## In-person Absentee Voting for June 10 Primary Elections

Primary elections will be held for the Democratic and Republican parties on Tuesday, June 10. Democratic Party primaries will be held in the 8<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> Congressional Districts. Republican Party primaries will be held in the 8<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> Congressional Districts only.

Any eligible Fairfax County voter who meets the legal requirements may vote absentee in these elections. In an effort to make absentee voting easily accessible, the Fairfax County Office of Elections is offering in-person absentee voting through Saturday, June 7, in Suite 323, Fairfax County Government Center, 12000 Government Center Parkway, Fairfax. Citizens may vote Monday through Friday from 8 a. m. to 6 p.m. Additional voting hours will be available on Saturdays, May 31 and June 7, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Voters are advised to cast absentee votes early. Celebrate Fairfax! is June 6 – 7 at the Government Center, the last two days of absentee voting, and voters may experience traffic congestion or delays. Citizens who wish to vote those days but who do not want to attend the festival should go to the “Yellow Gate” (south entrance). There they will be given priority parking and assistance to the Office of Elections or a satellite voting station. Those needing special assistance or further information should call the Office of Elections, 703-222-0776, TTY 771, during in-person absentee voting hours. In these primary elections, voters will be selecting candidates for the U.S. House of Representatives in the Democratic and Republican parties. The winners of these primaries will be on the ballot in the Nov. 4, general election.
