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At a regular meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Fairfax County, Virginia, held in the Board Auditorium of the Government Center at Fairfax, Virginia, on Tuesday, December 3, 2013, at 9:36 a.m., there were present:

AGENDA ITEMS

1. <u>CERTIFICATE OF RECOGNITION PRESENTED TO MEMBERS OF THE WESTFIELD HIGH SCHOOL MARCHING BAND (SULLY DISTRICT)</u> (9:36 a.m.)

Supervisor Frey announced that the Westfield High School Marching Bulldogs was only the third Virginia band in history and the first from the County to be asked to participate in the Tournament of Roses Parade. He added that a brass quintet from the band played holiday music in the Forum prior to the beginning of the Board meeting.

Supervisor Frey moved approval of the Certificate of Recognition presented to members of the Westfield High School marching band for noteworthy musicianship, marching ability, uniqueness and adroitness to perform field show maneuvers while marching, resulting in an invitation to participate in the 2014 Tournament of Roses Parade in Pasadena, California, on January 1, 2014. Supervisor Hudgins seconded the motion.

Following a presentation by select members of the 275 member band, discussion ensued concerning the band's fundraising efforts.

The question was called on the motion and it carried by unanimous vote.

Chairman Bulova recognized Sully District School Board Member Kathy Smith who was in the auditorium and warmly welcomed her.

2. RECOGNITION OF COUNTY EMPLOYERS SELECTED AS "BEST WORKPLACES FOR COMMUTERS" (9:56 a.m.)

Chairman Bulova introduced Phil Winters, Director, Transportation Demand Management Program, Center for Urban Transportation Research, University of South Florida. Supervisor Hudgins moved approval of the Certificate of Recognition presented to Westbriar Elementary School for outstanding performance on State academic assessments and noteworthy gains in student achievements resulting in being designated a 2013 National Blue Ribbon School by the US Department of Education. Supervisor Foust seconded the motion and it carried by unanimous vote.

Supervisor Herrity seconded the motion and it carried by unanimous vote.

5. <u>CERTIFICATE OF RECOGNITION PRESENTED TO COUNTY CIRCUIT COURT CLERK JOHN FREY</u> (10:21 a.m.)

Supervisor Cook moved approval of the Certificate of Recognition presented to County Circuit Court Clerk John Frey for his initiative to make County court opinions available to the public without charge and online, resulting in receiving an Open Government Award from the Virginia Coalition for Open Government. Supervisor Frey, Supervisor Herrity, and Supervisor Hyland jointly seconded the motion.

Following discussion concerning Mr. Frey's efforts, the question was called on the motion and it carried by unanimous vote.

6. <u>CERTIFICATE OF RECOGNITION PRESENTED TO MR. DAVE LAVERY</u> (10:29 a.m.)

Supervisor Foust moved approval of the Certificate of Recognition presented to Mr. Dave Lavery for his exceptional leadership; strong management skills; distinguished knowledge of robotics; technical understanding of landing requirements on Mars; and his vision of the possibilities as the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) team leader of the Curiosity Rover Mission to Mars, resulting in being awarded the 2013 Samuel J. Heyman Service to America Medal in the science and environment category by the Partnership for Public Service. Supervisor Herrity and Supervisor Hyland jointly seconded the motion.

Following discussion concerning Mr. Lavery's public service, commitment to the Herndon Robotics team, as well as the accomplishments of his co-recipients, the question was called on the motion and it carried by unanimous vote.

Chairman Bulova recognized a representative from the office of Congressman Gerry Connolly who presented Mr. Lavery with recognitions that appeared in the <u>Congressional Record</u>.

7. RESOLUTION PRESENTED TO MR. JOHN WHITE FOR HIS COMMUNITY OUTREACH (10:42 a.m.)

Supervisor Herrity moved approval of the Resolution of Recognition presented to Mr. John White for his noteworthy and honorable service to the Orange Hunt community. Supervisor Hyland seconded the motion.

Following discussion concerning Mr. White's efforts to keep the community well-kept and to return lost items to the owners, the question was called on the motion and it carried by unanimous vote.

8. <u>CERTIFICATE OF RECOGNITION PRESENTED TO THE FAIRFAX</u> <u>COUNTY GOVERNMENT CHANNEL 16</u> (10:50 a.m.)

Chairman Bulova relinquished the Chair to Vice-Chairman Gross and moved approval of a Certificate of Recognition presented to Government Channel 16 for creative programs addressing community needs and developing diverse community involvement, resulting in receiving a 2013 Hometown Video Award for Overall Excellence in Government Access and the prestigious Children's Program Award from the Alliance for Community Media. Vice-Chairman Gross and Supervisor Hyland jointly seconded the motion.

Following discussion concerning the Channel's professionalism, quality of work, and attention to detail, the question was called on the motion and it carried by unanimous vote.

Vice-Chairman Gross returned the gavel to Chairman Bulova.

9. <u>10:30 A.M. – ADOPTION OF THE 2014 LEGISLATIVE PROGRAM FOR THE VIRGINIA GENERAL ASSEMBLY, APPROVAL OF THE COUNTY'S 113TH CONGRESS FEDERAL LEGISLATIVE STRATEGY, AND ADOPTION OF PRINCIPLES FOR FEDERAL LEGISLATION FOR THE 113TH CONGRESS (11:01 a.m.)</u>

Supervisor McKay, Chair of the Board's Legislative Committee, stated that the Board has vetted the Legislative Package on numerous occasions, including conducting a public hearing, and noted that the first action the Board will take is to adopt the 2014 State Legislative Program and Human Services Issue Paper. He stated that the Board's basic principles remain largely the same as last year: the State must fully fund K-12 education and refrain from infringing on the County's land-use and taxing authority. He added that one key difference in the County's position is on transportation funding as the 2013 General Assembly provided the first significant infusion of State transportation dollars in over 20 years with the enactment of House Bill (HB) 2313 and, as a result, the County is ready to begin funding new transportation projects that will bring great congestion relief to the region. He noted that it is essential that Northern Virginia continue to receive its fair share of State-wide revenues from the bill in addition to the increased Northern Virginia revenues that result from the higher tax rates that the bill included and that Northern Virginians are paying.

Supervisor McKay said that the County has been particularly affected by substantial cuts to cost-of-competing adjustment funding for support staff and that the County's program urges that the State fully meet its responsibility to adequately fund K-12 education including full restoration of cost-of-competing funds.

He indicated that another area that has experienced significant cuts over the last several years is Human Services and a Human Services Issues Paper is again a

part of the package which asks the State to begin restoring funding for a number of Human Service programs. He added that when the Board has its roundtable discussion with the General Assembly, a significant portion of the agenda will be dedicated to a discussion of the County's Human Services' needs.

Supervisor McKay noted that there are three items under consideration for initiatives this year:

- A technical correction that would allow juvenile and domestic relations court staff to view, via secure remote access, the same records that they currently view in paper form, providing significant time-savings and efficiencies for court staff
- An initiative to allow local governments to offset some of their energy consumption by generating renewable energy on their property
- A request for a study by the State's Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission (JLARC) to address ongoing and significant problems with the State's broker for Medicaid-funded transportation services

Supervisor McKay moved that the Board adopt the 2014 Legislative Program and Human Services Issues Paper. The motion was multiply seconded.

Discussion ensued concerning:

- Baseline delivery of Human Services
- Preparation of laminated budget fact sheets
- Elimination of the Business, Professional and Occupational Licenses (BPOL) taxes and the effect on the County's tax base

The question was called on the motion and it **CARRIED** by a recorded vote of nine, Supervisor Herrity voting "**NAY**."

Supervisor McKay, noting the uncertainty of the federal budget process, stated that the County will:

- Continue to pursue a strategic approach to federal funding opportunities
- Continue to highlight the importance of the National Capital Region and its connection to the functioning of the federal government

- Focus on funding for transportation and protecting the social safety net during difficult economic times
- Be actively working to protect existing federal investments in the County, particularly military installations, civilian federal workforce, and federal contractors which are vital to the local economy
- Continue to proactively position itself to take advantage of federal opportunities as they arise, including the relocation of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), and the growing field of cybersecurity

Supervisor McKay moved that the Board adopt the 113th Congressional Federal Funding Strategy and the Principles for Federal Legislation in the 113th Congress. Supervisor Gross and Supervisor Hyland jointly seconded the motion and it carried by a vote of nine, Supervisor Herrity being out of the room.

Supervisor McKay stated that the last item for consideration was a reaffirmation of the discussion at the Board's last Legislative Committee meeting concerning Transit Service Delivery Advisory Committee (TSDAC). He said the will of the Board was to move forward with the Chairman sending a letter to the Secretary of Transportation and the Director of the Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation (VDRPT) outlining the Board's concerns with the TSDAC transit funding effort.

Supervisor McKay moved that the Board reaffirm its endorsement of the TSDAC letter dated November 26, 2013. Supervisor Hudgins and Supervisor Hyland jointly seconded the motion.

Discussion ensued concerning:

- TSDAC and formula changes which would put the County and other jurisdictions in Northern Virginia at a disadvantage
- The amount of funding the County contributes
- The desire to postpone action by the CTB until critical issues for Northern Virginia can be resolved
- A TSDAC minority report reflecting the huge financial implications and bad policy precedent that would be set if it is enacted
- Setting a precedent for funding other services throughout the Commonwealth

The question was called on the motion and it carried by a vote of nine, Supervisor Herrity being out of the room.

Supervisor Gross moved that the Board concur in the recommendation of staff and approve the reinstatement of funding for the OPA/Team/Managerial Excellence Awards program and the implementation of an Incentive Reinvestment Initiative for employee development. Supervisor Hyland seconded the motion.

Chairman Bulova noted that it was Mr. Long who suggested that the Board resume the program and thanked him for making sure staff is properly rewarded for their exemplary work.

Following a brief discussion, regarding the memorandum, the question was called on the motion and it carried by unanimous vote.

13. A-2 – APPROVAL OF MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT (MOA) WITH THE SHERIFF CONCERNING PERSONNEL ADMINISTRATION AND GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE (11:27 a.m.)

Supervisor Gross moved that the Board concur in the recommendation of staff and:

- Approve entering into a MOA with the Sheriff, memorializing the agreement between the Board and the Sheriff regarding the placement of her employees under the County's Personnel System and Grievance Procedure
- Authorize the County Executive to sign the revised MOA on behalf of the Board

Supervisor Gross noted a date change in the agreement from September 30, 2013 to November 25, 2013, the swearing in date of Stacey Kincaid as the Sherriff.

Supervisor McKay seconded the motion.

Chairman Bulova acknowledged the presence of Sheriff Kincaid in the Board Auditorium and warmly welcomed her.

The question was called on the motion and it carried by unanimous vote.

14. A-3 – APPROVAL OF LETTER TO THE VIRGINIA DEPARTMENT OF RAIL AND PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION (DRPT) REGARDING THE REPORT ON CAPITAL ASSISTANCE ALLOCATION METHODOLOGY FOR TRANSIT FUNDING (11:30 a.m.)

Chairman Bulova confirmed that the Board has already taken action on this item as part of the Legislative package.

On motion of Supervisor Gross, seconded by Supervisor Foust, and carried by unanimous vote, Supervisor Cook, Supervisor Foust, Supervisor Frey, Supervisor Gross, Supervisor Herrity, Supervisor Hudgins, Supervisor Hyland, Supervisor McKay, Supervisor Smyth, and Chairman Bulova voting "AYE," the Board concurred in the recommendation of staff and adopted a Resolution authorizing the issuance of the General Obligation Public Improvement Bonds and Public Improvement Refunding Bonds, which also authorizes the execution and delivery of a Continuing Disclosure Agreement and other documents necessary for sale. This resolution:

- Delegates to the County Executive or Chief Financial Officer authority to award the bonds to the lowest responsive bidder. Bond Counsel has advised that this form of authorization is acceptable and provides flexibility for changing market conditions
- Approves the form of the notice of sale and the Official Statement for the Public Improvement Bonds
- Authorizes the Chairman, Vice Chairman, County Executive or Chief Financial Officer to sign the Official Statement for the Public Improvement Bonds
- Provides the flexibility that Public Improvement Refunding Bonds (or public improvement bonds) may be sold in a negotiated transaction with a County chosen underwriter(s)

16. A-5 – ACTION ON A PARKING REDUCTION FOR HUNTINGTON AVENUE PROPERTIES (MOUNT VERNON DISTRICT) (11:31 a.m.)

Chairman Bulova announced that this item will be considered with the decision on Rezoning Application RZ 2013-MV-001 (A&R Huntington Metro LLC) later in the meeting.

Supervisor Hyland announced that this item will be deferred to a later date.

Discussion continued, with input from Mr. Long, regarding the approval process if there was the need to draw down on the line of credit, and the process for doing it in case of an emergency.

The question was called on the motion and it carried by unanimous vote, Supervisor Cook, Supervisor Foust, Supervisor Frey, Supervisor Gross, Supervisor Herrity, Supervisor Hudgins, Supervisor Hyland, Supervisor McKay, Supervisor Smyth, and Chairman Bulova voting "AYE."

18. <u>I-1 - PRESENTATION OF THE FISCAL YEAR (FY) 2013</u> COMPREHENSIVE ANNUAL FINANCIAL REPORT (CAFR) (11:35 a.m.)

The Board next considered an item contained in the Board Agenda dated December 3, 2013, regarding the FY 2013 CAFR.

Edward L. Long, Jr., County Executive thanked the Department of Finance and everyone else involved for a job well done in ensuring a sound financial base in the County.

Discussion ensued, with input from Susan Datta, Chief Financial Officer and Director, Department of Management and Budget, regarding the Management letter referenced on Pages 4 and 5 of the Required Communications Letter tab of the report.

Ms. Datta noted that this is the final audit for Victor Garcia, Director of Finance, who will be retiring from the County in a few months.

Chairman Bulova congratulated and thanked Mr. Garcia for a job well done and his service to the County.

19. <u>I-2 - PLANNING COMMISSION (PC) ACTION ON APPLICATION</u> 2232A-D01-4-1, SIRIUS XM (DRANESVILLE DISTRICT) (11:38 a.m.)

The Board next considered an item contained in the Board Agenda dated December 3, 2013, announcing that the PC approved Public Facilities Application 2232A-D01-4-1. The PC noted that the application met the criteria of character, location, and extent, and was in conformance with Section 15.2-2232 of the Code of Virginia. The application sought approval of the following modifications: Install one new panel antenna on the rooftop (Dimensions: Height: 38", Width: 21", Depth: 8"); relocate one existing dish on the rooftop; install one new dish with GPS on the rooftop; and replace one existing cabinet on existing steel platform that is located on the rooftop with one new cabinet. The property is located at 1350 Beverly Road, Tax Map 30-2 ((1)) 0030B.

22. **STUDENT MEAL ASSISTANCE FUND** (11:40 a.m.)

In a joint Board Matter with Supervisor Cook, Chairman Bulova said that the County makes a tremendous effort to prevent and end homelessness in the County. Recently, this trend has caught on at George Mason University (GMU). After finding that there is a small but real population of homeless college students on GMU's campus, two GMU seniors set up a Student Meal Assistance Fund which allows students and the community to donate to an account that provides meals to students in need.

Chairman Bulova noted that the two students, Yara El Mowafy and Jordan Bivings, collected over 2,000 signatures from peers who said they would donate meals to their fellow classmates in need. Now, in partnership with the GMU Foundation, Incorporated, and other organizations, Yara and Jordan are working hard to solicit donations to the fund and making a real difference in the GMU community.

Interested parties can support the fund by donating online at www.give.gmu.edu.

Chairman Bulova asked unanimous consent that the Board direct staff to invite Yara El Mowafy and Jordan Bivings to appear before the Board and be recognized for their outstanding efforts and commitment to aiding homeless individuals in the County and particularly at GMU. Without objection, it was so ordered.

Vice-Chairman Gross returned the gavel to Chairman Bulova.

23. THOMAS JEFFERSON HIGH SCHOOL FOR SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY (TJ) TJ³ SAT LAUNCH (MASON DISTRICT) (11:43 a.m.)

In a joint Board Matter with Supervisor Foust, Supervisor Gross said that in 2006, students at TJ, started what became a multi-year project to design a small, cube shaped satellite. Initially started as an extracurricular club, the TJ³Sat project evolved into a Systems Engineering class, and then a senior research project. Over the years, roughly 50 students worked on the project. It has survived school budget cuts, a recession, and even delays from the government shutdown. Finally, seven years later, the TJ³Sat project came to fruition. On November 19, 2013, the satellite was attached to an Orbital Minotaur I rocket and launched from NASA's Wallops Island on the Virginia Eastern Shore. The TJ³Sat is the first satellite designed and built by high school students.

Supervisor Gross also recognized the support provided by the Orbital Sciences Corporation, for its initial donation of \$30,000, its continued collaboration with the students in the development of this project, and for launching the TJ³Sat with its rocket's payload.

Therefore, Supervisor Gross moved that the Board:

- Applaud this achievement
- Direct staff to invite TJ Principal Evan Glazer, TJ³Sat Project Advisor Adam Kemp, and representatives from Orbital Science Corporation to be recognized by the Board
- Direct staff to also invite any and all TJ students or alumni who have worked on this project

Supervisor Foust seconded the motion and it carried by unanimous vote.

24. WAIVER OF WASHINGTON METROPOLITAN AREA TRANSIT AUTHORITY (WMATA) CONNECTION FEE FOR SILVER LINE STATIONS AND PROPERTIES IN THE COUNTY (DRANESVILLE DISTRICT) (11:45 a.m.)

In a joint Board Matter with Supervisor Hudgins, Supervisor Foust said that during construction of Phase 1 of the Silver Line, WMATA approved a revision to its direct connection policy to WMATA stations and properties. Under the policy change, WMATA was able to waive connection fees for the four Silver Line stations in Tysons Corner. That change was in consideration of real estate proffers and funding provided for transit infrastructure by private landowners adjacent to the four stations.

Supervisor Foust explained that WMATA's policy change did not address connection fees for Phase 1 and Phase 2 stations and facilities located outside the Tysons Corner area even though private landowners adjacent to these stations and facilities, like its Tysons Corner counterparts, are contributing to the Silver Line infrastructure. The County stations outside Tysons Corner are: Wiehle–Reston East, Reston Town Center, Herndon and Innovation Center.

Therefore, Supervisor Foust moved that the Board direct staff to prepare a letter for the County Executive's signature to WMATA, requesting that WMATA waive connection fees for all Silver Line stations and facilities located in the County consistent with the already approved waiver of fees granted to the Tysons Corner stations. Supervisor Hudgins seconded the motion.

Following a brief discussion regarding the waiver, the question was called on the motion and it carried by unanimous vote.

26. CHRISTOPHER LAND, LLC – REZONING/FINAL DEVELOPMENT PLAN APPLICATION RZ/FDP 2013-SU-010 (SULLY DISTRICT) (11:48 a.m.)

Supervisor Frey said that Christopher Land, LLC has filed Rezoning/Final Development Plan Application RZ/FDP 2013-SU-010 to rezone 3.7 acres from the R-l District to the PDH-2 District to permit seven single family detached homes on property known as Tax Map 44-4 ((1)) parcel 18. Last month the Board approved a date certain for the Board public hearing. Unfortunately, affidavit issues will preclude the case from being reviewed by the Board this year.

Consequently, the applicant has requested the ability to concurrently process the subdivision plans with the zoning application.

Therefore, Supervisor Frey moved that the Board direct the Director of the Department of Public Works and Environmental Services to accept for concurrent processing, the site and subdivision plans and plats associated with Rezoning/Final Development Plan Application RZ/FDP 2013-SU-010. The applicant understands that this motion should not be considered as a favorable recommendation by the Board on the proposed application and does not relieve the applicant from compliance with the provisions of all applicable ordinances, regulations, and/or adopted standards. Supervisor Foust and Supervisor Hudgins jointly seconded the motion and it carried by unanimous vote.

27. <u>REQUEST FOR RECOGNITION OF FORMER SHERIFF STAN BARRY</u> (11:48 a.m.)

In a joint Board Matter with Supervisor Cook, Supervisor Foust, Supervisor Gross, Supervisor Herrity, Supervisor Hudgins, Supervisor Hyland, Supervisor Smyth, and Chairman Bulova, Supervisor McKay said that now that the election is over it is important to recognize the great work of Sheriff Stan Barry.

Supervisor McKay referred to his written Board Matter which outlined Sheriff Berry's many accomplishments to the County and he asked unanimous consent that the Board direct staff to invite Sheriff Barry to appear before the Board to be recognized at a future date for his outstanding service to the citizens of the County. Without objection, it was so ordered.

28. **FAIRFAX SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA** (11:51 a.m.)

Supervisor Smyth announced that next year space will be made available for the offices of the Fairfax Council of the Arts and Fairfax Symphony Orchestra. She said that with the Fairfax Symphony Orchestra moving its offices to Merrifield it is looking for opportunities to introduce the Symphony to the neighborhood. The first opportunity is next week in a joint project between the Symphony and the Angelika Theater. The Symphony will present "Christmas in Black and White" on Thursday, December 12 at 6 p.m. and 8 p.m. showings at the Angelika Film Center.

Chairman Bulova relinquished the Chair to Vice-Chairman Gross and asked unanimous consent that the Board direct the Office of Public Affairs to help publicize this event. Without objection, it was so ordered.

Vice-Chairman Gross returned the gavel to Chairman Bulova.

29. NO BOARD MATTERS FOR SUPERVISOR HUDGINS (HUNTER MILL DISTRICT) (11:53 a.m.)

Supervisor Hudgins announced that she had no Board Matters to present today.

30. RECOGNIZING JESSICA AND RAYMOND BURMESTER FOR THEIR SERVICE ON THE FAIRFAX-FALLS CHURCH COMMUNITY SERVICES BOARD (CSB) (11:53 a.m.)

(BACs) In a joint Board Matter with Chairman Bulova, Supervisor Cook said that it has come to his attention that Mrs. Jessica Burmester will be resigning her position on the CSB.

Supervisor Cook said that Jessica and Raymond Burmester have served on the CSB for a total of nine terms, equaling more than two decades of service. To honor their service, Supervisor Cook asked unanimous consent that the Board direct staff to:

- Direct staff to invite them to appear before the Board to be recognized for their service
- Declare "Jessica and Raymond Burmester Day" in Fairfax County.

Without objection, it was so ordered.

31. WITHDRAWAL OF AND NEXT STEPS FOR REZONING APPLICATION RZ 2013-MV-001 (A&R HUNTINGTON METRO, LLC (MOUNT VERNON DISTRICT) (11:56 a.m.)

Supervisor Hyland said that on November 19, 2013, the Board held a public hearing on Rezoning Application RZ 2013-MV-001 filed by A&R Huntington Metro LLC, to rezone approximately 1.04 acres of land from the C-5 District to the PRM District to permit the development of a multi-family building containing up to 139 residential units and up to 35,324 square feet of ground floor retail at a 2.99 floor area ratio (FAR). The Board was also scheduled to hear a companion request for a parking reduction to permit the applicant to provide fewer parking spaces in the proposed development than the Zoning Ordinance otherwise would require. Several Members of the Board raised questions at the public hearing about the extent of the proposed parking reduction and how that would affect the project's viability and the neighborhood around it. Based on these concerns, Supervisor Hyland said that the Board deferred decision on the rezoning application and associated parking reduction to give time for his office to coordinate with the applicant to respond to the stated concerns.

Supervisor Hyland stated that in the intervening weeks, the applicant has decided to pursue expansion of the below-grade parking to provide an additional 30 parking spaces beyond the 161 currently proposed. The additional level of parking would bring the total number of parking spaces to 191, representing a parking ratio of approximately 1.3 spaces per residential unit and providing 10 spaces available to support the retail uses. The change primarily would occur

below grade and would not affect any of the streetscape, landscape, or other design elements of the project, as the principal impact is the amount of excavation required to expand the below-grade garage. Given the changes to the development plan and proffers, these changes will require a new public hearing before the Board and approval of the amended Final Development Plan (FDP) by the Planning Commission (PC).

Therefore, Supervisor Hyland moved that the Board:

- Remove Rezoning Application RZ 2013-MV-001 from the Board's current agenda.
- Pursuant to Section 18-204(1) of the Zoning Ordinance, direct the Department of Planning and Zoning and the Clerk to the Board to work with the applicant to prepare notices for and establish a new public hearing for Rezoning Application RZ 2013-MV-001, A&R Huntington Metro LLC, to be held on <u>January 28, 2018,* at 4 p.m.</u>, to consider revisions to the CDP and associated proffers.
- Defer decision on the associated parking reduction proposal to that same date to give the applicant time to update its request to reflect the changes described today.
- Refer Final Development Plan Application FDP 2013-MV-001 back to the PC for further action in light of the changes to the CDP and proffers the applicant proposes to make.
- Direct the PC to complete its review of the amended FDP prior to the Board's public hearing on January 28, 2014.

This motion should not be construed to prejudice the consideration of the application in any way nor does it relieve the applicant from compliance with the provisions of applicable ordinances, regulations, or adopted standards in any way. Supervisor McKay seconded the motion.

Supervisor Smyth noted that the motion misstated the date of the new public hearing and it was corrected to January 28, 2014.*

The question was called on the motion, as corrected, and it carried by unanimous vote.

32. <u>MOUNT VERNON COUNCIL RESOLUTION ON INVESTING IN SUCCESSFUL YOUTH (MOUNT VERNON DISTRICT)</u> (12:01 p.m.)

Supervisor Hyland said that on November 20, 2013, the Mount Vernon Council passed a resolution entitled *Investing in Successful Youth*. This in-depth resolution provides detailed recommendations on how to strengthen the way the

County provides support for human services through funding, collaboration, and redesign efficiencies. The resolution recommends continued and expanded support for the Community Services Board, Juvenile and Domestic Relations District Court, Housing Blueprint, and other human service and public safety service providers. Ultimately, the resolution seeks to ensure that the youth population of the County continues to have access to services that make them successful and self-sustaining members of society.

Supervisor Hyland moved that the Board refer the resolution to the County Executive for review and recommendations. Chairman Bulova seconded the motion.

Supervisor Hudgins asked unanimous consent that the Board direct staff to share the resolution with members of the Successful Children and Youth Policy Team (SCYPT). Without objection, it was so ordered.

Following discussion, with input from Edward L. Long Jr., County Executive, regarding potential budget implications, the question was called on the motion and it carried by unanimous vote.

Clara Q. Johnson, Planner III, Policy and Plan Development Branch, Planning Division, Department of Planning and Zoning, presented the staff report. Supervisor Foust said that he received a letter from Loudoun County staff concerning the bridge over the Dulles Toll Road and whether the proposed plan designates the width of the bridge and the number of lanes, and discussion ensued with input from Ms. Johnson.

Jeffrey Fairfield, Chairman, Route 28 Station South Work Group, gave a presentation regarding the proposed plan amendments.

Supervisor Hudgins raised a question regarding whether an analysis was performed concerning the anticipated amount of traffic for the bridge connection between Loudoun County and Fairfax County. Discussion ensued, with input from Michael Garcia, Transportation Planner, Transportation Planning Section, Department of Transportation.

Following the public hearing, Ms. Johnson presented the staff and Planning Commission (PC) recommendations.

Supervisor Foust recognized members of the Route 28 Station South Work Group who were present in the Board Auditorium.

Supervisor Foust moved approval of the PC recommendation for Plan Amendments ST09-III-DS1, S07-III-UP2, and S09-III-UP2, as found in Attachment 1, with some revisions intended to enhance parks and schools guidance. The PC recommendation adds Plan guidance for a balanced mix of uses that are integrated with the south side of the Innovation Center Metrorail station. This plan is consistent with the County's transit oriented development policies and focuses growth in the transit station area. Urban design guidance is included to emphasize the creation of a high quality walkable environment. The plan text also includes recommendations for creating a multimodal transportation system, environmental stewardship, urban parks, and recreation at schools.

Supervisor Foust said that his proposed revisions enhance the parks guidance for Land Unit A-5, which includes the largest vacant area in Land Unit A. The revisions also expand on the schools guidance to include examples of schools facilities that may be appropriate in the study area. Supervisor Foust noted that the revisions are shown in his handout dated December 3, 2013. Supervisor Hudgins and Supervisor Hyland jointly seconded the motion.

Following remarks by Supervisor Herrity, he moved to amend the motion to:

- Eliminate the paragraph beginning on page six of the staff report under the bullet point "Affordable and Workforce Housing"
- Insert a new sixth bullet point entitled "Public School Construction and Renovation Fund" with the following wording:

"Non-residential development in the TSA should contribute \$3 per non-residential square foot. This amount is to be adjusted annually based on the Consumer Price Index and may be contributed to a

public school construction and renovation trust fund that will be used to build and renovate public school facilities. The contribution may be made over a period of time to be determined at the time of rezoning but not less than 25 cents per nonresidential square foot each year. Such developments may provide an equivalent contribution of land in lieu of a cash contribution. If non-residential floor area is achieved through a bonus for providing WDU's, the bonus floor area should not be included when calculating the contribution amount. Ground level retail located in office, hotel, and residential buildings should also not be included when calculating the contribution amount."

Supervisor Frey seconded the motion. Discussion ensued regarding the amendment to the motion.

Supervisor Gross stated that she would not be supporting the motion.

Following further discussion regarding the amendment to the motion, Supervisor McKay stated that he would not be supporting the motion.

- 49. 4 P.M. PH ON PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CODE OF THE COUNTY OF FAIRFAX, CHAPTER 5 (OFFENSES) TO ADD A NEW ARTICLE 6 (EXCESSIVE SOUND GENERATION IN RESIDENTIAL AREAS AND DWELLINGS) AND REPEALING CHAPTER 108 (NOISE), ARTICLE 5 (NUISANCE NOISE) (5:53 p.m.)
- (O) A Certificate of Publication was filed from the editor of the *Washington Times* showing that notice of said public hearing was duly advertised in that newspaper in the issues of November 22 and November 29, 2013.

Cynthia L. Tianti, Deputy County Attorney, presented the staff report.

Supervisor Hyland called the Board's attention to Section 5-6-5 Exceptions, Item 7, Operation of public transportation facilities, and raised a question regarding whether it was exempted in the other ordinance, and, if not, why it was added to this proposed ordinance. Discussion ensued, with input from Ms. Tianti and Leslie B. Johnson, Zoning Administrator, Department of Planning and Zoning.

Supervisor Foust raised a question regarding special exception exemptions on noise, and discussion ensued, with input from Ms. Tianti.

Following the public hearing, which included testimony by 10 speakers, Chairman Bulova asked Edwin C. Roessler, Jr., Chief of Police, to address concerns regarding enforcement.

Mr. Roessler gave remarks, noting that this is an interim measure for the Police Department to educate the community and enforce compliance to the Code.

Major Mike Kline, Commander of Patrol Bureau Division Three, gave remarks regarding the noise issue and provided examples of incidents regarding noncompliance.

Supervisor Frey moved adoption of the proposed amendments to the Code of the County of Fairfax, as follows:

- Chapter 5 (Offenses) Adding a new Article 6 (Excessive Sound Generation in Residential Areas and Dwellings)
- Chapter 108 (Noise) Repealing Article 5 (Nuisance Noise)

The proposed amendments become effective at 12:01 a.m. on the day following adoption. Supervisor Herrity and Supervisor McKay jointly seconded the motion.

Discussion ensued regarding the proposed amendments.

Supervisor Hudgins, with regard to the issue of dog barking which was raised by several of the speakers, asked what the proposed ordinance does for them and how long and to what length is the County able to go to address their issue in the future. Discussion ensued, with input from Ms. Tianti, who noted that if a person is inside their residence with the doors and windows closed and can still hear the noise audible and discernible, and a police officer responds and can hear the noise from within your residence, then it would be a violation under the proposed ordinance.

Supervisor Hyland raised a question regarding transportation facilities (including a repair facility) in a residential community, and whether it would be subjected to any noise limitations and discussion ensued, with input from Ms. Johnson and Ms. Tianti.

Noting that the proposed ordinance deals with the Police Department's ability to deal with nuisance noise in residential areas, Supervisor McKay raised a question regarding when the Board will see an amendment that deals with the other issues concerning noise. Discussion ensued, with input from Ms. Johnson, who noted that staff would like to reach out to the community to get feedback before another ordinance is proposed.

Supervisor McKay asked unanimous consent that the Board direct staff to report to the Board in the March/April 2014 timeframe with a proposed ordinance that targets the broader issue of noise.

Discussion ensued, and Supervisor Foust raised a question regarding the ability to consider certain dog barking a noise violation, given the language in the proposed ordinance, and discussion ensued, with input from Ms. Tianti and Mr. Kline.

After sharing a childhood story regarding noise, Supervisor Gross asked to amend Supervisor McKay's request and direct staff, when performing outreach efforts, to include residential areas with schools next door to them, civic associations, and the business communities.

Following additional discussion with input from Ms. Johnson, the request, as amended, was so ordered.

The question was called on the motion to approve the proposed amendments to the Code of the County of Fairfax and it carried by unanimous vote, Supervisor Cook, Supervisor Foust, Supervisor Frey, Supervisor Gross, Supervisor Herrity, Supervisor Hudgins, Supervisor Hyland, Supervisor McKay, Supervisor Smyth, and Chairman Bulova voting "AYE."
