

Introduction

Resident Curator Program Background

Virginia Code Establishing Resident Curator Programs

In January 2011, the General Assembly amended Va. Code Ann. § 15.2-2306 authorizing localities to develop resident curator programs. Va. Code Ann. § 15.2- 2306(A)(4) enables localities to create, by ordinance, “a resident curator program such that private entities through lease or other contract may be engaged to manage, preserve, maintain, or operate, including the option to reside in, any such historic area, property, lands, or estate owned or leased by the locality.”

Resident Curator Program Study in Fairfax County

At the direction of the Fairfax County Board, staff in the Department of Planning and Zoning and the Park Authority have worked with the History Commission to evaluate the potential costs and benefits that might result from the implementation of a resident curator program. John Milner Associates prepared a report for the County that examines how states and localities across the country have implemented resident curator programs as a way to foster the maintenance and preservation of publicly owned historic properties. The report also provides recommendations for the establishment of a resident curator program in Fairfax County. The report was provided to the Board and was presented at the September 30, 2014 meeting of the Board’s Development Process Committee.

Fairfax County Resident Curator Program Ordinance

Va. Code Ann. § 15.2-2306(A)(4) requires resident curator programs to be established by ordinance. The program was approved in 2014 through adoption of Chapter 125, Resident Curator Program Ordinance, to The Code of the County of Fairfax, Virginia establishing a resident curator program. This program, designed to preserve and maintain historic properties owned or leased by the County, will lease historic properties to individuals or businesses subject to regulations established by the County Executive or his designee. Such regulations will require that resident curators maintain and improve the leased properties according to the Secretary of the Interior’s Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties, 36 CFR Part 68 (2013), as amended. Additionally, all leases for historic properties included within the resident curator program will provide for public access consistent with the historic property’s nature and use.

Resident Curator Program Stated Goal and Objective

The objective of a Fairfax County Resident Curator program is the preservation of historic buildings within the county...The end goal is to rehabilitate and maintain underutilized historic properties and provide periodic public access to appreciate the historical significance of the properties.

The Resident Curator Program is designed to preserve historic properties by offering long-term leases to qualified tenants who agree to rehabilitate and maintain these historic resources in accordance with established preservation standards. A curator can be a private citizen, a non-profit entity, or a for-profit entity.

Any proposed rehabilitation of these sites must meet the Secretary of the Interior's standards for rehabilitating historic buildings, and the curator must provide reasonable public access to the property. In return, curators pay no rent as long as they continue to fulfill their obligations. Curators do, however, pay for maintenance, utilities, and county property taxes.

Resident Curator Program Development Launch

In August of 2015 the Resident Curator Program Development Project Team, comprised of a Community Technical Advisory Committee and a county-wide multi-agency staff work team, convened its inaugural meeting for the purpose of the development and initial implementation of the Fairfax County Park Authority Resident Curator Program. The specific purpose of the Resident Curator Project Team is to develop a Resident Curator program within the Fairfax County Park Authority, and to implement the program by overseeing an initial property (or properties) through the curatorship process.

Invitation for Expressions of Interest

Based on the criteria created for evaluating the properties, the Project Team determined to advertise the following four properties for Expressions of Interest, in order to determine the level of interest and potential hurdles to overcome for the next property/(ies) to be considered for advertisement for curatorship:

1. Turner Farm House in Turner Farm Park, Great Falls
2. Lahey Lost Valley House in Lahey Lost Valley Park, Vienna
3. Hannah P. Clark (Enyedi) House in Old Colchester Park and Preserve, Lorton
4. Ash Grove in Ash Grove Historic Site, Tysons

Purpose of Invitation for Expressions of Interest

An Expression of Interest Invitation will be used to stimulate and determine levels of interest in the properties, gather feedback from applicants regarding potential hurdles with a property, engage the local community proactively regarding the Resident Curator program, and identify potential future curator applicants.

This document is an Invitation for Expressions of Interest and not a formal Curator Application. Submitting an Expression of Interest for any of these properties is not a prerequisite for submitting a formal Curator Application, should a formal Curator Application be released. The information provided in the Expression of Interest will not be considered binding on the respondent. This Invitation of Expression of Interest does not require FCPA to subsequently release any of these properties for a formal Curator Application.

 - Include potential observed obstacles or hindrances which FCPA may be able to assist with in order to facilitate your proposal
3. Historic Rehabilitation Experience and Qualifications
 - Describe any experience in rehabilitation, maintenance and management of historic buildings
4. Funding Sources
 - Describe in general terms the anticipated funding sources

Property name address, location area, brief history

Ash Grove Historic Site, 8881 Ashgrove House Lane, Vienna, VA.

Ash Grove Historic Site is located between the densely wooded Old Courthouse Spring Branch stream valley and the Westwood Village townhouse subdivision. The house is conveniently located on the edge of burgeoning Tysons Corner and approximately 2/3 mile from the new Spring Hill Metro Station.

History Overview

Ash Grove is one of the few standing 18th century Virginia houses built by the Fairfax family and is located on Ashgrove House Lane in Vienna, Virginia. In 1747, Thomas, sixth Lord Fairfax, moved from England to Virginia to manage the more than five million acres of Northern Neck Proprietary land he inherited from his mother. The front section of the Ash Grove house was built around 1790, and many other buildings at Ash Grove supported the house and farm. In 1850, New York farmer James Sherman bought the house and 241 acres of land from the Fairfax family. For nearly 150 years, generations of the Sherman family, who were leaders in Fairfax County, lived in and preserved Ash Grove. A fire damaged the house in 1960, but it had just been documented by the Historic American Building Survey (HABS) and most of the molding, windows, and doors had been removed for restoration. The house was fully restored, based on the HABS drawings, using many of the original architectural features. In 1997, the property was subdivided for Westwood Village, and the parcel around the historic buildings was dedicated to the Park Authority for land and building preservation.


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Floor Plan

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




Hannah P. Clark House, 10605 Furnace Road, Lorton, VA.

The Hannah P. Clark House is on a wooded parcel on the edge of Old Colchester Park and Preserve. The house is conveniently located near Lorton in Southern Fairfax County with easy access to the I-95 and Route 1 transportation corridors.

The Hannah P. Clark House is set back east of Furnace Road between Old Colchester Road and the CSX railway (historically Richmond, Fredericksburg, & Potomac Railroad). The topography is mainly level with a gentle slope downward north of the house to the railway. The land is densely wooded with a clearing for the structures and driveway. The driveway enters the property from Furnace Road and circles around a tree. The house is on the north side of the circle. To the south of the circle is a large corrugated metal studio, constructed 1986-1987, with sliding barn doors. Also on the property are two wood-frame sheds. The Railroad Tool Shed is from the 1930s and is located southeast of the house. The maintenance shed is from the 1990s and is located south of the studio.

History Overview:

The Hannah P. Clark House is located on a wooded edge of Old Colchester Park and Preserve on Furnace Road in Lorton, Virginia. It is the only standing 19th century structure within the park boundaries. The house was constructed circa 1876 by Hannah Potter Clark during Virginia's Reconstruction Period after the Civil War. The land was once part of Hannah P. Clark's family property, Colchester Farm. As railroads expanded in the early 20th century, Clark was forced to move her house across the road to where it stands today. The house changed hands several times during the 20th century and a number of physical changes and modern updates were made to the house between 1956 and 1983. The artist, Janos Enyedi, and his wife Diana Enyedi, purchased the property in 1986 and built a new studio building they called Furnace Road Studio. They owned the home for nearly 25 years until selling it to the Fairfax County Park Authority in 2011.

The house has 1,250 square feet of heated space; approximately 2,166 square feet with attic and cellar. There are three bedrooms, one full and one half bath, a living room with exposed ceiling beams, an eat-in kitchen, separate office and large wood deck.

Lahey Lost Valley House, 9750 Brookmeadow Drive, Vienna, Va.

Lahey Lost Valley Park is a densely wooded park north of Vienna, Virginia. The house is on approximately 22 acres set within a single family home development with 1 acre lots. The house sits on a rise above a small stream valley.

History Overview

The Lahey Lost Valley House is a mid-18th century brick hall-parlor house with a 1940s brick addition and is located on land that was granted to William Gunnell in 1730. A son turned a portion of the land into a working plantation by 1760. The Gunnells were leaders in Fairfax County throughout the 18th and 19th centuries, and the family continued to own the property through the 1930s. In 1940, the house and 45 acres were sold to Richard and Carlotta Lahey, who moved the wood framed kitchen addition off of the brick house and used it as a freestanding artist studio. In its place, the Laheys constructed a two-story brick addition. In the early 1990s, Carlotta Lahey arranged to donate the house, furnishings, and 22 acres of land to the Fairfax County Park Authority upon her death. FCPA took possession of the property in 1999.

The approximately 2,100 square-foot house has eight rooms, including a family room with exposed ceiling beams, eat-in kitchen, formal hall and parlor, two bedrooms, six fireplaces, one finished bath and one roughed-in bath.

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


Floor Plan





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

The Lahey bequest expressed the wish that the property not be developed and be retained as a nature preserve. Limited parking could be added to accommodate small event rentals. Lahey also requested that the house and furnishing be preserved as it was during her occupation. Primarily that the house itself be preserved and the furnishing in the kitchen and first floor be left in place to exhibit 18th century furnishings and lifestyle. Lahey requested that if a resident caretaker was deemed necessary for security that they live in the studio cottage and not in the main house.

Public comment during the Master Planning process included wishes to limit hours open to the public, size of events, and a desire to respect Mrs. Lahey's wishes.



Location Area

The Turner Farm is located at the intersection of Georgetown Pike (Route 193) and Springvale Road (Route 674) in Great Falls, Virginia. This community park is 52 acres in size and comprises several historic structures and represents the merger of three park parcels; Turner Farm purchase, Defense Mapping Agency site and Lexington Estates Park. Park features include an observatory, equestrian and community park features.

History Overview

The Turner Farm House, built in 1905 by the Turner family, is located in a 52-acre community park at the intersection of Georgetown Pike and Springvale Road in Great Falls, Virginia. The property contains several historic structures. The Mark Turner Dairy Farm is an example of the type of farm that predominated in the Great Falls area during the early years of the twentieth century, and the Turners were hailed as model farmers in a 1948 article in the "National Grange Monthly."

The 3,216-square-foot house is significant due to its Queen Anne style architecture and because it exemplifies the cultural, economic, and historic heritage of the Springvale and Forestville/Great Falls communities in Northern Virginia. Many of the original details, formal parlor, hardwood flooring, and fireplaces remain. The farm house has four bedrooms and four bathrooms.

The main house is a 2 story frame house on a stone foundation, facing Georgetown Pike to the north. It has a rear gabled wing with a taller, wider front facing gable that splits into two lower, small gables of unequal size on the north elevation; the tall center gable end of the front facing gable has a half-timber pattern. The smaller front gables have decorative shingling. The house contains a large, central corbelled cap chimney. Most windows are two-over-two, double-hung sash windows, taller on the first floor than on the second. Second level windows with the smaller gables on the north elevation are one-over-one. The easternmost window has a decorative balcony-like protrusion, with a circle pattern. A newer side-gabled wing on the west side of the house is two-story, three-bay, with one-over-one windows.
