



## Ideas for Handling Bulk Waste

- Encourage residents to utilize the county's Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) drop-offs, located at the county's disposal facilities. County residents can use this free service to dispose of large electronics, such as televisions and computer monitors, and other non-bulk hazardous wastes, such as compact florescent lightbulbs, solvents, pesticides, herbicides, and oil.
- Institute dedicated location(s) for tenants to dispose of bulky wastes and set clear guidelines about how items should be staged. For example, do they need to remove doors from appliances, or contact the property manager with a list of items prior to disposal?
- Post signs to prohibit illegal dumping, or dumping of large items wherever necessary.
- Provide refuse and recycling information and require tenants to notify management about disposal of large items prior to their move-out date.

When establishing collection services for non-reusable items, managers should think about who they should hire to provide this service. Traditional haulers that collect household trash and recycling usually also offer bulk services, but they may not be as responsive as a dedicated bulk waste hauler. Bulk waste haulers typically use box trucks and hand-collect bulk items rather than using dumpsters or other collection methods and may be able to respond more quickly to emergency, or on-call pick-up requests.
