BOARD MATTERS**1. ANNOUNCEMENT REGARDING INCREASED POLICE PRESENCE**
(9:34 a.m.)

Chairman McKay announced that, given the County's proximity to the Nation's Capital, the Fairfax County Police Department (FCPD) is in regular communication with surrounding law enforcement agencies to include federal law enforcement. These lines of communication are meant to ensure the region and resident safety. With recent U.S. Military strikes in the Middle East, the FCPD will increase police presence in certain locations to include religious institutions and known public gatherings. This is being done out of an abundance of caution, as there are no known threats to the County at this time.

Chairman McKay thanked the Chief and leadership of the FCPD for their proactive approach to this matter to ensure that everyone understands that public safety is number one, especially in these challenges time.

2. MOMENT OF SILENCE (9:35 a.m.)

The Board asked everyone to keep in thoughts the family and friends of:

- Two Minnesota State Legislators and their spouses who were the victims of a recent assassination and attempted assassination. Senator John Hoffman and his wife Yvette suffered multiple gunshot wounds, and after undergoing surgery are currently recovering. Unfortunately, Speaker of the Minnesota House Melissa Hortman and her husband Mark did not survive the attack. These hit close to the Board, as elected officials, and are appalling and unacceptable in a nation where political differences do not make us enemies, but participants in our efforts to form a more perfect union
- Conrad Egan, who passed away recently. He was the former Fairfax County Redevelopment and Housing Authority (FCRHA) Chairman, serving for decades in numerous leadership positions and making a lasting impact on Fairfax County's affordable housing. The FCRHA named its Employee Award's Program in honor of Mr. Egan

14. **PROCLAMATION REQUEST TO DESIGNATE SEPTEMBER 2025 AS “WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT MONTH” IN FAIRFAX COUNTY**
(11:23 a.m.)

Chairman McKay stated that this year, the importance of workforce development is more urgent than ever. As the County faces the potential consequences of

proposed budget cuts and workforce reductions at the federal level — particularly under the current Trump administration — the County must reaffirm its commitment to supporting the thousands of workers and families who may be impacted.

The National Association of Workforce Development Professionals (NAWDP) has long championed policies and practices that build resilient, future-ready communities. Locally, workforce development partners are helping residents reskill, upskill, and pivot into in-demand sectors — whether they are recent graduates, career changers, or long-serving public employees who may now face uncertainty due to federal restructuring and downsizing.

These services are a critical safety net and launchpad. As federal workforce stability becomes less certain, local and regional programs will be the first line of support — providing career coaching, training opportunities, and job placement resources that can help constituents navigate a rapidly shifting employment landscape.

Therefore, jointly with Supervisor Jimenez and Supervisor Storck, Chairman McKay moved that the Board:

- Proclaim September 2025 as “*Workforce Development Month*” in the County
- Direct the Office of Public Affairs to prepare a Proclamation designating September 2025 as “*Workforce Development Month*” in the County, in recognition of the vital work of the workforce development professionals and the organizations that support career advancement and economic resilience
- Direct the Department of Family Services, Division of Employment and Training, to invite the Board for a site visit in the Fall and to provide regular updates on services and ongoing support in the changing economy

Vice-Chairman Smith seconded the motion. Following a brief discussion regarding the motion, the question was called on the motion and it carried by unanimous vote.

15. **UPDATED REVENUE ANALYSIS STUDY** (11:26 a.m.)

Chairman McKay stated that the County has long been a major economic engine for the Commonwealth of Virginia, consistently contributing a substantial share of State revenues through income taxes, sales taxes, and other sources. However, previous balance of payments analyses have revealed a persistent and significant disparity between the County’s contributions to the State and the level of funding and resources it receives in return. This imbalance raises important questions about fiscal equity and the allocation of State resources to localities.

As the County continues to navigate an uncertain economic climate — with evolving revenue trends, inflationary pressures, and growing demands for essential services — it is more important than ever that County fiscal policy decisions be grounded in accurate, up-to-date data. A refreshed and comprehensive revenue and return analysis will help ensure transparency and fairness, support effective advocacy for the County’s needs, and inform future budget planning at both the State and local levels. The most recent study, conducted in partnership with the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission, dates back to 2001.

Given these circumstances, it is both timely and necessary to revisit this issue using current fiscal data and a thorough methodology that accounts for both direct and indirect state support. This will position the County to engage constructively with State partners and better serve its residents, as well as inform future budgeting efforts and legislative priorities to be included in the legislative package annually.

Therefore, jointly with Supervisor Storck, Chairman McKay moved that the Board direct the County Executive to collaborate with economic experts to produce an updated revenue and return analysis. The results should be presented to the Board at a Budget Committee meeting in the Fall of 2025. This analysis should include a detailed revenue breakdown for the County as well as comparisons with neighboring jurisdictions. Vice-Chairman Smith seconded the motion. Following discussion regarding the motion, the question was called on the motion and it carried by unanimous vote.

Vice-Chairman Smith returned the gavel to Chairman McKay.

16. **ENDORSEMENT OF FISCAL YEAR (FY) 2026-2027 ZONING ORDINANCE WORK PROGRAM** (11:32 a.m.)

Supervisor Smith stated that at the Board’s June 17, 2025, Land Use Policy Committee meeting, Leslie Johnson, Zoning Administrator, presented the proposed FY 2026 - 2027 Zoning Ordinance Work Program, which represents an updated two-year work program cycle. The proposed FY 2026-2027 Work Program has 14 topics with 25 individual items, including both new and carryover items. It is anticipated that many of the items currently under review will be completed over the next year. Some of the new items include a review of the standards for home day care facilities, the definition of building height, permissions for accessory structures, and a review of permissions and use standards for certain commercial and industrial uses. Ms. Johnson highlighted the accomplishments in FY 2025. She noted that 55 percent of the 20 items on the Work Program were completed with either the adoption of an amendment, publication of a report or moved to priority two as a placeholder for future topics. Completion of major topic areas included new rates for Accessible Parking, expanded permissions and standards for Contractors Offices and Shops, updates to the PDH and PDC District use standards for secondary uses and other changes (which the Board will hear about this afternoon), and a more streamlined process for permitting special events. Reports to the Board relating to electronic display signs and murals were also completed.

Ms. Johnson also highlighted the significant progress that has been made on substations, battery energy storage, manufactured housing and PRC Plan Exceptions and that the Board should see authorizations for these amendments later this year. The Work Program also includes a priority two list, which is focused on updates to the Zoning Ordinance that will continue to reflect current and future trends and priorities of the Board and community.

Therefore, Supervisor Smith moved that the Board endorse the FY 2026 - 2027 Zoning Ordinance Work Program, as presented in the Memorandum to the Board dated June 9, 2025. Supervisor Smith stated her understanding that the FY 2026-2027 Work Program will be posted on the Department of Planning and Development's webpage and circulated by GovDelivery Announcement. The motion was multiply seconded and carried by a vote of nine, Supervisor Herrity being out of the room.

17. **INTRODUCTION OF SUMMER INTERN IN THE BRADDOCK DISTRICT SUPERVISOR'S OFFICE** (11:35 a.m.)

Supervisor Walkinshaw introduced Soren Trimble, a new summer intern in his office. On behalf of the Board, he warmly welcomed her to the Board Auditorium.

18. **ANNANDALE COMMUNITY CENTER OPENS AS A COOLING CENTER (BRADDOCK DISTRICT)** (11:36 a.m.)

Supervisor Walkinshaw announced that the Annadale Community Center was recently opened as a cooling center for people without air conditioning. He thanked everyone for their work in opening the center for the community.

19. **NO BOARD MATTERS FOR SUPERVISOR BIERMAN (DRANESVILLE DISTRICT)** (11:37 a.m.)

Supervisor Bierman announced that he had no Board Matters to present today.

20. **KIDS' CONCERTS ON THE GREEN SERIES (FRANCONIA DISTRICT)** (11:37 a.m.)

Supervisor Lusk stated that at the May 13, 2025, Board Meeting, he made a motion to request that the Office of Public Affairs advertise the "Kids' Concerts on the Green" series at Springfield Overlook atop the Springfield CBC Commuter Garage. Supervisor Lusk stated that he is pleased to announce that the two performances on June 14 and 21, 2025, were attended by over 300 children and families. On June 14, 2025, Munit and Z Lovebugs entertained the audience with music from around the world and provided instruments for children to play along. On June 21, 2025, Rocknoceros brought the audience to their feet to dance, regardless of the heat that day.

Supervisor Lusk expressed his appreciation for the Fairfax County Park Authority for its partnership, and the Office of Public Affairs for its help in advertising the events. The concert series demonstrated one potential use of the Springfield Overlook space, which can be rented out through the Park Authority for meetings, events, and celebrations. Supervisor Lusk stated that he looks forward to seeing the creative ways in which the space is used in the future.

21. **13TH STUDENT-BUILT HOME IN SPRING VILLAGE ESTATES (FRANCONIA DISTRICT)** (11:39 a.m.)

Supervisor Lusk stated that he is excited to announce the completion of the 13th student-built home in Spring Village Estates. The five bed, four bath, 5,000 square foot home at 7430 Foundation Way in Springfield was built in partnership between the Foundation for Applied Technical Education (FATE), Fairfax County Public Schools (FCPS), and local contractors. Located in the Springfield area of the Franconia District, the Spring Village Estates Residential Construction Site is a unique, community-based, construction technologies program in the County. The program is available through Edison Academy for up to 20 students.

FATE and FCPS are providing a unique opportunity for students to apply classroom building trades instruction through their actual construction of a single-family home. Students develop skills in concrete installation, framing, tile, electrical, plumbing, heating, ventilation, air-conditioning, and other areas of home building. Participants also earn industry credentials to use after graduation. The home located at 7430 Foundation Way is being listed for \$1.35 million. Supervisor Lusk encouraged the Board to visit the Spring Village Estates community to see the impressive work being done by County students.

Supervisor Lusk introduced Zuyemi Cortez-Cardenas, a new summer intern in his office. On behalf of the Board, he warmly welcomed her to the Board Auditorium.

23. **ADDITIONAL DISCUSSION REGARDING THE FOUNDATION FOR APPLIED TECHNICAL EDUCATION (FATE) PROGRAM** (11:43 a.m.)

(NOTE: Earlier in the meeting, Supervisor Lusk presented a Board Matter pertaining to this program. See Clerk's Summary Item #_.)

Following comments regarding the FATE Program, Chairman McKay expressed appreciation to the press for its coverage and encouraged his colleagues to visit the site and think about sites in their respective Districts where it could be replicated.

24. **UPDATES FROM SJ28 MEETING** (11:45 a.m.)

Supervisor Alcorn stated that he serves on a State Subcommittee on public transit funding, SJ28, and at a recent meeting discussions were held regarding public transit funding and ways to modernize the rail system.

Supervisor Alcorn recognized the presence of Noelle Dominguez, staff, Department of Transportation, and noted that she was also in attendance of the meeting and asked that she provide the Board with the information and handouts from the meeting.

Chairman McKay shared that the meetings are open to the Board and public to attend.

25. **AMERICAN PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION ASSOCIATION'S (APTA) 2025 PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION AWARDS** (11:48 a.m.)

Supervisor Alcorn announced that the APTA recently awarded the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority with two awards:

- The Outstanding Partnership in Public Transportation; Kimley-Horn and Foursquare Integrated Transportation Planning
- The Outstanding Public Transportation System

26. **NO BOARD MATTERS FOR SUPERVISOR JIMENEZ (MASON DISTRICT)** (11:48 a.m.)

Supervisor Jimenez announced that he had no Board Matters to present today.

27. **COUNTY COMMENTS TO THE I-495 SOUTHSIDE EXPRESS LANES (SEL) STUDY PREFERRED ALTERNATIVE AND PUBLIC HEARINGS** (11:49 a.m.)

Supervisor Storck stated that in early 2022, the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) initiated the I-495 Southside Express Lanes (SEL) Study to evaluate the remaining segment of I-495 in Virginia without express lanes and to identify alternatives for improving traffic operations and multimodal connectivity between the Springfield Interchange and the MD 210 Interchange in Prince George's County, Maryland.

VDOT has developed and analyzed a range of alternatives and identified a preferred alternative in the most recent reports. VDOT has held four public information meetings this past April and four public hearings in June to present the preferred alternative and gather public feedback. VDOT has set a deadline of June 26, 2025, for comments on the preferred alternative.

The County appreciates VDOT's efforts to select a preferred alternative to improve system continuity and travel reliability along this critical segment of the Capital Beltway. It remains a top priority to the County that any proposed alternative provides multimodal travel choices for local and regional commuters, while minimizing adverse impacts to surrounding communities. However, based on the analyses seen to date, the County believes that further analysis of traffic and environmental impacts associated with the preferred alternative is essential to more fully understand its implications.

County key concerns include traffic congestion at major interchanges, potential impacts to the local transportation network, integration of transit options, continuity and safety of bicycle and pedestrian trail connections and potential environmental impacts. These issues have significant implications for both the local community and the broader region.

Therefore, jointly with Chairman McKay and Supervisor Lusk, Supervisor Storck moved that the Board authorize the Chairman to sign and transmit the letter, attached to his written Board Matter, to Virginia Secretary of Transportation, Sheppard Miller III, which outlines the County's comments on the I-495 SEL study's preferred alternative. Chairman McKay seconded the motion.

Following discussion regarding equity and ongoing County concerns, the question was called on the motion and it carried by unanimous vote.

28. **PROCLAMATION REQUEST TO DESIGNATE AUGUST 2, 2025, AS "COLONEL FRANK COHN DAY" IN FAIRFAX COUNTY** (12:01 p.m.)

Supervisor Storck stated that in 1938, just 10 days before Kristallnacht (also known as the Night of Broken Glass), Colonel Frank Cohn and his family escaped Nazi persecution. Their arrival in New York, followed by an Executive Order from President Roosevelt protecting in-country refugees, saved their lives and marked the beginning of an extraordinary American story.

Colonel Frank Cohn, who will celebrate his 100th birthday on August 2, 2025, is a Holocaust survivor, World War II veteran and longtime community leader. Drafted into the U.S. Army at age 18, Colonel Cohn became a U.S. citizen during basic training and was soon deployed to Europe, where he served as an intelligence agent during the Battle of the Bulge and throughout the European campaign, participating in the liberation of six key German cities. After active duty, he remained in the military, ultimately serving for 35 years and retiring as a Colonel.

Following retirement, Colonel Cohn worked for the University of Maryland for 14 years and served in several civic positions, such as Co-Chair of the Mount Vernon Council of Citizens' Associations and as Transportation Commissioner for the Mount Vernon District. Today, he continues to share his powerful story as a member of the Speakers Bureau for the

U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum, talking about his escape, his service in World War II and how he keeps faith with the motto: “Never Again.”

Therefore, jointly with Chairman McKay and Supervisor Herrity, Supervisor Storck asked unanimous consent that the Board direct staff to prepare a Proclamation designating August 2, 2025, as “*Colonel Frank Cohn Day*” in the County, to be presented out of the Board Room on August 2, 2025, in recognition of Colonel Cohn’s century of life, service and unwavering dedication to the country and community. Without objection, it was so ordered.

29. **RECOGNITION OF THE REOPENING OF THE MOUNT VERNON REC CENTER** (12:02 p.m.)

Supervisor Storck stated that on June 9, 2025, he and Team Mount Vernon District were thrilled to welcome the community back to the Mount Vernon Rec Center! From kids playing and squealing with delight, exercisers working out, and figure skaters gliding on the ice, it was a joy to behold.

Supervisor Storck recognized and thanked the Fairfax County Park Authority (FCPA) for its extraordinary efforts in the redevelopment and phased reopening of the Mount Vernon Rec Center. After more than four decades of service to the community, this facility has been under major reconstruction for the past two years and has now reopened as a modern, state-of-the-art wellness hub, featuring expanded amenities which will include two National Hockey League - sized ice rinks, a two-story fitness center, dedicated group fitness studios, multipurpose spaces, a renovated pool, an indoor track and the County’s first-ever indoor climbing wall. This new prominent landmark, with a dramatically enhanced entrance, exterior façade and lighting, health, fitness and fun, is unparalleled in the County. The vision and execution behind this \$74 million investment reflect FCPA’s commitment to delivering high-quality recreational opportunities for all residents.

While the reopening has followed a phased timeline, and certain amenities such as the pool will open later this summer, it is important to emphasize that these adjustments are not due to any shortcomings of the Park Authority. Rather, they reflect the complexities and scale of transforming a beloved community center into a best-in-class facility. The Park Authority’s steadfast leadership, coordination and community-centered approach throughout this process deserve sincere appreciation. Supervisor Storck thanked the Mount Vernon Park Authority Board Representative Linwood Gorham, Jai Cole, Sara Baldwin, Aimee Vosper, Brendon Hanafin, Andrew Miller and Sands Smith for all their efforts on this. Supervisor Storck also thanked the Department of Public Works and Environmental Services Capital Projects and Construction Team for their planning and development work throughout the project. Supervisor Storck stated that he looks forward to the rest of the amenities opening throughout the summer and a community Grand Opening Celebration in August and asked the Board to join him in commending the FCPA, and all partners involved in this remarkable project.

30. **APPROVAL OF THE PERFORMANCE AUDITOR TO THE BOARD'S FISCAL YEAR (FY) 2026 STUDY PLAN** (12:06 p.m.)

Supervisor Storck stated that at the June 17, 2025, Audit Committee meeting, the Performance Auditor to the Board's FY 2026 Study Plan was received. The Committee reviewed and recommends moving forward with the following studies:

First Quarter:

- Funding Reimbursement Study Series: Northern Virginia Transportation Authority (Commenced in Quarter Four FY 2025; Complete in Quarter One FY 2025)
- Recovered Costs Follow-up Study: Department of Family Services

Second Quarter:

- Fairfax Active Transportation Projects Study

Fourth Quarter:

- Evaluating the Timeliness and Efficiency of the Restaurant Permitting Process (Commence, Complete in Quarter One FY 2026)

Supervisor Storck stated that the Auditor to the Board has also recommended four alternative studies that could be done if time and resources allow or if a planned study is not possible. these include a study of the CSP phone line and its role and effectiveness in serving County residents, Fairfax County Short-Term Lodging Compliance Study, Surveying the Survey Tools: An Assessment of How Survey Data is Collected and Used, and Evaluating the Timeliness and Efficiency of the Residential Permitting Process.

Following comments, with Supervisor Bierman thanking staff for their work on the Study Plan, the question was called on the motion and it carried by a vote of nine, Chairman McKay being out of the room.

32. **INTRODUCTION OF SUMMER INTERN IN THE PROVIDENCE DISTRICT SUPERVISOR'S OFFICE** (12:12 p.m.)

Supervisor Palchik introduced Olivia Logan, a new summer intern in her office. On behalf of the Board, she warmly welcomed her to the Board Auditorium.

33. **REQUEST FOR CONCURRENT PROCESSING FOR FLINT HILL 3 (PROVIDENCE DISTRICT)** (12:12 p.m.)

Supervisor Palchik stated that Flint Hill Propco LLC has filed a Rezoning Application for Tax Map Parcel 047-2 01 0046D. This application, Rezoning Application/Final Development Plan Application RZ/FDP-2024-PR-00008, and Proffered Condition Amendment Application PCA-78-P-137-06, also known as Flint Hill 3, is currently being reviewed by staff and the community, and all significant issues have been largely resolved. In addition, this is the third of separate but adjacent rezonings that will transform the aging Flint Hill office complex. The previous two, Rezoning Application RZ 2023-PR-00010 (Redwood) and Rezoning Application RZ 2020-PR-00015 (Flint Hill A & A), were approved by the Board earlier this year on February 18, 2025. These requests for concurrent process and expedited Board date will better align all these rezonings into a single coordinated vision for the community.

The applicant is requesting to expedite the scheduling of the Board public hearing for the rezoning, and to permit concurrent review of the site plan, at its own risk,

during the review of the rezoning to allow the project to move forward to align with the other rezonings in the land unit.

Therefore, Supervisor Palchik moved that the Board direct staff to:

- Expedite the scheduling of the Board public hearing for Rezoning Application RZ-2024-PR-00008, Final Development Plan Application FDP-2024-PR-00008, and Proffer Condition Amendment Application PCA-78-P-137-06 to the earliest possible date
- Concurrently and simultaneously process any associated site plans

This motion should not be construed as a favorable recommendation by the Board on the pending application and does not relieve the applicant from compliance with the provisions of all applicable ordinances, regulations, or adopted standards

Chairman McKay seconded the motion and it carried by unanimous vote.

34. **PROCLAMATION REQUEST FOR THE NATIONAL ALLIANCE ON MENTAL ILLNESS (NAMI) NORTHERN VIRGINIA** (12:15 p.m.)

Supervisor Palchik stated that it is with great pride and enthusiasm that she recognizes NAMI Northern Virginia for being named the 2025 Outstanding Affiliate of the Year by the NAMI at its annual national convention. This prestigious distinction is the highest honor a local affiliate can receive and was awarded from among over 700 affiliates across the country.

For over 47 years, NAMI Northern Virginia has provided free education, peer support groups, and outreach services for individuals and families affected by mental illness. This national recognition highlights their unwavering commitment to serving the region's diverse communities and ensuring equitable access to culturally responsive mental health support. It also reflects the dedication of their staff, volunteers, and community partners who work collaboratively to strengthen the local mental health system.

Therefore, jointly with Chairman McKay, Supervisor Lusk, and Supervisor Smith, Supervisor Palchik asked unanimous consent that the Board direct staff to prepare a Proclamation for NAMI Northern Virginia, in recognition of its outstanding achievement. Without objection, it was so ordered.

35. **PROMOTION REQUEST FOR THE WASHINGTON METROPOLITAN AREA TRANSIT AUTHORITY (WMATA) BETTER BUS NETWORK LAUNCH EVENT** (12:17 p.m.)

Supervisor Palchik stated that she is excited to share that the Providence District will host a community event in celebration of the WMATA Better Bus Network

launch on Monday, June 30, 2025, from 8 – 11 a.m. at the Vienna/Fairfax-GMU Metro Station. This new network redesign is the first major overhaul of Metrobus service in over 50 years and presents a unique opportunity to improve service, expand access, and better connect the communities.

This event will help raise awareness about the new routes coming to the region and offer resources to help residents navigate these changes. WMATA staff will be there to answer questions and distribute printed route maps. The team will also provide a step-by-step guide for downloading and using the mobile SmarTrip app to make the transition as smooth as possible.

The event will have music, giveaways, snacks, and more to celebrate and encourage folks to get out of their cars and onto the buses! Supervisor Palchik expressed her hope that the community will attend the event and learn more about how the Better Bus Network will benefit all travel needs.

Therefore, Supervisor Palchik asked unanimous consent that the Board direct the Office of Public Affairs to promote the event through the County's communication channels. Supervisor Palchik invited the Board to attend the event by welcoming this new chapter in transit for the County. Without objection, it was so ordered.

36. **PROCLAMATION REQUEST FOR JOSEPH HEASTIE** (12:18 p.m.)

(NOTE: Earlier in the meeting, Supervisor Palchik recognized the presence of Mr. Heastie in the Board Auditorium. See Clerk's Summary Item #_.)

Supervisor Palchik stated that after 20 years of dedicated service on the Commission on Aging, first appointed by the late Congressman Connolly in February 2005, Joseph Heastie is retiring. As the longest-serving commissioner, his steadfast commitment has left a lasting mark on the lives of older adults in the community. The County is deeply grateful for his thoughtful advocacy and unwavering dedication throughout the years.

Supervisor Palchik stated that she asked his colleagues, who had the pleasure of working with Mr. Heastie to share some thoughts, and Cathy Cole, Chair of the Commission on Aging, shared the following: *“What I have learned is that he came to this area in 1974 to begin work with the army doing newly evolving computer/coding type work. He was and is a very enlightened man and quickly recognized that women were not being hired to do this kind of work. If you all recall, women were considered suitable only for clerical work, certainly not work that was as complicated as computers. The Equal Rights Amendment had been recently passed by Congress in 1972, and the ERA was out to the states for ratification in 1974. Joe was active in encouraging women to apply for this work and helped them reword their resumes to show their qualifications.*

Much more recently, Joe was honored with the Mason Medal in 2019. At the time it was noted that very few had served in as many roles at the University – as student,

member of the Board of Visitors and Alumni Association Board president leading GMU efforts related to diversity and access.”

Tara Turner, Director of the Fairfax Area Agency on Aging, shared her gratitude: *“I want to extend my deepest gratitude for his many years of unwavering dedication to serving the older adults in our community. His work on the Commission on Aging and the guardianship panel has profoundly impacted countless lives, ensuring that our most vulnerable are protected and cared for. Throughout his time on the Commission on Aging, his advocacy and genuine compassion have made a real difference here in Fairfax County. Though he may seem quiet at times, he is mighty. He adds value every time he speaks up with his quiet, gentle, but powerful reminders. He has provided not just support and protection but also hope and dignity to those who need it most.”*

As Mr. Heastie retires from the Commission, the County expresses its heartfelt thanks for his incredible service, and the County is fortunate that he will continue to serve through his work on the Industrial Development Authority.

Therefore, Supervisor Palchik asked unanimous consent that the Board direct staff to prepare a Proclamation for Joseph Heastie, in recognition of his decades of service and advocacy for the community. Without objection, it was so ordered.
