Multicultural Outreach/Area Agency on Aging

With the diversifying senior population of Fairfax County, multicultural outreach is growingly important. Among Fairfax County's large foreign-born population are persons age 65 and older who speak a language other than English at home. More than a quarter of this segment of the population lives in linguistically isolated households. The following statistics show the linguistic isolation according to language spoken: 23.6 percent of seniors live in Spanish-speaking households, 15.2 percent of seniors live in households speaking Indo-European languages, 39.5 percent of seniors live in households speaking an Asian or Pacific Islander language, and 22.3 percent of seniors live in households speaking other languages.

Fairfax County Provides Food Safety Preparation Tips

With home kitchens especially busy this time of year, Fairfax County provides these food safety preparation tips not only for the holiday season, but also year-round.

- Do not handle or prepare foods if you have any symptoms of cold, flu, vomiting, diarrhea or jaundice.
- Do not handle or prepare foods if you have open sores on your hands.
- Avoid eating, drinking, using tobacco products, and handling pets while preparing foods.
- Limit bare hand contact with foods that do not require washing, cooking or additional preparation before they are eaten. Use tongs, deli papers, or other utensils during preparation.
- Thoroughly wash your hands and the exposed portions of your arms with soap and water before handling food, and as often as necessary to keep them clean.
- Refrigerate or freeze groceries within two hours of purchase.
- Use food thermometers to monitor food temperatures.
- Thaw foods by refrigeration at 41°F or less, under cool running water, or in the microwave if for immediate cooking.
- Cook all vegetables to 135°F and other foods to 165°F.
- Cool foods from 135°F to 41°F or less within six hours. It is critical within the first two hours of the cooling process to cool foods from 135°F to 70°F. Regularly check your refrigerator to make sure the temperature is maintained at 41° F or below. Cool foods in shallow pans in the refrigerator or freezer.
- Make sure that no more than four hours pass between the time food is taken from the oven or refrigerator and the time cooked foods are eaten.

Support Groups for Grandparents/Relatives Raising Children

Spread the word, support groups help. If you are a grandparent, aunt, or uncle raising your minor relative due to the inability of the parents to do so, you probably need some help. The cost of raising children emotionally, financially, legally, and otherwise, at a time in your life that you did not expect to do so, makes networking important. The Fairfax County Department of Family Services, in conjunction with the Family Services and Involvement Section of the Fairfax County Public Schools, sponsors two support groups for these kinship care families. A group meets at the Pennino Building in Fairfax on select Tuesdays, and another meets at the Bryant Alternative High School in Alexandria on select Thursdays. Free childcare is available, but you must pre-register. Smart Kids/Safe Choices Program

Prevention Services of the Fairfax-Falls Church Community Services Board (CSB) is coordinating the implementation of a multi-session, out-of-school violence/gang prevention program focused on late elementary school-aged youth. Smart Kids/Safe Choices is designed to help kids avoid gang involvement, feel safe in their neighborhoods, develop skills in peacefully resolving conflict, become more aware of the legal consequences of certain choices, and become involved in healthy activities.

Partnering organizations agree to the following:

- Complete an eight-hour facilitator training
- Deliver services to older elementary-age (4-6 grade) children
- Obtain permission from parents for participation of child
- Enroll a minimum of 10/maximum of 20 participants in the program
- Schedule the program on a consistent basis: day, time, and location
- Maintain a closed membership group (once started, no new participants allowed)
- Maintain a minimum 80 percent attendance rate
- Provide follow up with participants between sessions as needed
- Conduct 12 consecutive sessions of curriculum (sessions may be combined)
- Follow the curriculum of the program as outlined in the facilitator training
- Participate in a minimum of four face-to-face consultations with CSB Prevention staff: first and last sessions and two additional meetings.
- Communicate needs and concerns with CSB staff as necessary (phone, e-mail)
- Complete all required paperwork as outlined in the facilitator training
- At end of session 12, provide CSB staff with attendance sheets, fidelity checklists, program kits in good order
- Provide receipts for purchases made with gift cards and/or list of snacks provided at each session
- Participate in follow-up focus group session for facilitators within two weeks of program completion

Community Services Board Prevention agrees to the following:

- Issue press releases and public information about Smart Kids/Safe Choices
- Conduct an eight-hour training for facilitators of partnering organizations
- Provide assistance in assuring cultural competence in program implementation
- Manage distribution of program materials: program kits; pre and post tests; attendance sheets; fidelity check lists; all required paperwork as outlined in the facilitator training
- Provide gift cards in the amount of \$200 per program for the purchase of supplies and snacks
- Participate in a minimum of four face-to-face site consultations to provide technical assistance and support: first and last sessions and two additional meetings
- Administer pre and post testing
- Respond as necessary to needs and concerns communicated by partners (phone, e-mail)
- Conduct a follow-up focus group session for facilitators within two weeks of program completion
- Provide a \$2,000 stipend to partner organizations that successfully complete all program requirements as stipulated above.

* *After program completion, CSB will provide kits on a loan basis, as well as technical assistance, to partners who wish to continue offering the program. Partner organizations are expected to read and sign a memorandum of agreement with the Fairfax-Falls Church Community Services Board*

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention

Qualified faith-based and other organizations may apply to conduct research on Abusive Head Trauma (AHT) Prevention. The purpose of the program is to evaluate strategies for the prevention of abusive head trauma (AHT). Applicants are expected to conduct a study on the effectiveness and cost-effectiveness of providing information to parents and other caregivers on preventing AHT. More specifically, projects will be sought that will allow comparisons of the impact of delivering such information in different settings on AHT and potential mediating factors for intervention effects.

A total of \$1.2 million is available during the first year to fund up to three projects, with each receiving up to \$400,000 for the first year of a five-year period. Letters of intent are due January 22, 2007. Applications are due February 21, 2007.

Qualified faith-based and other organizations may apply to study The Impact of Traumatic Brain Injury Among Incarcerated Persons. This program will study the potential impact on community reintegration and recidivism of traumatic brain injury and related problems among adults in state or federal prisons. The proposed study will investigate the interrelationships among a history of traumatic brain injury (TBI), substance abuse, and violent or aggressive behavior problems to inform programs to improve the health of incarcerated persons, reduce recidivism, and increase their potential for successful reintegration into the community.

One award will be funded for a total of \$500,000 during the first project year. Letters of intent are due January 29, 2007. Applications are due February 28, 2007.

Qualified faith-based and other organizations may apply to conduct research on Understanding Risk and Protective Factors for Sexual Violence Perpetration and the Overlap with Bullying Behavior. This program will assess the association between bullying experiences and co-occurring and subsequent sexual violence (SV) perpetration and test associations between these forms of violence and potentially modifiable risk and protective factors from multiple levels of social influence to determine the shared and unique risk and protective factors for bullying experiences and SV perpetration. Bullying experiences includes being a perpetrator, victim, or bystander of bullying. Co-occurring sexual violence perpetration refers to sexual violence that is perpetrated in the same time period as the bullying experiences. Subsequent sexual violence perpetration refers to sexual violence that is perpetrated in a time period after the bullying experiences. The sexual violence perpetration that is co-occurring or that happens subsequent to the bullying experiences can be perpetrated against the same person/people or against a different person/people than those who are involved in the bullying experiences.

A total of \$600,000 is available to fund two awards, each receiving up to \$300,000 for the first year of a three year project period. Letters of intent are due January 19, 2007. Applications are due February 21, 2007.

National Institutes of Health

Qualified faith-based and other organizations may apply to become Exploratory/Developmental Centers for Translational Research on the Clinical Neurobiology of Drug Addiction. These Centers are defined as entities with a primary clinical/human neurobiology focus in which preclinical research is included to directly inform or provide a mechanistic foundation for the human neuroscience/clinical neurobiologic research. It is expected that centers competing successfully for funding through this announcement will propose a program of highly integrative research that has, as its main focus, a well-defined clinical neurobiological question that will be investigated at multiple levels, taking advantage of model systems that offer methodological advantages that have the potential to yield results that can be directly translated into the clinical investigations. Success of these exploratory centers will be judged on the basis of effective integration of the projects so that clear integration of hypotheses and approaches exist across the interdisciplinary boundaries.

A total of \$2.5 million is available during the next year to fund two or three Centers, each receiving up to \$600,000 annually over a four year project period. Letters of intent are due January 23, 2007.

Qualified faith-based and other organizations may apply for two types of grants to study Focal Cognitive Deficits in CNS Disorders (R03 and R21). These programs will expand basic and translational research, including intervention research, on the types, nature, and functional consequences of focal or specific cognitive deficits experienced by persons with central nervous system disorders.

Bureau of Justice Assistance

Qualified faith-based and other organizations may apply for Gang Resistance Education and Training (G.R.E.A.T.) Program Training and Technical Assistance Support. The program's primary objective is prevention and is intended as an immunization against delinquency, youth violence, and gang membership. G.R.E.A.T. lessons focus on providing life skills to students to help them avoid engaging in delinquent behavior and violence to solve problems. This program seeks a provider to support the G.R.E.A.T. Program through training, technical assistance, and information dissemination support.

One award will be funded in the amount of \$4.5 million for an eighteen month project period.

Office for Victims of Crime

Qualified faith-based and other organizations may apply for Office for Victims of Crime Fiscal Year 2007 Action Partnerships. This program will expand, enhance, or develop services for victims of stalking, domestic violence, dating violence, or child abuse, or to infuse enhanced awareness and understanding of issues faced by victims of these crimes into their organizational activities.

Applicants may focus their project to raise awareness or promote a collaborative response to victims of any one of the above areas or a combination thereof. Organizations that have not traditionally addressed issues of crime victimization may consider sponsoring a project in collaboration with an experienced victim assistance or victim advocacy group. Organizations whose members frequently work with crime victims should consider enhancing their existing outreach efforts to crime victims or developing and disseminating advanced training or information to increase their members' ability to respond to victims of crime. The program should focus on victims' rights and services, not crime prevention efforts.

Up to \$75,000 is available for each project. Up to five projects will be funded, with each lasting between twelve and eighteen months. Applications are due January 24, 2007.
