Bridging Affordability

Overview

- Bridging Affordability combines rental subsidies with case management and supportive services with the intent of moving families toward self-sufficiency
- Partnership between Fairfax County Department of Housing and Northern Virginia Family Services (program administrator), as well as Alternative House, FACETS, New Hope Housing, Cornerstones, Shelter House, Homestretch, Brain Injury Services, Family PASS, Community Services Board

Overview

- Each client is assessed by a case manager who works with the client to develop a plan to meet the unique needs of the family
- Clients are connected to other support services such as education, employment, childcare, and life skills
- Progress toward goals is monitored closely and adjusted as needed to ensure client success

Bridging Affordability: By the Numbers

- 524 certificates issued; 420 households leased (63 percent families)
- 83 percent of the overall population has "bridged" to sustainable housing
- 65 households "bridged" to FCRHA housing (Public Housing or Housing Choice Voucher program)
- 63 percent employed (part time or full time)
- Average rent subsidy just under **\$1000/month**

Bridging Affordability: By the Numbers

- Two Bridging Affordability contracts since 2011 totaling **\$12,846,662**
- Only \$297,053 is not yet reserved for a specific household to be served for up to 24 months

Who is Bridging Affordability Serving?

- Homeless households (35 percent)
- Fairfax County affordable housing waitlist households (50 percent)
- Households referred by Community Services Board (7.5 percent)
- Households with physical or sensory disabilities (7.5 percent)

BA Successes

- BA has evolved from primarily a subsidy program to a comprehensive self sufficiency program
- LinkUp Fairfax has provided career path employment services to 30 BA clients with the following results:
 - o73 percent of current clients increased household income
 - 040 percent reduced dependency on public benefits
 - $\odot 27 \ percent$ moved to jobs with benefits
 - o67 percent engaged in **short term training opportunities**
 - o63 percent decreased their overall household debt

What's Next?

- Extend NVFS contract for four years

 Serve 165 households under contract extension;
 approximately \$5 million budgeted
- Partner with the Fairfax County Office for Women & Domestic and Sexual Violence Services in an effort to serve 12-17 households who are escaping domestic violence situations

 Work with LinkUp Fairfax to better serve clients coming out of shelters and broaden the scope of employment services to include those underserved
