Background of 2004-2007 NL Activity

- June 2004: Staff directed to develop plan and guidelines for "Aggressive and widespread use" of natural landscaping on County properties DPWES, UFMD assigned as lead
- July 2005: Interagency Natural Landscaping Group formed
- October 2007: Interagency Natural Landscaping Committee Presented to BOSEC
 - 1. Natural Landscaping Guidelines
 - a) Fairfax County Natural Landscaping Manual See Exhibit 2
 - b) Natural Landscaping Implementation Plan See Exhibit 3
 - 2. Draft Policy Plan Amendment
 - a) Draft Policy Plan Text See Exhibit 5

Background of 2005-2007 NL Activity

Charter Interagency Group - County, Regional & State Agencies

Interagency group developed activities included in the Implementation Plan. A summary of the plan is included as Exhibit 4.

- Develop guidelines for retrofitting existing County facilities
- Develop guidelines and specifications for new facilities
- Draft a Countywide Natural Landscaping Policy
- Natural Landscaping on County properties CIP/Stormwater Management
- Natural Landscaping retrofits on existing County properties
- Develop public educational materials
- Form a team of experts to ensure incorporation of natural landscaping practices

- Defines Natural Landscaping
- Conveys purpose, goals, and importance of natural landscaping
- Provides checklists to help facilitate planning and design
- Is adaptable for retrofitting existing facilities and designing new facilities



Natural Landscaping Implementation Plan – See Exhibit 3


- Establishes operational guidelines and identifies major elements to accomplish goals
- Specifies clear lines of communication for identifying, planning, and funding projects
- Ensures projects are monitored for success

 - Collecting quantitative data for annual reports

Natural Landscape Next Steps

- 1. BOSEC endorsement for BOS to Authorize a Comprehensive Plan Amendment to the Policy Plan.
- 2. BOSEC endorsement of budget approach: During the budget development process, staff should identify cost-effective natural landscaping retrofit projects that support the county's Natural Landscape Implementation Plan. Additional funds shall be included in the county's Environmental Improvement Program (Environmental Initiatives) that would be earmarked to support the Natural Landscape projects.
- 3. BOSEC endorsement for County Executive to form a core team of professional staff coordinated by UFMD under Community of Practice detailed in the Tree Action Plan 2.0 to include staff from FMD, DPWES, the Park Authority and NVSWCD. They will promote and provide review of natural landscaping and related practices and opportunities.
