Objectives

- Seamless transition
- Improve organizational climate
- Strengthen communication
- Culture of transparency and respect
- Engage staff
- Leaders to model desired behavior
- Balance animal welfare and public safety



➤ Address Safety Concerns

- > Risk Management Audit
- > Review of all previous cases
- > Safety training for volunteers and staff

> Develop culture of inclusion

- ➤ Ask all for input
- > Collaborate on cases
- Communicate "how" and "why"
- ➤ Need to fill critical shelter, APPO positions and Wildlife management positions

What the 2017 Data Tells Us About Dog Bites

January – October 2017 Return Outcome Data (10 months)

	Total #	%
Dog adoptions	819	
Returned for nips and minor bites	17	2%
Returned bites and euthanized	7	<1%

What the Data Tells Us About Positive Release

January - September 2017 Live Release Rates

	Overall (dogs, cats, other)	Dogs	Cats	Other
Asilomar*	94.8%	94.4%	93.8%	97.0%
Raw**	91.8%	91.4%	90.4%	94.6%

^{*} For the purposes of Asilomar Accords data collection, the Fairfax County Animal Shelter subtracts owner requested euthanasia from total euthanasia.

^{*} Raw percentages are live outcomes divided by total outcomes.

Moving Forward

- Continued analysis and improvement of dog evaluations
- Development of Animal Behavior and Enrichment specialist position
- Development of staff expertise in animal handling
- Continuous evaluation of facility and animal handling safety
- Continued development of effective working relationship between APPO and DAS staff.
