



 - Climate Projections Report
 - $\,\circ\,$ Temperatures, precipitation, flooding, storm severity, drought
- 2. Where are we vulnerable?
 - $\,\circ\,$ Climate Vulnerability and Risk Assessment
 - Homes, businesses, neighborhoods, infrastructure, services & operations, people in path of climate effects

3. How are we currently doing in terms of resilience?

- $\,\circ\,$ Audit of Existing Policies, Plans, and Programs
- $\,\circ\,$ Which programs are working well? Where do we have gaps?

4. Which strategies will strengthen our resilience?

- Adaptation and Resilience Strategies
- Physical upgrades, policies, design standards, services, staffing, procedural changes, agency coordination, etc.

5. What is the path to implementation?

- Implementation Roadmap




Alignment at multiple levels

- ✓ Funding coordination and opportunities




Resilient Fairfax Planning Timeline

- May June: Carryover funding proposals
- June July: Meetings with Planning Team (PT), Infrastructure Advisory Group (IAG), Community Advisory Group (CAG) about comments received and final edits
- July 26: Update #4 to BOSEC
- August: Final revisions and ADA compliance
- Sept 27: Presentation of final draft to BOSEC
- Fall 2022: Presentation of final plan to BOS
