Authorized by the Board in 2005 to allow developers to contribute to a Countywide tree planting program through the use of cash proffers, in kind proffer commitments obtained during the land development process, and reparations for violations of tree preservation commitments.

Amended in 2016 to allow Urban Forest Management Division (UFMD) staff to administratively distribute funds for tree planting projects without board approval

\$19,432 has been spent for tree planting and education programs since 2016

Currently Available Budget = \$78,874.07
