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PARTNERING WITH LOCAL VOLUNTEER CENTERS

Volunteer Centers mobilize people and resources to deliver creative solutions to community problems. A Volunteer Center is a convener for the community, a catalyst for social action, and a key resource for volunteer involvement. Below are examples of how your local volunteer center might help you.

Volunteer Opportunities. Volunteer Centers often maintain a bank of volunteer opportunities in your community. They match skills and interests with an agency or project that needs volunteers or can simply refer you to an agency who is looking for volunteers. Because of their unique status, Volunteer Centers also have knowledge about the needs of issues facing the community.

Community Resources. Volunteer Centers can connect you with the larger field of community service. They know of other area non-profit organizations that might be able to assist you in gathering information on specific causes such as rainforest destruction, heart disease, or homelessness. Many have partnerships or programs with schools that provide young people with volunteer opportunities. Volunteer Centers might also give you names of businesses and organizations that want to collaborate with volunteers or have employee volunteer programs. Many also keep video and publication libraries on information having to do with community service programs and issues.

Building Capacity. Many Volunteer Centers facilitate training and technical assistance opportunities for organizations around key issues in volunteer management. Many Volunteer Centers also act as facilitators for networking groups which can help you make connections and get the information you need to get people involved in service.

Recognition. Volunteer Centers believe in recognizing volunteers for their hard work. Many sponsor local recognition programs or have information about state and national recognition programs.



⌘ Faith Communities needed for Homeless Adult Hypothermia Shelter Sites ...

Faith Communities are needed this coming winter to provide a warm and safe place for homeless adults who are camping or living in their cars in and around the Central – Central Western areas of Fairfax County. Faith Communities are being asked to provide night shelter for 20 to 35 homeless adults in their facility. Actual shelter times will start each evening at 5:30 p.m. and end no later than 7:30 a.m. the following morning. Organizers of this effort are hopeful that Faith Communities will volunteer space in their facilities for a one-week time period; however, single nights will also be welcomed. A minimum of three volunteers are needed to be on site at all times. Some faith communities split the time into two shifts of three volunteers each so that no volunteer is at the shelter more than eight hours. Although evening and morning meals can be arranged through other volunteer sources, participating Faith Communities are encouraged to consider providing these meals on the nights they provide shelter.

Faith Communities who cannot provide space for an evening shelter but are still interested in participating in this effort may assist in other ways, to include:

- Providing volunteers to help staff other faith community shelter sites;
- Recruiting van drivers;
- Washing shelter blankets;
- Preparing and/or delivering meals to shelter sites;
- Providing "G" rated videos to show at shelter sites;
- Providing bottled water and snacks;
- Providing toiletry supplies (toothbrushes, toothpaste, soap, shaving razors, and washcloths)
- Supplying first aid boxes; and/or
- Providing administrative and communication assistance.

The Fairfax County Department of Family Services will contract with a community organization to coordinate the Faith Community Hypothermia Shelter initiative this coming winter. Once this contractor is finalized, faith communities will be notified.

⌘ Grant Funds Available for Faith- and Community-Based Organizations ...

The Northern Virginia Workforce Investment Board (NVWIB)/Skill Source Group, Inc., has just been awarded a Department of Labor grant to work with faith- and community-based organizations to provide employment services. Areas targeted will be South Alexandria, Herndon, Sterling, and Leesburg, Virginia. Faith and community organizations with social services annual budgets below \$350,000 will be invited to submit proposals to provide employment services from their facilities for approximately one year. Grant amounts are anticipated to be small, and applicants will be asked to indicate how they will be able to sustain the employment program after the grant's completion. The Workforce Organization for Regional Collaboration (WORC) will be serving as this grant's intermediary. WORC will be providing technical assistance to all interested faith- and community-based organizations interested in applying and will continue to provide technical assistance to subgrant awardees during the grant period. More information will be released by WORC and the NVWIB shortly.

The grant opportunities this week for community and faith-based organizations are through programs administered by the Corporation for National and Community Service, the United States Department of Health and Human Services, and the United States Agency for International Development.

CORPORATION FOR NATIONAL AND COMMUNITY SERVICE

The Fiscal Year 2005 Challenge Grants will support organizations to build the capacity of their "Baby Boomer" (those born between 1946 and 1964) volunteer programs by providing matching federal funds to those secured by the organization through new private funding sources. Organizations eligible to apply must have experience in programs organizing volunteers and in raising funds through private sources. The Challenge Grants are to assist in expanding services through the use of more volunteers and private funds or offer a new service.

A total of \$4 million will fund eight grants. Individual grant awards will be \$500,000 to \$2,000,000. Applicants would be responsible for providing two private dollars for every one federal dollar. Applications are due August 23, 2005. The program announcement is at:

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

Administration for Children and Families

Qualified faith-based and other organizations may apply for a cooperative agreement to operate and administer the Child Development Associate (CDA) Credentialing Program. The successful applicant will credential qualified caregivers who work with children from birth to age five in a variety of public and private agency settings. Activities include maintaining a national credentialing program (including a process for renewing credentials), ensuring that CDAs will be credentialed in numbers sufficient to meet the staffing needs of Early Head Start and Head Start grantee and delegate agencies, promoting CDA credentialing, and monitoring progress of CDAs.

A total of \$1 million annually will be awarded to a single successful applicant for a five-year project period. Applications are due September 23, 2005. Complete details are in the program announcement at:

ACF will support one project to operate the Head Start Family Literacy Project. The successful applicant will provide family literacy training and technical assistance to Head Start and Early Head Start programs. The family literacy services provided must be of sufficient intensity in terms of hours, and of

sufficient duration, to make sustainable changes in a family, and that integrate all of the following activities: interactive literacy activities between parents and their children; training for parents regarding how to be the primary teacher for their children and full partners in the education of their children; parent literacy training that leads to economic self-sufficiency; and an age-appropriate education to prepare children for success in school and life experiences.

The successful applicant will be awarded \$3 million annually for five years. Applications are due September 8, 2005. The program announcement is in the Federal Register at:

Projects creating employment or business opportunities for targeted low-income individuals may apply for a grant under the Job Opportunities for Low-Income Individuals (JOLI) Program. The three program areas to be funded are providing technical and/or financial assistance to businesses already in existence, creating self-employment/micro-enterprise programs, and developing new businesses that will train and employ 40-100 TANF and/or low-income individuals.

A total of \$5 million is available for the program. Ten to 12 grants will be awarded with an average award amount estimated to be \$450,000. Applications are due August 19, 2005. The Federal Register announcement is at:

Faith-based and other organizations may apply for a grant to establish and operate a 24 hours-per-day, seven days-a-week National Domestic Violence Hotline. The successful applicant will provide information and referral services, counseling, and assistance to victims of domestic violence, their children and other family members, and others affected by such violence, and assist them in finding safety and protection in crisis situations.

A total of \$3 million annually will be awarded to one successful applicant for a five-year project. Applications are due August 22, 2005. The program announcement can be found in the Federal Register at:

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention

Faith-based and other organizations that meet certain requirements outlined in the program announcement may apply for a cooperative agreement entitled Expanding and Enhancing HIV Confidential and Voluntary Counseling and Testing (VCT) Services in the Republic of Botswana. The funds will support a project to administer, support, monitor and evaluate VCT service delivery in Botswana, provide social marketing for confidential VCT services, expand HIV counseling and testing to remote areas and to special groups, and coordinate to link services to other related activities and groups.

A total of \$3.4 million will be awarded for a single grant. Applications are due August 22, 2005. The request for applications is at:

International faith-based and other organizations may apply for the Rapid Expansion of Access to HIV/AIDS Prevention, Care and Treatment Interventions among Rural and Other Underserved

Populations in the Republic of Cote d'Ivoire cooperative agreement. The successful applicant will assist in building an indigenous response to the HIV epidemic through the rapid expansion of innovative, culturally appropriate, high-quality HIV/AIDS prevention and care interventions, and improved linkages to HIV counseling and testing and HIV treatment services in rural and other underserved populations in Cote d'Ivoire.

Activities include changing behavior through abstinence and "be faithful" interventions, providing voluntary HIV counseling and testing, providing care and support for orphans and vulnerable children, providing and supporting palliative care, implementing treatment literacy programs, and developing or enhancing a functional referral network.

A total of \$4 million will support a single successful applicant to conduct a four-year project.

Qualified faith-based and other organizations may apply for a cooperative agreement to develop a national Single Gene Disorders Resource Network. The grant will support the development, implementation, and evaluation of a resource center with a focus on Duchenne and Becker Muscular Dystrophy and Fragile X syndrome. The successful applicant must have the capacity to expand the national network to other single gene disorders.

A total of \$600,000 will be awarded to a single successful applicant. Letters of intent are due July 29, 2005 and applications are due August 18, 2005. Further details can be found in the program announcement at:

National Institutes of Health

Qualified faith-based and other organizations may apply for a research grant entitled Biobehavioral Methods to Improve Outcomes Research. The grant will support multidisciplinary research on the links between biological, psychosocial, and behavioral factors and health. Examples of research areas are included in the program announcement.

The deadline for the next round of applications is October 1, 2005. The amount of individual awards is dependent on the scope and scale of the proposed research. Further details can be found in the program announcement at:

Qualified faith-based and other organizations may also apply for the Developing Centers for Innovation in Services and Intervention Research grant. The successful project will be an interdisciplinary research team that investigates a major, public health-relevant, mental health and/or alcohol-related problem. Project results will produce pragmatic information for clinical and policy decision making, improve current community practice, and reduce the burden of mental illness and of alcohol-related problems.

The maximum individual award amount is \$400,000. Letters of intent for the next cycle of funding are due October 1, 2005 with applications due November 1, 2005. The request for applications is at:

Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration

U.S. AGENCY FOR INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Qualified faith-based and other organizations may apply for a cooperative agreement with USAID to implement the Returnee Reintegration and Support Project in Cambodia. The grant will support a project to provide basic support services to returnees deported by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security, assist in easing the initial reintegration process, and establish case management system for returnees.

The type of services provided by the successful applicant include cultural orientation upon arrival in Cambodia, pre-deportation orientation materials that describe the entry process into Cambodia and what to expect the first two weeks in country, housing support, relative location support, job placement support, medical support, training services (vocational training, khmer language training, and computer training), substance abuse counseling, peer counseling support, and case management.

A total of \$800,000 will be awarded for a three year project. Applications are due August 18, 2005. The request for applications can be found at:

The National Integration and Tolerance in Georgia cooperative agreement will support a project that creates and/or enhances the mechanisms for the expression of peoples' concerns, and increases national awareness of ethnic, religious and minority rights among the citizens of Georgia. The successful applicant will establish a national advisory committee, develop a national strategy and action plan to promote integration and tolerance, administer a small grants program, and develop television programs that expose people to the benefits of diversity and help promote a sense of a civic identity.

A total of \$2.7 million will be awarded for a four-year project. Applications are due August 29, 2005. The request for applications is at:

USAID is accepting applications for projects funded under the President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief - Annual Program Statement for Haiti. Successful applicants will provide and enhance prevention activities to reduce mother to child AIDS transmission, increase voluntary counseling and testing referrals to existing sites, and advance the "abstinence/be faithful" approach. The grant will also support palliative care -- which includes training, home/community-based care, and clinical-based palliative care -- and the care and support of orphans and vulnerable children.

A total of over \$14 million is available for this program. The maximum amount of funding under the prevention component of the grant is \$6.374 million, with \$3,187,000 for "abstinence/be faithful" approaches and \$3,187,000 for other prevention activities. A total of up to \$4.374 million will be awarded for palliative care activities and \$3.381 million for care and support of orphans and vulnerable children.
