**Binge Drinking: Are Your Teens at Risk?
Police Co-host Communitywide Forum**

Out of control, underage, binge drinking is every parent's nightmare as their student prepares for life beyond high school; in college and elsewhere. The Fairfax County Police Department wants to help parents and teens better understand these dangerous, illegal and life-threatening issues. In collaboration with the Countywide Initiative to Reduce Underage Drinking and Northern Virginia Community College, a free film screening of the documentary HAZE, and panel discussion featuring local experts, will take place on Wednesday, May 26 at Northern Virginia Community College in Annandale.

HAZE is a feature documentary that addresses the national crisis of alcohol abuse, binge drinking and hazing taking place on many college campuses. The film is graphic in its description of college life and the effects of alcohol, but is a must-see for parents, teens and others who are concerned about these important issues. Experts from the police department, the Commonwealth Attorney's Office, George Mason University, and the Inova Fairfax Hospital trauma unit will be among the panelists sharing their first-hand knowledge and information on these difficult topics.

Learn more and ask the tough questions at this important, eye-opening forum; be a part of tackling solutions for this growing concern.

FAIR OAKS POLICE STATION RENOVATION AND EXPANSION

Starting this summer, the Fair Oaks Police Station will be renovated to modernize it for future staffing and technology needs.

Not to worry, **the station will still be open for business during the two-year renovation**, and police officers from this station remaining committed to serving you.

Construction will begin summer 2010, and renovations are scheduled to be completed in fall 2012. The station's interior will be completely renovated, and a two-story addition will be added to the existing building. **Fair Oaks will become the county's first green police station**, using principles of the Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design Program (LEED).

The station is located at 12300 Lee Jackson Memorial Highway, Fairfax.

Green Building Features

Fair Oaks will be the first green police station in Fairfax County, and it will incorporate a number of environmentally friendly features, including:

- High-efficiency heating and cooling systems that save energy

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- Low-flow toilets and water efficient landscaping to reduce water consumption
 - Building materials that have recycled content or come from renewable sources
 - Most construction waste will be recycled, instead of going into a landfill.
