### Emergency Kit Effort Aims To Enlist Religious Leaders ...

People who work to promote residents' spiritual health are being asked to also promote their safety -- by helping them prepare for the chaos that can come with winter storms, hurricanes, terrorist attacks and other disasters.

A handful of church leaders and county officials have launched a campaign called "Ready, Pack, Go," encouraging families to assemble an emergency kit that includes food, water, blankets, clothes and other basics. Campaign organizers are holding a series of 10 training sessions over the course of the summer, tailoring them specifically for religious leaders in the community. Those leaders then will be expected to hold training sessions in their places of worship in September.

"We're trying to help people understand that if we each have a home emergency kit, we will be a safer community," said the Rev. John R. Denninger, pastor of the Prince of Peace Lutheran Church in Springfield and an organizer of the effort.

The campaign was developed after Denninger and others realized few people had emergency kits, even though in recent years the region has experienced the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001, as well as hurricanes, severe thunderstorms and heavy snowstorms.

Religious institutions are deeply rooted in the community and seemed a perfect vessel for the safety message, said Sandy Chisholm, community interfaith liaison for the county, who noted that her office has relationships with Jewish, Hindu, Buddhist, Sikh and other religious groups represented in the county.

"Hopefully, they will begin to reach out to people within their congregations who might not have the economic means to prepare themselves," she said. "That will be the next step."

Each training session this summer will be led by a representative from the American Red Cross, who will explain why the kits are important and what they should include. Then someone from Chisholm's office will talk about addressing emergency preparedness within the religious setting.

If all goes well, Denninger said, the September training will become an annual event connected to remembrances of the Sept. 11 attacks.



### ***Digest of Federal Grants with Faith-Based and Community Organization Eligibility - 06/28/2005***

The grant opportunities this week for community and faith-based organizations are through programs administered by the United States Departments of Health and Human Services, Labor, and the United States Agency for International Development.

#### **DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH & HUMAN SERVICES**

##### **Administration for Children and Families**

Faith-based and other organizations that are officially designated as a Local Council by a local government entity are invited to apply for the Early Learning Opportunities Act (ELOA) Discretionary Grants program. The grants will support the development, operation or enhancement of early learning programs targeting young children (birth to the age of mandatory school attendance).

The successful applicant will provide services to enhance early childhood literacy, and two or more of the following activities: a) increasing the capacity of parents, caregivers, child care providers and educators to facilitate the child's development and promote learning readiness; b) promoting effective parenting; c) linking relevant groups and programs within a community; d) increasing access to early learning opportunities for children with special needs; expanding operating hours, number of children served or the affordability of existing early learning programs; e) providing professional development and training activities, increasing compensation, recruitment and/or retention incentives for providers; and, (f) removing ancillary barriers such as transportation difficulties or absence of programs during nontraditional work times.

A total of \$35,712,000 will be awarded for 30 to 55 grants. Letters of intent are due June 30, 2005, and applications are due July 15, 2005. The program announcement is at:

Faith-based and other organizations may apply for a grant under the Secondary Analysis of Data from the National Survey of Child Abuse and Neglect program if they meet the requirements of the National Survey of Child Abuse and Neglect data licensing agreement. The grant will support analysis that advances the state of knowledge in child maltreatment, child welfare services, child and family services, and/or child development for high risk children.

Priority areas are outlined in the program announcement and include characteristics, needs and services received by children that were re-reported for abuse or neglect within the study period, by children with one or more unsubstantiated reports of maltreatment, or by children who enter the child welfare system as infants; and differences in characteristics, needs and services received by children and families of different races, geographies, and ages of the children when they entered the child welfare system.

A total of \$800,000 will be awarded for five to ten grants. Letters of intent are due July 15, 2005 and applications are due August 5, 2005. Further details on the program can be found in the funding announcement at:

### **Centers for Disease Control and Prevention**

Grants under the BioSense Initiative to Improve Early Event Detection will support projects that improve early detection of disease outbreaks of public health importance through the increased utility of electronic bio-surveillance. The successful applicant will focus on one key question or problem related to monitoring health-related data for early detection of disease outbreaks.

A total of \$1.8 million will be awarded for three to five grants. Applications are due July 15, 2005. The request for applications is at:

Qualified faith-based and other organizations may apply for the Workplace HIV/AIDS Programs/Public Private Partnerships grants. Successful applicants will provide targeted assistance to governmental, nongovernmental, business and labor sectors in developing and implementing HIV/AIDS workplace prevention, care, and support programs. The grantee will select twenty of the organizations that the CDC has already assisted with needs assessment and strategic planning, and provide these organizations with planning and training services on the development and implementation of workplace HIV/AIDS programs.

The successful applicant will also award sub-grants to four organizations to support their workplace programs and provide technical support services to organizations beyond the selected twenty organizations.

The CDC will award one grant of \$600,000 for a three-year project. Applications are due July 25, 2005. The program announcement is in the Federal Register at:

### **Health Resources and Services Administration and Environmental Protection Agency**

The Border Environmental Health Coordination Program will support research to test the hypothesis that environmental education and training is an effective intervention tool for improving public health. The successful applicant will create a methodology to assess the short- and long-term clinical and public health impacts of environmental health training programs, and the program costs, for promotoras (lay community health workers residing along the U.S.-Mexico border). Activities include implementing an environmental health promotora training intervention, evaluating the intervention, and reporting the assessment results back to HRSA and EPA for dissemination.

A total of \$100,000 will be awarded for up to two grants. Letters of intent are due July 6, 2005, and applications are due July 29, 2005. The application and guidance documents are at:

## **National Institutes of Health**

Qualified faith-based and other organizations may apply for a research grant entitled Diet-Induced Changes in Inflammation as Determinants of Colon Cancer. The grant will support research projects that identify and characterize diet-induced changes in inflammation and colon cancer risk, define genetic polymorphisms that modify the response to specific bioactive food components with regard to colon cancer inhibition; and investigate the physiological effectiveness of dietary components to receptors in inflammatory colonocytes. Both preclinical and clinical approaches are eligible.

The deadline for the next cycle of funding is October 1, 2005. The amount of individual awards is dependent on the scope and scale of the proposed research project. The request for applications is at: <http://grants.nih.gov/grants/guide/pa-files/PA-05-125.html>.

Qualified faith-based and other organizations may apply for a grant entitled Underage Drinking: Building Health Care System Responses. NIH will support rural and small urban health care systems to assess the extent of underage drinking in the areas they serve and develop capacity for intervening to reduce underage drinking. This is the first phase of a two-part request for applications. The successful applicants of this phase can later apply for funds to implement and evaluate the interventions.

A total of \$2 million will be awarded for three to five grants. Individual award amounts will be between \$250,000 and \$400,000. Letters of intent are due November 19, 2005, and applications are due December 19, 2005. ## **Office of the Secretary**

The Office of Public Health and Science within the Office of the Secretary is accepting applications for Improving, Enhancing, and Evaluating Outcomes of Comprehensive Heart Health Care Programs for High-Risk Women. The successful applicant will focus on women's heart health care programs in hospitals, clinics, and/or health centers and assist the programs in tracking and evaluating outcome data.

Programs will be enhanced to provide a continuum of heart health care services through the integration of the following components: education and awareness, screening and risk assessment, diagnostic testing and treatment, lifestyle modification and rehabilitation, and tracking and evaluation. Interested applicants should note that they are expected to target high-risk women in at least one of the following groups: women aged 60 years or older, racial and ethnic minority women, and/or women who live in rural communities (particularly rural communities in the South and Appalachian region).

## **DEPARTMENT OF LABOR**

### **Bureau of International Labor Affairs**

Applicants interested in the grant opportunities Combating Exploitive Child Labor through Education in Angola and Combating Exploitive Child Labor through Education in Sierra Leone and Liberia that were

announced in the June 1, 2005, Roundtable e-newsletter should be aware of changes to the program announcements.

The deadline and total award amount have changed for the Combating Exploitive Child Labor through Education in Angola program. The new deadline is July 15, 2005, and the new total amount available for the program is \$4 million.

The total award amount for the Combating Exploitive Child Labor through Education in Sierra Leone and Liberia program has changed to \$6 million. Applications are being accepted for the cooperative agreement entitled Combating Exploitive Child Labor through Education in Ecuador. The successful applicants will facilitate and implement strategies that result in educational opportunities to children engaged in or at risk of entering exploitive child labor. Qualified faith-based and other organizations interested in applying must already have a presence in, or can partner with an established and eligible organization within, Ecuador.

Project activities include providing educational and training opportunities and direct education services. Examples of activities include non-formal or basic literacy education; vocational, pre-vocational, or skills training; formal school enrollment; and assistance in mainstreaming/transitioning into the formal education system, non-formal education, vocational, pre-vocational, or skills training after the children have received assistance from the project that enables them to enroll in such programs.

### **Occupational Safety and Health Administration**

Faith-based and community-based organizations may apply for the Susan Harwood Training Grant Program to provide training and education or develop training materials for employers and workers regarding safety issues and health hazards in the workplace. There are two categories of funding -- Targeted Topic and Training Materials Development.

The Targeted Topic category will support projects that conduct training for employers and employees on the topics of construction industry hazards and general industry hazards. The Training Materials Development category will support projects that develop, evaluate, and validate training materials on the following five topic areas: construction industry hazards, general industry hazards, prevention of transportation fatalities and accidents, work-related respiratory diseases, and other safety and health topic areas of interest to OSHA.

A total of \$2.9 million is available to support Targeted Topic grants, with individual awards estimated to be \$150,000. A total of \$4 million will support successful applicants under the OSHA Training Materials Development grants with average awards of \$200,000. Applications are due July 21, 2005. Qualified faith-based and other organizations may apply for the cooperative agreement entitled Private Sector Support to Small-and-Medium-Sized Enterprises (SMEs) in Georgia. Successful applicants will provide assistance to increase access to medium- and long-term financing through Development Credit Authority mechanisms; encourage increased participation of Georgian businesses in international markets through the adoption of internationally recognized self-certification standards; develop advocacy skills in selected Georgian business associations; and improve SMEs business skills.
