2008 – 2018: Ten Year Plan

Overview of the strategies, successes, and challenges in the execution of the "Blueprint for Success" and "Implementation Plan" to prevent and end homelessness.

Strategies from 10-Year Plan

- 1. Prevent homelessness due to economic crisis and/or disability.
- 2. Preserve and increase the supply of affordable housing to prevent or remedy homelessness.
- 3. Deliver appropriate support services to obtain and maintain stable housing.
- 4. Create a management system for plan implementation with the collaboration of the public and private sectors that ensures adequate financial resources and accountability.

10-Year Plan Retrospective

• Successes

- 46 percent reduction in homelessness.
- More effective, efficient homeless services.

Challenges

- Demand for temporary shelter and permanent housing programs consistently exceed capacity.
- Racial disparities in homelessness.
- Community understanding about causes of homelessness.



2019 – 2022: Current Era

Overview of latest trends in annual Point-in-Time count results, lessons from the COVID-19 pandemic, evidenced based best practices, and Countywide Strategic Plan homelessness metrics.

OPEH Merger with HCD


- One department, a continuum of housing needs
- Early Benefits
 - Retooling Bridging Affordability
 - Broader staff expertise to support the development of new permanent supportive housing
 - Emergency Housing Vouchers

Lessons from COVID-19 Pandemic

• QPID shelters were response to a <u>health crisis</u>, not homelessness.

Successes

- Rapid isolation and quarantine.
- Protect individuals at high risk of serious illness.
- Decompress shelters to mitigate spread of virus.
- Over 700 people housed from the hotels.
- Challenges
 - Increases in temporary shelter increases homelessness.
 - Insufficient affordable, permanent housing for guests.



Evidenced-Based Best Practices

- Housing First
- Built for Zero
- Permanent housing with support services:
 - Permanent supportive housing
 - Rapid rehousing

Countywide Strategic Plan

- **Community Outcome Area:** *Housing & Neighborhood Livability*
- Indicator of Success: Preventing and Ending Homelessness
- Strategies:
 - HNL 14. Expand the availability of <u>permanent supportive</u> <u>housing</u> units and services for people experiencing homelessness, including both individuals and families.
 - HNL 15. Provide incentives so that nonprofit and for-profit housing developers and landlords will <u>set aside units</u> for people experiencing homelessness.

Moving Forward

- Planning for Zero: Ending Homelessness in Fairfax County
 - Seek community input on updating existing strategies
 - Community forums, surveys
 - Process to update performance metrics
- Governance
 - Evaluate current structure and make recommendations

Moving Forward

Operations

- Conduct operational assessment of the effectiveness of county and private homeless services
- Analyze hotel usage
- Longer Term Solutions
 - Find locations for permanent supportive housing
 - Review zoning requirements
 - Identify new or under-utilized options

Moving Forward

- Create more capacity in emergency shelters and reduce the population of various encampments
- Share findings and recommendations at Nov. 22, 2022, Housing Committee
