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Preparing Our Faith Communities ...

Do you have a Home Emergency Supply Kit prepared for your home? Do other members of your faith community? Are you prepared for the next hurricane, bad storm, or risk of evacuation?

Living in the shadow of the nation's capital has many benefits as well as challenges. With a history of powerful storms, the risk of evacuation due to hazardous material spills on our highways, and the ongoing threat of terrorism, there is an anxiety among the public including people who attend our houses of worship. As leaders within our respective faith communities, all of us have a special opportunity to share hope and peace in these times of uncertainty. One of the ways we can help comfort those attending our houses of worship is to ensure they are prepared for the unexpected.

September has been established as "Preparedness Month." Starting now and through September 2005, our plan is to build on the broad-based public initiative with a more focused campaign to those attending houses of worship. The goal of this more focused effort known as the "Home Emergency Supply Kit – Ready, Pack, Go" campaign is to have everyone in the faith community assemble a home emergency supply kit by Sept. 30. Our belief is if we, in faith communities, are prepared then we will be in a better position to care for our neighbors and community.

We have prepared a "Home Emergency Supply Kit – Ready, Pack, Go Campaign Resource Packet" to assist faith communities to organize an educational initiative to facilitate the preparation of home emergency supply kits. "Home Emergency Supply Kit – Ready, Pack, Go" training sessions will be provided throughout the county during the summer. We are looking for contacts in Fairfax County houses of worship to attend one of the 10 training sessions to be held throughout the County from June 28, 2005, through August 25, 2005. 

The grant opportunities this week for community and faith-based organizations are through programs administered by the United States Departments of Agriculture, Health and Human Services, and the United States Agency for International Development.

It should be noted that many of the grant announcements this week are for programs requiring technical expertise in health research or expertise in particular foreign countries.

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

Foreign Agricultural Service

Qualified faith-based and community-based organizations may apply for two funding opportunities for international food assistance programs.

The *McGovern-Dole International Food for Education and Child Nutrition Program* allows for donated U.S. agricultural products to be used for school feeding, maternal and child nutrition projects, and health and education programs in developing countries. Local sale of the commodities by the grantee is permitted provided that the proceeds go towards supporting school feeding and maternal and child nutrition projects. Grant funds will support administration, transportation, distribution and other activities related to the commodity transaction.

The second funding opportunity is the *Food for Progress Program*. Under this program, grantees distribute donated U.S. agricultural products in countries with emerging democracies. The goal of the program is to support democracy and expand private enterprise. The award is to assist the grantee in the administration, transportation, storage and distribution of the commodity. Proceeds from the sale of the commodity will be used to foster private sector development of the agricultural infrastructure.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

Administration on Aging

Faith-based and other organizations with national scope and experience in providing support and technical assistance to entities involved in the legal rights of older individuals may apply for the *National Legal Assistance and Elder Rights Projects* grant. The successful applicants will provide case consultations to Title III legal assistance providers, training, legal advice and assistance, and/or assistance in the design, implementation, and administration of legal assistance delivery and elder rights advocacy systems to local providers.

The Administration on Aging anticipates awarding five grants. Individual award amounts will be \$150,000 annually for three-year projects. Applications are due July 8, 2005. Complete details are in the program announcement at:

Administration for Children and Families -- Family and Youth Services Bureau

The *Community-Based Abstinence Education* grant program has been reassigned from the Health Resources and Services Administration to ACF's Family and Youth Services Bureau in an effort to coordinate similar youth programs across the Federal government. Faith-based and other organizations may apply for a grant to develop and implement abstinence education programs for adolescents, ages 12 through 18. Projects must be abstinence-only programs that target the prevention of teenage pregnancy and premarital sexual activity, and be culturally sensitive and age-appropriate.

A total of \$36,823,000 will be awarded for 60 to 70 grants. Applications are due June 20, 2005. The program announcement is in the Federal Register at:

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention

The *Implementing Community-Level Strategies for Fetal Alcohol Syndrome Prevention and Surveillance in South Africa* grant will support projects that conduct prevention programs in urban and rural communities in South Africa with high proportions of childbearing-aged women who are at risk for Fetal Alcohol Syndrome. The successful applicant will develop and test a model prevention program to reduce hazardous alcohol use and/or promote pregnancy delay until alcohol abuse is resolved in those women at highest risk.

One cooperative agreement will be awarded with a total of \$300,000. Letters of intent are due June 16, 2005 and applications are due July 1, 2005. The program announcement is in the Federal Register at:

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and National Institutes of Health

Qualified faith-based and other organizations may apply for the Incidence, Natural History, and Quality of Life of Diabetes in Youth grant to expand the preliminary findings of a five year research project

entitled, SEARCH for Diabetes in Youth. The program will support a multi-center research study and a data coordinating center.

The research center supported will assess the incidence and trends of diabetes in youth; research the natural history of diabetes and its complications in children, conduct research on health care utilization, processes of care, and quality of life of youth with diabetes; and develop and validate classification schemes. The data coordinating center will provide the data management and analysis to support the multi-center research study.

A total of \$4.4 million will be awarded for six research center cooperative agreements and one coordinating center cooperative agreement. Letters of intent are due May 25, 2005 and applications are due June 24, 2005. The request for applications is at:

National Institutes of Health

Qualified faith-based and other organizations may apply for the *Economics of Prevention and Treatment Services for Drug and Alcohol Abuse* grant. NIH is interested in supporting research related to the economic burden in health care costs, productivity losses and criminal justice expenditures due to drug abuse and dependence. Research areas include financing, including health insurance and/or payment mechanisms; alternative delivery systems (including faith-based ones) and managed care; cost-benefit, cost-effectiveness, or cost-utility analyses; service costs and production; and methodological research.

The amount of individual awards is dependent on the scope and scale of the proposed project. The deadline for the next round of funding is October 1, 2005. The program announcement is at:

Applications are being accepted for the planning and design of Phase I, II, III, and IV clinical trials under the *National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases Clinical Trial Planning Grants*. The grants will support planning activities including developing a clinical protocol, obtaining approval of consent form(s) and protocol, developing a manual of operations, developing a plan to acquire and administer study agents, organizing safety oversight, developing a data and safety monitoring plan, and developing training materials.

Phase I trial applicants may request up to \$75,000 and Phase II, III, or IV trial applicants may request up to \$150,000.

Applicants who have successfully implemented their Planning Grant may apply for the *National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases Clinical Trial Implementation Cooperative Agreement*. These grants will support the implementation of the investigator-initiated clinical trials that were designed under a NIAID Clinical Trial Planning grant.

Qualified faith-based and other organizations may also apply for a *National Institute of Mental Health Career Transition Award*. The grants are to support research opportunities for the most promising and exceptionally talented new investigators, early in their career by training them within the NIMH Division of Intramural Research Programs.

The amount of individual awards is dependent on the scope and scale of the proposed project. The deadline for the next round of funding is October 1, 2005. The program announcement is at:

The *Quick-Trials for Imaging and Image-Guided Interventions: Exploratory Grants* will support Phase I or II clinical trials of novel imaging-agents; feasibility studies in image-guided intervention; and/or clinical feasibility studies or clinical trials to demonstrate potential efficacy of promising discoveries in imaging or image-guided therapy methodologies or technologies.

U.S AGENCY FOR INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Qualified faith-based and other organizations may apply for a cooperative agreement with USAID for *Direct Assistance to Victims of Trafficking and Sexual Exploitation* in Brazil. The successful applicant will provide direct assistance to victims of trafficking, sexual exploitation and sex tourism through a network of shelters and health and psycho-social service sites. In addition, the grantee will assist the Department of Justice and Department of Homeland Security in their law enforcement training and provide emergency treatment to victims rescued through these activities. The project will coordinate with the government of Brazil to enhance their programs and policies.

USAID is also seeking qualified applicants, including faith-based organizations, to work closely with Azerbaijani organizations to strengthen the capacity of civil society organizations (CSOs) in advocating their cause. The *Strengthening Azerbaijan Civil Society* cooperative agreement will support a project that provides capacity building assistance to CSOs, promotes and assists the development of the CSOs in rural areas, promotes and assists the development of the NGO movement among the private sector and academic institutions, and assists in collaborative efforts at all levels. Interested applicants should note that there is a small grants component to the cooperative agreement.
