Letter from Supervisor Joan DuBois

Dear Dranesville Resident,

My recent vote to reaffirm county financing for the Dulles Rail project was the most difficult vote that I have cast as Supervisor. No one fought harder for reconsideration of a tunnel option through Tysons Corner. However, the need for further environmental reviews and the threat of being removed from the federal “new starts” program posed grave risks. Ultimately, I was most influenced by a June 12 letter from Virginia’s Transportation Secretary, Pierce Homer, which warned that if the Board did not authorize funding “...the project would stop, with little or no prospect for revival in the foreseeable future.” The full text of this letter is posted on my [Web site](#).

This is the most important Transit Project in the history of Fairfax County. Dulles is the only major airport in the country without a rail connection. This vibrant economic corridor *needs* rail to remove 91,000 trips per day from its congested roads. The county’s share of Phase I will be paid for by landowners in Tysons Corner who have agreed to tax themselves to pay for it. My vote was fully contingent on receiving a positive Risk Assessment from the Federal Transit Administration in August.

Like all of you, I remain intensely concerned about the construction impacts that rail will have on residents of McLean and Vienna, and the possibility of toll increases affecting Herndon residents. I commit to you that I will continue to work tirelessly to identify adequate funding to mitigate congestion as I will live through construction each day with you. I deeply believe that rail will ultimately benefit Dranesville. If we walk away from this project, there will still be population growth. While some of you believe in “tunnel or nothing,” I did not believe that ‘nothing’ was an option I could support in good conscience.


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National Night Out

Tips to prevent Car Break-ins

During the summer, Police continue to respond to frequent reports of car break-ins across the county. In almost all cases items stolen were in plain view from outside the vehicle. The number one item stolen is GPS systems. Other popular targets include satellite radio systems, cell phones, briefcases, purses, laptops, and money. To decrease the possibility of your car being burglarized, remember to remove valuable items or place them out of plain view in the trunk. Also remember to always close garage doors whenever you leave home.

Fairfax County Police Special Hotline Unveiled

The Fairfax County Police Department has created a special telephone hotline to handle an increasing number of citizen complaints about the illegal placement of large commercial dumpsters and self-contained storage units on neighborhood streets. Through the hotline, citizens can alert police to potential problems with the location of dumpster or storage unit. Containers left on streets can become a dangerous hazard for drivers at night. This hotline should not be used to report issues involving self-contained storage units on private property, such as a neighbor's driveway.

An investigator from the police department will respond to assess the situation and determine if the container creates any hazards. If so, it will be removed immediately, the container will be purged of its contents, and then stored by the Fairfax County Police Department. If the container is not deemed a hazard, but is in violation of Fairfax County Code, the owner of the container, not the homeowner, will be notified to remove it within four working days. Should the container not be removed during that time period, the Police Department will have it removed. In both scenarios, the cost incurred for removal and storage will be absorbed by the owner of the container, not the homeowner. A summons will be issued or a warrant obtained for the owner of the container, at the time of the removal.

Falls Church Water Quality

Supervisor DuBois has received calls from constituents who read the July 19 *Washington Post* article regarding the spike in chlorine found in drinking water at a number of residences in Northwest Washington, DC. The conversion to disinfection with chloramines began in 2000, and has significantly improved water quality by reducing disinfection byproduct formation, also called “chlorine toxins.” Previously, water was treated with free chlorine all year. However, during one month of each year, the Corps of Engineers returns to the use of free chlorine to scrub the distribution pipes.

Since the Falls Church Water Authority is a wholesale customer of DCWASA, the Dranesville Office contacted the City of Falls Church to ensure residents of McLean and Falls Church, who are customers of the Authority, were drinking safe water. 

County Mails Influenza Preparedness Guides

Approximately 420,000 Fairfax County households will receive by mail a reference guide, “Caring for Yourself and Others: Seasonal and Pandemic Influenza”, to help individuals and families prepare for influenza. The 17-page guide features six color-coded sections: Influenza – the Flu; Protecting Yourself and Others Against Influenza; Managing Influenza (information on self-care at home and guidance on when to seek medical care); Planning for Pandemic Flu; Hand Washing Guide; Emergency Information. Health Department officials advise that citizens should expect and plan for an extended stay at home if they or a family member becomes ill.

The guide is one component of a major pandemic flu preparedness effort being undertaken by Fairfax County. The county’s other recent outreach initiatives include training sessions, conferences and summits for physicians, businesses, child-care providers, faith-based organizations and other segments of the community. Fairfax County elected officials and county government staff recently joined nearly 200 business leaders at a Business Preparedness Summit. Highlights of the summit will be featured in September’s “County Magazine,” a program on Fairfax County Government’s Channel 16. Fairfax County began planning for pandemic flu in 2005, and has posted its Pandemic Flu Response Plan online.

State-of-the-Art Buses Join Fairfax Connector Fleet

In June, Fairfax Connector unveiled its new state-of-the-art bus to the Board of Supervisors. During the next year, 84 new buses will gradually join the Fairfax Connector fleet with older buses being retired. Along with a modern design and color scheme, features include larger windows, a fire suppression system, bike racks, SmarTrip fare boxes, improved accessibility for older adults and passengers with disabilities, and environmentally friendly components to reduce emissions. The new buses conform to Environmental Protection Agency 2007 clean air mandates. These "Green Diesel" buses run on ultra-low sulfur diesel and include a particulate trap, which can reduce emissions up to 90 percent.

Hot Lanes Web site Revealed

Many citizens have inquired about the status of the Beltway HOT Lanes project and how it may affect the Dranesville District. Like Dulles Rail, this project is nearing final design and construction. Updated information can be found at www.virginiahotlanes.com.

This Web site provides links to project specifics, including the final Environmental Impact Statement (EIS), the Federal Highway Record of Decision, the Commonwealth Transportation Board Preferred Alternative finding, and the actual Comprehensive Agreement between the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) and Fluor-Transurban. The project will expand the Beltway from 8 to 12 lanes between Springfield and the interchange for the Dulles Toll Road. It will also provide two new HOT (toll) lanes on both the Inner and Outer Loop. The draft 2002 EIS included three HOV alternatives and 15 possible concepts to improve congestion on the Beltway. VDOT held 3 public hearings, in which the county and members of the public raised concerns over costs and potential environmental impacts. In response, VDOT scaled back the project, maximizing the existing roadway, reducing right-of-way demands from 170 acres to 10 acres, and limiting the interchange improvements.

In April, 2005 VDOT entered into a Comprehensive Agreement with Fluor-Transurban to develop, design, finance, build, and operate the Beltway HOT lanes. VDOT will continue to retain ownership and oversight of the road. During the last year, Fluor engineers have worked with VDOT to complete the planning and reviews necessary to begin construction in Spring 2008. This planning includes two crucial exits that are not yet finalized in Tysons Corner near the mall and Jones Branch Drive. We will continue to closely follow those negotiations because of their potential impact on Dranesville and also monitor noise impacts of the HOT Lanes on adjacent communities and will update you in upcoming newsletters.

Summer Fire Safety Tips

The Fairfax County Fire and Rescue Department wants your help in drastically reducing preventable fires. Here are some tips to help residents save lives and reduce property damage by preventing fires in the home, especially related to smoking, candles, and outdoor grills.

Improper disposal of smoking materials, candles (indoor or outdoor), and barbeque grill fires are major causes of fires during the summer months. Fairfax County firefighters have responded to approximately 30 major fires over the past year involving smoking materials, grills, and candles. Two fatalities, several injuries, including nine firefighter injuries, and property damage amounting to over \$11 million have resulted from those fires. The U.S. Fire Administration estimates outdoor grills cause more than 6,000 fires, average five fatalities, over 170 injuries, and approximately \$35 million in property loss annually. Increasing awareness and education is critical to changing personal behavior when it comes to fire prevention and accidental fires.

If you smoke, only smoke outside and before disposing of butts and ashes, make sure they are out by dousing them in water or sand. Always keep matches and lighters out of children's sight and reach. When using candles, always extinguish them before leaving the rooms or going to sleep. Use candles holder that are sturdy, won't tip over easily, are made from a material that cannot burn, and are large enough to collect dripping wax. Keep candles and all open flames away from flammable liquids and also ensure all flammable liquids are properly cared for and stored. During power outages, avoid the use of candles—instead use flashlights.

When using outdoor grills on decks or patios, leave sufficient spaces from siding and eaves. Always supervise a grill in use and keep children and pets at a safe distance. With charcoal grills, only use charcoal starter fluid designed for grills. Do not add fluid after the coals have been lit. When using gas grills, be sure that the hose connection is tight and check hoses carefully for leaks.

In all areas, especially in rural areas like Great Falls, it is imperative that a monitored alarm system be present that will automatically call an alarm company in case of fire or burglary. Make sure your address is clearly marked and visible from the road, even at night, so emergency responders can easily locate your home.

Board of Supervisors Adopts Tree Canopy Goal

The Board of Supervisors recently adopted a goal to cover 45 percent of the county with tree cover by 2037. This tree canopy goal is one of the most ambitious for any local government in the Metropolitan area. The Board took action because trees help to combat global warming, as well as air and water pollution. The goal supports the county's new Cool Counties initiative to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, and it also pushes forward the county's Tree Action Plan. The Cool Counties initiative identifies specific steps the county can take to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. The new initiative was created in partnership with the Sierra Club. The county's Tree Action Plan aims to conserve and maintain trees by setting forward 12 strategies for preserving and planting trees. These include encouraging homeowners to plant trees and strengthening the county's tree conservation policies. Since 2003, the Board has implemented more than \$6 million worth of projects and programs to address air quality and global climate change.

Besides protecting the environment, the new tree canopy is expected to save taxpayers money. Once matured, the trees should provide \$5.3 million of air pollution removal and \$4.7 million of energy conservation every year. The canopy also will have the capacity to absorb more than 10 million pounds of carbon dioxide annually, which could eliminate the need for \$1 million in greenhouse gas reduction services each year.

To reach the goal, the County and citizens will need to plant an additional 2.6 million trees, or 20,400 acres of new canopy, and maintain existing trees. New trees will be needed because the county expects to lose 4 percent of its canopy during the next 30 years. This projected canopy loss is equivalent to seven parks the size of Huntley Meadows, one of the County's largest.

County Reduces Fuel Consumption Over Last Fiscal Year

Fairfax County employees used 56,726 fewer gallons of fuel from June 2006 through May 2007 than they did during the previous 12-month period. The decrease, which has saved the county an estimated \$115,000 is the result of fuel conservation efforts, the reduction in the number of vehicles in the county fleet, operational changes within agencies and tighter controls over the use of miscellaneous codes used to dispense fuel at 47 locations throughout the county.

Changes now in effect have eliminated miscellaneous codes at agencies that did not use them often; limited miscellaneous code use in certain agencies to specific groups and individuals; and added miscellaneous code use in certain agencies to more easily identify users and provide better control. Where possible, access to fuel has been limited to certain locations and fuel types. In addition, unique driver personal identification numbers were established, and monthly reports are generated for each agency with details (date, time, quantity and location) for all miscellaneous fuel used. Fairfax County agencies typically use a total of about 3.9 million gallons of fuel per year. Prior to this reduction, the amount of fuel issued to county agency vehicles had been increasing, by 197,358 gallons and 84,049 gallons respectively, over the two previous fiscal years.

Dranesville Land Use Updates

Two Special Exception Amendment (SEA) projects that will be generating public hearings in coming weeks include the Potomac School and the Verizon Switching Station on Chain Bridge Road, across from Evans Farm.

SEA 85-D-097-5 would permit Potomac School to modify its current site to increase the total land area from 82 to almost 90 acres, redevelop and enlarge the lower/middle school by 46,000 square feet to provide more classroom space. In addition, the school will construct a field house/aquatic center in a different configuration than previously allowed and build three interpretative outdoor classrooms of approximately 2,500 square feet each. A proposal to build 25 units of faculty housing on the site has been deferred. Copies of the staff report are available in my office. An abbreviated version can also be accessed [online](#). The Planning Commission will hold a public hearing on this proposal on July 25 at 8:00 p.m. followed by a Board of Supervisors hearing on August 6.

Verizon Virginia, Inc., has requested approval of an amendment to SEA 97-D-020-02 to place two chilled water cooling units on the roof of its central switching station on Chain Bridge Road. The switching station has been at this location since 1956 with additions in 1968, 1973, and 1997. The cooling units would be surrounded by an open air mansard style screen which will add 13 feet to the height of the rear of the building but will not impact the view from Chain Bridge Road. A copy of the proposal is available at Dranesville District office, and the case will be heard in October after staff and community analysis.

River Oaks Sanitary Sewer Project

Arbor Lane will be closed to thru traffic for two and one half months to allow for the installation of a sanitary sewer main. Due to the location of the proposed sewer main, the location of existing utility lines and depth of the sanitary sewer main necessary to maintain gravity flow, this work cannot be constructed under traffic. A detour will be posted and the proper authorities (Fairfax County Police, Fire and Rescue, Fairfax County Public Schools, and VDOT) are aware of the road closure and detour. It is expected that the road closure will start on or about July 30, 2007. The detour map is available [online](#). Message board signs have been placed on site to notify motorists of the road closure dates.

In an effort to keep the community advised of the progress of this project as well as outline the work planned for the months ahead, the contractor, Anchor Construction Corporation, will be issuing a monthly Newsletter.
