PHASING OUT PLASTIC BAGS FOR YARD WASTE COLLECTION



On Feb. 25, 2020, the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors voted to begin the transition away from the use of plastic bags for yard waste collection. During the 2020 yard waste season, which runs March through December, staff from Fairfax County's Solid Waste Management Program will be working with the community and private haulers to help customers transition to using only compostable paper bags or reusable containers for setting out yard waste. No More Plastic Bags for Yard Waste!

Plastic bags are bad for the environment they get torn and mixed in with yard waste. That becomes part of the compost that we use in our gardens, and those microplastics can end up in local streams, affecting water quality.

Beginning this spring, Fairfax County will start to transition away from using plastic bags for yard waste.

What can you do instead?

- If you use a landscaper to manage your property, talk to them about this change.
- Let the grass clippings fertilize and hydrate the lawn.
- Start backyard composting.
- Repurpose an old trash can or try a reusable, collapsible can for yard waste.
- Use paper yard waste bags they are designed to hold yard waste and can get wet without falling apart.

Use paper yard waste bags for grass clippings, leaves, and brush; they are durable, sustainable, and available in stores and online.

 - Closing current operation November 2020



Ordinance Update

Original:

Yard waste may only be set out in bags, reusable containers, or in piles as instructed by the company which will be collecting them.

Recommended:

Yard waste shall be set out in paper yard waste bags, reusable containers, other storage devices as approved by the Director, or bundled with string as instructed by the collection provider and shall not weigh more than fifty pounds. Yard waste shall not be placed in plastic bags.
