BOARD MATTER1. **MOMENT OF SILENCE** (9:34 a.m.)

The Board asked everyone to keep in thoughts the family, friends, and/or colleagues of:

- Former Vice President Dick Cheney, who died recently. He was a longtime County resident; spent decades in public service, dating back to the Nixon and Ford administrations; multiple terms as a congressman from Wyoming; Secretary of Defense under former President George H.W. Bush; and Vice President for eight years under former President George W. Bush
- Toni Woods, who died recently. She was an Urban Forester with the County's Urban Forest Conservation Branch of Land Development Services who tragically lost her life, along with her husband, in a house fire in Herndon. Her passion for trees, nature, and the environment shaped her career and made a lasting impact on the County's environmental efforts; her work preserved countless trees and inspired colleagues across the region; she was known for her warmth, humor, and compassion, and will be deeply missed
- Former County Executive J. Hamilton Lambert, who died recently. He served as County Executive for 10 years. His career in the County began in 1959, and over the years, he held 22 different roles, working his way up from an entry-level position to County Executive. One of his greatest achievements was overseeing the development, funding, and completion of the Fairfax County Government Center. After retiring, he became involved with the Claude Moore Charitable Foundation, where he became the Executive Director and helped develop a program that has trained 35,000 young people in medical technologies across Virginia. His dedication to Fairfax County and the community made a lasting impact, and his legacy continues to shape the County today
- Mattie Palmore, who died recently. She lived a life of purpose and service; and dedicated many years to the County as a magistrate serving her community with wisdom, fairness, and compassion. Beyond her professional service, she was a passionate and tireless champion for survivors of domestic violence, organizing events, raising awareness, and offering encouragement to those rebuilding their lives. Her commitment to helping the vulnerable whether through domestic violence advocacy, supporting youth, or fighting poverty was a lifelong passion. Her loss leaves a significant void, especially in South County, where she was a beloved figure and advisor

- Rob Webster III, who died recently. He served Fairfax County for 14 years, making a significant impact in Providence District; was a Human Development Specialist V and member of the Region III Leadership Team; held various roles, including Assistant Director at Huntington and Gum Springs Community Centers, the South County Teens Center, and was the first Director of the Providence Community Center in 2016. He was passionate about supporting youth, started the Original Street Team in Region One, which promoted youth leadership through workforce development, service learning, and community building. He also led programs like the VIP Summer Program and Road Dog, and contributed to several County initiatives
- Filemon Pamorca Marmol, who died recently. He was a beloved member of the community and a longtime resident of the Providence District; and was the father of Jackie Marmol, Northern Virginia Regional Director for Senator Warner. After immigrating from the Philippines, he lived a life of hard work, generosity, and a love for cooking, especially his famous chicken adobo
- Bernadette Raymo, who died recently. She was a long-time resident of Mason Neck in the Mount Vernon District; known in the community for her passion for birds, gardening, boating, and her daily walks, she touched many lives with her humility and warmth; and leaves behind a legacy of kindness, generosity, and love

Jointly with Supervisor Herrity, Chairman McKay asked unanimous consent that the Board direct staff to prepare a Proclamation designating January 2026 as “*Human Trafficking Awareness Month*” in the County. Without objection, it was so ordered.

15. **FAIRFAX COUNTY POLICE DEPARTMENT (FCPD) SELECTED AS NATIONAL MODEL FOR USE OF FORCE REVIEW PRACTICES**
(12:25 p.m.)

Chairman McKay announced that FCPD was selected by the National Policing Institute (NPI) as the first Knowledge and Innovation (K&I) Site for the National Law Enforcement Knowledge Lab. This recognition highlights FCPD's commitment to advancing evidence-based practices in law enforcement, specifically in use of force review, analysis and accountability.

FCPD was selected as a K&I Site for its record of excellence in this core practice area. This designation as a K&I site highlights the County's innovative strategies in establishing these evidence-based practices.

NPI conducted an in-depth assessment of the FCPD that included a review of policies, interviews with personnel and participation in scenario-based forums. As part of the K&I site selection process, the results of this assessment were evaluated against research-based best practices, feedback from NPI subject-matter experts and discussions with NPI Fellows.

Through the National Law Enforcement Knowledge Lab, the FCPD will serve as a national model in the establishment of best practices of use of force that prioritize accountability, transparency and continuous improvement. The Department's review processes, which focus on officer training and commitment to community collaboration, will provide a blueprint for law enforcement agencies nationwide to follow.

Through its role as a K&I Site, FCPD will engage with other agencies to provide insights, resources and best practices, demonstrating how deliberate and transparent approaches to use of force can build trust and enhance safety for both officers and the communities they serve.

The National Law Enforcement Knowledge Lab's mission is to foster safer communities and more effective policing by spotlighting agencies that are leading the field in innovation and excellence.

Chairman McKay thanked FCPD for their hard work in achieving this award.

16. **CONCURRENT SITE PLAN PROCESSING REQUEST FOR THE WESTFIELDS BUSINESS PARK (SULLY DISTRICT)** (12:28 p.m.)

Supervisor Smith stated that pending applications, Rezoning/Final Development Plan Application RZ/FDP-2024-SU-0003 and Proffered Condition Amendment Application PCA-78-S-063-15, are requests to rezone approximately 8.1 acres of land in the Westfields Business Park to the PDH-16 District and to retain and rezone additional land area, approximately 9.47 acres, to the I-4 District to retain the

existing office use. The applicant has worked diligently with staff, and all issues have been resolved. The application is scheduled for public hearing before the Planning Commission on November 19, 2025. Given the absence of any significant concerns, Supervisor Smith moved that the Board authorize the concurrent site plan processing for the applications. As always, approval of these motions shall in no way prejudice or affect any ongoing staff review and should not be construed as support for the application by the Board. Chairman McKay seconded the motion and it carried by unanimous vote.

17. **NO BOARD MATTERS FOR THE BRADDOCK DISTRICT** (12:29 p.m.)

The Braddock District Supervisor's seat is currently vacant.

18. **NO BOARD MATTERS FOR SUPERVISOR BIERMAN (DRANESVILLE DISTRICT)** (12:29 p.m.)

Supervisor Bierman announced that he had no Board Matters to present today.

19. **FRANCONIA-SPRINGFIELD TRANSIT STATION AREA (TSA) AND THE SPRINGFIELD COMMUNITY BUSINESS CENTER (CBC) STUDY, SITE-SPECIFIC PLAN AMENDMENT (SSPA) 2023-IV-1S REVISIONS TO THE AUTHORIZATION (FRANCONIA DISTRICT)** (12:29 p.m.)

Supervisor Lusk stated that on April 11, 2023, the Board authorized consideration of a study for the Franconia-Springfield TSA and the Springfield CBC as part of the 2023 Comprehensive Plan Work Program. The study is currently underway with a visioning effort and associated community outreach.

Given the opportunity presented by the current study, Supervisor Lusk proposed that the Fleet Industrial Park (Tax Map Parcels 91-1 ((1)) 32A, 33, 34, 35, 36, 36B, 39, 47A, 47B, and 98), as shown on the map attached to his written Board Matter, be included in the study area and considered for incorporation into the TSA. The Industrial Park, located south of Fleet Drive, west of Beulah Street, and north of Walker Lane along Gravel Avenue, is adjacent to the TSA boundary. With the new Franconia-Springfield Inova Hospital under construction and the evolving land use patterns in the area, now is an appropriate time to reevaluate the long-term future of this area.

Therefore, Supervisor Lusk moved that the Board revise the Comprehensive Plan Amendment Work Program authorization for the Franconia-Springfield TSA and the Springfield CBC Study, SSPA 2023-IV-1S, to allow consideration of the Fleet Industrial Park as part of the study and for possible inclusion in the Franconia-Springfield TSA. This motion should not be construed as a favorable recommendation on these applications by the Board and does not relieve the applicant from compliance with the provisions of any applicable ordinances, regulations, or adopted standards. This action in no way prejudices the

substantive review of the applications. Chairman McKay seconded the motion and it carried by unanimous vote.

20. **CONCURRENT PROCESSING AND FEE WAIVER SPECIAL PERMIT FOR LIGHTHOUSE BAPTIST CHURCH (FRANCONIA DISTRICT)**
(12:32 p.m.)

Supervisor Lusk stated that on July 24, 2013, Special Permit Amendment Application SPA 2004-LE-053 was approved for Lighthouse Baptist Church located at 5901 Wilton Road for the proposed expanded vestibule addition to include Pastor's office and reception area with elevator.

Since that time, the Church has been working on processing its site plan and building plans. It took considerable time to resolve an issue with the Virginia Department of Transportation, which held up site plan approval. Unfortunately, the Special Permit Amendment expired in July, without the applicant requesting additional time. As a result, the church will need to apply for a new special permit, which is expected be identical to the previously approved Special Permit Amendment, the approval which formed the basis for the site and building plans. For these reasons, Supervisor Lusk stated his belief that there is good cause for the Board to waive the application fee for the new special permit application.

Therefore, jointly with Chairman McKay, Supervisor Lusk moved that the Board:

- Waive the application fee for the new special permit application
- Authorize staff to expeditiously process the application
- Direct Land Development Services to concurrently and simultaneously process the site and building plans during the review of the special permit application

This motion should not be construed as a favorable recommendation by the Board or the Board of Zoning Appeals on the proposed application and does not relieve the applicant from compliance with all applicable ordinances, regulations and adopted standards

Chairman McKay seconded the motion and it carried by unanimous vote.

21. **RESOLUTION OF RECOGNITION REQUEST FOR KEVIN AND CHRISTINE LIBERTY** (12:33 p.m.)

Supervisor Lusk recognized two dedicated members of the County's public safety family, Master Police Officer (MPO) Kevin Liberty and Police Citizen Aide (PCA) Christine Liberty, both of whom retired from the Fairfax County

Police Department, specifically from the Franconia District Police Station, this past Friday, November 14, 2025.

MPO Kevin Liberty served the County for 31 years, beginning with 10 years as a dispatcher before joining the Police Department as an officer. For the last 21 years, he was a steady and reliable presence on the Midnights Squad at the Franconia Station, providing calm professionalism and exceptional service to the community during the hours when it is needed the most.

PCA Christine Liberty served the County for 22 years, with four years as a Dispatcher and the remaining 18 years at the Franconia District Station. Her work as a PCA supported residents and officers alike, and she was an integral part of the Station's daily operations. The married couple both effectively retired together on November 14, 2025, marking the end of many years of shared commitment to the safety and well-being of County residents. This transition also marks an important moment for their family and for the Station and should be honored.

Therefore, Supervisor Lusk moved that the Board direct the County Executive to assign the appropriate staff to prepare a Resolution of Recognition in honor of the career service of MPO Kevin Liberty and PCA Christine Liberty. Chairman McKay and Supervisor Herry jointly seconded the motion and it carried by unanimous vote.

Supervisor Lusk announced that the Franconia District Food Drive for nonperishables will be held through November 30, 2025. Supervisor Alcorn summarized his written Board Matter which states: As winter approaches, there are many children who need warm winter coats. To help the smallest residents stay warm, the Hunter Mill District Supervisor's office is sponsoring a children's coat drive in partnership with Heritage Fellowship Church in Reston. The focus of the coat drive is on children since little ones outgrow their winter jackets so quickly, and there's always a need for more.

Supervisor Alcorn invited the community to donate new or gently used, clean winter coats for kids. Coats and jackets in all children's sizes are needed, from newborns to teens, but there is also a high demand for coats for elementary and middle school children. Accompanying donations of children's-sized plastic coat hangers, and reusable shopping bags and totes, that will be used to transport and distribute coats, are also being requested and collected.

Donations may be made through February 2026 and can be dropped off at the Hunter Mill District Supervisor's office, located at the North County Governmental Center, 1801 Cameron Glen Drive, Reston, on Wednesdays from 1 - 5 p.m., or by appointment.

While in the past residents have generously donated other winter clothing, such as sweaters, hats, scarves and gloves, those cannot be accepted due to space limitations.

28. **REVIEW OF HEIGHT-LOOMING STANDARDS TO BE ADDED TO THE ZONING ORDINANCE WORK PROGRAM** (12:46 p.m.)

Supervisor Herrity stated that he has seen in his District, and many others, redevelopments of residential lots that result in new homes or additions that loom over the adjacent property. This has been a point of concern for residential communities in the County for many years.

Many jurisdictions, including the City of Alamo Heights, Texas, have very clear ratio systems to address looming that considers the side setbacks for determining max height. During former Mount Vernon District Supervisor Hyland's tenure, the Board approved his motion to include a revision addressing building height but rejected the bulk plane changes as too complicated. However, problems persist, as shown in the photos attached to his written Board Matter. Now seems like an appropriate time to consider what additional changes can be made based on how the problem has been addressed in other jurisdictions.

Therefore, jointly with Supervisor Storck and Supervisor Smith, Supervisor Herrity moved that the Board direct the Ordinance Administration Section of the Department of Planning and Development to bring this topic to the Land Use Policy

Committee for further discussion and consideration during the next annual review of the Zoning Ordinance Work Program. Supervisor Smith seconded the motion.

Discussion ensued regarding:

- The current standards and recent construction
- Respect for property rights
- Defining building height
- Staff examining other possible ways to address the issue
- Balance needed for current homeowners and neighbors and neighborhood

The question was called on the motion and it carried by unanimous vote.

29. **MESSAGE ORDINANCE PUBLIC HEARING** (12:52 p.m.)

(NOTE: Earlier in the meeting, Chairman McKay presented a Board Matter on human trafficking. See Clerk's Summary Item #15.)

Supervisor Herrity stated that earlier there was a Board Matter presented requesting a Proclamation for "Human Trafficking Awareness Month." He announced that later this afternoon, the Board will be holding a public hearing related to massage establishments. He stated that human trafficking sometimes occurs within massage establishments and that tougher enforcement language will allow for better enforcement and will play a role in reducing human trafficking, which occurs with children and in schools too. He urged the community to call 9-1-1 if a person has information related to it occurring.

- The program includes a renewed focus on efficiency and communication, both with County residents and the State Delegation. These improvements help ensure priorities are clearly understood and that local needs are well-represented in Richmond and community voices remain strong

- Support for increased funding for transportation and transit infrastructure. This priority underscores the need to restore and expand regional and State transportation funding to support the road transit bicycle and pedestrian projects that are essential for mobility, safety, economic growth, and congestion reduction
- Emphasizing the need to strengthen State funding for K-12 public schools to close the gap between State education funding and actual needs, particularly in the areas of teacher pay, cost of living adjustments, and school operations
- Prioritizing affordable housing investment and preservation, including the creation of housing that is affordable for the entire community. This includes expanding State tools and increasing financial support to building and preserving affordable housing options, as well as strengthening the partnership necessary to help the County achieve its long-term housing goals
- The need to grow workforce development and local economic strength, such as investments in workforce pipelines that train and connect job seekers to in-demand careers, particularly in the trades: health care, education, childcare and behavioral health, in addition to renewed emphasis on local economy in the County, particularly around artificial intelligence. This priority is especially critical as Fairfax County continues to feel the impacts of federal level changes. The County is urging the State to provide the resources needed to help localities address these shifts, including support for workforce development efforts and for residents navigating staff and Medicaid changes, both of which will be significant issues this session
- The importance of advancing climate and environmental action. This includes continued progress towards coordinated climate goals, strengthening infrastructure resilience, improving stormwater management, expanding energy efficiency efforts, and reducing emissions. These actions are essential to ensuring an environmentally sustainable and equitable future for all County residents

Supervisor Jimenez noted that the last Legislative Committee meeting for the year will be December 2, 2025, to finalize the State Legislative Program in preparation for Board adoption on December 9, 2025. Lynne Strobel, Walsh, Colucci, Lubeley and Walsh, P.C., representative for the nominator for SSPA 2023-III-3FC, gave a brief presentation.

- Requirements for posting hours of operation

- Section 28.2-2-7(b) is changed to read:
 - (b) The permit holder must ensure that all employees complete any training specific to their job function, which has been mandated due to:
 1. A community health event; or
 2. Compliance issues arising from a complaint or inspection; or
 3. An emergent issue that may impact establishment, therapist and/or client health and safety.
- Section 28.2-3-1(c) is changed to read:
 - (c) Every massage establishment shall display, without obstruction in a conspicuous place and supplied and designed by the Department, notice stickers that inform the public that the massage establishment is subject to inspection by the Department. Such notice stickers shall be displayed at or near each public entrance.
- Direct staff to report to the Board in 18 months with data about the effect of these amendments
