MICHAEL L. O'REILLY

Chairman, Governing Board of the Partnership to Prevent and End Homelessness

Michael L. O'Reilly, a native Northern Virginian and a resident of Herndon for more than 25 years, was first elected to the Herndon Town Council in May 2000. In May 2002, he was re-elected to a second term. In May 2004, he was elected Mayor, which office he held until June 30, 2006. He currently serves as a member of the Board of Directors of the Washington Metropolitan Airports Authority.

Prior to serving on the Herndon Town Council, Mayor O'Reilly served as a member of the Herndon Planning Commission (1995-2000) and as the chair of both the Architectural Review Board and the Heritage Preservation Review Board (1991-1995). As a member of Council he chaired the Council's Finance Ad Hoc Committee (2002-2004), and also chaired the first Joint Communications Committee (2004-2005). He served as the Town's representative to the Northern Virginia Regional Partnership (2002-2004), and served on the Virginia Municipal League Transportation Steering Committee and Transportation Policy Committee, and the Dulles Corridor Rail Association Advisory Board. He represented the Town on the Northern Virginia Regional Commission from January 2002 until June 2006 and served on the Commission's Executive, Legislative, and Operations Committees.

Mayor O'Reilly was named "Citizen of the Year" for 2005 by *The Herndon Times* newspaper and was awarded the 2005 Phyllis Campbell Newsome Public Policy Leadership Award by the Center for Nonprofit Advancement. In 2006, the Mayor was named Lord Fairfax from the Dranesville district of Fairfax County, chosen by the County's Board of Supervisors for his "capable and unwavering leadership and political courage"; was the first-ever recipient of the Gregg Simpson "Spirit of Relay" Award, presented by organizers of the Town of Herndon's Relay for Life benefit on behalf of the American Cancer Society; was awarded the Community Trustee Award by Leadership Fairfax, Inc. for his demonstration of "...courage and inspiration in his leadership of Herndon's immigrant day labor issue."; and was presented with the American Society for Public Administrators Northern Virginia Chapter Public Service Award.

Mayor O'Reilly is a member of the Herndon Dulles Chamber of Commerce; serves on the board of directors for the Council for the Arts of Herndon; was the volunteer Incorporator and is an advisory board member of Vecinos Unidos/Neighbors United, Incorporated; and served on the board of directors for Downtown Herndon Incorporated, a Virginia "Main Street" Program. He is a member of the Friends of Runnymede Park, a member of the Herndon Rotary, a member of the Downtown Business Alliance, and a sponsor of the Herndon Optimist Basketball program. He has volunteered as a Herndon Optimist Basketball Coach, Herndon Youth Soccer Coach, and Saint Joseph's Basketball Coach.

Mayor O'Reilly holds a B.S. in Psychology from Virginia Commonwealth University (1976) and a J.D. from the Columbus School of Law at Catholic University of America (1979). He has been a practicing attorney for more than 25 years in Northern Virginia. From 1979 until July 31, 2002, he practiced with the Tyson's Corner law firm of Rees, Broome & Diaz, P.C., where he also served as President. He is the

owner and principal of The O'Reilly Law Firm, located in downtown Herndon, which he opened on August 1, 2002, with his sister, Nancy O'Reilly. He is a member of the Virginia State Bar and served as Chair of its District Attorney Grievance Committee. He is a member of the Virginia Trial Lawyers Association and the Fairfax Bar Association.

Mayor O'Reilly and his wife, Annie, have four children, Mike Jr., David, Jeannie and Colleen; and three grandchildren, Caeli, Michael and Colleen. They are members of St. Joseph's Catholic Church in downtown Herndon.

THE HONORABLE KRISTEN J. AMUNDSON

Former, Virginia House of Delegates

Former Chair, Fairfax County School Board

Kristen (Kris) Amundson is the communications manager for Education Sector, an independent think tank in Washington, DC. In this capacity, Amundson is responsible for developing and implementing strategies to effectively communicate the organization's ideas to policymakers, educators, the media, and other key audiences.

Amundson represented the 44th District in Virginia's General Assembly from 1999 to 2009. She was the chief patron of Governor Mark Warner's Education Efficiency Audits program, which has returned millions of dollars from administrative expenses to classrooms across Virginia. She was elected as the Vice Chair of the House Democratic Caucus. Governor Kaine has appointed her to Virginia's P-16 Council and of the Southern Regional Education Board.

Prior to joining the Virginia General Assembly, Amundson served for nearly a decade on the Fairfax County, Virginia, School Board, including two years as its chairwoman. It was during that period that the school system made the transition to one of the most diverse school systems in the country.

Amundson is the co-founder of La BECA (Bringing Education, Compassion, and Assistance) Women's Scholarship Foundation. The Foundation provides scholarships for low-income women and girls in Central and South America and currently supports 11 scholars in three countries. A former teacher, Amundson has also written about education topics ranging from accountability to parent involvement in education and increasing civic involvement.

A former President of New Hope Housing, she has served as a member of the organization's Board of Directors and Board of Trustees since 1989. In 2005, Kris Amundson received New Hope Housing's Good Neighbor Award for her commitment to serving homeless people.

RALPH F. BOYD, JR.

Executive Vice President Community Relations, Freddie Mac

Chairman and CEO, Freddie Mac Foundation

Ralph F. Boyd, Jr. is Freddie Mac's executive vice president, Community Relations. He is a member of the company's management committee and reports directly to interim CEO John Koskinen. Boyd also serves as president and CEO of the Freddie Mac Foundation. In these dual roles, he oversees the national capital region's largest philanthropic program, which includes corporate giving, employee volunteer activities, and Foundation grant making, while also serving as a member of the Foundation's Investment Committee.

Boyd started at Freddie Mac as executive vice president and general counsel, and head of the external relations and public affairs functions. He also served as a director of the Homeownership Funding Corporations I and II, two Freddie Mac-affiliated real estate investment trusts.

Prior to joining Freddie Mac, Boyd was a senior partner with the national law firm of Alston & Bird LLP, leading its Washington, D.C. litigation practice. Before that, he served as Assistant Attorney General of the United States for Civil Rights and head of the Department of Justice's Civil Rights Division. From 1997 to 2001, Boyd was counsel and then a partner in the Litigation Department of Goodwin Procter LLP in Boston. He also served for six years as an assistant U.S. attorney in the Criminal Division of the Boston U.S. Attorney's office. Following law school, Boyd was a law clerk to

the Honorable Joseph H. Young, U.S. District Judge for the District of Maryland, and then an associate at the Boston law firm of Ropes & Gray.

Boyd has a long history of involvement in community matters, and currently serves on several non-profit boards. He is chairman of the board of Easter Seals of the Greater Baltimore-Washington Region, vice chair and secretary of the Center City Public Charter Schools board of directors, and a member of the executive committee of the American Association of People with Disabilities (AAPD). He also is a trustee of the National Housing Partnership Foundation (NHPF), a developer and provider of quality, affordable multi-family housing. Boyd serves on NHPF's audit and investment committees.

Boyd is a director of the DIRECTV Group, Inc., chairman of its audit committee, and a member of its nominating and governance committee. Boyd also served for three years as the U.S. member of the Geneva-based Committee on the Elimination of Racial Discrimination – a United Nations human rights treaty body.

Boyd is a graduate of Haverford College and Harvard Law School. In 2001, he received an honorary Doctor of Law degree from Suffolk University.

THE HONORABLE SHARON BULOVA

Chairman, Fairfax County Board of Supervisors

Sharon Bulova was elected Chairman of the Board of Supervisors on Feb. 3, 2009. She was first elected in November 1987 to represent the Braddock District. Mrs. Bulova has served as the Board's Vice Chairman and chairs the Board's Budget Committee.

Mrs. Bulova has been a member, and past chairman, of the Northern Virginia Transportation Commission since 1988. She is a founding member of the (VRE) Virginia Railway Express Operations Board since its inception in 1989 and has served as that board's chairman four times. Under her leadership, commuter train service for Northern Virginia has advanced from a speculative proposal to a successful reality.

In the summer of 2004, Mrs. Bulova was appointed by former Gov. Mark Warner to chair the Governor's Commission on Rail Enhancement for the 21st Century in the Commonwealth of Virginia, which recommended the creation of a State Rail Advisory Board. In the fall of 2005, she was elected the first chairman of that board, which makes recommendations to the Commonwealth Transportation Board to fund projects (both freight and passenger) that have a significant public benefit.

As a member and past chairman of the Northern Virginia Regional Commission, Mrs. Bulova champions regionalism to address our metropolitan area concerns. She is a member of the Council of Government (COG) Metropolitan Washington Air Quality Committee and is past chairman of COG's Metropolitan Development Process Committee.

Throughout 2008, Mrs. Bulova has served as chairman of Greater Washington 2050, a new regional initiative to improve the quality of life for Washington area residents in the next 50 years by fostering stronger regional cooperation and planning. The Greater Washington 2050 Initiative is led by COG and a coalition of public, business, civic and environmental stakeholders.

Mrs. Bulova is chairman of the Fairfax County/City of Fairfax Committee, which addresses issues of interest to both jurisdictions and is the county's liaison on the Central Fairfax Chamber Board of Directors.

Mrs. Bulova regularly engages constituents in Community Dialogue Series and Task Forces. Some of these efforts in Braddock District have included: Transportation and Land Use; The Burke Centre VRE Station Parking Garage Task Force, Preventing Gang Activity, Braddock Tomorrow (a community visioning series in 2006) and Keeping our Neighborhoods Safe, Attractive and Vital (2007).

In 2005, a Braddock community task force began a process to research, capture and tell the history of the Braddock area. Products of this effort include the book Braddock's True Gold and an A Look Back at Braddock Heritage Website, created in partnership with George Mason University.

A Northern Virginia resident since 1966, Mrs. Bulova resides in The Cloisters of Fairfax with her husband Lou DeFalaise. Together, they have four adult children and three grandchildren.

RONALD F. CHRISTIAN

Chairman, Fairfax County Redevelopment Authority

Ronald F. Christian has been a Fairfax County resident for 40 years. He previously served as the Pastor and an Administrator of Lutheran Church and currently serves as the Director of Lutheran Housing Services. Mr. Christian is the Chairman of the Fairfax County Redevelopment and Housing Authority.

Christian and his wife are proud parents of two adult children and four grandchildren.

CONRAD EGAN

President and CEO, National Housing Conference

Mr. Egan is the President of the National Housing Conference. He has served the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development and NHP Inc., once one of the Nation's largest multifamily property owners and managers. He also served as the Executive Director of the Millennial Housing Commission and as the immediate past Chairman of the Fairfax County Redevelopment and Housing Authority.

TERRI LEE FREEMAN

Terri Freeman, President of The Community Foundation for the National Capital Region for the past 12 years, is responsible for providing strategic leadership to further the mission of The Community Foundation to facilitate individual, family and organizational giving at all levels to improve the quality of life in the metropolitan Washington region. Under Ms. Freeman's leadership, the Foundation's assets have grown from \$52 million to nearly than \$308 million in fiscal year 2009, and the Foundation maintains the status as the largest local grant maker in the metropolitan Washington region, and one of the top fifty foundations nationwide, with grants of more than \$87 million in fiscal year 2009.

Ms. Freeman has become well known in the metropolitan Washington, D.C. nonprofit community, particularly among those organizations supporting social and racial justice, youth and education, as well as, those devoted to strengthening the nonprofit sector. A graduate of the 1996 class of Leadership Washington, Ms. Freeman has served on a variety of boards. Mayor, Falls Church

The Honorable Robin Gardner is currently a Strategic Account Manager at GTSI. Her focus is on civilian agencies, namely HHS, Education, and State. Previously, she served as Vice President of Business Development with Apogen Technologies, and before that she worked as an Account Manager with Northrop Grumman (through acquisition of TRW), focusing on the Department of Health and Human Services, the Department of Agriculture, and the Department of State. She joined TRW through their acquisition of BDM International Inc., a dominant company in information systems technology and technology services. At BDM, Ms. Gardner was the Training Coordinator and Administrative Director of the Manufacturing and Computer Standardization Project for the American Red Cross. She then began working in Sales and Business Development, focusing on the area of Human Services systems.

Ms. Gardner is active in a number of Information Technology organizations, most specifically the Industry Advisory Council. She is a graduate of the Partners class of 2003, was Vice Chair for the Voyagers class of 2005, and was industry chair for the Management of Change Conference 2007.

She received a bachelor's degree in politics from Ithaca College and a master's degree in international affairs from The George Washington University. Ms. Gardner was first sworn in as a member of City Council on July 1, 2000. She was first elected Mayor on July 1, 2006, and re-elected on July 1, 2008.

PASTOR HORACE H. GRINNELL

Pastor, Saint Anthony of Padua Parish

Pastor Grinnell was born in Charlottesville, VA and educated through high schools in Charlottesville, VA and Richmond, VA. He attended college at the University of Virginia for one year and St. Mary's Seminary and University (BA Philosophy 1970). He performed graduate work at the Katholiek Universiteit te Leuven (the University of Louvain in Belgium) and received an STB/MA in Theology in 1973. Grinnell also performed graduate work at the Catholic University of America toward a DMin.

Pastor Grinnell was ordained a Roman Catholic Priest in 1974. He served in parishes in Northern Virginia (Diocese of Arlington) as an associate pastor in four parishes (until 1986). He also served as pastor at St. Charles Parish (1986-1994) in Arlington, VA and at St. Anthony Parish (1994-present) in Falls Church, VA.

Grinnell served as co-chair of the Lee Gardens Interest Group (1986/87) where he worked with Arlington County, Arlington Housing Corporation (AHC), Artery Corporation, and HUD to establish Woodbury Park (owned by AHC) of which 200 units were Section 8 housing.

Pastor Grinnell is a long term member of the board of SOME (So Others Might Eat) and he served as the former Chair of the board and he is currently the Vice-Chair.

Grinnell is the founding member of VOICE (Virginians Organized in Interfaith Community Engagement). He currently works with Fairfax County, the tenants, VOICE, and the owners of Vista Gardens to improve the deplorable conditions in the apartment complex.

THE HONORABLE CATHERINE M. HUDGINS

Hunter Mill District Supervisor, Fairfax County Board of Supervisors

Catherine M. Hudgins is serving her third term on the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors and is also serving as Chair of the Human Services and the Housing and Community Development Committees for the County. Supervisor Hudgins finds her greatest satisfaction assisting constituents obtain services critical to maintaining more sustainable lives. She was honored for her leadership and work in mental health and affordable housing.

A native of Kansas City, David has been the Senior Rabbi of Congregation Olam Tikvah (A World of Hope) since 1998. He holds a BA in English from Columbia University and a BA and an MA in Jewish History from The Jewish Theological Seminary (JTS). He was ordained by JTS in 1993.

Rabbi has turned his attention outward as he works in the greater community, including serving as the Vice-Chair of the Fairfax County Faith Communities in Action.

David, and his wife Talya, are the parents of three children who each anticipate long careers as professional basketball players.

WILLIAM H. LAUER

President, Tetra Partnerships

Tetra Partnerships, under the direction of President and Founder William Lauer, is a multi-faceted commercial real estate development, sales, and property management firm located in Reston. Since it was established in 1978, Tetra Partnership has developed into a company that embraces the importance of regional growth, leading other firms toward a stronger business community. The company itself has grown and evolved over the years through creativity and responsiveness to a changing marketplace. Mr. Lauer works to align the goals of Tetra Partnerships with those of the community. He serves on the Board of Directors of Devotion to Children, an organization that is dedicated to fulfilling the needs of children, ages six and younger. Tetra Partnerships has also provided financial support and been involved in fundraising efforts for the Ronald McDonald House at INOVA Fairfax Hospital and for Joe Gibbs' Youth for Tomorrow. In addition, Tetra Partnerships renovated Alternative House, a crisis intervention center for at-risk youth, teens, and their families.

Mr. Lauer also works diligently to preserve affordable housing in our area. He serves on Fairfax County's Affordable Housing Preservation Action Committee, and was instrumental in securing support from local businesses for the "Penny Fund". He is a member of the Board of Directors of Reston Interfaith and the Reston Interfaith Housing Corporation, and has been a long-time supporter of Reston Interfaith; this year, Tetra Partnerships is a sponsor of Best of Reston at the level of Strategic Partner. In addition, Mr. Lauer has been involved with Habitat for Humanity, Home Aid, and Carpenter's Shelter.

DANIEL P. LEAF

Vice President of Full Spectrum Initiatives, Defense Systems Division Northrop Grumman Information Systems

Dan Leaf is vice president for full spectrum initiatives with Defense Systems division in Herndon, Va. In this key leadership role, he is responsible for shaping and developing new defense and joint forces opportunities, with a strong focus on irregular warfare, homeland protection, and allied/coalition-countries support.

Prior to joining Northrop Grumman in 2008, Mr. Leaf completed 34 years with the Air Force, retiring as a lieutenant general after serving as deputy commander, U.S. Pacific Command, Camp H.M. Smith, Hawaii. Before that, he served as vice commander, Air Force Space Command, Peterson Air Force Base, Colorado.

He was the director of operational requirements for the Air Force from 2000 to 2003. Among other positions, Mr. Leaf commanded seven units at various levels, served on the faculty for the Army Command and General Staff College, Fort Leavenworth, Kan., and was an F-15C instructor pilot. His operational experience includes duty as director of operations for Joint Task Force-Southwest Asia, F-15C missions over Southern Iraq during sanction enforcement operations, and F-16CJ Operation Northern Watch suppression of enemy air defense missions over Northern Iraq. As 31st Air Expeditionary Wing commander, he flew and led F-16CG strikes during the Kosovo war. He also served as the senior airman with the land component commander during the initial combat operations of Operation Iraqi Freedom. Mr. Leaf is a command pilot with more than 3,600 flight hours. In addition to the 31st Air Expeditionary Wing, he has commanded a flight, two squadrons, an operations group and two fighter wings.

Mr. Leaf has received numerous awards and decorations, including the Secretary of the Air Force Leadership Award, the Distinguished Service Medal, Bronze Star, Legion of Merit and Air Medal.

He earned his Bachelor of Science in political science from the University of Wisconsin-Madison and a Master of Arts degree in military art science from the Army Command and General Staff College, Fort

Leavenworth, where he was an honor graduate. His written work includes Unity of Command and Interdiction (Air University Press) and many articles and papers.

THE HONORABLE ROBERT F. LEDERER

Mayor, City of Fairfax

Robert F. Lederer is serving his fourth term as Mayor of the City of Fairfax. He was first elected to the City Council in 1982 and served three terms in the 1980s, then held two more terms from 1998-2002.

As mayor, he is the city's representative on the Virginia Municipal League Transportation Policy Committee; the Northern Virginia Transportation Authority; and the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments (COG) Transportation Planning Board and the Committee on Noise Abatement and Aviation at National and Dulles Airports (CONAANDA). He also led the city's recent efforts for redevelopment of Old Town Fairfax.

Among his many activities as a councilmember, he served as chair of the Task Force for a More Livable City of Fairfax.

Lederer is the Chief Executive Officer of an international trade association in the City of Fairfax. A lifelong resident of the City of Fairfax, he attended Green Acres Elementary School, Sidney Lanier Middle School and Fairfax High School. He received a Bachelor of Science degree from the Robins School of Business at the University of Richmond.

Rodney L. As the Capital Attraction Manager, Rodney assists area high tech start-ups in finding financing from angel networks, venture capitalists, and investment bankers. Theodore C.
