Background

- NAACP contacted the Board in July 2022 about concerns for unsheltered residents in extreme heat.
- Workgroup was established in August 2022 to identify strategies to enhance the County's response.
- Memorandum with recommendations was sent to Board on March 9, 2023.
- Recommendations are being implemented this summer.

Extreme Heat Workgroup

- Composed of County staff, homeless services providers, faith community, and advocates.

- Additional County agencies participated on four committees, including CSB, FMD, DFS, OPA, Park Authority, DIT, and DOT.

Extreme Heat Workgroup

- Conducted a survey of unsheltered residents about their needs and how they handle extreme heat.
- Developed recommendations to enhance the County's response in four areas:
 - 1. Communications and outreach
 - 2. Transportation
 - 3. County infrastructure and response
 - 4. Supplies and distribution



Activation of Extreme Heat Response

 The Extreme Heat Response will be activated when the National Weather Service issues one of these alerts:


Heat Advisory: Issued when the heat index value is expected to reach 105 to 109 degrees within the next 12-24 hours.

Excessive Heat Watch: Issued when there is a potential for the heat index value to reach or exceed 110 degrees within next 24-48 hours.

Excessive Heat Warning: Issued when the heat index value is expected to reach or exceed 110 degrees within the next 12-24 hours. An Excessive Heat Warning may be issued for lower criteria if it is early in the season or during a multi-day heat wave.

Communications & Outreach Enhancements

- Developed a specific Fairfax Alerts group for homeless services providers and unsheltered residents to receive notifications of heat advisories, which will include a link to the County's Extreme Heat Resources webpage.
- Conducting a robust public outreach campaign to encourage unsheltered residents to sign up for Fairfax Alerts and inform them about cooling resources.
- Created posters and flyers (in 8 languages) highlighting cooling resources, which are being distributed at dropin sites and other locations that provide services to unsheltered residents.





Transportation Enhancements

 Free Fairfax Connector bus passes to get to a cooling center, drop-in center, or weather-related overflow shelter.

 Free pre-loaded TOPS cards are available to unsheltered residents who cannot use Connector bus so they can use other modes of transportation to get to a shelter or cooling center.








County Infrastructure and Response Enhancements

- All County facilities that are open to the public are available for residents to use for cooling.
- 47 facilities have been designated as cooling centers, including libraries, community centers, Rec Centers, and human services offices.
- Features of designated cooling centers:
 - Staff trained on how to provide a welcoming experience.
 - Set-aside space with seating.
 - Supplies, including water, sunscreen, insect repellant, and bus passes.

County Infrastructure and Response Enhancements



Supply and Distribution Enhancements

- Supplies requested from survey respondents have been purchased, including handheld fans, reusable/collapsible water bottles, sun hats, cooling towels, electrolyte drink powder packets, sunscreen, and insect repellant.
- Being distributed by outreach workers, as well as available at drop-in centers, shelters, and other locations that provide services to residents experiencing homelessness.
- Water, sunscreen, insect repellant, and bus passes will be available at the designated County cooling centers.

Next Steps

- Will track usage of designated cooling centers to identify areas of the County and/or types of facilities that there was higher usage.
- Survey unsheltered residents to determine if enhancements were effective.
- Debrief with County agencies and community partners in early fall.
- Report back to Board on results.
