 4 by providing referral services and financial assistance to residents in need in the Herndon and Reston areas. The referral service links residents to public and private agencies that are able to meet the clients' specific needs. Financial assistance is also provided to help Herndon-Reston residents with rent, utilities, and prescription medications.

**HIV Prevention Education for Youth
Northern Virginia AIDS Ministry
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4**

This project will train 25 youth to serve as HIV Prevention Educators for their peers. The project seeks to provide outreach to 1,320 youth through prevention peer education training, skill building workshops, and community outreach.

**Holistic Approaches to Achieving Independence for Individuals with Disabilities
National Rehabilitation and Rediscovery Foundation, Inc.
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4**

This project will provide weekly neuromuscular training, movement therapy, motor skills and therapeutic dance/movement workshops to persons with disabilities. In addition, the project will provide motor skills and creative movement for Fairfax County children and adolescents with brain injuries and other physical and neurological disabilities. A summer camp program is also proposed.

**Home Delivered Food & Nutritional Counseling
Food & Friends
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4**

To provide free home delivered meals, groceries and nutritional counseling to county residents suffering from life threatening illnesses.

**Homeless Intervention Services
FACETS
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4**

The proposal addresses the need for comprehensive case management and counseling for homeless persons and families. The project is a continuation and expansion of services to address the needs of the identified population. Services will include delivery of nightly hot meals; operation of a mobile resource center; client resource center; hypothermia response program; shelter waitlist outreach; street outreach; supportive housing; homeless prevention supports; case management; and special programs for families (staff coordinates educational/recreational activities including summer camps and field trips).

**Homes for the Homeless Transitional Housing Program (H4H)
Christian Relief Services, Inc.
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4**

The project proposes to provide case management services to homeless people. This includes employment assistance, education/vocational training, substance abuse treatment, housing counseling, credit counseling, child care, life skills, medical/dental care, dental health services and transportation services.

**Homes for the Working Poor, Elderly and Disabled
Good Shepherd Housing and Family Services, Inc.
Region 1**

This proposal addresses the need for housing for homeless families and individuals to help them achieve stability and self-sufficiency. The project will offer two options: housing for individuals and families who cannot obtain a home due to credit or income limits and those who are able to obtain housing in their own name but are at risk of returning to homelessness. Services will include access to housing, financial counseling, and support.

Homestretch English as a Second Language**Homestretch, Inc.****Regions 1, 2, 3, 4**

This project will provide ESL instruction for individuals enrolled in the transitional housing program in order to improve their employability, and self-sufficiency. The population served is homeless adults with limited English which is an obstacle to self-sufficiency.

Homestretch Permanent Affordable Housing Acquisition**Homestretch, Inc.****Regions 1, 2, 3, 4**

This project involves providing permanent affordable housing to low-income families with housing vouchers. The need addressed is the shortage of affordable housing. The population served is low-income families with children under age 18 in Fairfax County. CCFP funds will be used to purchase two four-bedroom units, housing approximately 14 people.

Homestretch Transitional Housing**Homestretch, Inc.****Regions 1, 2, 3, 4**

This project involves providing comprehensive transitional housing services for homeless families with the goal of helping them attain self-sufficiency, family stability, and permanent housing. The need addressed is for affordable housing and services for homeless families in order to help them break the cycles of homelessness, poverty, and dependence. The population served is homeless families with children under 18 in Fairfax County and the city of Falls Church.

Housing Counseling, Case Management, and Supportive Services**Housing and Community Services of Northern Virginia****Regions 1, 2, 4**

The program will provide housing counseling and case management service to low income individuals and families. It will expand this service to the Annandale/Bailey's Crossroads area. It will also provide educational workshops and homelessness prevention activities.

Housing Counseling and Training Courses**Center for Housing Counseling and Training, Inc.****Regions 1, 2, 3, 4**

The proposal addresses the need for homeless prevention and intervention services by training human service professionals working with low/moderate income residents who are homeless, at risk of becoming homeless, seeking affordable rental or homeownership opportunities. Services will include a 12-week training and certification course for professionals in housing and human service fields and housing counseling training (resources and information) courses which will improve their counseling skills and provide adequate tools to address issues of homeless intervention and prevention, and fair housing. Participants will learn effective ways to assist clients in eviction/foreclosure prevention, tenant responsibility, credit repair, budgeting, emergency housing and basic homeownership.

Housing Development Administration**Reston Interfaith, Inc.****Region 3**

This project involves the preservation, management and asset management of affordable rental units, serving approximately 250 individuals who are extremely low, very low, and low to low-moderate income. The area served includes 84 units in Reston/Herndon. The need is for preserving affordable housing.

Immigration and Citizenship Program**Progreso Hispano****Region 1**

Funds will provide immigration and citizenship case management to immigrants in the Route One corridor.

Island Walk After-School Program**Community Preservation and Development Corporation****Region 3**

This project addresses the need for an after school program for youth at Island Walk, located in Reston. The project proposes to provide reading, fluency and literacy support (for 1st grade students at risk for reading failure), intensive reading support (for youth falling significantly below grade level and 1st graders lacking basic reading readiness skills), homework support and technology education (includes basic skills improvement and opportunities for using technology to achieve results). The project has been successfully implemented at the Buckman Road site in Alexandria.

Just Neighbors Legal Services Project**Just Neighbors Ministry, Inc.****Regions 1, 2, 3, 4**

The program will continue to provide immigration-related legal services such as work permit renewals; family unification petitions; and assistance to abused immigrant women under the Violence Against Women Act.

Leadership, Education, Achievement, & Diversity (LEAD)**Center for Multicultural Human Services****Regions 2, 4**

Program targets low-income minority students at three high schools, two middle schools, and two elementary schools in the Falls Church, Baileys/Culmore areas. This project will provide school-based mental health services to children at-risk of dropping out of school, expulsion from school and low academic achievement. The project will serve ethnically diverse children with mental health needs due to trauma caused by war or persecution and their needs cannot be met by the current school social worker or mental health staff.

Legal Aid – Access to Justice – Route 1**Legal Services of Northern Virginia****Regions 1, 2, 3, 4**

The proposal addresses the need for legal services in South County. This new project proposes to provide free civil legal services to low-income families and individuals, including seniors and persons with disabilities who are residents of the Route One area. The focus of the project is to serve individuals who need legal assistance with

family and housing issues. The program will serve 500 individuals in both fiscal years.

Legal Aid – Families and Consumers

Legal Services of Northern Virginia

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The proposal will provide legal service (assistance and representation) to low income families and individuals in the areas of family law, law for children, consumer law, elder law, and public benefits law. These services enable low income people to meet their basic needs and become stable and independent and therefore self-sufficient. The target population includes people with disabilities, the elderly, battered women and people needing multicultural and multilingual assistance.

Legal Aid – Housing and Employment

Legal Services of Northern Virginia

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The program will provide legal services to low income individuals and families, including seniors and people with disabilities, in the areas of housing and employment. The legal service will help clients find and maintain safe and affordable housing and attain or retain jobs.

Legal Aid - Immigrant Law

Legal Services of Northern Virginia

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The program will provide legal information, outreach, legal advice and representation to immigrants in the areas of civil rights, housing, family and employment.

Virginia Justice Center for Farm and Immigrant Workers

Legal Aid Justice Center

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The program will provide legal service and education to low wage immigrants concerning employment rights. The services are designed to help workers achieve self-sufficiency by ensuring they are properly compensated. Spanish language worker rights material will be produced and distributed.

LIFT One and LIFT Two Projects

Residential Youth Services, Inc.

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The proposal addresses the need for affordable or transitional housing programs for homeless, at risk and aging-out foster care youth. The goal of the program is to help youth transition to independent living and become self-sufficient by providing services in six key areas: stable housing, vocational and educational services, life skills preparation, therapeutic services, and support and street outreach services. The project proposes to serve 480 youth with information and referral services.

Meeting the Comprehensive Needs of Fairfax County's Abused and Neglected Children

Fairfax Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA)

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

This project will serve Fairfax County's children who have been abused or neglected. The program will continue to recruit, train and supervise citizens from the community to serve as Court Appointed Special Advocates.

Mental Health Homeless Prevention Program

PRS, Inc.

Region 4

This project will provide specialized services to individuals with serious mental health illness living in Fairfax County who are at risk of homelessness. The project will incorporate three components: the home-based residential support services, psychiatric and vocational rehabilitation programming and tenant education workshops.

Micro-enterprise Development Program

ECDC Enterprise Development Group

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

This project will provide loans ranging from \$500-\$35,000 to low to moderate income residents of Fairfax County who would like to start or expand an existing business. Activities are specifically designed to address underserved populations such as women, minorities, low to moderate income persons and newcomers to the country. Individual business counseling and training will be offered to residents to help them develop a business plan. Technical assistance is also offered to clients after the loans are granted to help clients strengthen their business skills.

Mt. Vernon Village II - Scattered Site Homes

Good Shepherd Housing and Family Services, Inc.

Region 1

This project provides affordable housing and supportive services to improve self-sufficiency to families on fixed incomes. The need addressed is preservation of affordable housing units in Region I. The population served is low-income working, disabled or elderly families earning 50% or less of the median area income.

Multicultural Housing Program

Center for Multicultural Human Services

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The program will assist individuals and families to find and maintain affordable housing. Services include providing information on housing; counseling; and providing emergency deposits, rental or mortgage assistance. This proposal differs from the program funded by the CCFP in 2005/2006 under the name in that it does not include a transitional housing program. Transitional housing will be funded by alternative funding sources.

Multilingual Information Referral and Outreach Program

Center for Multicultural Human Services

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The program will provide culturally sensitive needs assessments, referrals to service, education and crisis intervention to low income individuals and families who present with complex social and mental health problems and have little or no

English speaking proficiency. This is primarily provided through a referral line staffed with multi-lingual counselors. The program will also provide consultation, outreach and training to service providers on how to work with cultural and language minority clients.

Multicultural Mental Health Services
Center for Multicultural Human Services
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

This proposed program would provide free or reduced-fee mental health and case management services to low income people with little or no English (and/or experiencing cultural isolation). The target population includes clients who are foreign-born and in need of services related to trauma sustained in the country of origin.

Employment Services for Newcomers
ECDC African Community Center
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The proposed project will use a comprehensive approach to services that focus on removing barriers to employment and meeting individual needs. The goal of the program is to help African newcomers secure and maintain suitable employment that will help them achieve self-sufficiency. Services will include individual assessments, employment work shops, resume writing assistance, assistance with completing a job application, mock interviews, job referrals and follow-up.

Northern Virginia Dental Clinic
Northern Virginia Dental Clinic, Inc.
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

This project will address the CCFP priority 1 by providing oral health care services to low income and uninsured Fairfax County residents ages 18 or older. The project's goal is to eliminate all pain and infection, restore oral health and educate clients on proper home care techniques to help maintain their improved state of oral health.

NOVACO Transitional Housing for Victims of Domestic Abuse
NOVACO, Inc.
Regions 3, 4

This project will address the CCFP priority areas 1 and 4 by providing a transitional training program, safe affordable housing, childcare assistance and supportive counseling services in the areas of family counseling, housing counseling and parent training. This project will serve 7 households. The program's goal is to help participants meet their family's basic needs, increase job skills and obtain permanent housing.

Older Job Seeker Assistance
Senior Employment Resources
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The proposal addresses the need for employment services for people over age 50 who wants to be productive in the community. The project's focus is to encourage older job seekers to prepare themselves for exploring the current job market, job searches and employment and to urge more employers to hire older workers. Services will include computer training, job search counseling, resume development, job placement assistance and job data bank.

Pals Mentoring Program
Northern Virginia AIDS Ministry (NOVAM)
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

This project will provide adult mentors to 10 Fairfax County children ages birth to 18 affected by HIV/AIDS. This project will recruit, screen, train and match adult mentors to children, monitor and support relationships and match children in the Pals program with children enrolled in other NOVAM programs. Six hundred hours of mentoring will be provided to children each year and 600 hours of respite care will be provided for their parents.

Pathways to Self-Sufficiency
Pathway Homes, Inc.
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

This project will provide non-time limited housing, case management and supportive services to persons with serious mental illness and/or dual diagnosed who are at risk of chronic homelessness. This program seeks to incorporate a new project by serving 40 to 50 clients who require intensive supportive services to maintain stability in the community. The goal of this project is to integrate these individuals into the community, normalize their lives as much as possible by providing an environment which protects personal privacy.

Prevention, Intervention and Treatment of Child Abuse
Childhelp USA Children's Center of Virginia
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

This project will raise the community's awareness of the child abuse problem and identifying available resources; educate children on ways to keep from becoming victims, thus educating older children, adults and professionals on the signs of child abuse and how to report suspicions; facilitate the investigation of reports of child abuse, while minimizing further trauma to the child; and facilitate the delivery of mental health therapy for the victim and family.

Pro Bono Program
Fairfax Law Foundation
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The program will provide free civil pro bono legal services to low income families and individuals in order to enable them to become more stable and independent. The program will recruit and train attorneys to provide legal services on domestic relations; housing; employment and consumer issues. Attorneys work at homeless shelters, family resource centers, non profit organizations and transitional housing sites throughout the county.

Program for Juvenile Court Supervised and Other At Risk Youth
Community Mediation Services, Inc.
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

This project will address the needs of youth under the supervision of the Fairfax County Juvenile Court system and youth who attend the alternative learning program at the Transition Support Resource Center. These youth will participate in an anger class, which will help them to label their behaviors and understand how and why they behave in certain ways when they are angry. The sessions are designed to reduce avoidable conflict and repeated acts of violence; prepare youth with the choice to respond appropriately in dispute situations with adults; prevent future disputes from escalating into incidents requiring police and court

intervention; teach problem solving skills, develop personal pride, self esteem and multicultural sensitivity and provide job seeking skills and present employment opportunities.

Promising Futures

Wesley Housing Development Corporation

Region 2

This project involves providing computer skills training to low-income individuals and families located in Strawbridge Square in Lincolnia and Wexford Manor in Idylwood.

Promoting Self-Sufficiency and Acculturation Among Hispanic Families

Hispanic Committee of Virginia

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The project will provide affordable immigration services, employment services, social services, information and referral and youth educational programs to low income Hispanic immigrant families in Fairfax County.

Providing Recruitment and Supportive Services for Youth ("Special Needs")

Adoptions

African American Adoptions, Inc.

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The project will identify and publicize special needs children eligible for adoption. In addition, the project will provide processing services, individual and family counseling sessions to prospective children and their adoptive parents, financial assistance and sponsor/offer financial support for life skills development activities. The proposal addresses the need to increase positive interaction among community based organizations and individuals that provide direct services to African American disadvantaged children.

Rainbow for Healthier Communities Restorative Dental Clinic Project

Northern Virginia Community college Educational Foundation

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The project proposes to meet the needs of 450 low income Fairfax County residents by adding restorative dental care services which will require the addition of dental assistant hours, expanding the program's hours of operation which requires the addition of dentists hours, and adding support staff to ensure the quality of care, efficiency of operations and improve the communication between patients and clinicians. The project will continue to provide existing services such as oral screenings, full-mouth radio-graph, diagnosis and treatment plans, simple surgery, simple fillings and patient education and expand its services to include restorative dental care services so that patients can function free of infection or imminent physical health caused by untreated dental disease

Residential Assistance Program

Western Fairfax Christian Ministries

Region 4

This project involves providing financial assistance and counseling services for a period of nine months to families who are not receiving public support for housing. The need is family instability and the risk of homelessness. The population that will be served is families in Centreville, Clifton, Chantilly, Fair Oaks and Fairfax

Station, who are experiencing financial, personal or social challenges to long term stability.

Screen, Treat, Educate Program (STEP)

Herndon Free Clinic, Inc.

Regions 3, 4

This proposal addresses the need for healthcare services to uninsured, low income individuals in the Reston-Herndon area. The clinic is in need of a permanent facility to provide needed services to the identified population. Services will include dental, vision, asthma, diabetes, hypertension and cholesterol screenings; treatment for adults and children with chronic illnesses; education on preventive care measures and community resources; and referrals to a permanent medical home.

Self Sufficiency

Lorton Community Action Center

Region 1

The program will assist Lorton area families to become self-sufficient. Services include ESL; nutrition assistance; assistance with tax return preparation; pro-bono legal services and case management services.

Self-Sufficiency through Self-Employment

Business Development Assistance Group

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

This project involves providing assistance and training for those who want to become self-sufficient through business ownership. The need addressed is self employment is a viable option to becoming self-sufficient. The population served is unemployed individuals and newly arrived immigrants.

Self-Sufficiency Training for Korean-Americans in Fairfax County

Korean-American Association of Northern Virginia

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The program will provide 21 vocational and related courses including three computer courses, seven English courses (including an advanced English/Citizenship class), two classes in heating and air conditioning, a plumbing class, electrical technician class, tailoring classes, and classes to prepare for a construction license, pharmacy technician certification and nursing aide certification. The proposal will target Korean immigrants who need language and job skills to become self-sufficient. The program will also provide computer training to seniors.

Services for Self-Sufficiency

LLV (Lincoln-Lewis-Vannoy Communities for Assistance and Improvements, Inc.)

Region 4

The project will provide weekly supplement food sources for families in need. A nutritious food program for persons with diet restrictions due to medical conditions will also be implemented. The project will also provide emergency assistance for rent and utilities and job counseling and transportation services will be available.

Strengthening Asian Families through Empowerment and Services

Korean Community Service Center

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The proposal changes the name of the project to Strengthening Asian Families through Empowerment Services and will provide information and referral services;

case management; counseling; public assistance workshops; financial literacy workshops; health fair; housing workshops; citizenship preparation; and leadership training. The program will serve low income Korean American families and individuals who have little to no English proficiency and American cultural proficiency.

Supportive Services Program
Wesley Housing Development Corporation
Regions 2, 3, 4

This project involves on-site services to elderly and/or disabled residents, including the meeting of basic needs, to ensure that seniors and persons with disabilities are healthy, stable, and independent. Services consist of resource and referrals, computer access and training, social and recreational activities, and educational/empowerment programs.

TEC 2000
ServiceSource
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

This project will facilitate an Information Technology Training designed to assist people with disabilities living in Fairfax County. The class format for the program will include Microsoft Office (MSO) and soft skills that including job interviewing skills, resume writing, customer service, interviewing techniques, networking, job keeping skills, and cover letter composition.

Training Futures
Northern Virginia Family Services
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The program will provide comprehensive skills training to low income adults, most of whom support children, who are either under-employed earning an average of \$8-\$9/hour with no benefits or are unemployed. The program includes training in seven skill areas; counseling; internships; job search service; career coaching; and financial management workshops. The program has added a new outcome goal in this proposal, i.e. two thirds of the newly employed graduates will increase their earnings by at least 30%.

Transitional Employment Model for Persons with Brain Injuries
Brain Injury Services, Inc.
Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

This project addresses the needs of individuals with brain injuries to assist them in regaining independence and self-sufficiency. The project will focus on the long-term employability of adults with brain injuries by providing a unique and supportive environment to gain work related skills and promote self-sufficiency. Services will include identifying marketable skills, improving underdeveloped skills, building job seeking skills, creating/updating resumes, building and enhancing interpersonal skills and job shadowing. The program will benefit 100 clients.

Transitional and Supportive Housing Program
Robert Pierre Johnson Housing Development Corporation
Regions 1, 2

This project will provide transitional and case management services of up to 8 families and housing of up to 9 singles and 4 families at a time. The need addressed if providing housing for individual and families who either have been homeless or

have disabilities and require supportive housing. The population served will be 9 singles and 12 families at a time.

Transportation Services for Persons Living with HIV/AIDS

Northern Virginia AIDS Ministry

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

This project will provide transportation services to 100 Fairfax County residents living with HIV/AIDS. This service will be used to assist clients to medical and other social service appointments. The project will also provide bus tokens or Metro fare cards to clients and refer them for other social services such as FASTER.

Unidos Educational Parent Support Group

SCAN (Stop Child Abuse Now) of Northern Virginia

Region 1

This project will facilitate a parent educational support group which will include information, education and assistance for Hispanic parents (in the southern part of the County) to develop support systems with each other; expose parents to a variety of information and services including, public transportation, workshops on anger management and stress. A concurrent children's program will also be provided to help children enhance their social skills, increase their self-esteem and pro-social behaviors.

Victims of Violence, Exploitation and Trafficking Assistance Program

Boat People SOS

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

This project will provide case management services and legal assistance for Vietnamese victims of domestic violence and sexual assault in Fairfax County.

Virginia Ely Senior Rental Assistance Program

Catholics for Housing, Inc.

Region 3

This program will provide monthly rental assistance to low income seniors living in Fairfax County senior facilities. The program will provide subsidies to 27 seniors for FY 2007 and 30 seniors in FY 2008.

Volunteer Home Repair Programs

Robert Pierre Johnson Housing Development Corporation

Regions 1, 2, 3, 4

The RPJ Volunteer Home Repair Programs – Rebuilding Together (formerly Christmas & Sukkot in April) and Hearts and Hammers - rehabilitate homes, at no cost to the occupants, of extremely low income homeowners, particularly the elderly, disabled and families with children, as well as nonprofit facilities.

Workforce Development Program

United Community Ministries, Inc.

Region 1

The Workforce Development Center will provide services to unskilled and low-skilled low income people so that they can obtain and retain jobs that pay adequate wages to sustain their households without the use of public funds. The target population includes laid off workers, domestic abuse survivors, ex-offenders, and skilled immigrants with limited English. Services will include basic computer skills

training; workplace readiness skills training, micro-enterprise development and job placement.

Youth Empowerment & Leadership Program

United Community Ministries

Region 1

This program was formerly called Youth in Action. It will provide a number of services to youth and parents designed to promote healthier families and youth. Services will include a community-based drop in club house; athletic programs; summer camps; mentoring; and life skills training. It also will provide scholarships for athletic organizations and Park Authority programs and parent involvement activities including coaching and parent training. It will also provide school supplies to youth. The target population will be low income and moderate income families in the Hybla Valley area of Region 1.

Youth Programs

Lorton Community Action Center

Region 1

The program will provide recreational and educational opportunities for Lorton youth, including after school programs, homework help, one-on-one tutoring and summer camp. The target population is low income youth of the Lorton area. Funds will be used to staff and support the programs.
