
## IAP.1a: Comprehensive Plan Updates for Resilience


#### **Progress Updates**

- ✓ Board Authorization of Comprehensive Plan Amendment to Environment Element of Policy Plan
- DPD and OEEC are working on early tasks for climate component of the larger amendment
  - Climate-related amendments scope, schedule, roles
  - Resilience and emissions reduction
  - Research of other jurisdictions' climate-related updates
  - Identification of potential sections and text in need of update
  - Plan for internal and external engagement

#### Funding and Resource Opportunities:

- Community
   Development Block
   Grant Mitigation
   (CDBG-MIT) Program
- General Fund (salaries)





#### **Resilience topic examples for CP:**

- Urban Heat Island effect

## IAP.3a: County Climate Fund

#### Progress Updates (Proposed Change in Approach)

- What the plan says: Resilient Fairfax recommended research and creation of a County Climate Fund for resilience action
- Why a change is proposed: The Green Bank in development is an intensive effort with a similar goal
  - o Green Bank code is currently limited to emissions reduction
  - Recommend requesting legislative change to allow the Green Bank to cover both climate mitigation and climate resilience projects, rather than creating a separate, similar entity
- Funding for Resilient Fairfax in the meantime
  - Using existing staff capacity, salaries built into budget
  - Pursuing grants
  - Some funding requested in the County Budget process for Resilient Fairfax implementation; limited to outreach, and shared with CECAP outreach





## IAP.3b: Pursue Federal and State Funding Opportunities for Resilience

**Implementation Actions Progress Bar**

- ✓ Consolidated database of funding opportunities, shared with all relevant departments
- ✓ DPWES recently won 4 Community Flood Preparedness Fund grants for flood risk reduction (\$15.7 million)
- Unprecedented levels of federal funding available currently
- Grant tracking and staffing coordination across agencies to enable the county to seize current opportunities
- Pursuing EPA EJG2G Grant for possible Resilience Hub w/ FACS


- ✓ Staff from **20+ agencies** represented, continued from RF planning
- ✓ Metrics and tracking system across agencies
- ✓ **Climate Interagency Team** Microsoft system for coordination
- ✓ Departments organized into Implementation Groups
  - Group 1 All Agencies
  - Group 2 Development Codes, Policies, and Plans
  - Group 3 Community Services, Education, Engagement, Incentives
  - Group 4 Natural Resources
  - Group 5 Facilities and Operations
  - Group 6 Data and Research
- March 3<sup>rd</sup> "All Hands" Meeting; sub-groups already meeting
- Breaking siloes, improving interagency coordination on overlapping initiatives, policy and plan updates, reporting, grants




## CRC.1a: Adaptation Action Areas (AAAs) where Resilience is Prioritized

- ✓ OEEC, GIS, and One Fairfax staff are refining the AAA data and maps
- Interagency effort to decide the best way to use AAAs in Fairfax
  - Zoning Overlay? Higher design standards? CIP prioritization?
     Funding distribution? Incentives? Aid?








## CRC.1b: Pursue Development of Resilience Hubs

**Implementation Actions Progress Bar**

#### **Progress Updates and Proposed Change in Approach**

- ✓ Identification of areas of the county in greatest need of hubs
- ✓ Research & definition of "Resilience Hubs" in Fairfax context
- ✓ Resilient Fairfax plan recommends detailed inventory/ evaluation of many potential hub sites <u>before</u> pursuing one pilot
- An opportunity has arisen for a pilot Resilience Hub now
  - Requesting BOS approval to pursue EJG2G grant
  - Partnership with county agencies, non-profits, others
  - Grant application due April 10<sup>th</sup>
- The vision for the Resilience Hub pilot :
  - A trusted place for community resilience before, during, and after severe weather events
  - Solar & battery back-up in case of power outages, environmental site rehabilitation, green infrastructure
  - Interagency training on flood risk reduction, emergency preparedness, heat risk reduction, environmental health, financial resilience, climate
  - Access to critical services and basic needs





## Strategy CRC.3a: Implement the Flood Risk Reduction Plan for Fairfax County

#### **Progress Updates**

- Big picture purpose: reducing flood risk through:
  - 1. Physical projects constructed by the county
    - o DPWES manages dozens of <u>Stormwater Improvement Projects</u>
    - Resilient Fairfax implementation → updates how/where projects are prioritized (AAAs, CIP updates)

#### 2. Development/ design standards

- Interagency team led by LDS and DPWES for analysis of flood risk areas, design standards, flooding level of service, and options
- Task Order with Consultant for study is ongoing
- Climate change included, using Resilient Fairfax data
- DPWES/LDS update to the Board scheduled for April 25<sup>th</sup>

#### 3. Community outreach and education

- DPWES and NVSWCD currently provide outreach and education
- Resilient Fairfax: boost education, interagency collaboration








## Climate Resilience Services (CRC 2a), Guidance and Education (CRC 2b)

- ✓ Resilience Dashboard links to resilience-related services (from DPWES, DEMS, DFS, OEEC, NVSWCD, NCS) in one place
- Creating a Climate Checklist for residents (both resilience and emissions reduction)
- Interagency collaboration on community education and guidance
- Interagency collaboration on expanding access to services
- Resilience Hub pilot at Rising Hope → opportunity for pilot training program
