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Important Information on Parking and Security 2008 Celebrate Fairfax! What You Need to Know June 2-8

The Celebrate Fairfax! festival is June 6-8 at the Government Center complex. The event will impact employee parking at the Government Center, Herry and Pennino buildings beginning June 2. It is important to note the following information to plan your commute accordingly.

Parking during the week of June 2

▶ Employees can expect limited parking availability at the Government

Center during the week as festival set-up progresses. Visitor parking will be maintained in front of the Government Center. Employees are requested to leave these spaces available for residents and visitors coming to conduct business in the Government Center.

▶ Employees are encouraged to carpool as parking will be limited in some front lots. On Friday, the only available parking in the front lots at the

Government Center will be reserved for visitors. Employees, including those from off-site locations, must use the lot provided for shuttle bus service.

Employees who normally park in the front lots of the Government Center may have to park in one of the garages behind the Herry or Pennino buildings. On Friday, all front parking lots are closed to

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Take Action on Air Quality This Summer

Everyone has a role to play in helping to improve the air quality in this region, particularly in the summer when air pollutants interact with heat and strong sunlight to produce unhealthy ground-level ozone, or smog.

People breathe about two gallons of air every minute – that’s almost 3,000 gallons per day and it can increase with activity, such as running and playing. Across Fairfax County government, many employees are pitching in so everyone can breathe cleaner air.

▶ **Cool Counties** – Fairfax County is one of the founding members of this national initiative, launched in July 2007 in partnership with the Sierra Club, to reduce local government emissions by 80 percent by 2050. Shuttle Bus Service (Courtesy of Fastran and Department of Community and Recreation Services)

Arrangements have been made to use the parking lot on the northwest corner of Monument Drive and Government Center Parkway across from Fairfax Corner for overflow employee parking on Thursday and Friday, June 5-6 from 7 a.m.–5 p.m.

▶ **NOTE:** County employees are not permitted to park in the other customer lots in Fairfax Corner. The shuttle bus will stop only at the approved parking lot.

▶ On Thursday, June 5, continuous service (about every 15-20 minutes) will be provided during the hours listed above. The shuttle bus will stop at the front entrances of the Herrity and Pennino buildings; at the bus stop near the front entrance of the Government Center; and at the parking lot on the northwest corner of Monument Drive and Government Center Parkway across from Fairfax Corner.

▶ On Friday, June 6, continuous service (about every 15-20 minutes) will only stop at the front entrance of the Herrity Building (the front of the Pennino Building will be blocked off); at the loading dock of the Government Center; and at the lot across from Fairfax Corner.

Road and Garage Closures

▶ At 6 p.m. Thursday, June 5, the two center entrance roads to the Government Center will be closed to vehicular traffic and will remain closed until Monday morning.

▶ At 9 a.m. Friday, June 6, the north entrance road (entrance closest to Monument Drive) will be closed to vehicular traffic and will remain closed until Monday morning.

▶ On Friday, June 6, the lot in front of the Pennino Building will be closed except for Child Care Center drop off and pick up.

▶ At 4:30 p.m. Friday, June 6, employee access to the Government Center P1 and P2 parking garages will end until 6 a.m. Monday. On Friday morning, P1 and P2 will operate as normal. Employees can stay in their parking space until the end of their regular day. However, reserved spaces of those employees who leave and return after 2 p.m. on P1 or P2 are not guaranteed as pre-approved exhibitors will be moving their cars into any available spaces.

▶ When leaving P1 and P2 on Friday, all employees must leave the garages through the south entrance road (near the fuel island) and follow the directions of the police officers.

▶ When the festival is open to the public, Government Center Parkway will be closed to through traffic from the

stoplight at Post Forest Drive to the intersection of the north entrance road.

Security

▶ For security, all offices in the Government Center Complex are closed to employee and visitor access from 5 p.m. Friday, June 6, to 6 a.m. Monday, June 9, except for the Office of Elections. Employees who must work must submit an Employee Security Access Request Form through their department's security coordinator to the Building Services Branch in Facilities Management Department (FMD) by May 28. ▶ **Important Note:** Contact the Security Office at 703-324-3434, TTY 711, if you plan to leave a personal vehicle in any garage at the Government Center complex over the weekend. You must have a pass on the dash with your name on it so that the vehicle can be easily identified and won't be towed.

▶ The Government Center will be open for absentee voting during the festival for voters that are attending the fair. Additionally, the Office of Elections will accommodate absentee voters in a trailer, which will be located in parking lot B. Access to lot B will be via the yellow gate. Vehicular parking for voters will be located in lot B. ■

Focus on Benefits

Protecting Your Investments From Inflation

Some good ways to protect against the potential impact of inflation are to select an appropriate asset allocation strategy, start saving early and save as much as you can.

► How inflation affects your savings

Inflation, or the rising costs of goods and services, can affect your ability to live comfortably after retirement. How? If inflation averages 3 percent each year for the next 30 years, \$100 worth of groceries will cost almost \$250.

In order to maintain the standard of living you enjoy today, you must invest your savings to beat inflation over time.

► Choosing an asset allocation strategy

Before you decide how to invest your savings, consider your time frame and risk tolerance. Once you've determined how many years you will be investing, and how much fluctuation you can tolerate in the value of your savings, you can begin to choose an asset allocation strategy.

Your strategy will serve as a blueprint

for investing, guiding your decisions about how much of your savings to invest in stocks, bonds and money market/stable value investments.

In general, you will find that even the most conservative asset allocation strategies include stocks. This is because stocks have significantly outpaced inflation over time. Historically, inflation averaged 3.03 percent per year from 1926 through 2003. During the same period, stocks averaged 10.42 percent, bonds averaged 5.40 percent, and money market/stable value investments averaged 3.75 percent.* (Past performance is no indication of future results.)

► The power of inflation

The table below reflects actual inflation from 1983 through 2003 and projects costs in 2023 based on an assumed 3 percent rate of inflation each year from 2003 through 2023.**



Did You Know Your Salary and E-Mail Are Public Information?

Did you know that as a Fairfax County employee, your salary is public information? Your salary is probably something you don't freely share with many people, but be advised that it is a public record and the county is obligated by law to provide salary information, if more than \$10,000 a year, to Virginia residents and members of the media who request it.

Your county e-mail also is considered a public record and can be requested by the public or the media, so remember the adage, "If you don't want to see it on the front page of your local newspaper, don't put it in an e-mail."

These are just two examples of the Virginia Freedom of Information Act that impact you as a county employee.

Uncapping Text and Changing Text Case

Do you ever want to change the case of text that is all upper case without re-typing? With a few simple steps in Microsoft Word you can convert text to the correct case.

1. Highlight the all-capped text.
2. Then choose "Format" from the main menu and select "Change Case."
3. In the dialog box that appears, select "Sentence Case."

This converts your text into uppercase and lowercase letters according to where

they are located in the sentence. You may need to further modify the text, converting proper nouns and names to uppercase.

There are other options available in the Change Case dialog box:

- ▶ lowercase - Lowercases the selected text.
- ▶ UPPERCASE - Caps all selected text.
- ▶ Title Case - Makes the first letter of each selected word capitalized. Note that small words such as "Of," "And," and "The" also will be capitalized.
