7th Annual Winter Coat Closet Begins Collections and Distributions

My office will kick-off the **Winter Coat Closet** on Saturday, November 15. The Winter Coat Closet, a joint effort between my office and Reston Interfaith, provides a new or nearly new winter coat to children and adults who need them. This successful program, in its 7th year, distributed over 5,000 coats to ward off the chill last winter, and has distributed over 11,500 coats and 3,100 accessories since its inception. This endeavor would not be possible without the dedicated staff support from co-sponsor Reston Interfaith and the leagues of volunteers they amass to assist with this effort.

Again this year, your donations of new or gently used coats in youth and adult sizes are needed. XL and XXL sizes are especially appreciated. Also collected are hats, gloves and scarves. All donations are tax deductible.

Hypothermia Centers to Open in December

On December 1, 2008, faith communities, in partnership with Fairfax County government and local non-profit organizations, will begin the 5th year of the County's hypothermia shelter program to homeless adults during the winter of 2008 - 2009. Referrals are to be made to the hypothermia centers only after a determination that County year-round shelter bed space and their winter overflow bed space are not available.

The North County hypothermia center, in its third year of operation at the Cameron Glen Human Services building in Reston, is managed by Reston Interfaith as an extension of the services offered by the Embry Rucker Community Shelter. The North County location will operate from December 1, 2008 - March 15, 2009. The hours of operation are from 5 pm-7am Sunday-Saturday.

FACETS, in the central part of the County, and Volunteers of America (operators of another community shelter) in the eastern part of the County, will coordinate with faith communities and volunteers to provide overnight shelter and meals to individuals in mostly faith-based locations on a rotating basis. The hypothermia program is only made possible with the assistance of numerous volunteers and congregations that offer their time, food, and comfort.

Reston Master Plan Review Process Underway

On Tuesday, October 28, 2008, my office and staff from the Department of Planning and Zoning (DPZ) hosted a community meeting to share information gathered and discuss recommendations for the planning process to review the Reston Master Plan and related portions of the Fairfax County Comprehensive Plan.

When the Board of Supervisors approved amendments to the Planned Residential Community (PRC) District Zoning Ordinance in March 2007, I directed DPZ to develop a proposal to review the PRC and the comprehensive plan areas as needed. Staff began an evaluation of the existing Reston Master Plan, and relevant sections of the Comprehensive Plan. In addition, staff met with nine (9) community focus groups to ascertain information on what they like about Reston, what they dislike, and what they think should be reconsidered in future development in Reston, and other general comments.

Based on comments from these focus groups, staff determined that community concerns related primarily to three broad issues that should be addressed in the future planning of Reston, 1) balancing planning for land use and transportation, 2) remaining faithful to original Reston principles, and 3) viewing Reston in a more comprehensive fashion for planning purposes. Based on this information staff has recommended a two-stage approach:

- Review of the Reston Master Plan and Fairfax County Comprehensive Plan and the development of an appropriate amendment(s) consisting of four (4) segments:
 1. Development of existing condition data to include a transportation study and land use study, including a multi-session “Reston Land Use College” orientation to provide a comprehensive overview of the land use concepts, terminology, and type of issues to be considered,
 2. Develop general planning principles and objectives for future development in Reston,
 3. Develop more specific planning goals and objectives for the Reston Town Center and areas along the Dulles Corridor,
 4. Consider redevelopment recommendations for the Village Centers.
- Review of the Planned Residential Community (PRC) zoning district to assess what changes, if any, are needed to support and achieve the proposed changes in the Comprehensive Plan.

Work on the existing Land Use conditions assessment would begin after the Hunter Mill District Area Plan Review Task Force concludes its work in early 2009. The “Reston Land Use College” orientation is anticipated to be 8-10 weeks in length and could be initiated shortly after the Existing Conditions assessment begins. The development of general planning principles could begin at the conclusion of the “Reston Land Use College”.

Lake Anne Village Center Draft Comprehensive Language

On Thursday, November 6, 2008, I hosted a community meeting to provide an update on activities associated with the Lake Anne Plan Amendment and share draft Comprehensive Plan Language. The Board of Supervisors authored the Department of Planning and Zoning (DPZ) on December 4, 2006 to evaluate a Plan Amendment (ST06-III-UP2) for the Lake Anne Village Center and Adjacent areas.

Input from community focus groups, a design charrette, and public meetings assisted in the preparation of recommendations for draft Comprehensive Plan text and urban design guidelines. A follow-up road network and parking study has been completed and was used by DPZ staff in refining the draft plan recommendations.

Major planning objectives for Lake Anne Village Center (Center) are 1) to bring more residents and day-time employees to Lake Anne, 2) ensure continuation of diverse housing options, 3) encourage development that complements existing development on Washington Plaza, 4) encourage high-quality site design and building design, 5) enhance pedestrian and bicycle connections throughout the Village Center, and 6) preserve and introduce new green open space, including green roofs.

For the purpose of the proposed Plan text, the area was identified as five land units A, B, C, D and E, with each unit having a redevelopment option. Three of the units, A, D and E have a full consolidation option, all of which are subject to conditions. The proposed comprehensive plan text identifies planning goals for the Center as follows: 1) add uses to provide a more vital village center environment, 2) achieve long-term economic viability of the businesses on Washington Plaza by adding residents to Village Center, and 3) protect the historic and architectural quality of Washington Plaza.

I believe that Lake Anne is a valued community asset. Revitalization of Reston's first village is a critical step in demonstrating Reston's continued commitment to the guiding principles upon which Reston was founded – that Reston be a lively and varied community where one can work, live and play.

Dates for the Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors' public hearings on the Plan Amendment and the final staff report will be posted on the Department of Planning and Zoning website. Area Plans Review Process

In March 2008, the 2008-2009 North County Area Plans Review (APR) process officially started. The area under review includes the Dranesville, Hunter Mill, Providence and Sully Supervisor Districts. The purpose of the APR process is to review proposed changes to the land use recommendations found in the Area Plans and on the Comprehensive Plan Map. Nominations were submitted from May 1, 2008 through June 27, 2008. The Hunter Mill District received 28 nominations, of which 21 have been deferred. The remaining nominations to be reviewed during this cycle are:

I recently completed my nominating for the task force. The list of committee members can be found at www.fairfaxcounty.gov/huntermill. The Fairfax County Department of Planning and Zoning (DPZ) will analyze the nominations and prepare a staff report for each nomination. The task force will then review the nominations and formulate recommendations to the Planning Commission. Only those nominations or alternatives that the Planning Commission votes to support will be forwarded to the Board of Supervisors for additional public hearings and final decision.

The Hunter Mill District Task Force is expected to begin reviewing nominations in mid to late November. Speak Up for a Child in Court - Volunteers Needed

A new case of child abuse or neglect enters the Fairfax County Domestic & Juvenile Relations court system once every 30 hours. These children need caring advocates to help ensure that they grow up in safe and permanent homes. An independent nonprofit organization, Fairfax CASA recruits and trains volunteers to investigate a child's situation and to advocate for the best interest of the child in court. All CASA volunteers undergo extensive training; no prior experience in child welfare or the law is required.

Cool Hunter Mill District Initiative



in April 2008, I launched the “Cool Hunter Mill District Initiative” The main focus is to enlighten residents, businesses, and community organizations to identify ways and/or commit to reducing green house gas emissions. This effort is in support of the Fairfax County initiative to reduce global warming emissions 80 percent by 2050. Just small steps by each of us can translate to major impact on significant emissions reductions throughout the District. Steps such as:

- ◆ Saving water by turning off the tap while brushing your teeth
- ◆ Walk, bike or take public transportation and carpooling, telecommute
- ◆ Turn off lights, computers and other equipment at night or set to sleep mode
- ◆ Switch to energy-efficient compact fluorescent lights
- ◆ Setting your thermostat two (2) degrees lower in the winter
- ◆ Use small appliances such as microwaves instead of ovens, cover pots and pans when cooking
- ◆ Join community organizations in partnering on environmental projects and events
- ◆ Install motion sensors for light switches
- ◆ Recycle, recycle, recycle
- ◆ Install rain barrels, plant native trees around your house to provide windbreaks and summer shade
- ◆ Use paint with no or low volatile organic compounds
- ◆ Purchase energy efficient appliances

Large Area Community Parking District

Fairfax County Department of Transportation is in the process of implementing a Large Area Community Parking District (CPD) in Reston, in order to enable enforcement of recreational vehicle parking in Reston. I requested this action along with Reston Association in response to resident concerns about increased commercial and recreational vehicle parking in residential communities.

Large area CPD would restrict the following vehicles from parking on public roads:

- ◆ Boat trailer
- ◆ Watercraft (boat)
- ◆ Motor home
- ◆ Camping trailer
- ◆ Trailer or semi-trailer, even if attached to a vehicle
- ◆ Vehicle \geq 3 axels
- ◆ Vehicles with a gross vehicle weighted rating (GVWR) \geq 12,000 lbs.

Vehicles temporarily parked (for up to 48 hours) for the purpose of loading, unloading or preparing for a trip are exempt.

A community meeting was held to solicit comments from the public on October 30th. Authorization for the district by the Board of Supervisors will be on November 17, and the public hearing is planned for Monday, December 8. For additional information, see:

Old Courthouse Road Traffic Calming

In response to community concerns, I held a Transportation Town Hall meeting on September 30 at Westbriar Elementary School in cooperation with Citizens for Traffic Calming on Old Courthouse Road. Cris Janoski, coordinator of the organization, Jack Mitchell of the Creek Crossing Community, and others asked the elected officials and staff to help them come up with a plan to address speeding and enforcement issues in their community.

Old Courthouse Road functions not only as a neighborhood road but as a shortcut around the Town of Vienna from Fairfax to Tysons Corner and is used by commuters every day. Of special concern is the intersection of Pine Valley Drive and Old Courthouse Road in front of Westbriar Elementary School.

State Senator Chap Petersen, Del. Steve Shannon, Vienna Mayor Jane Seeman, county and state transportation staff, and Captain Steve Thompson, Commander of the McLean District Police Station, listened to the concerns and issues presented by the residents. Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) and county staff are looking at a variety of traffic calming measures including striped crosswalks, additional signage, provision of sidewalk and bike lanes, speed limit review, along with additional enforcement at various locations along Old Courthouse Road.

The County's Department of Transportation, VDOT and McLean District Police station staff will cooperate with Town of Vienna transportation staff and the Town of Vienna Police. Status of proposed projects will be reviewed quarterly and information posted on the Hunter Mill website and newsletters.

Transportation

Hunter Mill District Transportation Advisory Council

HMD Transportation Advisory Council is made up of citizens of Hunter Mill District from Reston, Vienna, and Herndon, business representatives, Fairfax County Transportation (FCDOT) staff, as well as Public Works and Environmental Services (DPWES) staff, Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) staff, Fairfax County and Reston District Police staff, and Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority Staff. The group meets quarterly in the North County Governmental Center Community Room at 12000 Bowman Town Drive, Reston from 8:00 to 10:00 a.m. The next meeting will be held on February 11, 2009. The meeting schedule and documents are on the Hunter Mill web site.

Soapstone Drive Walkway Project

County staff and I held the first of two community meetings on Wednesday, November 5 at Langston Hughes Middle School to solicit comments on the Soapstone Drive Walkway Project that will extend from South Lakes Drive to Glade Drive. At that meeting, participants raised concerns about overall quality and safety of the Soapstone Drive area. Focus was on parking, litter, large trucks, and pedestrian safety.

The \$1.5 million project has been funded through a federal transportation enhancement grant. The county has collected comments from area residents submitted via mailed and online surveys. Based on their findings and comments from the November 5 meeting, the county will develop walkway alternatives that consider ideas from the community, traffic and pedestrian safety, impacts to parking, environmental impacts, drainage, utilities, and cost.

Trails

Northern Vienna Trail Network Update

The Northern Vienna (NoVi) Trail Network Feasibility Study was approved in November 2006 after several years of community meetings. When completed, the NoVi network will connect cultural, natural, and recreational resources including the Wolftrap National Park for the Performing Arts and the Barns of Wolftrap, Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority's W & OD Trail and Meadowlark Botanical Gardens, Fairfax County Park Authority's Cross County Trail and Clarks Crossing Park, and many smaller parks, as well as The Enterprise School and Antioch Christian Church.

Phase I, a trail mainly along Beulah Road, is in design. There are four segments – Segment A - Beulah Road near Abbotsford Road to Clarks Crossing Road, Segment B - Clarks Crossing Road at Brookside to the intersection of Trap Road and Old Courthouse Road (Four Corners), Segment C - Four Corners to Coral Ridge Subdivision, and Segment D - Coral Ridge Subdivision to Meadowlark Park/Enterprise School.

The trail has been funded from state transportation grants and from the 2007 Transportation Bond. The Wolftrap Pedestrian Bridge, a state project, that would link Wolftrap Park for the Performing Arts with the Beulah Road trail network is in design with funding sought from the federal government. That appropriation request is supported by the state and county.
