<u>Authorization to Advertise a Public Hearing to Consider Adopting an Ordinance to Establish the Marlboro Estates Community Parking District (Dranesville District)</u>

ISSUE:

Board authorization to advertise a public hearing to consider a proposed amendment to Appendix M of *the Code of the County of Fairfax, Virginia* (Fairfax County Code), to establish the Marlboro Estates Community Parking District (CPD).

RECOMMENDATION:

The County Executive recommends that the Board authorize advertisement of a public hearing for March 22, 2022, at 3:30 p.m., to consider adoption of a Fairfax County Code amendment (Attachment I) to establish the Marlboro Estates CPD, consisting of Deer Drive and Poppy Drive.

TIMING:

The Board of Supervisors should take action on February 22, 2022, to provide sufficient time for advertisement of the public hearing on March 22, 2022, at 3:30 p.m.

BACKGROUND:

Fairfax County Code Section 82-5B-2 authorizes the Board to establish a CPD for the purpose of prohibiting or restricting the parking of the following vehicles on the streets in the CPD: watercraft; boat trailers; motor homes; camping trailers; and any other trailer or semi-trailer, regardless of whether such trailer or semi-trailer is attached to another vehicle; any vehicle with three or more axles; any vehicle that has a gross vehicle weight rating of 12,000 or more pounds, except school buses used on a current and regular basis to transport students; and any vehicle of any size that is being used in the transportation of hazardous materials as defined in Virginia Code § 46.2-341.4.

No such CPD shall apply to (i) any commercial vehicle when discharging passengers or when temporarily parked pursuant to the performance of work or service at a particular location, (ii) utility generators located on trailers and being used to power network facilities during a loss of commercial power, (iii) restricted vehicles temporarily parked on a public street within any such CPD for a maximum of 48 hours for the purpose of loading, unloading, or preparing for a trip, (iv) restricted vehicles that are temporarily parked on a public street within any such CPD for use by federal, state, or local public

agencies to provide services.

Pursuant to Fairfax County Code Section 82-5B-3, the Board may establish a CPD if: (1) the Board receives a petition requesting establishment and such petition contains the names, addresses, and signatures of petitioners who represent at least 60 percent of the addresses within the proposed CPD, and represent more than 50 percent of the eligible addresses on each block of the proposed CPD, (2) the proposed CPD includes an area in which 75 percent of each block within the proposed CPD is zoned, planned, or developed as a residential area, (3) the Board receives an application fee of \$10 for each petitioning property address in the proposed CPD, and (4) the proposed CPD must contain the lesser of (i) a minimum of five block faces or (ii) any number of blocks that front a minimum of 2,000 linear feet of street as measured by the centerline of each street within the CPD.

Staff has verified that the requirements for a petition-based CPD have been satisfied.

The parking prohibition identified above for the CPD is proposed to be in effect seven days per week, 24 hours per day.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The cost of sign installation is estimated to be \$800. It will be paid from Fairfax County Department of Transportation funds.

M-94 Marlboro Estates Community Parking District

- (a) District Designation.
 - (1) The restricted parking area is designated as the Marlboro Estates Community Parking District.
 - (2) Blocks included in the Marlboro Estates Community Parking District are described below:

Deer Drive (Route 2059)
From Poppy Drive to Blue Star Drive.

Poppy Drive (Route 2662)

From Great Falls Street to Deer Drive.

(b) District Provisions.


- (1) This District is established in accordance with and is subject to the provisions set forth in Article 5B of Chapter 82.
- (2) Parking of watercraft; boat trailers; motor homes; camping trailers; any other trailer or semi-trailer, regardless of whether such trailer or semi-trailer is attached to another vehicle; any vehicle with three or more axles; any vehicle that has a gross vehicle weight rating of 12,000 or more pounds except school buses used on a current and regular basis to transport students; any vehicle designed to transport 16 or more passengers including the driver, except school buses used on a current and regular basis to transport students; and any vehicle of any size that is being used in the transportation of hazardous materials as defined in Virginia Code § 46.2-341.4 is prohibited at all times on the above-described streets within the Marlboro Estates Community Parking District.
- (3) No such Community Parking District shall apply to (i) any commercial vehicle when discharging passengers or when temporarily parked pursuant to the performance of work or service at a particular location or (ii) utility generators located on trailers and being used to power network facilities during a loss of commercial power or (iii) restricted vehicles temporarily parked on a public street within any such District for a maximum of 48 hours for

the purpose of loading, unloading, or preparing for a trip or (iv) restricted vehicles that are temporarily parked on a public street within any such District for use by federal, state, or local public agencies to provide services.

(c) Signs. Signs delineating the Marlboro Estates Community Parking District shall indicate community specific identification and/or directional information, if applicable, in addition to the following:





Supplemental Appropriation Resolution AS 22189 for the Health Department to Accept Funding from the Virginia Department of Health to Increase the Disease Investigation Specialist Public Health Workforce

ISSUE:

Board approval of Supplemental Appropriation Resolution AS 22189 for the Health Department to accept funding from the Virginia Department of Health in the amount of \$183,854 to increase Fairfax County's disease investigation specialist public health workforce. This funding will support 2/2.0 FTE new grant positions in the Health Department's Division of Epidemiology & Population Health for the express purpose of breaking the chain of transmission for sexually transmitted infections (STIs). When grant funding expires, the County is under no obligation to continue funding these positions. No Local Cash Match is required. Board authorization is also requested for the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors, the County Executive, and/or a designee appointed by the County Executive to enter into the grant agreement and any related agreements, including but not limited to Federal Subaward Agreements, on behalf of the County.

RECOMMENDATION:

The County Executive recommends that the Board of Supervisors approve Supplemental Appropriation Resolution AS 22189 in the amount of \$183,854 from the Virginia Department of Health to increase Fairfax County's disease investigation specialist public health workforce. Funding will support 2/2.0 FTE new grant positions. No Local Cash Match is required. The County Executive also recommends the Board authorize the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors, the County Executive, and/or a designee appointed by the County Executive to enter into the grant agreement and any related agreements, including but not limited to Federal Subaward Agreements, on behalf of the County.

TIMING:

Board approval is requested on February 22, 2022.

BACKGROUND:

Disease Investigations Specialists (DIS) are the Health Department's boots on the ground in the County's efforts to help control sexually transmitted infections (STI),

including HIV, syphilis, gonorrhea, and chlamydia. Like much of the nation and the rest of Virginia, STIs are increasing among Fairfax Health District residents. However, these impacts are not equal among all residents, with vulnerable residents and communities of color experiencing a disproportionate level of disease burden.

Based on a Virginia Department of Health assessment, four DIS positions are needed in the Fairfax Health District to adequately investigate and assist priority cases (i.e., HIV, syphilis) and their sexual contacts. The Health Department currently has 2/2.0 FTE General Fund merit DIS positions. The new grant will establish an additional 2/2.0 FTE DIS grant positions. These grant-funded positions will work alongside the current DIS staff to break the chain of STIs among Fairfax Health District residents and provide prevention education to vulnerable populations. Specifically, efforts will include investigating reported cases of STIs, ensuring clients are appropriately treated for their infection, identifying and facilitating testing/treatment for sexual contacts, and providing prevention education to vulnerable populations.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Funding from the Virginia Department of Health, in the amount of \$183,854, will be used to increase the Health Department's disease investigation specialist public health workforce. No Local Cash Match is required. This action does not increase the expenditure level of Federal-State Grant Fund, as funds are held in reserve for unanticipated grant awards in FY 2022. This grant does not allow the recovery of indirect costs.

CREATION OF POSITIONS:

There are 2/2.0 FTE new grant positions associated with this award. The County has no obligation to continue funding these positions when the grant funding expires.

- PARTIES TO THE AGREEMENT: This Subrecipient Agreement is entered into by Fairfax County, acting through the Fairfax Health District, 10777 Main Street, Suite 203 Fairfax, Virginia 22030, hereinafter called the "Subrecipient" and Commonwealth of Virginia through the Department of Health, Office of Epidemiology, Division of Disease Prevention, whose business address is 109 Governor Street, Richmond, Virginia 23219 hereinafter called the "Department."
- WHEREAS, The Department desires to enter into an Agreement with the Subrecipient to provide (scope of service) and;

WHEREAS, The Subrecipient desires to perform such services;

THEREFORE, in consideration of their respective undertakings, the Department and the Subrecipient hereby execute this covenant and agree to the following terms.

- **III. PERIOD OF PERFORMANCE:** From execution date of VDH signature on last page through December 31, 2022 and renewable for 3 one- year periods, under the terms of the current agreement, and at a reasonable time (approximately 90 days) prior to the expiration.
- **IV. PURPOSE:** The Agreement funds two Disease Intervention Specialist positions, including salary and fringe costs, with the goal of preventing and controlling sexually transmitted diseases (STD), human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) infections, hepatitis C virus (HCV), Covid-19 and their associated complications. The DIS will provide coverage in the Fairfax County Health District, and will assist other health districts in the Northern Region, as needed.

V. SCOPE OF SERVICES:

- A. The Subrecipient agrees to provide the following services during the term of this MOU:
- Funds shall be used to aid in the efficient and timely disease intervention services, including salary and fringe benefits only. Funds shall not be used for purposes other than to pay the salary and fringe of the DIS without prior written approval from the STD Prevention and Surveillance (SPS) Program.
- 2. Assume all responsibilities associated with the recruitment and hiring of a person(s) to fulfill the services of this MOU, including:

- (a) Provide all administrative and supervisory services associated with the employee hired to fulfill the requirements of the Disease Intervention Specialist (DIS) position including leave report and submission of time and effort.
- (b) Provide an opportunity for the Department to participate in the interview panel.
- (c) Provide adequate office space, telephone, operating supplies, and support staff for the DIS including maintenance of time records, distribution of pay checks, and completion of necessary personnel forms.
- 3. The primary function of the DIS is to provide and conduct services including STD and HIV infection case identification, case investigation, partner notification, and active referral. Services consist of all field-related surveillance, including data collection and submission, contact tracing, partner elicitation, treatment verification, field phlebotomy, and linkage, retention, and reengagement in care.
 - (a) General Disease Intervention Services
 - Direct support of field operations, including case/partner/suspect follow-up and contact tracing, prevention counseling and referral services, and treatment assurance for established STD, HIV, and HCV criteria.
 - Perform phlebotomy in nontraditional settings and environments.
 - Maintain ongoing contact with clinicians, patient navigators, or other relevant healthcare entities to ensure appropriate linkage, referral, and re-engagement in care for STD, HIV, and HCV.
 - Provision of prevention services, available resources, and methods for reducing disease transmission.
 - Ensure methods of contact tracing in accordance with the current Field Operations Manual (FOM), including local health department-specific requirements.
 - Provide education to patients and their partners with a negative HIV test results about HIV Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis (PrEP). Assist individuals with accessing PrEP resources.
 - Provide linkage to HIV medical care within 14 days of a positive test for acute HIV infection and 30 days for established HIV infection through the active referral process.
 - Provide HIV 4th generation testing within 48 hours to clients who received reactive rapid HIV test results through the Department's Pharmacy testing program.

(b) Consultation Services

- Assure ongoing communication between local and district staff and central office.
- Consult with the Regional STD Program Coordinator (RSPC) as the SPS program point of contact.
- Address issues identified by the central office in a timely manner.

(c) Surveillance/Outbreak Response

- Collect and submit data collection forms, testing, partner notification, and other epidemiological information on the appropriate forms to meet local, state, and federal reporting requirements in a timely manner. Case investigations should be closed within 45 days after assignment for follow up.
- Assess and interpret surveillance reports to ensure appropriate public health response.

- Assist with outbreak response including implementation of existing strategies,
 DIS work, paperwork review, and report preparation.
- Coordinate and implement screening events, including collection of blood, urine, and other specimen types.
- Respond to the Central Registry Unit (CRU) in a timely manner.

(d) Program Administration and Communications

- Participate in written narratives and summaries related to deployments, outbreak response activities, and evaluation/assessments, as needed.
- Ensure relevant communications with all partners is conducted for clarity of operations, status, needs, and recommendations, as appropriate.
- Ensure providers remain updated on the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) STD Treatment Guidelines.

(e) Quality Assurance

- Complete all applicable paperwork for case investigations and related follow up in accordance with the FOM.
- Review paperwork to ensure accurate and complete documentation is delivered to CRU.
- Handle and manage hazardous materials following appropriate guidelines.
- Store and file all field-related paperwork properly abiding to standard security and confidentiality procedures.

4. Field Operations Manual

- (a) Reference the Field Operations Manual to guide disease intervention services.
- (b) Prioritize cases in accordance with the DIS Interview and Field Investigation Priorities (DIFIP) found in the most current version of the FOM.

5. Training

- (a) Passport to Partner Services:
 - Ensure staff funded with this MOU complete all 14 online modules of the Passport to Partner Services training provided by CDC. Prior to CDC instructor led course, the new hire should begin to review online modules within 6 weeks of being hired. Ensure staff complete and participate in CDC's visual case analysis (VCA) training webinars.
 - Ensure staff funded with this MOU attend and successfully complete the 5-day in-person Passport to Partner Services class.
- (b) All DIS are expected to participate in 100% of the SPS' monthly STD Prevention webinars to obtain current knowledge on the latest available information and research. Webinar attendance is recorded monthly.
- (c) The DIS shall perform venipuncture for blood specimen collection only after receiving training and demonstrating their competency to draw blood to the satisfaction of the local health department.
- (d) Ensure staff funded with this MOU complete Blood borne Pathogens and/or Respiratory Protection training annually.
- (e) Ensure staff funded with this MOU attend 100% of regional DIS training meetings organized by the SPS program.
- (f) All DIS should receive training outlined in the Training Plan section of the Field Operations Manual.

6. Program Evaluation

The DIS' local supervisor and the RSPC will work together to examine and assess all funded activities, including:

- (a) Employee progress with Passport to Partner Services training.
- (b) Once the DIS has successfully completed all required training and demonstrated competency, the supervisor will work with the RSPC to perform skills inventories in accordance with the current FOM. The local supervisor and/or the RSPC will observe and evaluate the DIS paperwork and partner services to ensure quality, efficiency, and accurate delivery of information. The supervisor and/or DIS Regional Coordinator as identified in 2 (a) will monitor DIS services and activities to guarantee that performance meets program goals and objectives for case identification, investigation, partner notification and active referral relating to STD, HIV, and HCV.

7. Confidentiality

Staff funded under this MOU will review and acknowledge the most current Division of Disease Prevention Security and Confidentiality (S&C) Guidelines on an annual basis. Annual acknowledgement of the S&C Guidelines is conducted through REDCap. 8. Reports

The supervisor and/or RSPC will provide the Department with Skills Inventory reports for DIS in accordance with the Department's quality assurance schedule.

B. The Department agrees to provide the following services during the term of this agreement:

(1) Funding

Provide funds to aid efficient and timely disease intervention services, including: personnel salary and fringe benefits only.

(2) Hiring

Assist with recruitment and hiring of employee(s) to fulfill the services outlined in this MOU, including:

- (a) Representation on the interview panel.
- (3) DIS Consultation Services
 - (a) Provide subject matter expertise and recommendations within 24 hours of initial inquiry that is complete, accurate, and concise.
 - (b) Assure ongoing communication between local and Subrecipient staff and central office.
- (4) Provide current version of the FOM to guide DIS services.
- (5) Training
 - (a) Provide technical consultation and ongoing training, as necessary, for the provision of disease intervention services.
 - (b) Reimburse travel expenses to attend the five day in-person Passport to Partner Services training upon completion of the online modules as well as other travel as agreed upon by the Department.
- (6) Program Evaluation
 - (a) Provide program evaluation and regular contact including site visits to share program updates, lessons learned, and provisions of the contract.
 - (b) Conduct periodic onsite evaluations to assist and evaluate the impact of DIS performance on the prevention and control of STD, HIV, and HCV infections.

(7) Confidentiality

Provide current version of the S&C Guidelines to ensure data is kept secure and confidential.

(8) Reports

Provide the Subrecipient with monthly morbidity reports and quarterly STD and HIV case management reports (individual worker and district composite), in order to assist the Subrecipient in evaluating disease intervention outcomes.

A valid invoice shall be submitted to the Department by the tenth (or designated date) of the month following the month of service. Payment will be made in accordance with the Prompt Payment Act of Virginia by check or EDI. (State payment type)

VIII. TERMS AND CONDITIONS:

- **A.** AUDIT: The Subrecipient shall retain all books, records, and other documents relative to this agreement for five (5) years after final payment, or until audited by the Commonwealth of Virginia, whichever is sooner. The Department, its authorized agents, and/or state auditors shall have full access to and the right to examine any of said materials during said period.
- B. APPLICABLE LAWS AND COURTS: This contract shall be governed in all respects by the laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia, without regard to its choice of law provisions, and any litigation with respect thereto shall be brought in the circuit courts of the Commonwealth. The Department and the Subrecipient are encouraged to resolve any issues in controversy arising from the award of the contract or any contractual dispute using Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) procedures (Code of Virginia, § 2.2-4366). ADR procedures are described in Chapter 9 of the Vendors Manual. The Subrecipient shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws, rules and regulations.
- **C.** AVAILABILITY OF FUNDS: It is understood and agreed between the parties herein that the department shall be bound hereunder only to the extent that the legislature has appropriated funds that are legally available or may hereafter become legally available for the purpose of this agreement.

D. BACKGROUND CHECKS:

- The VDH may require a background check for Subrecipient staff assigned to any resulting agreement. The Subrecipient shall be required to pay for all background checks processed for staff assigned to any agreement resulting from this contract agreement at a rate of \$50.00. Fees are on a per background check basis and will be invoiced by VDH Accounting. The Subrecipient employees will be required to complete a form granting authority to release information. The Subrecipient shall allow the VDH access to review Subrecipient staff personnel and employment records.
- 2. Background investigation results will be reviewed by the VDH, and are not releasable to the Subrecipient, however, can be provided to the individual of the investigation upon a written request.
- 3. In the event agreement award is made prior to completion of background checks, any unfavorable results shall be subject to the terms and conditions of this contract agreement.
- 4. In the event of any staff turnover or staff reassignments, the Subrecipient shall notify the VDH and shall submit the appropriate background history questionnaire, authority for release of information and have fingerprints obtained for any proposed new staff member. This shall be in addition to the requirement to provide the required credentials information. The VDH may remove any Subrecipient employee that the Contract Administrator feels threatens the health or safety of staff, security of the facility, or quality of the service provided by the Subrecipient.

- **E. CANCELLATION OF AGREEMENT:** The department reserves the right to cancel and terminate any resulting contract, in part or in whole, without penalty, upon 60 days written notice to the Subrecipient. In the event the initial contract period is for more than 12 months, the resulting contract may also be terminated by the Subrecipient, without penalty, after the initial 12 months of the contract period upon 60 days written notice to the other party. Any contract cancellation notice shall not relieve the Subrecipient of the obligation to deliver and/or perform on all outstanding orders issued prior to the effective date of cancellation.
- **CHANGES TO THE AGREEMENT:** The parties may agree in writing to modify the scope of the Memorandum of Agreement. An increase or decrease in the price to the memorandum of Agreement resulting from such modification shall be agreed to by the parties as a part of their written agreement to modify the scope of the Memorandum of Agreement.
- G. CONFIDENTIALITY OF PROPRIETARY INFORMATION AND PERSONALLY IDENTIFIABLE INFORMATION: The Subrecipient assures that information and data obtained as to proprietary information and personal facts and circumstances related to patients or clients will be collected and held confidential, during and following the term of this agreement, and will not be divulged without the individual's and the Department's written consent and only in accordance with federal law or the Code of Virginia. Subrecipients who utilize, access, or store proprietary information or personally identifiable information as part of the performance of an agreement are required to safeguard this information and immediately notify the Department of any breach or suspected breach in the security of such information. Subrecipients shall allow the Department to both participate in the investigation of incidents and exercise control over decisions regarding external reporting. Subrecipients and their employees working on this project may be required to sign a confidentiality statement.
- **H. DRUG-FREE WORKPLACE:** Applicable for all contracts over \$10,000:

During the performance of this contract, the Subrecipient agrees to (i) provide a drug-free workplace for the Subrecipient's employees; (ii) post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, a statement notifying employees that the unlawful manufacture, sale, distribution, dispensation, possession, or use of a controlled substance or marijuana is prohibited in the Subrecipient's workplace and specifying the actions that will be taken against employees for violations of such prohibition; (iii) state in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the Subrecipient that the Subrecipient maintains a drug-free workplace; and (iv) include the provisions of the foregoing clauses in every subcontract or purchase order of over \$10,000, so that the provisions will be binding upon each Subrecipient or vendor.

For the purposes of this section, "drug-free workplace" means a site for the performance of work done in connection with a specific contract awarded to a Subrecipient, the employees of whom are prohibited from engaging in the unlawful manufacture, sale, distribution, dispensation, possession or use of any controlled substance or marijuana during the performance of the contract.

- I. IMMIGRATION REFORM AND CONTROL ACT OF 1986: Applicable for all contracts over \$10,000: By entering into a written contract with the Commonwealth of Virginia, the Subrecipient certifies that the Subrecipient does not, and shall not during the performance of the contract for goods and services in the Commonwealth, knowingly employ an unauthorized alien as defined in the federal Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986.
- **RENEWAL OF AGREEMENT:** This agreement may be renewed by the Commonwealth upon written agreement of both parties for 3 successive one year periods, under the terms of the current agreement, and at a reasonable time (approximately 90 days) prior to the expiration.
- K. ANTI-DISCRIMINATION: By submitting this agreement Subrecipient certifies to the Commonwealth that they will conform to the provisions of the Federal Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended, as well as the Virginia Fair Employment Contracting Act of 1975, as amended, where applicable, the Virginians With Disabilities Act, the Americans With Disabilities Act and § 2.2-4311 of the Virginia Public Procurement Act (VPPA). If the award is made to a faith-based organization, the organization shall not discriminate against any recipient of goods, services, or disbursements made pursuant to the contract on the basis of the recipient's religion, religious belief, refusal to participate in a religious practice, or on the basis of race, age, color, gender or national origin and shall be subject to the same rules as other organizations that contract with public bodies to account for the use of the funds provided; however, if the faith-based organization segregates public funds into separate accounts, only the accounts and programs funded with public funds shall be subject to audit by the public body. (Code of Virginia, § 2.2-4343.1E).

 - c. Notices, advertisements and solicitations placed in accordance with federal law, rule or regulation shall be deemed sufficient for the purpose of meeting the requirements of this section.
 - d. If the contractor employs more than five employees, the contractor shall (i) provide annual training on the contractor's sexual harassment policy to all

supervisors and employees providing services in the Commonwealth, except such supervisors or employees that are required to complete sexual harassment training provided by the Department of Human Resource Management, and (ii) post the contractor's sexual harassment policy in (a) a conspicuous public place in each building located in the Commonwealth that the contractor owns or leases for business purposes and (b) the contractor's employee handbook.

- e. The requirements of these provisions 1. and 2. are a material part of the contract. If the Contractor violates one of these provisions, the Commonwealth may terminate the affected part of this contract for breach, or at its option, the whole contract. Violation of one of these provisions may also result in debarment from State contracting regardless of whether the specific contract is terminated.
- f. In accordance with Executive Order 61 (2017), a prohibition on discrimination by the contractor, in its employment practices, subcontracting practices, and delivery of goods or services, on the basis of race, sex, color, national origin, religion, sexual orientation, gender identity, age, political affiliation, disability, or veteran status, is hereby incorporated in this contract.
- 2. The Subrecipient will include the provisions of 1. above in every subcontract or purchase order over \$10,000, so that the provisions will be binding upon each Subrecipient or vendor.
- L. <u>ANTITRUST</u>: By entering into an agreement, the Subrecipient conveys, sells, assigns, and transfers to the Commonwealth of Virginia all rights, title and interest in and to all causes of action it may now have or hereafter acquire under the antitrust laws of the United States and the Commonwealth of Virginia, relating to the particular goods or services purchased or acquired by the Commonwealth of Virginia under said agreement.

M. PAYMENT:

1. To Prime Subrecipient:

- a. Invoices for items ordered, delivered and accepted shall be submitted by the Subrecipient directly to the payment address shown on the purchase order/contract. All invoices shall show the state contract number and/or purchase order number; social security number (for individual Subrecipients) or the federal employer identification number (for proprietorships, partnerships, and corporations).
- b. Any payment terms requiring payment in less than 30 days will be regarded as requiring payment 30 days after invoice or delivery, whichever occurs last. This shall not affect offers of discounts for payment in less than 30 days, however.
- c. All goods or services provided under this contract or purchase order, that are to be paid for with public funds, shall be billed by the Subrecipient at the contract price, regardless of which public agency is being billed.

- d. The following shall be deemed to be the date of payment: the date of postmark in all cases where payment is made by mail, or when offset proceedings have been instituted as authorized under the Virginia Debt Collection Act.
- e. **Unreasonable Charges**. Under certain emergency procurements and for most time and material purchases, final job costs cannot be accurately determined at the time orders are placed. In such cases, Subrecipients should be put on notice that final payment in full is contingent on a determination of reasonableness with respect to all invoiced charges. Charges which appear to be unreasonable will be resolved in accordance with *Code of Virginia*, § 2.2-4363 and -4364. Upon determining that invoiced charges are not reasonable, the Commonwealth shall notify the Subrecipient of defects or improprieties in invoices within fifteen (15) days as required in *Code of Virginia*, § 2.2-4351.,. The provisions of this section do not relieve an department of its prompt payment obligations with respect to those charges which are not in dispute (*Code of Virginia*, § 2.2-4363).

2. To Subrecipients:

- a. Within seven (7) days of the Subrecipient's receipt of payment from the Commonwealth, a Subrecipient awarded a contract under this solicitation is hereby obligated:
- (1) To pay the Subrecipient(s) for the proportionate share of the payment received for work performed by the Subrecipient(s) under the contract; or
- (2) To notify the department and the Subrecipient(s), in writing, of the Subrecipient's intention to withhold payment and the reason.
- b. The Subrecipient is obligated to pay the Subrecipient(s) interest at the rate of one percent per month (unless otherwise provided under the terms of the contract) on all amounts owed by the Subrecipient that remain unpaid seven (7) days following receipt of payment from the Commonwealth, except for amounts withheld as stated in (2) above. The date of mailing of any payment by U. S. Mail is deemed to be payment to the addressee. These provisions apply to each sub-tier Subrecipient performing under the primary contract. A Subrecipient's obligation to pay an interest charge to a Subrecipient may not be construed to be an obligation of the Commonwealth.
- 3. Each prime Subrecipient who wins an award in which provision of a SWaM procurement plan is a condition to the award, shall deliver to the contracting department or institution, on or before request for final payment, evidence and certification of compliance (subject only to insubstantial shortfalls and to shortfalls arising from Subrecipient default) with the SWaM procurement plan. Final payment under the contract in question may be withheld until such certification is delivered and, if necessary, confirmed by the department or institution, or other appropriate penalties may be assessed in lieu of withholding such payment.
- 4. The Commonwealth of Virginia encourages Subrecipients and Subrecipients to accept electronic and credit card payments.

- **N.** ASSIGNMENT OF AGREEMENT: An agreement shall not be assignable by the Subrecipient in whole or in part without the written consent of the Commonwealth.
- DEFAULT: In case of failure to deliver goods or services in accordance with the agreement terms and conditions, the Commonwealth, after due oral or written notice, may procure them from other sources and hold the Subrecipient responsible for any resulting additional purchase and administrative costs. This remedy shall be in addition to any other remedies which the Commonwealth may have.
- P. INSURANCE: By signing and submitting a bid or proposal under this solicitation, the bidder or offeror certifies that if awarded the contract, it will have the following insurance coverage at the time the contract is awarded. For construction contracts, if any Subrecipients are involved, the Subrecipient will have workers' compensation insurance in accordance with §§ 2.2-4332 and 65.2-800 et seq. of the Code of Virginia. The bidder or offeror further certifies that the Subrecipient and any Subrecipients will maintain these insurance coverage during the entire term of the contract and that all insurance coverage will be provided by insurance companies authorized to sell insurance in Virginia by the Virginia State Corporation Commission. Fairfax County government is self-insured and is prohibited from providing Additional Insured Status and agreeing to Holding Harmless or Indemnifying any parties.

MINIMUM INSURANCE COVERAGES AND LIMITS:

- 1. Workers' Compensation Statutory requirements and benefits. Coverage is compulsory for employers of three or more employees, to include the employer. - 4. Automobile Liability \$1,000,000 combined single limit. (Required only if a motor vehicle not owned by the Commonwealth is to be used in the contract. Subrecipient must assure that the required coverage is maintained by the Subrecipient (or third party owner of such motor vehicle.)

PROFESSIONAL SERVICES - Health Care Practitioner (to include Dentists, Licensed Dental Hygienists, Optometrists, Registered or Licensed Practical Nurses, Pharmacists, Physicians, Podiatrists, Chiropractors, Physical Therapists, Physical Therapist Assistants, Clinical Psychologists, Clinical Social Workers, Professional Counselors, Hospitals, or Health Maintenance Organizations.)

- Q. <u>NONDISCRIMINATION OF SUBRECEIPIENTS:</u> A Subrecipient shall not be discriminated against in the solicitation or award of this contract because of race, religion, color, sex, national origin, age, disability, faith-based organizational status, any other basis prohibited by state law relating to discrimination in employment or because the bidder or offeror employs ex-offenders unless the state department, department or institution has made a written determination that employing ex-offenders on the specific contract is not in its best interest. If the award of this contract is made to a faith-based organization and an individual, who applies for or receives goods, services, or disbursements provided pursuant to this contract objects to the religious character of the faith-based organization from which the individual receives or would receive the goods, services, or disbursements, the public body shall offer the individual, within a reasonable period of time after the date of his objection, access to equivalent goods, services, or disbursements from an alternative provider.
- **R.** <u>WHISTLEBLOWER PROTECTIONS:</u> Congress has enacted the whistleblower protection statute 41 U.S.C. - S. <u>AUTHORIZATION TO CONDUCT BUSINESS IN THE COMMONWEALTH</u>: A Subrecipient organized as a stock or nonstock corporation, limited liability company, business trust, or limited partnership or registered as a registered limited liability partnership shall be authorized to transact business in the Commonwealth as a domestic or foreign business entity if so required by Title 13.1 or Title 50 of the *Code of Virginia* or as otherwise required by law. Any business entity described above that enters into a contact with a public body pursuant to the *Virginia Public Procurement Act* shall not allow its existence to lapse or its certificate of authority or registration to transact business in the Commonwealth, if so required under Title 13.1 or Title 50, to be revoked or cancelled at any time during the term of the contract. A public body may void any contract with a business entity if the business entity fails to remain in compliance with the provisions of this section.
- **T.** <u>SERVICE ORGANIZATION CONTROLS</u>: Service Organization Controls (SOC2) may be required for this contract. Please see link for requirements: http://www.doa.virginia.gov/Admin Services/CAPP/CAPP Topics/10305.pdf

CERTIFICATION OF INTERNAL CONTROLS: The Subrecipient shall have clearly delineated processes and procedures for the internal control of sensitive data and processes, which

are any data and processes of which the compromising of confidentiality, integrity, and/or availability could have a material adverse effect on Commonwealth of Virginia interests, the conduct of department programs, or to the privacy of which individuals are entitled, when such sensitive data or processes are related to the goods and/or services provided pursuant to this agreement.

The Subrecipient shall provide evidence of compliant and ongoing internal control of sensitive data and processes through a standard methodology, such as but without limitation the American Institute of Certified Public Accountant (AICPA) Service Organization Control (SOC) Reports. The evidence of compliance shall be contained in a report describing the effectiveness of the Subrecipient's internal controls. The most recent version of the report shall be provided to the purchasing office upon request. Trade secrets or proprietary information contained within the report shall not be subject to public disclosure under the Virginia Freedom of Information Act; however, the Subrecipient must invoke the protection of Code of Virginia, § 2.2-4342F, in writing, prior to or upon submission of the report, and must identify the data or other materials to be protected and state the reasons why protection is necessary.

If deficiencies in the Subrecipient's internal control processes and procedures are described in the most recent version of the report, the Subrecipient shall automatically submit the report to the purchasing office within a timely manner and shall describe the corrective actions to be put into place by the Subrecipient to remedy the deficiencies. Failure to report and/or repair deficiencies in a timely manner shall be cause for the Commonwealth to make a determination of breach of contract.

The Subrecipient's obligations for certification of internal controls shall survive and continue after completion of this agreement unless the Subrecipient certifies the destruction of the sensitive data at the end of the contract term.

U. CONTINUITY OF SERVICES:

- a) The Subrecipient recognizes that the services under this contract are vital to the Department and must be continued without interruption and that, upon contract expiration, a successor, either the Agency or another Subrecipient, may continue them. The Subrecipient agrees:
 - (i) To exercise its best efforts and cooperation to effect an orderly and efficient transition to a successor;
 - (ii) To make all Department owned facilities, equipment, and data available to any successor at an appropriate time prior to the expiration of the contract to facilitate transition to successor; and
 - (iii) That the Department Contracting Officer shall have final authority to resolve disputes related to the transition of the contract from the Subrecipient to its successor.
- b) The Subrecipient shall, upon written notice from the Contract Officer, furnish phase-in/phase-out services for up to ninety (90) days after this contract expires and shall negotiate in good faith a plan with the successor to execute the phase-

- in/phase-out services. This plan shall be subject to the Contract Officer's approval.
- c) The Subrecipient shall be reimbursed for all reasonable, pre-approved phase-in/phase-out costs (i.e., costs incurred within the agreed period after contract expiration that result from phase-in, phase-out operations) and a fee (profit) not to exceed a pro rata portion of the fee (profit) under this contract. All phase-in/phase-out work fees must be approved by the Contract Officer in writing prior to commencement of said work.

- **B.** CONFIDENTIALITY OF PERSONALLY IDENTIFIABLE INFORMATION: The Subrecipient assures that information and data obtained as to personal facts and circumstances related to patients or clients will be collected and held confidential, during and following the term of this agreement, and unless disclosure is required pursuant to court order, subpoena or other regulatory authority, disclosure will not be divulged without the individual's and the department's written consent, and only in accordance with federal law, including the HIPAA Privacy rule or the Code of Virginia.

Subrecipients who utilize, access, or store personally identifiable information (PII), protected health information (PHI), and electronic protected health information (ePHI), in performance of a contract, and in support of the HIPAA Privacy and Security regulations, are required to safeguard PII and PHI by:

- a. implementing appropriate safeguards to prevent unauthorized use or disclosure of the information, including implementing requirements of the HIPAA Security Rule with regard to ePHI,
- implementing appropriate safeguards to prevent unauthorized use or disclosure of the information, including implementing requirements of the HIPAA Security Rule with regard to ePHI,
- ensure that any sub contractors the Subrecipient may engage on its behalf, and will
 have access to PHI, agrees to the same restrictions and conditions that apply to the
 business associate with respect to such information, and
- d. immediately notifies the department of any breach, or suspected breach, in the security of such information.

Subrecipients shall allow the department to both participate in the investigation of incidents and exercise control over decisions regarding external reporting. Subrecipients and their employees working on this project may be required to sign a confidentiality statement.

C. <u>CONFIDENTIALITY OF HEALTH RECORDS</u>:

By signature on this agreement, the Subrecipient agrees to comply with all applicable statutory provisions and regulations of the Commonwealth of Virginia and in the performance of this agreement (agreement) shall:

- 1. Not use or further disclose health records other than as permitted or required by the terms of this agreement or as required by law;
- Use appropriate safeguards, as defined by HIPAA the Privacy and Security Rules to prevent use or disclosure of health records other than as permitted by this agreement;
- 3. Report to the Department of Health any use or disclosure of health records not provided for by this Agreement;
- 4. Mitigate, to the extent practicable, any harmful effect that is known to the Subrecipient of a use or disclosure of health records by the Subrecipient in violation of the requirements of this agreement;
- 5. Impose the same requirements and restrictions contained in this agreement on its subSubrecipient s and agents;
- 6. Provide access to health records contained in its records to the Department of Health, in the time and manner designated by the Department of Health, or at the request of the Department of Health, to an individual in order to afford access as required by law;
- 7. Make available health records in its records to the Department of Health for amendment and incorporate any amendments to health records in its records at the Department of Health request; and
- 8. Document and provide to the Department of Health information relating to disclosures of health records as required for the Department of Health to respond to a request by an individual for an accounting of disclosures of health records.

The Subrecipient shall provide evidence of compliant and ongoing internal control of sensitive and/or private data and processes through a standard methodology, including the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (42 USC Sec. 1320D et seq., the federal rules adopted thereunder (45 CFR Parts 160, 162 and 164, as applicable), and the American Institute of Certified Public Accountant (AICPA) Service Organization Control (SOC) Reports. The evidence of compliance shall be contained in a report describing the effectiveness of the Subrecipient's internal controls. There shall be an appropriate separate instrument, i.e., a business associate agreement (BAA), executed between the parties further protecting the privacy and security of data."

X. STATUS OF PERSONNEL: <u>Brianna Carey</u>, STD Program Analyst for the Division of Disease Prevention, has been designated as the Department administrator for this Agreement.

Authorization for the Office of the Sheriff to Apply for and Accept Funding from the Washington/Baltimore High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area for the FY 2023 Advancing Interventions to Mitigate Substances Grant in the Washington/Baltimore High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area Communities

ISSUE:

Board of Supervisors (BOS) authorization is requested for the Office of the Sheriff to apply for and accept grant funding, if received, from the Washington/Baltimore High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA) for the FY 2023 Advancing Interventions to Mitigate Substances (AIMS) Grant in the Washington/Baltimore HIDTA) Communities in the amount of \$329,269. This grant is designed to build on the success of current HIDTA grant funding with enhanced jail-based Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) program for Opioid Use Disorder including treatment services and increased coordination with the STAR (Striving to Achieve Recovery) program. There are 2/2.0 FTE grant positions associated with the current HIDTA grant award that will continue with the new HIDTA grant award. The grant period is July 1, 2023, to June 30, 2024, with an opportunity for second year of funding based on performance and availability. No Local Cash Match is required. If the actual award received is significantly different from the application amount, another item will be submitted to the Board requesting appropriation of grant funds. Otherwise, staff will process the award administratively per Board policy. Board authorization is also requested for the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors, the County Executive and/or a designee appointed by the County Executive to enter into the grant agreement and any related agreements, including but not limited to Subaward Agreements, on behalf of the County.

RECOMMENDATION:

The County Executive recommends that the Board authorize the Office of the Sheriff to apply for and accept funding, if received, from the Washington/Baltimore HIDTA, AIMS in the Washington/Baltimore HIDTA Communities Program in the amount of \$329,269. No Local Cash Match is required. The County Executive also recommends the Board authorize the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors, the County Executive, and/or designee appointed by the County Executive to enter into the grant agreement and any related agreements, including but not limited to Federal Subaward Agreements, on behalf of the County.

TIMING:

Board action is requested on February 22, 2022. Due to the grant application deadline of February 4, 2022, the application was submitted pending Board approval. This Board item is being presented at the earliest subsequent BOS meeting. If the Board does not approve this request, the application will be immediately withdrawn.

BACKGROUND:

On December 15, 2021, the Washington/Baltimore High Intensity Drug Trafficking office announced funding availability for FY 2023 Advancing Interventions to Mitigate Substances. This proposal allows for enhancement of the current grant award from HIDTA's FY 2020 Advancing Systems of Recovery for Addiction (ASRA) solicitation. That grant will complete its third and final year on June 30, 2023. This proposal will enhance the current Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) for opioid use disorder at the Adult Detention Center (ADC). It will also build on existing partnerships, post-release supports including housing, employment services, and health care designed to reduce recidivism and overdoses. A third-party evaluator will provide support for HIDTA data collection requirements and develop additional process and outcome measurement approaches to demonstrate effectiveness and provide grant administration support for this project. A 1/1.0 FTE grant Recovery Navigator position and a 1/1.0 FTE grant nurse position will continue to provide staff support for this funding cycle. This project will help connect people with community-based services as program participants are released. Funding may be available for another 12 months depending on the success of the proposed project and funding availability. The jail-based programming has garnered national attention since its launch in July 2020. Jail-based MAT treatment is a key County strategy to address the opioid epidemic especially among individuals involved with the criminal justice system who are at extreme risk for overdoses following a period of incarceration.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Grant funding in the amount of \$329,269, is being requested from the Washington/Baltimore HIDTA to support medication expenses, evaluation, grants management, technical assistance and training, and reentry supports. No Local Cash Match is required. This grant does not allow for the recovery of indirect costs. This action does not increase the expenditure level of the Federal-State Grant Fund, as funds are held in reserve for unanticipated grant awards.

CREATION OF NEW POSITIONS:

No new positions will be created by this grant award; however, this funding will support 2/2.0 FTE existing grant positions that are currently funded under the current HIDTA

grant award that is ending. The County is under no obligation to continue funding these positions if the new grant is not awarded.

Proposed Use of Funds: The Enhanced Jail-Based Recovery-Oriented Medication Assisted

Treatment and Wrap-Around Reentry Supports project enhances an evidence- and jail-based treatment program and multi-faceted reentry and recovery supports program that provides holistic, wrap-around substance abuse treatment and recovery services to mitigate against key risk factors associated with recidivism and overdoses. This will solidify the connection between the jail-based STAR (Striving to Achieve Recovery) program for individuals receiving medications for opioid use disorder. Services include jail-based Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) from booking through release, that will transition to community-based outpatient MAT clinics, housing, health care, community recovery supports, and peer navigation. The proposal will serve 75 people engaged in the jail-based treatment and recovery services who will benefit from the proposed treatment and recovery transitional reentry supports. Funds will cover personnel (Recovery Navigator and Nurse) as well as contracted grant administration, program evaluation, enhancement training and technical assistance

program evaluation, enhancement training and technical assistance, housing services, support groups, and some medication costs,.

The geographic area of the project is Fairfax County, but it will include people incarcerated in the Fairfax County Adult Detention Center who may be from other jurisdictions. This model will continue to be evaluated and will aid in replication of this model across the country.

Performance Measures:

The overall goal of this project is for participants to engage in treatment while incarcerated and successful transition to the community with reentry supports resulting in ongoing engagement in a recovery-oriented lifestyle, reduced recidivism and reduced overdoses for 75 people during the funding cycle.

- 1- Compliance with all HIDTA-required performance measures including the following process indicators: numbers screened, number of urine screens, numbers receiving treatment, discharges, and rates of recidivism.
- 2- Assure early identification of opioid use disorder starting with screening at booking, safe withdrawal protocols, induction with medications for opioid use disorder when needed, and ongoing

- engagement with treatment throughout period of incarceration or as clinically indicated for up to 75 participants.
- 3- Broaden eligibility requirements for the STAR (Striving to Achieve Recovery Program) program to encourage participants receiving MOUD to participate.
- 4- Provided recovery-focused housing supports for up to 35 participants.
- 5- Evaluate use of cell phones for people transitioning to the community as a tool to improve community connections and engagement.
- 6- Build recovery supports to include jail-based 12 step programs, reading materials, community sponsors, access to community-based treatment at release, and peer support for up to 75 participants.
- 7- Assure that transportation is provided to any participant needing it to access a community-based treatment facility or recovery housing for up to 75 participants.
- 8- Link participants with community recovery supports including 12-step recovery networks, health care, evidence-based wellness services, and peer support for 75 participants.
- 9- Assure that all eligible participants apply for Medicaid health care benefits and provide information about health care access prior to release for 35 participants.
- 10- Enhance partnerships to sustain participant engagement with the Chris Atwood Foundation and the Community Services Board for 75 participants.

Grant Period:

July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024 with one 12 month renewal based on fund availability and performance.

Authorization to Advertise a Public Hearing to Consider an Ordinance to Amend and Readopt Fairfax County Code Sections 7-2-4 through 7-2-13 in Response to the 2021 Decennial Redistricting, to Adjust Certain Election Precinct Boundaries, Create New Election Precincts, and Establish Polling Places for Those New Precincts in the Braddock, Hunter Mill, Dranesville, Lee, Mason, Mount Vernon, Providence, Springfield, and Sully Districts; Consolidate the Danbury and Kings Park Precincts in the Braddock District; and Relocate the Polling Places for the Chesterbrook Precinct in the Dranesville District and the Army Precinct in the Mount Vernon District

ISSUE:

Authorization to advertise a Public Hearing to consider an ordinance that proposes to amend and readopt Fairfax County Code §§ 7-2-4 through 7-2-13 in response to the 2021 decennial redistricting, to adjust certain election precinct boundaries, create new election precincts, and establish polling places for those new precincts in the Braddock, Hunter Mill, Dranesville, Lee, Mason, Mount Vernon, Providence, Springfield, and Sully Districts; consolidate the Danbury and Kings Park Precincts in the Braddock District; and relocate the polling places for the Chesterbrook Precinct in the Dranesville District and the Army precinct in the Mount Vernon District.

RECOMMENDATION:

The County Executive recommends that the Board authorize advertisement of a public hearing on Tuesday, March 8, 2022, at 4:00 p.m. to consider this ordinance and the associated resolution.

TIMING:

Board action is requested on February 22, 2022, to provide sufficient time to advertise the proposed public hearing for adoption of this ordinance and the associated resolution on March 8, 2022, at 4:00 p.m.

BACKGROUND:

Following the 2021 decennial census, the boundary lines of local magisterial, Virginia House of Delegates, State Senate, and Congressional election districts were redrawn to reflect changes in population distribution, as required by Virginia Code §§ 24.2-302.2 through 304.3. The Board adopted its plan for Fairfax County's magisterial districts on December 7, 2021, and received a Certification of No Objection from the Virginia

Attorney General for that plan on January 10, 2022. Applying a process approved by constitutional amendment in 2020, the Virginia Supreme Court issued an order approving and adopting a plan for House of Delegates, State Senate, and Congressional districts on December 28, 2021.

The year prior to redistricting, the General Assembly amended Virginia Code § 24.2-307, prohibiting the use of "split precincts" except in very limited cases, specifically where creating a precinct with less than 100 voters could not be avoided. Virginia Code § 24.2-307 also bars the establishment of precincts with more than 5,000 registered voters. Prior to the 2020 amendments, a single precinct could serve voters residing in two different legislative districts, such that voters received different ballots depending on the district in which their home resided. Under the revised statute and unless a waiver is granted by the Virginia Department of Elections ("ELECT"), the different portions of such a "split precinct" must be divided into separate precincts and/or combined with other, adjacent precincts, so that all voters in each resulting precinct reside in the same magisterial, State and Congressional districts.

The new State and Congressional districts established by the Virginia Supreme Court created numerous split precincts in the County. All of the split precincts must be eliminated before the June 21 primary election. The only exceptions to elimination of the split precincts under the proposed plan are four areas containing no registered voters that cannot be joined with adjacent precincts. The proposed plan includes seeking ELECT waivers to integrate those four areas into adjacent precincts.

The Electoral Board and the Office of Elections have been developing a plan to resolve the new split precincts since early January, with the goal of completing the process sufficiently in advance of the June primary to notify all affected voters as required. However, on February 1, 2022, ELECT notified all jurisdictions in the Commonwealth that the process of eliminating split precincts resulting from redistricting, including entry of all the changes into Virginia's computerized voter registration and election information system ("VERIS"), must be completed no later March 21, 2022. Further, ELECT will not grant local election offices access to make the necessary changes in VERIS until their governing bodies have adopted an ordinance reflecting the changes and the ordinance has satisfied Virginia Code § 24.2-129.

Virginia Code § 24.2-129 requires that certain "covered practices" go through either a statutorily specified public comment process or receive a Certification of No Objection from the Attorney General before the practices can be given effect. The public comment process takes a minimum of 75 days to complete, while the Attorney General process takes a maximum of 60 days to complete. When the County sought a Certification of No Objection for its redistricting ordinance, the certification was issued in 28 days.

Among the "covered practices" identified are any changes to precincts that consolidate, relocate, or reduce the number of polling places in the County. As is detailed in the attachments to this Board Item, the elimination of split precincts results in consolidation, relocation, and elimination of polling places, as well as revised precinct boundaries for many, but not all, County precincts.

As a result, the Board must first adopt an ordinance making the boundary and polling place changes required by redistricting. After the Board adopts the ordinance, the County Attorney will file a request for a Certification of No Objection with the Virginia Attorney General, in accordance with Virginia Code § 24.2-129(D).

In response to the March 21 deadline, the Office of Elections expedited its development of a plan to resolve the County's split precincts. The proposed plan reflected in the attached summary, descriptions, maps, and draft ordinance revises precinct boundaries and polling places to eliminate split precincts created by the 2021 redistricting. The proposed plan also relocates two polling places due to building closures at existing precincts and reduces the size of 7 larger precincts by sub-dividing them. Finally, the proposed plan recommends seeking a waiver to establish four split precincts to incorporate small areas of land that currently have no registered voters. Written descriptions of the changes proposed can be found at Attachment 2. Descriptions and maps detailing the results of the proposed changes can be found at Attachment 3.

The Office of Elections used the following guidelines in developing the proposed plan: (1) Disrupt the fewest voters possible; (2) Ensure that affected precinct boundaries and polling places meet all legal requirements, including those for location and accessibility; (3) Confirm that polling places have adequate facilities to accommodate voters, including parking; and (4) Minimize the number of extremely small or extremely large precincts.

Applying those guidelines and despite the extensive adjustments required due to state and Congressional redistricting, approximately 29,000 voters, or less than 4% of registered voters in the County, will have their polling place affected by the proposed plan. The proposed plan also kept approximately 87,000 voters affected by redistricting in their same polling place.

FISCAL IMPACT:

§ 24.2-305. Composition of election districts and precincts.

A. Each election district and precinct shall be composed of compact and contiguous territory and shall have clearly defined and clearly observable boundaries.

B. A "clearly observable boundary" shall include (i) any named road or street, (ii) any road or highway which is a part of the federal, primary, or secondary state highway system, (iii) any river, stream, or drainage feature shown as a polygon boundary on the TIGER/line files of the United States Bureau of the Census, or (iv) any other natural or constructed or erected permanent physical feature which is shown on an official map issued by the Virginia Department of Transportation, on a United States Geological Survey topographical map, or as a polygon boundary on the TIGER/line files of the United States Bureau of the Census. No property line or subdivision boundary shall be deemed to be a clearly observable boundary unless it is marked by a permanent physical feature that is shown on an official map issued by the Virginia Department of Transportation, on a United States Geological Survey topographical map, or as a polygon boundary on the TIGER/line files of the United States Bureau of the Census.

§ 24.2-307. Requirements for county and city precincts.

The governing body of each county and city shall establish by ordinance as many precincts as it deems necessary. Each governing body is authorized to increase or decrease the number of precincts and alter precinct boundaries subject to the requirements of this chapter.

At the time any precinct is established, it shall have no more than 5,000 registered voters. The general registrar shall notify the governing body whenever the number of voters who voted in a precinct in an election for President of the United States exceeds 4,000. Within six months of receiving the notice, the governing body shall proceed to revise the precinct boundaries, and any newly established or redrawn precinct shall have no more than 5,000 registered voters.

At the time any precinct is established, each precinct in a county shall have no fewer than 100 registered voters and each precinct in a city shall have no fewer than 500 registered voters.

Each precinct shall be wholly contained within a single congressional district, Senate district, House of Delegates district, and election district used for the election of one or more members of the governing body or school board for the county or city. In each year ending in one, the governing body of each county and city shall establish the precinct boundaries to be consistent with any congressional district, Senate district, House of Delegates district, and local election district that was adopted by the appropriate authority by June 15 of that year. If congressional districts, Senate districts, House of Delegates districts, or local election districts have not been adopted by the appropriate authority by June 15 of a year ending in one, the governing body may use the congressional districts, Senate districts, House of Delegates districts, or local election districts as such districts existed on June 15 of that year as the basis for establishing the precinct boundaries to be used for the elections to be held in November of that year. Such governing body shall establish precinct boundaries to be consistent with any subsequent changes to the congressional districts, Senate districts, House of Delegates districts, or local election districts. If a governing body is unable to establish a precinct with the minimum number of registered voters without splitting the precinct between two or more congressional districts, Senate districts,

House of Delegates districts, or local election districts, it shall apply to the State Board for a waiver to administer a split precinct. The State Board may grant the waiver or direct the governing body to establish a precinct with fewer than the minimum number of registered voters as permitted by § 24.2-309. A governing body granted a waiver to administer a split precinct or directed to establish a precinct with fewer than the minimum number of registered voters may use such a precinct for any election held that year.

The governing body shall establish by ordinance one polling place for each precinct.

§ 24.2-310. Requirements for polling places.

A. The polling place for each precinct shall be located within the county or city and either within the precinct or within one mile of the precinct boundary. The polling place for a county precinct may be located within a city (i) if the city is wholly contained within the county election district served by the precinct or (ii) if the city is wholly contained within the county and the polling place is located on property owned by the county. The polling place for a town precinct may be located within one mile of the precinct and town boundary. For town elections held in November, the town shall use the polling places established by the county for its elections.

- B. The governing body of each county, city, and town shall provide funds to enable the general registrar to provide adequate facilities at each polling place for the conduct of elections. Each polling place shall be located in a public building whenever practicable. If more than one polling place is located in the same building, each polling place shall be located in a separate room or separate and defined space.
- C. Polling places shall be accessible to qualified voters as required by the provisions of the Virginians with Disabilities Act (§ 51.5-1 et seq.), the Voting Accessibility for the Elderly and Handicapped Act (52 U.S.C. § 20101 et seq.), and the Americans with Disabilities Act relating to public services (42 U.S.C. § 12131 et seq.). The State Board shall provide instructions to the local electoral boards and general registrars to assist the localities in complying with the requirements of the Acts.
- D. If an emergency makes a polling place unusable or inaccessible, the electoral board or the general registrar shall provide an alternative polling place and give notice of the change in polling place, including to all candidates, or such candidate's campaign, appearing on the ballot to be voted at the alternative polling place, subject to the prior approval of the State Board. The general registrar shall provide notice to the voters appropriate to the circumstances of the emergency. For the purposes of this subsection, an "emergency" means a rare and unforeseen combination of circumstances, or the resulting state, that calls for immediate action.
- E. It shall be permissible to distribute campaign materials on the election day on the property on which a polling place is located and outside of the building containing the room where the election is conducted except as specifically prohibited by law including, without limitation, the prohibitions of § 24.2-604 and the establishment of the "Prohibited Area" within 40 feet of any entrance to the polling place. However, and notwithstanding the provisions of clause (i) of subsection A of § 24.2-604, and upon the approval of the local electoral board, campaign

materials may be distributed outside the polling place and inside the structure where the election is conducted, provided that the "Prohibited Area" (i) includes the area within the structure that is beyond 40 feet of any entrance to the polling place and the area within the structure that is within 40 feet of any entrance to the room where the election is conducted and (ii) is maintained and enforced as provided in § 24.2-604. The local electoral board may approve campaigning activities inside the building where the election is conducted when an entrance to the building is from an adjoining building, or if establishing the 40-foot prohibited area outside the polling place would hinder or delay a qualified voter from entering or leaving the building.

F. Any local government, local electoral board, or the State Board may make monetary grants to any non-governmental entity furnishing facilities under the provisions of § 24.2-307 or 24.2-308 for use as a polling place. Such grants shall be made for the sole purpose of meeting the accessibility requirements of this section. Nothing in this subsection shall be construed to obligate any local government, local electoral board, or the State Board to appropriate funds to any non-governmental entity.

§ 24.2-310.1. Polling places; additional requirement.

The requirement stated in this section shall be in addition to requirements stated in §§ 24.2-307, 24.2-308, and 24.2-310, including the requirement that polling places be located in public buildings whenever practical. No polling place shall be located in a building which serves primarily as the headquarters, office, or assembly building for any private organization, other than an organization of a civic, educational, religious, charitable, historical, patriotic, cultural, or similar nature, unless the State Board has approved the use of the building because no other building meeting the accessibility requirements of this title is available.

Summary of Proposed Changes

February 2022
Fairfax County Office of Elections

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Overview

As a result of the 2020 census and subsequent adoption of new congressional district, Senate district, and House of Delegate districts lines as drawn by the special masters for the Supreme Court of Virginia, local governing bodies were required to eliminate any resulting split precincts as required by Virginia Code 24.2-307; each precinct must now be wholly contained within a single congressional, state senate, delegate, and magisterial district.

In Fairfax County, 54 precincts were directly split by the new district lines implemented by the Supreme Court of Virginia and more than 100 precincts were impacted as a result of the required changes. The proposed changes herein include creating new precincts with an established polling place, or merging and consolidating, where possible, any of the split precinct parts into a contiguous precinct with the same electoral attributes.

After completing this process, four precinct parts remained that contained no registered voters and shared no electoral attributes with any adjoining precincts. This includes two regions in the Lee District, created from the splits of GARFIELD and PIONEER precincts, and two regions in the Springfield District, created from the splits of BURKE and PENDERBROOK precincts. In accordance with established procedures set by the Virginia Department of Elections, which allows for localities to request a waiver in lieu of creating a new precinct with fewer than 100 registered voters, we will request a waiver to keep these impacted areas as part of their existing precincts.

100s – BRADDOCK DISTRICT

Supervisor James R. Walkinshaw

- 1. **108 KINGS PARK** and **133 DANBURY**, previously divided by a political boundary, now share common attributes.
 - a. Absorb 133 DANBURY (751 voters) into 108 KINGS PARK (2,589 voters) and maintain as 108 KINGS PARK (3,340 voters) that will vote at Kings Park Elementary School (*fig. A1*).
- 2. **113 CANTERBURY** was split due to redistricting.
 - a. Absorb the western part of 113 CANTERBURY (348 voters) into 109 LITTLE RUN (1,340 voters) and maintain as 109 LITTLE RUN (1,688 voters) that will vote at Little Run Elementary School (fig. A2).
- 3. **117 WOODSON** was split due to redistricting.

FAIRFAX STATION



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

 - c. Merge the eastern part of 924 SPINDLE (1,353 voters) and the western part of 926 POWELL (1,096 voters) to create <u>924 SPINDLE #1</u> (2,449 voters) that will vote at Centreville Regional Library (*fig. J4*).
 - d. Maintain the central part of 924 SPINDLE (949 voters) as <u>935 SPINDLE #2</u> to co-locate with 924 SPINDLE #1 that will continue to vote at Centreville Regional Library (*fig. J5*).

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- 6. **931 CARSON** was split due to redistricting.
 - a. Absorb the western part of 931 CARSON (1,006 voters) into 927 ARMFIELD (2,260 voters) and maintain as <u>927 ARMFIELD</u> (3,266 voters) that will vote at Franklin Middle School (*fig. J9*).
 - b. Maintain the eastern part of <u>931 CARSON</u> (2,188 voters) as a precinct that will continue to vote at Rachel Carson Middle School (*fig. J9*).

















Section 7-2-12. Sully District.

The Sully District shall consist of these election precincts: Armfield, Brookfield, Bull Run, Carson, Centre Ridge, Centreville, Chantilly, Cub Run, Deer Park, Difficult Run, Fox Valley, Franklin, Green Trails, Hidden Meadow, London Towne, Navy, Oak Hill, Old Mill, Poplar Tree, Powell, Rocky Run, Spindle No. 1, Spindle No. 2, Stone, Stonecroft, Vale, Virginia Run, and Waples Mill.

Section 7-2-13. - General provisions.

All references to election precincts shall refer to those precincts, together with the descriptions and maps of the boundaries and polling places for each of those precincts, which were adopted by the Board of Supervisors on March 24, 2003, as amended on March 8, 2004, March 21, 2005, March 27, 2006, March 26, 2007, September 10, 2007, March 10, 2008, January 12, 2009, March 9, 2010, July 27, 2010, April 26, 2011, July 26, 2011, January 10, 2012, July 10, 2012, March 19, 2013, July 9, 2013, November 18, 2014, June 23, 2015, December 8, 2015, July 12, 2016, July 11, 2017, March 20, 2018, December 4, 2018, and April 9, 2019, December 3, 2019, March 24, 2020, March 23, 2021, June 22, 2021, December 7, 2021, and March 8, 2022, kept on file with the clerk to the Board of Supervisors. Whenever a road, a stream, or other physical feature describes the boundary of a precinct, the center of such road, stream, or physical feature shall be the dividing line between that precinct and any adjoining precinct.

RESOLUTION TO APPLY FOR A WAIVER TO ADMINISTER PIONEER AND GARFIELD PRECINCTS IN THE LEE DISTRICT, AND THE PENDERBROOK AND BURKE NO. 2 PRECINCTS IN THE SPRINGFIELD DISTRICT, AS SPLIT PRECINCTS

At a regular meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Fairfax County, Virginia ("Board of Supervisors") held in the Board Auditorium of the Fairfax County Government Center at 12000 Government Center Parkway in Fairfax, Virginia, on March 8, 2022, the following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS, Virginia Code Section 24.2-307 requires each precinct to be wholly contained within a single congressional, Senate, House of Delegates, and local election district throughout the County for each election year, and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Virginia Code Section 24.2-304.1 and following the 2021 decennial census, the Board of Supervisors adopted an ordinance reapportioning the magisterial districts in the County on December 7, 2021, and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Virginia Code Section 24.2-129(D), that ordinance was given effect on January 10, 2022, after the County received a certification of no objection from the Virginia Attorney General, and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Virginia Code Section 30-399 and following the 2021 decennial census, the Virginia Supreme Court entered an order approving and adopting a plan reapportioning the House of Delegates, State Senate, and Virginia Congressional districts in the County on December 28, 2021, and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Virginia Code Section 24.2-307, the Board of Supervisors adopted an ordinance on March 8, 2022 to adjust certain precinct boundaries, create new election precincts and establish polling places for those new precincts, consolidate certain election precincts and their polling places, and relocate polling places for certain election precincts in the Braddock, Hunter Mill, Dranesville, Lee, Mason, Mount Vernon, Providence, Springfield, and Sully Districts, in response to the 2021 decennial redistricting ("Reprecincting Ordinance"); and

WHEREAS, in accordance with 24.2-129(D), the County attorney will submit a request for a certification of no objections in relation to the Reprecincting Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the Pioneer and Garfield precincts in the Lee District now contain district line splits resulting from the district boundaries established by the Virginia Supreme Court's redistricting of state and Congressional districts, and

WHEREAS, the Penderbrook and Burke No. 2 precincts in the Springfield District now contain district line splits resulting from the district boundaries established by the Virginia Supreme Court's redistricting of state and Congressional districts, and

WHEREAS, those four split precincts include a portion of a state or Congressional district with no registered voters, and

WHEREAS, Virginia Code Section 24.2-307 further requires that County precincts have no fewer than 100 registered voters, and

WHEREAS, eliminating the splits in the Pioneer, Garfield, Penderbrook, and Burke No. 2 precincts would result in precincts containing no voters; and

WHEREAS, Virginia Code Section 24.2-307 further requires that a locality's governing body apply to the State Board of Elections for a waiver to administer a split precinct if a split cannot be eliminated without creating a precinct that has fewer than the permitted, minimum number of voters, and

WHEREAS, the State Board of Elections will permit Office of Elections staff to submit such a waiver application on behalf of the Board of Supervisors if the Board has adopted a resolution confirming its decision to seek a waiver,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Supervisors, in accordance with Virginia Code Section 24.2-307, shall apply to the State Board of Elections for a waiver to administer the Pioneer, Garfield, Penderbrook, and Burke No. 2 precincts as split precincts for any elections held in 2022; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Office of Elections staff may file the Board's waiver application, in accordance with the procedures of the State Board of Elections.

Approval of the Reciprocal Agreement Between the Virginia Department of State Police and Fairfax County During the Police Unity Tour

ISSUE:

Board approval of the Reciprocal Agreement between the Virginia Department of State Police and Fairfax County during the Police Unity Tour.

RECOMMENDATION:

The County Executive recommends that the Board of Supervisors authorize the Chief of Police to sign the Reciprocal Agreement between the Virginia Department of State Police and Fairfax County during the Police Unity Tour.

TIMING:

Board action is requested on February 22, 2022.

BACKGROUND:

This Agreement establishes the powers and responsibilities of both the Fairfax County Police Department (FCPD) and the Virginia Department of State Police (VSP) during the upcoming Police Unity Tour. The Tour is an annual, three-day bicycle ride from central Virginia to Washington, D.C., which draws in law enforcement officers and supporters from around the country to raise awareness about officers who have died in the line of duty. The Tour was first organized by Officer Patrick P. Montuore of the Florham Park Police Department in May 1997.

From May 10, 2022, through May 12, 2022, the Tour will be traveling through the Commonwealth of Virginia. Members of the FCPD and of the VSP, in the course of their respective duties, both provide law enforcement escorts to vehicles or processions within the areas of their respective jurisdictional authority in Virginia. The two departments believe that a cooperative effort between them would be the most advantageous means to provide escort services for the Tour and ensure the safety of its participants. To that end, this Agreement provides that any FCPD officer who participates with officers of the VSP in the escort of bicycle riders or support vehicles associated with the Tour, on the dates and along the route specified, shall have the same powers, rights, benefits, privileges, and immunities from liability as he or she has when operating within Fairfax County, including, but not limited to, the authority to direct

RECIPROCAL AGREEMENT

BETWEEN

THE COUNTY OF FAIRFAX, VIRGINIA

AND

THE VIRGINIA DEPARTMENT OF STATE POLICE

By virtue of the authority contained in Section 15.2-1726 of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, this Reciprocal Agreement is entered into this _____ day of __________, 202_____, by and between the County of Fairfax and the Virginia Department of State Police.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Police Unity Tour is an annual, three-day bicycle ride from central Virginia to Washington, D.C., which draws in law enforcement officers and supporters from around the country to raise awareness about officers who have died in the line of duty; and

WHEREAS, from May 10, 2022 through May 12, 2022, the Police Unity Tour will be traveling through the Commonwealth of Virginia along a route that is set forth in the document attached hereto as Exhibit "A," which is incorporated by reference herein; and

WHEREAS, members of the Fairfax County Police Department and the Department of State Police, in the course of their respective duties, have occasion to provide law enforcement escorts to vehicles or processions within the areas of their respective jurisdictional authority in Virginia; and

WHEREAS, the County of Fairfax and the Department of State Police believe that a cooperative effort between the Fairfax County Police Department and the Department of State Police would be an advantageous means to provide escort services for the Police Unity Tour and to ensure the safety of its riders, other motorists and pedestrians as it travels through the

Commonwealth: and

WHEREAS, members of the Fairfax County Police Department, in the interest of safe and efficient law enforcement practices, need the ability to exercise police authority and jurisdiction while in the performance of their duties escorting processions such as the Police Unity Tour; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Virginia Code § 15.2-1726, the County of Fairfax and the Department of State Police may enter into a reciprocal agreement with each other, subject to such conditions as they may prescribe, for cooperation in the furnishing of police services;

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties hereto jointly resolve and agree:

- The parties wish to maintain the integrity and independence of their respective police forces; however, they are entering into this Reciprocal Agreement to provide more efficient escort services for the Police Unity Tour.
- 2. Any Fairfax County Police officer who participates with officers of the Department of State Police in the escort of bicycle riders or support vehicles associated with the Police Unity Tour, while performing his or her duties within the Commonwealth of Virginia on the dates and along the route specified in this Reciprocal Agreement, shall have the same powers, rights, benefits, privileges, and immunities from liability as he or she has when operating within Fairfax County, including, but not limited to, the authority to direct vehicle traffic and control intersections.
- 3. While providing the escort described in this Reciprocal Agreement, every law enforcement officer participating in such escort from the Fairfax County Police Department and the Department of State Police shall be in uniform and display his or her badge of authority.
- 4. It is the intent and purpose of this Reciprocal Agreement that there be the fullest

- cooperation between the Fairfax County Police Department and the Department of State Police. In furtherance of coordinated operations, the respective departments will each ensure that any information necessary to the planning and execution of this escort is communicated to the other in a timely manner.
- 5. All pensions, insurance, workers compensation and other benefits enjoyed by said officers of the Fairfax County Police Department and the Department of State Police who perform escort duties under this Reciprocal Agreement shall be the sole responsibility of their employing law enforcement agency. The County of Fairfax and the Department of State Police shall be solely responsible for the salaries of their respective officers performing duties pursuant to this Agreement. Neither party to this Agreement shall be obligated to indemnify or hold the other harmless against any claims, demands or liabilities of any nature that are asserted by participating officers or third parties and arise out of the services performed hereunder.
- Each Department shall be responsible for the supervision of their personnel.
 Additionally, each Department shall be liable for the acts or omissions of their personnel pursuant to this agreement.
- No amendment or enlargement of this Reciprocal Agreement shall be effective unless
 executed in writing and agreed to by the parties hereto.
- 8. Either party may terminate this Reciprocal Agreement at any time by giving thirty (30) days prior written notice of its desire to terminate this Agreement to the other party's chief law enforcement officer.

HIDTA STATE AND LOCAL TASK FORCE AGREEMENT

This agreement is made this 4th day of January 2022, between the United States Department of Justice, Drug Enforcement Administration (hereinafter "DEA"), and the Fairfax County Police Department ORI# VA0290100 (hereinafter "FCPD"). The DEA is authorized to enter into this cooperative agreement concerning the use and abuse of controlled substances under the provisions of 21 U.S.C. § 873.

Whereas there is evidence that trafficking in narcotics and dangerous drugs exists in the Washington, DC area and that such illegal activity has a substantial and detrimental effect on the health and general welfare of the people of the Washington Metropolitan area, the parties hereto agree to the following:

- 1. The Asset Removal Group (33) (Northern VA Financial Initiative Task Force) will perform the activities and duties described below:
- a. disrupt the illicit drug traffic in the Washington, DC area by immobilizing targeted violators and trafficking organizations;
- b. gather and report intelligence data relating to trafficking in narcotics and dangerous drugs; and
- c. conduct undercover operations where appropriate and engage in other traditional methods of investigation in order that the task force's activities will result in effective prosecution before the courts of the United States, the Commonwealth of Virginia, the District of Columbia, and/or the State of Maryland.
- 2. To accomplish the objectives of the Asset Removal Group (33) (Northern VA Financial Initiative Task Force), the FCPD agrees to detail one (1) experienced officer to the Asset Removal Group (33) for a period of not less than two years. During this period of assignment, the FCPD officer will be under the direct supervision and control of DEA supervisory personnel assigned to the task force.
- 3. The FCPD officer assigned to the task force shall adhere to all DEA policies and procedures. Failure to adhere to DEA policies and procedures shall be grounds for dismissal from the task force. Any conflict between DEA policies and procedures and those of the parent agency shall be resolved by the DEA Special Agent in Charge or his designee, and the chief law enforcement officials of the participating agencies.
- 4. The FCPD officer assigned to the task force shall be deputized as task force officers of DEA pursuant to 21 USC 878.
- 5. To accomplish the objectives of the Asset Removal Group (33) (Northern VA Financial Initiative Task Force), DEA will assign two (2) Special Agents to the task force. HIDTA will also, subject to the availability of annually appropriated funds or any continuing resolution thereof, provide necessary funds and equipment to support the activities of the DEA Special Agents and FCPD officer assigned to the task force. This support will include: office space,

office supplies, travel funds, funds for the purchase of evidence and information, investigative equipment, training and other support items.

- 6. During the period of assignment to the Task Force, the FCPD will remain responsible for establishing the salary and benefits, including overtime, of the officer assigned to the Task Force, and for making all payments due the officer. DEA will, subject to availability of funds, reimburse Fairfax County for overtime payment. Annual overtime for each state or local law enforcement officer is capped at the equivalent of 25% of a GS-12, Step 1, of the general pay scale for the Rest of United States. Reimbursement for all types of qualified expenses shall be contingent upon availability of funds and the submission of a proper request for reimbursement which shall be submitted monthly or quarterly on a fiscal year basis, and which provides the names of the investigator who incurred overtime for DEA during the invoiced period, the number of overtime hours incurred, the hourly regular and overtime rates in effect for the investigator, and the total cost for the invoiced period. Invoices must be submitted at least quarterly within 10 business days of the end of the invoiced period. Note: Task Force Officer's overtime "shall not include any costs for benefits, such as retirement, FICA, and dre expenses."
- 7. In no event will the FCPD charge any indirect cost rate to DEA for the administration or implementation of this agreement.
- 8. The FCPD shall maintain on a current basis complete and accurate records and accounts of all obligations and expenditures of funds under this agreement in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and instructions provided by DEA to facilitate on-site inspection and auditing of such records and accounts.
- 9. The FCPD shall permit and have readily available for examination and auditing by DEA, the United States Department of Justice, the Comptroller General of the United States, and any of their duly authorized agents and representatives, any and all records, documents, accounts, invoices, receipts or expenditures relating to this agreement. The FCPD shall maintain all such reports and records until all litigation, claim, audits and examinations are completed and resolved, or for a period of six (6) years after termination of this agreement, whichever is later.
- 10. The FCPD shall comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, as amended, and all requirements imposed by or pursuant to the regulations of the United States Department of Justice implementing those laws, 28 C.F.R. Part 42, Subparts C, F, G, H and I.
- 11. The FCPD agrees that an authorized officer or employee will execute and return to DEA the attached OJP Form 4061/6, Certification Regarding Lobbying; Debarment, suspension and Other Responsibility Matters; and drug-Free Workplace Requirements. The FCPD acknowledges that this agreement will not take effect and no federal funds will be awarded until the completed certification is received.
- 12. When issuing statements, press releases requests for proposals, bid solicitations and other documents describing projects or programs funded in whole or part with federal money, the

FCPD shall clearly state: (1) percentage of the total cost of the program or project which will be financed with federal money and (2) the dollar amount of federal funds for the program or project.

- 13. The FCPD understands and agrees that HIDTA will provide the FCPD Task Force Officer with vehicles suitable for surveillance. HIDTA through DEA will furnish mobile radios for installation in the HIDTA Task Force vehicles and HIDTA will assume the cost of installation and removal. HIDTA will be financially responsible for the purchase of fuel for the leased vehicles and for providing routine maintenance, i.e., oil changes, lubes and minor tune-ups via the HIDTA lease contractor. DEA and HIDTA procedures for reporting and investigating automobile accidents involving Official Government Vehicles (OGV'S)-HIDTA lease vehicles shall apply to accidents involving the leased vehicles furnished to the FCPD personnel, in addition to whatever accident reporting requirements the FCPD may have.
- 14. While on duty and acting on task force business, the FCPD officer assigned to the HIDTA task force shall be subject to all DEA and federal government rules, regulations and procedures governing the use of OGV's for home to work transportation and for personal business. The HIDTA Executive Committee acknowledges that the United States is liable for the actions of the task force officer, while on duty and acting within the scope of their federal employment, to the extent permitted by the Federal Torts Claim Act.
- 15. The term of this agreement shall be effective from the date in paragraph number one until September 30, 2023. This agreement may be terminated by either party on 30 days advance written notice. Billing for all outstanding obligations must be received by DEA within 90 days of the date of termination of this agreement. HIDTA will be responsible only for obligations incurred by FCPD during the term of this agreement.

In supporting the regional effort towards intervention and suppression of trafficking in narcotics and dangerous drugs, the FCPD recognizes the need to continue to be a lead agency within the DEA Task Force 11. The current MOU was approved by the Board on September 20, 2016.

Continuing to participate in a partnership with the Task Force allows the Department to recoup certain fixed expenses such as rental vehicles, radios, and some overtime. Under this agreement renewal, the DEA Task Force and the Fairfax County Police will work to facilitate sharing information to suppress and disrupt drug trafficking, gather and report intelligence data relative to narcotics activities, and conduct undercover operations that are associated with the culture of illegal narcotics and drug trafficking.

The assigned Fairfax County detective will be a full-time member of the DEA Task Force that has the primary responsibility of interdicting large-scale contraband going through our regional airports with origins or destinations in Northern Virginia. This includes narcotics, weapons and money tied to organized crime.

HIDTA STATE AND LOCAL TASK FORCE AGREEMENT

This agreement is made this 4th day of January 2022, between the United States Department of Justice, Drug Enforcement Administration (hereinafter "DEA"), and the Fairfax County Police Department (hereinafter "FCPD"). The DEA is authorized to enter into this cooperative agreement concerning the use and abuse of controlled substances under the provisions of 21 U.S.C. § 873.

WHEREAS there is evidence that trafficking in narcotics and dangerous drugs exists in the Washington DC area and that such illegal activity has a substantial and detrimental effect on the health and general welfare of the people of Washington Metropolitan area, the parties hereto agree to the following:

- 1. The HIDTA Task Force Group 1 (11) (Washington-Mass Transit) will perform the activities and duties described below:
 - a. disrupt the illicit drug traffic in the area by immobilizing targeted violators and trafficking organizations;
 - b. gather and report intelligence data relating to trafficking in narcotics and dangerous drugs; and
 - c. conduct undercover operations where appropriate and engage in other traditional methods of investigation in order that the HIDTA Task Force Group 1 (11) (Washington-Mass Transit) activities will result in effective prosecution before the courts of the United States and the District of Columbia.
- 2. To accomplish the objectives of HIDTA Task Force Group 1 (11) (Washington-Mass Transit), the FCPD agrees to detail one (1) experienced officer to the HIDTA Task Force Group 1 (11) (Washington-Mass Transit) for a period of not less than two years. During this period of assignment, the FCPD officer will be under the direct supervision and control of DEA supervisory personnel assigned to HIDTA Task Force Group 1 (11) (Washington-Mass Transit).
- 3. The FCPD officer assigned to the HIDTA Task Force Group 1 (11) (Washington-Mass Transit) shall adhere to DEA policies and procedures. Failure to adhere to DEA policies and procedures shall be grounds for dismissal from HIDTA Task Force Group 1 (11). Officers assigned to the Task Force shall also remain subject to the policies, procedures, and regulations of their parent agency. Any conflict between DEA policies and procedures and those of the parent agency shall be resolved by the DEA Special Agent in Charge or his designee, and the chief law enforcement officials of the participating agencies.

- The FCPD officer assigned to the HIDTA Task Force Group 1 (11) (Washington-Mass Transit) shall be deputized as a Task Force Officer of DEA pursuant to 21 U.S.C. Section 878.
- 5. To accomplish the objectives of the HIDTA Task Force Group 1 (11) (Washington-Mass Transit), DEA will assign three (3) Special Agents to the HIDTA Task Force Group 1(11). DEA will also, subject to the availability of annually appropriated funds or any continuing resolution thereof, provide necessary funds and equipment to support the activities of the DEA Special Agents and officers assigned to the HIDTA Task Force Group 1 (11) (Washington-Mass Transit). This support will include: office space, office supplies, travel funds, funds for the purchase of evidence and information, investigative equipment, training, and other support items.
- 6. During the period of assignment to the Task Force, the FCPD will remain responsible for establishing the salary and benefits, including overtime, of the officers assigned to the Task Force, and for making all payments due them. HIDTA will, subject to availability of funds, reimburse the FCPD for overtime payment. Annual overtime for each state or local law enforcement officer is capped at the equivalent of 25% of a GS-12, Step 1, of the general pay scale for the Rest of United States. Reimbursement for all types of qualified expenses shall be contingent upon availability of funds and the submission of a proper request for reimbursement which shall be submitted monthly or quarterly on a fiscal year basis, and which provides the names of the investigators who incurred overtime for DEA during the invoiced period, the number of overtime hours incurred, the hourly regular and overtime rates in effect for each investigator, and the total cost for the invoiced period. Invoices must be submitted at least quarterly within 10 business days of the end of the invoiced period. Note: Task Force Officer's overtime "shall not include any costs for benefits, such as retirement, FICA, and other expenses."
- 7. In no event will the FCPD charge any indirect cost rate to DEA for the administration or implementation of this agreement.
- 8. The FCPD shall maintain on a current basis complete and accurate records and accounts of all obligations and expenditures of funds under this agreement in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and instructions provided by DEA to facilitate on-site inspection and auditing of such records and accounts.
- 9. The FCPD shall permit and have readily available for examination and auditing by DEA, the United States Department of Justice, the Comptroller General of the United States, and any of their duly authorized agents and representatives, any and all records, documents, accounts, invoices, receipts or expenditures relating to this agreement. The FCPD shall maintain all such reports and records until all litigation, claim, audits and examinations are completed and resolved, or for a period of six (6) years after termination of this agreement, whichever is later.
- 10. The FCPD shall comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, as amended, and all

- requirements imposed by or pursuant to the regulations of the United States Department of Justice implementing those laws, 28 C.F.R. Part 42, Subparts C, F, G, H and I.
- 11. The FCPD agrees that an authorized officer or employee will execute and return to DEA the attached OJP Form 4061/6, Certification Regarding Lobbying; Debarment, suspension and Other Responsibility Matters; and drug-Free Workplace Requirements. The FCPD acknowledges that this agreement will not take effect and no federal funds will be awarded until the completed certification is received.
- 12. When issuing statements, press releases requests for proposals, bid solicitations and other documents describing projects or programs funded in whole or part with federal money, the FCPD shall clearly state: (1) percentage of the total cost of the program or project which will be financed with federal money and (2) the dollar amount of federal funds for the program or project.
- 13. The FCPD understands and agrees that HIDTA will provide the Group 1 (11) (Washington-Mass Transit) Task Force Officers with vehicles suitable for surveillance. HIDTA through DEA will furnish mobile radios for installation in the HIDTA Task Force vehicles and HIDTA will assume the cost of installation and removal. HIDTA will be financially responsible for the purchase of fuel for the leased vehicles and for providing routine maintenance, i.e., oil changes, lubes and minor tune-ups via the HIDTA lease contractor. DEA and HIDTA procedures for reporting and investigating automobile accidents involving Official Government Vehicles (OGV'S)-HIDTA lease vehicles shall apply to accidents involving the leased vehicles furnished to the FCPD personnel, in addition to whatever accident reporting requirements the FCPD may have.
- 14. While on duty and acting on task force business, the FCPD officers assigned to the HIDTA task force shall be subject to all DEA and federal government rules, regulations and procedures governing the use of OGV's for home to work transportation and for personal business. The HIDTA Executive Committee acknowledges that the United States is liable for the actions of task force officer, while on duty and acting within the scope of their federal employment, to the extent permitted by the Federal Torts Claim Act.
- 15. The term of this agreement shall be effective from the date specified in the opening paragraph until September 30, 2023. This agreement may be terminated by either party on thirty days' advance written notice. Billing for all outstanding obligations must be received by DEA within 90 days of the date of termination of this agreement. DEA will be responsible only for obligations incurred by FCPD during the term of this agreement.

 - a. disrupt the illicit drug traffic in the Washington, DC area by immobilizing targeted violators and trafficking organizations;
 - gather and report intelligence data relating to trafficking in narcotics and dangerous drugs;
 and
 - c. conduct undercover operations where appropriate and engage in other traditional methods of investigation in order that the Task Force's activities will result in effective prosecution before the courts of the United States and the District of Columbia.
- 2. To accomplish the objectives of the HIDTA Task Force Group 1 (11) and HIDTA Task Force Group 5 (12), the FCPD agrees to detail two (2) experienced officers (one (1) officer to HIDTA Task Force Group 1 (11) and one (1) officer to HIDTA Task Force Group 5 (12)) for a period of not less than two years. During this period of assignment, the FCPD officers will be under the direct supervision and control of DEA supervisory personnel assigned to the Task Force.
- The FCPD officers assigned to the Task Force shall adhere to DEA policies and procedures.Failure to adhere to DEA policies and procedures shall be grounds for dismissal from the Task Force.
- The FCPD officers assigned to the Task Force shall be deputized as Task Force Officers of DEA pursuant to 21 U.S.C. Section 878.
- 5. To accomplish the objectives of the HIDTA Task Force Group 1 (11) and HIDTA Task Force Group 5 (12), DEA will assign five (5) Special Agents to the Task Forces. DEA will also, subject to the availability of annually appropriated funds or any continuing resolution thereof, provide necessary funds and equipment to support the activities of the DEA Special Agents and

- the two officers assigned to the Task Force. This support will include: office space, office supplies, travel funds, funds for the purchase of evidence and information, investigative equipment, training, and other support items.
- 6. During the period of assignment to the HIDTA Task Force Group 1 (11) and HIDTA Task Force Group 5 (12), the FCPD will remain responsible for establishing the salary and benefits, including overtime, of the officers assigned to the Task Force, and for making all payments due them. DEA will, subject to availability of funds, reimburse the FCPD for overtime payments made by it to the two officers assigned to the HIDTA Task Force Group 1 (11) and HIDTA Task Force Group 5 (12) for overtime, up to a sum equivalent to 25 percent of the salary of a GS-12, step 1, (RUS) Federal employee (currently \$17,753.00), per officer. Note: Task Force Officer's overtime "shall not include any costs for benefits, such as retirement, FICA, and other expenses."
- In no event will the FCPD charge any indirect cost rate to DEA for the administration or implementation of this agreement.
- 8. The FCPD shall maintain on a current basis complete and accurate records and accounts of all obligations and expenditures of funds under this agreement in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and instructions provided by DEA to facilitate on-site inspection and auditing of such records and accounts.
- 9. The FCPD shall permit and have readily available for examination and auditing by DEA, the United States Department of Justice, the Comptroller General of the United States, and any of their duly authorized agents and representatives, any and all records, documents, accounts, invoices, receipts or expenditures relating to this agreement. The FCPD shall maintain all such reports and records until all litigation, claim, audits and examinations are completed and resolved, or for a period of three (3) years after termination of this agreement, whichever is later.
- 10. The FCPD acknowledges that this agreement will not take effect and no Federal funds will be awarded to the FCPD by DEA until the completed certification is received.
- 12. When issuing statements, press releases, requests for proposals, bid solicitations, and other documents describing projects or programs funded in whole or in part with Federal money, the FCPD shall clearly state: (1) the percentage of the total cost of the program or project which will be financed with Federal money and (2) the dollar amount of Federal funds for the project or program.
- 13. The term of this agreement shall be effective from the date in paragraph number one until September 30, 2017. This agreement may be terminated by either party on thirty days' advance written notice. Billing for all outstanding obligations must be received by DEA within 90 days of

the date of termination of this agreement. DEA will be responsible only for obligations incurred by FCPD during the term of this agreement.

Approval of a Lease Agreement for Commuter Parking at Springfield Plaza (Lee District)

ISSUE:

Board approval to execute a Lease Agreement with Springfield Plaza to compensate the owner for necessary annual maintenance costs, and the estimated ground lease value of the land.

RECOMMENDATION:

The County Executive recommends that the Board:

- 1. Approve the attached Lease Agreement to continue commuter parking services at Springfield Plaza in substantial form (Attachment I).
- 2. Authorize the Director of Fairfax County Department of Transportation to execute the Lease Agreement on behalf of the County.

TIMING:

Board approval is requested on February 22, 2022, to allow for immediate execution of the Lease Agreement.

BACKGROUND:

Springfield Plaza, Sec. II LLC (Springfield Plaza) has permitted the County to operate a commuter park-and-ride lot at its shopping center since the early 1980's. Springfield Plaza maintained the commuter lot at its own expense for approximately 30 years without any formal agreement. In 2012, the County and Springfield Plaza entered into a formal agreement where the County provided a quarterly payment of \$4,050 in exchange for the use and maintenance of 108 commuter spaces in the shopping center parking (Attachment II). Weekday occupancy of these commuter parking spaces was typically at full capacity. The County renewed the lease in 2017.

The Department of Public Works and Environmental Services (DPWES) is constructing a new commuter parking garage in Springfield located at the existing Old Keene Mill Commuter Lot. The Old Keene Mill Commuter Lot, which typically operates at capacity (278 vehicles), was closed for construction beginning in the Summer of 2021. Other nearby commuter lots were operating at capacity prior to the pandemic, and it is expected that commuter use will increase during the construction of the new Springfield Parking Garage. Therefore, the Springfield Plaza lot is necessary to supply adequate

parking options for commuters until the new parking garage is completed in 2023. The current lease has expired. However, due to the pandemic, demand for commuter parking has dropped.

At the request of the Springfield Plaza, the terms of the recently expired lease agreement (Attachment III) have been renegotiated. Springfield Plaza has agreed to lease the County 108 parking spaces at a monthly cost of \$90.11 per space per month for year 1 and \$92.81 per space per month for year 2. The annual operating and maintenance costs combined with the estimated annual lease value of the parking spaces equals \$116,779.80 for year 1 and \$120,283.20 for year 2 (Attachment IV). Much of the rise in the lease cost is attributed to the increase value of the property. Staff confirmed the land value shown in the attachment.

The term of the new lease agreement will be from October 1, 2021, to September 30, 2023. When the new Springfield parking garage opens in 2023, it is anticipated that all the leases for commuter parking in central Springfield will be terminated. The agreement has two additional one-year options for renewal, if the County needs to continue the lease.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Total funding of \$87,584.85 is needed for FY 2022 including retroactive leasing fees from October 2021. Funding is available in Fund 40000, County Transit Systems. Funding requirements for future lease years will be included in future budget submissions.

WHEREAS, the County continues to support public transportation services, facilities, and commuter park-and-ride lots as effective traffic mitigation facilities; and

WHEREAS, the County desires to provide satellite parking spaces in various places in Fairfax County to supplement parking at Metrorail, Virginia Railway Express stations, and other commuter facilities; and

WHEREAS, the County desires to lease parking spaces at the Springfield Plaza (Section II) Shopping Center (the "Center") to provide additional commuter parking; and

WHEREAS, the Center, located at the intersection of Bland Avenue and Old Keene Mill Road in Springfield, Virginia, has available 108 spaces for commuter parking on weekdays between 5:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m.: and

WHEREAS, Owner is the owner of the parking area to be designated as commuter parking pursuant to this Agreement;

NOW THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual promises and agreements set forth below, Owner and County agree as follows:

- 1. One hundred and eight (108) parking spaces in the Center parking lot (the "Commuter Parking Area"), which are shown on the map attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit A, will be reserved for use by commuters, who will carpool, vanpool, or ride public transportation for a period of two (2) years from the effective date of October 1, 2021, ending September 30, 2023.
- a. Subject to the provisions of this Agreement, County shall make the lease payments to Owner.
- b. The amount of lease payments payable to Owner during the Lease Year starting October 1, 2021, will be in the amount of Twenty-Nine Thousand One Hundred Ninety-Four Dollars and Ninety-Five Cents (\$29,194.95) for each full quarter. If the parking spaces are not available for the full quarter, the lease payment shall be prorated accordingly.

- c. The County shall make lease payments to Owner on a quarterly basis, with payment being made within thirty (30) working days after receipt of Owner's quarterly invoice. Quarters are designated as July 1 September 30, October 1 December 31, January 1 March 31, and April 1 June 30. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the payment for the period from October 1, 2021, through December 31, 2021, shall be paid within thirty (30) days after execution of this Lease Agreement by all parties hereto.
- d. Annual 3% increase will be applied to the lease payments beginning on October 1, 2022. Consequently, quarterly payments will increase to Thirty Thousand Seventy Dollars and Eighty Cents (\$30,070.80).
- e. Owner shall submit to the County a quarterly invoice to the following person:

f. The lease payment to Owner shall be forwarded to:

- 3. a. County shall have the option to renew the lease for two (2) additional periods of one (1) year each with 3% annual increases applied to lease payments. All terms, covenants and conditions shall remain the same under the optional renewal periods as in this Agreement. This renewal option shall be exercisable upon notice from County to Owner at least ninety (90) days prior to the expiration of the lease or renewal period.
- b. The quarterly lease payment during the first option year, starting October 1, 2023, will be Thirty Thousand Nine Hundred Seventy-Two Dollars and Ninety-Two Cents (\$30,972.92).
- c. The quarterly lease payment during the second option year, starting October 1, 2024, will be Thirty-One Thousand Nine Hundred Two Dollars and Eleven Cents (\$31,902.11).
- 4. a. As part of its continuing maintenance of the parking lot, Owner will continue to provide lighting, sweeping, and snow removal with respect to the Commuter Parking Area; provided, however, that this obligation shall be fulfilled consistent with Owner's existing practices and contractual obligations at the Center, and that no additional obligations are undertaken by Owner pursuant to this paragraph.

- b. Owner agrees to provide the County with the use of the parking spaces covered by this Lease Agreement free and clear of all obstructions, and upon termination of this Lease Agreement or any extension of the term hereof, the County shall leave said parking spaces in good condition, normal wear and tear excepted. The County shall be permitted to inspect the parking spaces shown on Exhibit A and shall within five (5) days, advise Owner of the existence of any conditions that may be hazardous. After having been so notified by the County, Owner shall have fourteen (14) days in which to eliminate the hazardous condition or offer to the County alternative spaces on the subject property.
- 5. In cooperation with Owner, County shall provide appropriate signage for the Center to direct commuters to the Commuter Parking Area (the location and installation of such signage to be subject to Owner's prior approval) and may install commuter parking signs in the Commuter Parking Area (subject to Owner's prior approval). County shall maintain any signage installed under this paragraph to Owner's reasonable satisfaction. County shall provide advance written notice to Owner of County's intention to install any signage in the Center, including the Commuter Parking Area.
- 6. County shall obtain and keep in force throughout the duration of this Agreement a Commercial General Liability Insurance policy in the limit of \$2,000,000.00 per occurrence and in the aggregate. Claims, suits or actions brought on account of any injury or damage sustained to any person, or to the property of any person, while utilizing the Commuter Parking Area or as a direct result of utilizing the Commuter Parking Area, should be directed to:

The liability insurance policy shall name Owner and A.J. Dwoskin & Associates, Inc. as additional insureds and shall provide 45 days prior written notice of cancellation to Owner from the insurance company. It is expressly agreed that County does not indemnify or hold harmless Owner or A.J. Dwoskin & Associates for or against any claim brought by any party against Owner or A.J. Dwoskin & Associates.

- 7. Owner shall monitor and enforce all parking regulations concerning where and when parking shall be permitted in the Commuter Parking Area, consistent with this Agreement and Owner's general practices regarding parking in the Center. Parking by commuters in the Commuter Parking Area shall be permitted only in clearly identified spaces (consistent with paragraph 4 herein), between the hours of 5 a.m. and 8 p.m., Monday through Friday. These spaces shall be available for use by other visitors to the Center at all other times.
- County shall be permitted to include the Center's Commuter Parking Area in promotional literature about commuter parking lots located in Fairfax County.

- 9. The parties agree that the Agreement shall be effective on October 1, 2021, shall continue in force for a period of two (2) years, and shall be binding upon the parties, their successors and assigns, and that the obligation to pay the lease payments provided herein shall accrue on that date; provided, however, that either party shall have the right to terminate this Agreement, with or without cause, upon thirty (30) days written notice to the other party.

The County's obligations to make payments during subsequent fiscal years are dependent upon the same action. If such an appropriation is not made for any fiscal year, this Agreement shall terminate effective at the end of the fiscal year for which funds were appropriated and the County will not be obligated to make any payments under this Agreement beyond the amount appropriated for payment obligations under this Agreement. The County will provide the Contractor with written notice of non-appropriation of funds within thirty (30) calendar days after action is completed by the Board of Supervisors. However, the County's failure to provide such notice will not extend this Agreement into a fiscal year in which sufficient funds have not been appropriated.
- 12. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed or interpreted as creating anything other than a lease; that is, this agreement shall not be construed or interpreted as creating any other property rights at the location of the Center.
- 13. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed as creating any personal liability on the part of any officer, employee or agent of the parties to this Agreement.

LEASE AGREEMENT BETWEEN FAIRFAX COUNTY AND SPRINGFIELD PLAZA, SEC. II LLC FOR COMMUTER PARKING

THIS LEASE AGREEMENT, made this _______ day of March____, 2017, by and between (a) SPRINGFIELD PLAZA, SECTION II, L.L.C., a Delaware limited liability company ("Owner"), having an address of 3201 Jermantown Road, Suite 700, Fairfax, Virginia 22030; and (b) the BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF FAIRFAX COUNTY ("County"), a body politic of Virginia, having an address of 12000 Government Center Parkway, Fairfax, Virginia 22035.

WHEREAS, the County continues to support public transportation services, facilities, and commuter park-and-ride lots as effective traffic mitigation facilities; and

WHEREAS, the County desires to provide satellite parking spaces in various places in Fairfax County to supplement parking at Metrorail, Virginia Railway Express stations, and other commuter facilities; and

WHEREAS, the County desires to lease parking spaces at the Springfield Plaza (Section II) Shopping Center (the "Center") to provide additional commuter parking; and

WHEREAS, the Center, located at the intersection of Bland Avenue and Old Keene Mill Road in Springfield, Virginia, has available 108 spaces for commuter parking on weekdays between 5:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m.; and

WHEREAS, Owner is the owner of the parking area to be designated as commuter parking pursuant to this Agreement;

NOW THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual promises and agreements set forth below, Owner and County agree as follows:

- 1. One hundred and eight (108) parking spaces in the Center parking lot (the "Commuter Parking Area"), which are shown on the map attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit A, will be reserved for use by commuters who carpool, vanpool, or ride public transportation for a period of five (5) years from the effective date of October 1, 2016, ending October 1, 2021.
- a. Subject to the provisions of this Agreement, County shall make the lease payments to Owner.
- b. The amount of lease payments payable to Owner for the period from October 1, 2016 through December 31, 2017 shall be Five Thousand Thirty-Six Dollars and Fifty-Five Cents (\$5,036.55) per month, based on annual operating and maintenance costs plus

the estimated lease value of the land. Quarterly payments shall be in the amount of Fifteen Thousand One Hundred Nine Dollars and Sixty-Five Cents (\$15,109.65) for each full quarter. If the parking spaces are not available for the full quarter, the lease payment shall be prorated accordingly.

- c. The County shall make lease payments to Owner on a quarterly basis, with payment being made within thirty (30) working days after receipt of Owner's quarterly invoice. Quarters are designated as July 1 September 30, October 1 December 31, January 1 March 31, and April 1 June 30. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the payment for the period from October 1, 2016, through December 1, 2016, shall be paid within thirty (30) days after execution of this Lease Agreement by all parties hereto.
- d. Annual 3% increases will be applied to the lease payments beginning on January 1, 2018. Consequently, quarterly payments will increase to \$15,562.94 in 2018, \$16,029.83 in 2019, \$16,510.72 in 2020, and \$17,006.04 in 2021.

- 3. a. As part of its continuing maintenance of the parking lot, Owner will continue to provide lighting, sweeping, and snow removal with respect to the Commuter Parking Area; provided, however, that this obligation shall be fulfilled consistent with Owner's existing practices and contractual obligations at the Center, and that no additional obligations are undertaken by Owner pursuant to this paragraph.
- b. Owner shall submit to the County paid invoices related to resurfacing and lighting improvements made within the Commuter Parking Area. These improvements are expected to be completed by July 1, 2017. The County shall reimburse Owners for said expenses not to exceed \$61,000 in total payments. Such reimbursements shall be provided in up to two payments: one for completion of the lighting improvements and one for the completion of the resurfacing. Such payments shall be provided within 30 days of the County's receipt of paid invoices. In the event that Owner terminates this agreement prior to 2 years after the County's receipt of the last paid invoice for said improvements, the Owner shall repay a prorated portion

of the County's total reimbursement to Owner. After this 2-year period, no such repayment to the County shall be required.

- c. Owner agrees to provide the County with the use of the parking spaces covered by this Lease Agreement free and clear of all obstructions, and upon termination of this Lease Agreement or any extension of the term hereof, the County shall leave said parking spaces in good condition, normal wear and tear excepted. The County shall be permitted to inspect the parking spaces shown on Exhibit A and shall within five (5) days, advise Owner of the existence of any conditions that may be hazardous. After having been so notified by the County, Owner shall have fourteen (14) days in which to eliminate the hazardous condition or offer to the County alternative spaces on the subject property.
- 4. In cooperation with Owner, County shall provide appropriate signage for the Center to direct commuters to the Commuter Parking Area (the location and installation of such signage to be subject to Owner's prior approval), and may install commuter parking signs in the Commuter Parking Area (subject to Owner's prior approval). County shall maintain any signage installed under this paragraph to Owner's reasonable satisfaction. County shall provide advance written notice to Owner of County's intention to install any signage in the Center, including the Commuter Parking Area.
- 5. County shall obtain and keep in force throughout the duration of this Agreement a Commercial General Liability Insurance policy in the limit of \$2,000,000.00 per occurrence and in the aggregate. Claims, suits or actions brought on account of any injury or damage sustained to any person, or to the property of any person, while utilizing the Commuter Parking Area or as a direct result of utilizing the Commuter Parking Area, should be directed to:

The liability insurance policy shall name Owner and A.J. Dwoskin & Associates, Inc. as additional insureds and shall provide 45 days prior written notice of cancellation to Owner from the insurance company. It is expressly agreed that County does not indemnify or hold harmless Owner or A.J. Dwoskin & Associates for or against any claim brought by any party against Owner or A.J. Dwoskin & Associates.

- 6. Owner shall monitor and enforce all parking regulations concerning where and when parking shall be permitted in the Commuter Parking Area, consistent with this Agreement and Owner's general practices regarding parking in the Center. Parking by commuters in the Commuter Parking Area shall be permitted only in clearly identified spaces (consistent with paragraph 4 herein), between the hours of 5 a.m. and 8 p.m., Monday through Friday. These spaces shall be available for use by other visitors to the Center at all other times.
- 7. County shall be permitted to include the Center's Commuter Parking Area in promotional literature about commuter parking lots located in Fairfax County.

- 8. <u>Approval of Fairfax Connector's Reston – Herndon Bus Plan Service Changes</u> (Dranesville, Hunter Mill, and Sully Districts)

ISSUE:

Board of Supervisors' approval of Fairfax Connector's service changes in conjunction with the start of the Metrorail Silver Line Phase 2.

RECOMMENDATION:

The County Executive recommends the Board approve Fairfax Connector's service change proposals for the Reston – Herndon Bus Plan, to be implemented in conjunction with the start of the Metrorail Silver Line Phase 2.

TIMING:

Board approval is requested on February 22, 2022, to allow for implementation of the Reston – Herndon Bus Plan in conjunction with the start of the Metrorail Silver Line Phase 2.

BACKGROUND:

Staff proposes Fairfax Connector service changes for implementation in conjunction with the start of the Metrorail Silver Line Phase 2 to improve the customer experience and increase ridership through improved connectivity, on-time performance, service reliability, and effectiveness. The proposed service changes are described below. Additional background information and proposal details are provided in Attachment II and III.

A baseline assessment of existing transit services and demographics was done for the Reston – Herndon study area to support development of three service alternatives. This effort included a detailed market analysis looking at both transit propensity and potential, as well as a high-level assessment of travel flow between activity centers. Connections to the new Silver Line Metrorail stations served as an important consideration. The outreach effort conducted helped provide a better understanding of the travel modes most used by residents within the study area, predominant trip purposes, Fairfax Connector rider experiences, transit needs and concerns, and frequently used bus routes.

The three service alternatives were then evaluated and compared using a three-tier analysis measuring access to facilities, changes in travel times between popular origins and destinations, and ridership potential. Each alternative was compared against the existing system as well.

- Alternative 1 Existing Service Plus: provides an updated assessment of service recommendations proposed through Fairfax Connector's 2016 Transit Development Plan
- Alternative 2 Streamlined Service: simplifies existing service across all time periods while adding service to new destinations
- Alternative 3 Transformation: reimagines service through a new blend of peakonly and all-day routes

Based on public feedback and the results of the three-tier analysis, a preferred plan was developed. This plan reflects the results of an iterative process to envision a transit network that preserves the best of the existing system while linking with new Metrorail stations and creating new connections based on travel patterns, growth, and service demand in the Reston – Herndon area.

PROPOSAL SUMMARY:

Reston – Herndon Bus Plan

Staff recommends the following service changes due to the opening of new Metrorail stations as part of the Silver Line Phase 2. Route profiles for the proposed new routes are provided in Attachment III.

Route Modifications

Staff recommends implementing realignments on Routes 507, 552, 553, 557, 558, 574, 599, 605, 924, 937, 950, 951, 952, 983, RIBS 1, RIBS 2, RIBS 3, RIBS 4, and RIBS 5. The proposed route realignments will decrease travel time and duplication of service, improve frequency, increase span of service, and improve access to Metrorail stations, transit centers, employment, education, hospitals, and key activity centers. Overall, the modifications simplify the route structures and improve transit options throughout the Reston – Herndon service area. Additional information including maps and levels of service of the following modified routes are in Attachments II and III.

Route Eliminations

Public Involvement

To inform the public of the proposed service changes and receive feedback from passengers, staff posted detailed information on the Fairfax Connector website and social media accounts, conducted an online survey, hosted three rounds of public meetings and several pop-up events to directly engage the public. Through an on-line survey, staff received over 200 public comments on the preferred service plan. Of these, 71 comments resulted in adjustments to the preferred service plan. The remaining comments either were already addressed as part of the original preferred service plan, could not be implemented due to vehicle fleet limitations, or are recommended to be addressed as part of the 2023 Transit Development Plan update, currently under development. The comments were grouped into several packages, as presented in Attachment IV. Packages A and B are recommended for inclusion in the preferred service plan, while the remaining packages are not recommended due to limited resources. A summary of the public feedback is provided in Attachment IV.

TITLE VI:

The service changes, proposed for implementation in conjunction with the start of the Metrorail Silver Line Phase 2, were reviewed as mandated by the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) in *Circular C4702.1B: Title VI Requirements and Guidelines for Federal Transit Administration Recipients*. The analysis showed the proposed service changes will not create a negative disparate impact on the minority population or a disproportionate burden on low-income households. Instead, they will result in an overall service improvement for Fairfax Connector's riders and the communities served. The new routes did meet the threshold for major service change. However, they did not create a disparate impact on the minority population or a disproportionate burden on low-income households. As a result, no Title VI impacts were found for any of the proposed service changes. A summary of the Title VI analysis is provided in Attachment V.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The proposed route modifications and new routes in the Reston – Herndon Bus Plan equate to an additional 8,000 annual revenue hours, which is less than one percent of the total annualized service for Fairfax Connector. The FY 2022 cost for the proposed

service plan is included in the <u>FY 2022 Revised Budget Plan</u> in Fund 40000 (County Transit Systems), and no additional General Fund resources are required.

EQUITY IMPACT:

The Reston – Herndon Bus Service Plan increases transit service, adds new connections, and provides better transit options for communities of color and low-income households as the result of opening Phase 2 of Metrorail's Silver Line.

Staff conducted a federally required Title VI analysis "designed to ensure that no person, based on race, color, or national origin, is excluded from participation in, denied the benefits of, or otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program that USDOT financially assists" and to determine if any service change will have a negative impact on the "minority" population and/or low-income households, as defined by USDOT. This analysis was done by examining the level of service (including span of service, frequency, and days of operation) for communities of color and low-income households before and after the proposed service change. Based on the analysis, access to transit will increase by an estimated 24 percent for populations of color (from 79,000 to 98,200) and 21 percent for low-income households (from 9,100 to 11,200).

The analysis showed the proposed service changes will not create a negative impact on communities of color or low-income households. Instead, the service changes will result in an overall service improvement including span of service, frequency, and days of operation for these populations and households within the Reston – Herndon service planning area.

A post implementation analysis will include conducting an onboard survey to obtain socio-economic information on the Connector riders. This information along with daily ridership and U.S. census data will be used to assess and monitor the service improvements. Based on the survey, ridership, and other input, it is likely that staff will recommend refinements to these bus routes after implementation.

Public Input Sought on Proposed Fairfax Connector Bus Service Plan for the Herndon-Reston Area

Fairfax County Department of Transportation (FCDOT) is seeking community input on a proposed plan for bus service in the Herndon-Reston area.

After two rounds of community engagement, stakeholder input and technical analysis, FCDOT has developed a proposed plan for improved Fairfax Connector bus service in the Herndon and Reston areas, including connections to the future Metrorail Silver Line Phase 2 stations. The proposed plan aims to improve on-time performance and streamline service to meet the needs of the community and commuters.

- Some of the key improvements to the bus service in the area include new and more direct

Background Information and Proposal Details

Service Changes

The following tables summarize the proposed service changes (route modifications, new routes, and eliminated routes) from the Reston – Herndon Bus Plan to improve service within the Reston – Herndon area. Route profiles detailing the service type, hours of operations, frequency, map, and serviced locations for each proposed new route are provided in Attachment III.

Route Modifications

Staff recommends implementing realignments on the routes shown on Table 1. The proposed route realignments will decrease travel time and duplication of service, improve frequency, increase span of service, and improve access to Metrorail stations, transit centers, employment, education, hospitals, and key activity centers. Overall, the modifications simplify the route structures and improve transfer options throughout the Reston – Herndon service area.

Route 507: Sunset Hills - Sunrise Valley

Route 507 will continue to operate as a loop route linking Sunset Hills Road and Sunrise Valley Drive to the Wiehle-Reston East Metrorail Station and the Northern Virginia Community College Reston Center campus. The route will provide weekday service with 25-minute frequency, similar to the frequency of the current Route 507.

Route 552: Innovation Center Metrorail Station – Wiehle-Reston East Metrorail Station Route 552 will expand service, connecting several medium-density residential areas in the Reston – Herndon service area with three Metrorail stations. The route will operate with 20-minute frequency during peak periods, similar to the frequency of the current Route 552.

Route 553: Kingstream - Herndon - Fox Mill

Route 553 will improve connectivity from Fox Mill Road to Reston Town Center and the Herndon Metrorail Station south of the Dulles Toll Road. The route will link the Herndon High School and the Town of Herndon with the Herndon Metrorail Station, with 20-minute frequency during peak periods, similar to the frequency of the current Route 553.

Route 557: Reston South - Soapstone

Route 557 will link the Reston South Park-and-Ride Lot to the Wiehle-Reston East Metrorail Station via Soapstone Road, with 40-minute frequency during peak periods. The current Route 557 operates with 20-minute frequency during weekday period periods.

Route 558: Center Harbor – Wiehle-Reston East Metrorail Station – Reston Town Center Metrorail Station

Route 558 will provide all-day service along North Shore Drive, with 20-minute frequency during weekday peak periods and 60-minute frequency during weekday off-peak periods and weekends. The current Route 558 operates with 40-minute frequency during weekday off-peak periods and weekends.

Route 574: Reston Town Center – Tysons

Route 574 will provide all-day service between Reston Town Center and Tysons, with 30-minute frequency during weekday peak periods and 45-minute frequency during weekday off-peak periods and weekends. The current Route 574 operates with 35-minute frequency during weekday peak periods and 40-minute frequency during weekday off-peak periods and weekends.

Route 599: Reston North – Pentagon Express

Route 599 will continue to provide weekday express commuter service from Reston North Park-and-Ride Lot to the Pentagon and Crystal City, with 25-minute frequency during peak periods, similar to the frequency of the current Route 599.

Route 605: Reston - Fair Oaks Mall

Route 605 will provide all-day service between Reston and the Fair Oaks – Fairfax County Government Center area, with a more direct link between the Fair Oaks Hospital and Fair Oaks Mall. This will reduce travel time for passengers by as much as 40 percent. The route will operate with 30-minute frequency during weekday peak periods and 45-minute frequency during weekday off-peak periods and weekends. The current Route 605 operates with 45-minute frequency during weekday peak periods and 70-minute frequency during weekday off-peak periods and weekends.

Route 924: Northern Virginia Community College Loudoun – Herndon – Franklin Farm Route 924 will provide all-day service between the Northern Virginia Community College Loudoun campus and Franklin Farm Road via the Herndon Metrorail Station, with connections to Loudoun County Transit. This will significantly increase access to education and employment opportunities. The route will operate with 20-minute frequency during weekday peak periods and 60-minute frequency during weekday off-peak periods and weekends. The current Route 924 operates peak-only service with 30-minute frequency.

Route 937: Coppermine – Elden – Herndon Metrorail Station
Route 937 will operate between the Herndon Harbor House and the Herndon Metrorail
Station. Service will also include Frying Pan Road, Coppermine Road, the Innovation
Center Metrorail Station, and Elden Street. The route will provide mid-day service on
weekdays and all-day service on weekends with 40-minute frequency. The current
Route 937 operates all-day service with 35-minute frequency on weekdays and
weekends.

Route 950: Reston Town Center Metrorail Station – Herndon Metrorail Station
Route 950 will provide all-day service between the Herndon Metrorail Station and the
Reston Town Center Metrorail Station. Service will also include the Reston Town Center
Transit Station, Reston Hospital, and activity centers along Elden Street to Worldgate.
The route will operate with frequencies of 15 minutes during weekday peak periods, 20
minutes during weekday off-peak periods, and 20 to 30 minutes during weekends. The
current Route 950 operates with frequencies of 20 minutes during weekday peak
periods, 25 minutes during weekday off-peak periods, and 30 minutes during weekends.

Route 951: Wiehle-Reston East Metrorail Station – Innovation Center Metrorail Station Route 951 will operate during peak periods between the Wiehle-Reston East Metrorail Station and the Innovation Center Metrorail Station. Service will also include Glade Drive, the U.S. Geological Survey, and Sunrise Valley Drive. The route will provide connections between commercial and residential areas south of the Dulles Toll Road,

with 20-minute frequency during weekday peak periods. The current Route 951 operates weekday-only service with 30-minute frequency during peak periods and 40-minute frequency during off-peak periods.

Route 952: Sunset Hills – Dulles Airport

Route 952 will provide all-day service between the Wiehle-Reston East Metrorail Station and the Dulles Airport. Service will also include activities centers along Sunset Hills, the Herndon Metrorail Station, and Worldgate. The route will operate with 20-minute frequency during weekday peak periods and 60-minute frequency during weekday off-peak periods and weekends. The current Route 952 operates weekday-only service with 30-minute frequency during peak periods and 40-minute frequency during off-peak periods.

Route 983: Dulles Airport – Udvar-Hazy

Route 983 will provide all-day service between the Dulles Airport and the Udvar-Hazy Air and Space Museum. Service will also include the Innovation Center Metrorail Station and Park Center Road. The route will operate with 25-minute frequency during weekday peak periods and 60-minute frequency during weekday off-peak periods and weekends. The current Route 983 operates with 20-minute frequency on weekdays and weekends.

RIBS 1: Lake Anne – Hunters Woods

RIBS 1 will provide all-day service between the Lake Anne area and the Reston Town Center Metrorail Station. The route will operate with 25-minute frequency during weekday peak and off-peak periods and 20 to 30-minute frequency on weekends. The current Route RIBS 1 operates with 25-minute frequency on weekdays and 35-minute frequency on weekends.

RIBS 2: Reston – South Lakes Drive

The current RIBS 2 and Route 551 will be merged to form a new RIBS 2 operating on a bidirectional basis. The route will provide all-day service between the Wiehle-Reston East Metrorail Station and the Reston Town Center Transit Station via South Lakes Drive and Sunset Hills Drive. The route will operate with 20-minute frequency during weekday peak periods and 30-minute frequency during weekday off-peak periods and weekends. The current Route RIBS 2 operates with 40-minute frequency on weekdays and 35-minute frequency on weekends.

RIBS 3: Hunters Woods - Lake Anne

RIBS 3 will provide all-day service between Hunters Woods and the Reston Town Center Metrorail Station. The route will operate with 25-minute frequency during weekday peak and off-peak periods and 20 to 30-minute frequency on weekends. The current Route RIBS 3 operates with 25-minute frequency on weekdays and 35-minute frequency on weekends.

RIBS 4: Reston Town Center Metrorail Station – North Point

RIBS 4 will replace Route 556 and connect with the Reston Town Center Metrorail Station. The route will provide all-day service with 20-minute frequency during weekday

peak periods and 40-minute frequency during weekday off-peak periods and weekends. The current Route RIBS 4 operates with frequencies of 35 minutes during weekday peak periods, 40 minutes during weekday off-peak periods, and 35 minutes on weekends.

RIBS 5: Herndon

RIBS 5 will provide more direct service between Harbor House and the Elden Street shopping centers, while continuing to link to the Reston Town Center Transit Station. North and west of Harbor House, the route will operate in a loop incorporating Herndon Parkway and Park Avenue. The route will operate with 45-minute frequency on weekdays and weekends. The current Route RIBS 5 operates with 45-minute frequency during weekday peak periods and 50-minute frequency during weekday off-peak periods and weekends.

New Routes

Staff recommends implementing the new routes shown on Table 2 to decrease travel time and improve access to Metrorail stations, employment, hospitals, and key activity centers.

Route 615: Fair Oaks Hospital – Greenbriar – Fair Oaks Mall

The section of Route 605 currently operating between the Fair Oaks Hospital and the Fair Oaks Mall, via Stringfellow Road and Fair Lakes Parkway, will be replaced by the new Route 615. More direct connections with Reston will be available at the Fair Oaks Hospital. Route 615 will provide all-day service with 30-minute frequency during weekday peak periods and 45-minute frequency during weekday off-peak periods and weekends. Connection with Route 605 to Reston will be maintained by way of a transfer point at Fair Oaks Hospital.

Route 901: Herndon Metrorail Station - Centreville

The new Route 901 will provide connectivity between the Herndon, Centreville, and Chantilly areas. The route will significantly reduce travel time between these areas, while providing access from residential areas to employment centers. The route will

operate all-day service with 30-minute frequency during weekday peak periods and 60-minute frequency during weekday off-peak periods and weekends.

Route 921: Herndon Circulator

At the request of the Herndon area stakeholders, the new Route 921 will operate as a loop through the Town of Herndon, connecting the Herndon downtown and historical areas to the Herndon Metrorail Station. Service will also include Parcher Avenue, as well as the Spring Street / VanBuren Street area not currently served by public transit. The route will operate with 40-minute frequency on weekdays and weekends.

Route 954: Sterling Plaza – Herndon Metrorail Station


The new Route 954 will provide all-day service between the Sterling Plaza and the Herndon Metrorail Station, improving access to employment, shopping, and Loudoun County Transit. Additionally, Route 954 will provide more frequent and regular connections to medium-density and high-density areas with higher transit propensity along Herndon Parkway, as well as the Crestview Drive area not currently served by public transit. The route will operate with 30-minute frequency during weekday peak periods and 60-minute frequency during weekday off-peak periods and weekends.



Had social distancing not been imposed, I would by now (3/25) have taken, at a minimum, four additional trips on the 552 or 558. In addition, I have in the past taken a bus to get to the Wiehle Metro and then walked on to businesses along Sunset Hills. The proposed stop nearest my home on Westhills Lane appears to be Wiehle Avenue at North Shore. While that distance may appear small to some, the route is hilly and a challenge for someone of my age (well past retirement, though reasonably healthy). Pulling luggage to/from the stop would not be possible for me. Even walking to/from the Ribs stop at North Shore and Becontree could be a challenge at times. Admittedly, I have observed that the 552 and 558 are lightly used, at least at the times I have ridden. Have you considered the following?

- Using a smaller vehicle—a traditional shuttle—on lightly these used routes
- Rerouting a Ribs bus around Ring Road

I understand that I am not in the demographic you are targeting. . .though I will say that over my years in Reston (51 total, 49 in my current home) I've used the bus system to get to/from work in DC. . .first the Reston Commuter to DC and later the Connector (?) to—was it East or West Falls Church Metro?

Since retirement, I've truly rejoiced in my convenient connection to the world outside Reston, have coached local friends on using the Connector, and bragged to non-locals about the excellent public transit service Fairfax County provides. Elimination of buses around Ring Road would truly be a blow to me, greatly diminishing the quality of my life. I urge you to reconsider—or to consider some alternative that would provide some service to that route.

	P.S. On further scrutiny, it appears that the proposed re-routing of the 574 may come around Ring Road and then take riders down Route 7 to the Spring Hill Metro station. Perhaps you can tell me if I am reading the map correctly. While this route seems a bit bizarre, heading away from the nearest Metro, one must adjust, I suppose. For those of us whose bus segments you are proposing to eliminate, having a special screen pointing convenient options would have been helpful.

SILVER LINE PHASE 2 BUS SERVICE PLAN: TITLE VI SERVICE EQUITY ANALYSIS

INTRODUCTION

This analysis was conducted in accordance with the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) *Circular 4702.1B, Title VI Requirements and Guidelines for Federal Transit Administration Recipients* (hereafter the *Circular*). The *Circular* requires, under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, that the Fairfax County Department of Transportation (FCDOT) undertakes an evaluation of any proposed major service change to determine whether it has a discriminatory impact on Title VI protected minority or low-income populations. The requirement applies to any and all major service changes. Any transit operator receiving federal funds with at least 50 vehicles during peak service periods is required to conduct a service equity analysis.

The analysis was completed in accordance with Fairfax County's Title VI Program and must be approved by the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors before the service change is implemented. It will be included in FCDOT's submission in 2023 of the next Title VI Program to FTA, as required.

In summary, the Circular states that the service equity analysis must include:

- A statement of the agency's major service change, disparate impact, and disproportionate burden
 policies and how the public was engaged in developing the policies.
- Inclusion of a copy of the Board of Supervisors' approval demonstrating the consideration, awareness, and approval of the major service change policy, disparate impact, and disproportionate burden policies.
- A clear explanation of how the proposed service changes meet or exceed the operator's major service change policy. Changes that exceed the major service change policy must be analyzed for disparate impact and disproportionate burden.
- An analysis that takes into effect any adverse effects related to a major service change.
 Demonstration that the operator has analyzed impacts of the existing and proposed service and has considered the degree of adverse effects when planning service changes.
- Description of data and methodology used in service equity analysis.
- Overlay maps and tables showing how the proposed service changes would impact minority and low-income populations. If a disparate impact or disproportionate burden is found, the operator will clearly demonstrate substantial legitimate justification for the proposed service change and analysis of alternatives to avoid, minimize, or mitigate the disparate impact or disproportionate burden.

Summary of Analysis Results

The service changes proposed for implementation in 2022 were reviewed as mandated by the *Circular*. The planned service changes are cost-neutral and redistribute service from routes that were made redundant by the opening of Metrorail Silver Line Phase 2 service throughout the Reston-Herndon area of Fairfax County. As part of these changes, four routes were added (615, 901, 921, and 954), 12 routes were removed (505, 551, 554, 556, 559, 585, 926, 927, 929, 980, 981, and 985), and 19 routes experienced other changes including realignments, span of service, or headway (507, 552, 553, 557, 558, 574, 599, 605, 924, 937, 950, 951, 952, 983, RIBS 1, RIBS 2, RIBS 3, RIBS 4, and RIBS 5). The service changes within the Reston-Herndon area are comprehensive in nature, encompassing all routes and a reenvisioning of service. As a result, adverse effects were analyzed on a census block group basis instead of a route-by-route basis, and all proposed service changes were deemed major service changes.

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The service equity analysis identified changes in 18 census block groups resulting in a disparate impact and changes in 14 census block groups resulting in a disproportionate burden. Of the disparate impacts identified, a substantial legitimate justification was identified for the 18 census block groups. Of the disproportionate burdens identified, the impacts and rationale of the proposed changes in serving low-income passengers were explored and documented.

Development of Title VI Policies and Approval by Board of Supervisors

In accordance with the requirements of the *Circular*, Fairfax County must establish policies and thresholds for what constitutes a major service change, disparate impact, and disproportionate burden for use in service equity and fare equity analyses. The Board of Supervisors approved these policies and their accompanying thresholds on September 15, 2020 (Figure 1). According to the *Circular*, Fairfax County must review these policies every three years and make revisions, as necessary. While a new analysis was completed to ensure these thresholds continue to meet FTA guidelines, the proposed policies and thresholds for FY 2021–2023 are unchanged from the previous Title VI Program.

A public comment period on the proposed major service change, disparate impact, and disproportionate burden policies was held from June 29, 2020, to July 31, 2020. Members of the public were offered the following options for providing comments:

- Online survey
- Virtual focus groups for representatives of community organizations serving minority and low-income populations
- Webpage featuring both the proposed written policies, as well as a recorded presentation video explaining the major service change, disparate impact, and disproportionate burden policies

More information about the public involvement effort can be found in the Title VI Program document.

33. A-8 – APPROVAL OF THE FAIRFAX COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION'S MAJOR SERVICE CHANGE, DISPARATE IMPACT, AND DISPROPORTIONATE BURDEN POLICIES FOR THE FAIRFAX CONNECTOR (2:22 p.m.)

Supervisor Alcorn moved that the Board concur in the recommendation of staff and approve the proposed Major Service Change, Disparate Impact, and Disproportionate Burden Policies for the Fairfax Connector (Attachments 1 & 2), as part of the Department of Transportation's forthcoming Title VI Plan triennial update. The motion was multiply seconded and it carried by unanimous vote.

Title VI Policies and Definitions

A service equity analysis may require the evaluation of as many as four items, depending on the nature of the route, the proposed service change, and the environment being served. The policies listed in this section are contained in Fairfax County's Title VI Program, as approved by the Board of Supervisors on September 15, 2020.

A <u>major service change</u> is defined as either an increase or a decrease of 25 percent or more in either daily revenue service hours, revenue service miles, or both for the individual route being modified.

A <u>disparate impact</u> occurs when the difference between minority riders and non-minority riders affected by a proposed service change or fare change is 10 percent or greater.

A <u>disproportionate burden</u> occurs when the difference between low-income riders and non-low-income riders affected by a proposed service change or fare change is 10 percent or greater.

An <u>adverse effect</u> occurs when a proposed service change incorporates any of the following modifications:

- Service is eliminated.
- Headway is modified by at least 20 percent and 10 minutes.
- Span of service is modified by at least 10 percent and two hours.
- New service is implemented.

"If a transit provider chooses not to alter the proposed service changes despite the potential disparate impact on minority populations, or if the transit provider finds, even after the revisions, that minority riders will continue to bear a disproportionate share of the proposed service change, the transit provider may implement the service change *only* if:

- "the transit provider has a substantial legitimate justification for the proposed service change; and
- "the transit provider can show that there are no alternatives that would have a less disparate impact
 on minority riders but would still accomplish the transit provider's legitimate program goals." (Circular
 page IV-16; emphasis in original)

Staff measured and compared the percentage of minority population living in each impacted census block group to the percentage of minority population living within the entire service area (i.e., Fairfax County) to determine whether the service change would result in a disparate impact. Staff also measured and compared the percentage of low-income households in each impacted census block group to the percentage of low-income households within the entire service area to determine whether the service change would result in a disproportionate burden.

METHODOLOGY AND APPLICATION OF ADVERSE EFFECTS DEFINITION

Data Sources

Definitions for minority and low-income population are drawn from the Title VI Program. Data on the minority population by census block group is from Table B03002 from the American Community Survey, 2014–2018 five-year estimates. Minority population is defined as all persons who are not within the non-Hispanic white population. Data on the low-income households by census block group is from Table B19001 from the American Community Survey, 2014–2018 five-year estimates. Low-income households are defined as households making under \$50,000 annually.

Fairfax Connector's existing General Transit Feed Specification (GTFS) was used to analyze the existing and proposed access to bus stops, headway, and span of service for each census block group.

Methodology

Step 1: Major Service Change Determination

The service changes within the Reston-Herndon area are comprehensive in nature, encompassing all routes and a re-envisioning of service. As a result, all changes were deemed a major service change. In addition, due to the comprehensive nature of the proposed service changes, the equity analysis was conducted on a census block group basis instead of a route-by-route basis.

Step 2: Adverse Effect Determination

The following paragraphs describe the methodology used to define whether a census block group met the definition of adverse effect, which includes added or eliminated service, headway change, or span of service change.

A spatial join between census block groups and bus stops was executed to find the access to stops for each census block group, including any stops within one-quarter mile of each census block group to account for walkability to nearby census block groups. A census block group was considered to have service added under the proposed plan if there were no stops in the existing service but there were stops in the proposed service change. Similarly, a census block group was considered to have service removed under the proposed plan if there were stops in the existing service but there were no stops in the proposed service. Any census block group with service added or eliminated was evaluated for disparate impact and disproportionate burden.

The number of trips serving any stop within one-quarter mile of each census block group during each time period of interest (weekday peak, weekday midday, Saturday core, and Sunday core) was calculated in

order to find the effective headway for each census block group. To calculate the headway, the number of hours in each period was divided by the number of trips in that period times 60. The change in headway was analyzed as both a percent and absolute change. According to the adverse impact definition, a census block group was evaluated for disparate impact and disproportionate burden if the headway change was at least 20 percent (increase or decrease) and at least a 10-minute absolute change.

Span of service for each census block group was calculated as the maximum span of all the stops within one-quarter mile of each census block group by day type (weekday, Saturday, and Sunday). The maximum span includes only hours in which there is service to one of the stops within one-quarter mile of the census block group by day. For example, if a stop only has trips in the AM peak and PM peak periods, then the midday hours are not included in the census block group's maximum span. The change in span of service was analyzed as both a percent and absolute change. According to the adverse impact definition, a census block group was evaluated for disparate impact and disproportionate burden if the span change was at least 10 percent (increase or decrease) and at least a two-hour absolute change.

Step 3: Disparate Impact and Disproportionate Burden Analysisny census block group meeting the criteria for added or eliminated service, headway change, or span of service change was evaluated for disparate impact and disproportionate burden by comparing the census block group's percentages of minority population and low-income households with the Fairfax County averages of 48.7 percent minority population and 16.8 percent low-income households. A disparate impact (DI) occurs when the difference between minority riders and non-minority riders affected by a proposed service change is 10 percent or greater. A disproportionate burden (DB) occurs when the difference between low-income riders and non-low-income riders affected by a proposed service change is 10 percent or greater. Analysis at the census block group level is shown in the *Appendix: Disparate Impact (DI) and Disproportionate Burden (DB) by Census Block Group.* Census block groups that will have a disparate impact or disproportionate burden are highlighted in orange color (Table 17 to 32).

When service was added, headway was reduced (an increase in service), or span of service was increased, the affected census block group was considered to have a disparate impact if the minority population was 38.7 percent or less and a disproportionate burden if the low-income households were 6.8 percent or less (which equate to 10 percent less than the Fairfax County averages). When service was eliminated, headway was increased (a decrease in service), or span of service was reduced, the affected census block group was considered to have a disparate impact if the minority population was 58.7 percent or greater and a disproportionate burden if the low-income households were 26.8 percent or greater (which equate to 10 percent greater than the Fairfax County averages).

Step 4: Avoid, Minimize, Mitigate

If the proposed change resulted in a disparate impact or a disproportionate burden, each change was closely analyzed to understand the nature of the change at the census block group level and the routes serving the census block group. The routes were modified to avoid, minimize, or mitigate impacts where practical or substantial justification was provided.

SUMMARY OF SERVICE CHANGES

Impetus for Change

Staff propose service changes scheduled for implementation with the opening of the Silver Line phase 2, to improve the customer experience and increase ridership through improvements in on-time performance, service reliability, effectiveness, and enhanced connections to the new Metrorail Stations for Silver Line Phase 2 in Reston and Herndon. The new Metrorail Silver Line Phase 2 will replace services formerly provided by bus, including services that connected the Reston-Herndon community to other areas of Fairfax County and the Washington, D.C. metropolitan region. This presented staff with an opportunity to reallocate bus service resources within the Reston-Herndon area.

Determination of Major Service Changes

The service changes within the Reston-Herndon area are comprehensive in nature, encompassing all routes and a re-envisioning of service. As a result, adverse effects were analyzed on a census block group basis instead of a route-by-route basis. The major service change policy is based upon changes in revenue hours or revenue miles, but may not adequately capture routes that are being significantly realigned (as many routes in this proposed plan are). Due to the comprehensive nature of the proposed service changes, all changes were deemed a major service change. As a result, this analysis includes all the route changes that meet the major service change policy, as well as others that experienced a significant change in service but did not independently meet the major service change policy.

DISPARATE IMPACT

This section contains the analysis of FCDOT's proposed changes for disparate impact. The "Substantial Legitimate Justification" column for each metric describes an area (comprised of one or more census block groups) for which FCDOT has provided a substantial legitimate justification for changes that resulted in disparate impacts.

After examining the proposed service changes, staff determined that all identified disparate impacts resulted from service improvements. Each disparate impact was closely analyzed to understand the nature of the changes at the census block group level and the routes serving the census block group. Staff determined that the service improvements were integral to changes made to enhance access to key public facilities or employment and retail centers, and reflected service requests received via the robust public input process that was a part of the development of the service plan.

Some of the public facilities to benefit from the proposed service changes include the Northern Virginia Community College's Loudoun County Campus, Herndon High School, and the Fair Oaks Hospital. Note that in fall 2019, minority students accounted for 54 percent of all students at the Northern Virginia Community College's Loudoun County Campus.² The Herndon High School student body was 69 percent minority and 27 percent English language learners in the 2019–2020 school year.³

Discontinuation of Service or New Service Disparate Impact




Figure 2: Service Added or Eliminated - Disparate Impact

One location within the Fairfax Connector service area had a disparate impact finding due to service being added where there is currently no service. **Table 1** describes the service change taking place in the impacted area, as well as the substantial legitimate justification for the change. As noted in Table 1, the change will improve service with no adverse effect. The accompanying map on **Figure 2** displays the geographic location. Analysis at the census block group level is shown in **Table 17** of the Appendix.




Figure 3: Weekday Span of Service - Disparate Impact




Figure 4: Saturday Span of Service – Disparate Impact




Figure 5: Sunday Span of Service - Disparate Impact




Figure 6: Weekday Peak Period Headway - Disparate Impact




Figure 7: Weekday Midday Headway - Disparate Impact




Figure 8: Saturday Core Period Headway - Disparate Impact




Figure 9: Sunday Core Period Headway – Disparate Impact

DISPROPORTIONATE BURDEN

This section contains the analysis of FCDOT's proposed changes for disproportionate burden. The "Rationale" column for each metric describes an area (comprised of one or more census block groups) and the rationale for changes that resulted in a disproportionate burden.

After examining the proposed service changes, staff determined that the identified disproportionate burden instances all resulted from service improvements. Each disproportionate burden was further analyzed to understand the nature of the changes at the census block level and the routes serving the census block group. Staff determined that the service improvements were integral to changes made to enhance access to key public facilities or employment and retail centers, and reflected service requests received via the robust public input process that was a part of the development of the service plan.

Some of the public facilities to benefit from the proposed service changes include the Northern Virginia Community College's Loudoun County campus, Herndon High School, and the Fair Oaks Hospital. Note 48 percent of the Herndon High School student body in the 2019–2020 school year qualified for free or reduced-price meals, which was a measure of student poverty.⁴

Discontinuation of Service or New Service Disproportionate Burden




Figure 10: Service Added or Eliminated – Disproportionate Burden

One location within the Fairfax Connector service area had a disproportionate burden finding due to service being added in a location that currently does not have service. **Table 9** describes the service change taking place in the impacted area, as well as the rationale for the change. As noted in Table 9, the change will improve service with no adverse effect. The accompanying map on **Figure 10** displays the geographic location. Analysis at the census block group level is displayed in **Table 25** of the Appendix.




Figure 11: Weekday Span of Service – Disproportionate Burden




Figure 12: Saturday Span of Service – Disproportionate Burden




Figure 13: Sunday Span of Service – Disproportionate Burden




Figure 14: Weekday Peak Period Headway – Disproportionate Burden




Figure 15: Weekday Midday Period Headway – Disproportionate Burden




Figure 16: Saturday Core Period Headway – Disproportionate Burden



Also, Route 924 will provide access to employment areas on Herndon Parkway and the north side of the new Metrorail Station, shopping centers at Franklin Farms Market Place and Sugarland Crossing, the Town Center of Sterling, and Herndon Center, as well as Loudoun County Transit Route 70. Much of the area of eastern Loudoun County north of Dulles Airport, including the Sterling community served by Route 924, is classified as low-income census block groups by Loudoun County Transit in their Title VI Program. Route 924 will connect these populations within Loudoun County with the Northern Virginia Community College and the Fairfax Connector and Metrorail networks.



CONCLUSION

The service changes proposed for implementation were reviewed as mandated by the FTA in the *Circular*. The identified instances of disparate impact and disproportionate burden resulted from improvements to service. Staff determined the identified service improvements were integral to changes made to enhance access to key public facilities or employment and retail centers, and reflected service requests received via the robust public input process that was a part of the development of the service plan. Overall, the proposed service changes will improve service for Fairfax Connector riders and the communities along the routes.

Monitoring

Staff will monitor the ridership levels, ridership characteristics (such as demographics, low-income status, and English proficiency) and performance metrics of the new routes to understand how riders are using the new system once implemented.

ACTION - 7

Approval of an Increase to the Maximum Annual Financing Authorized Under the Current Master Lease Agreement

ISSUE:

Board of Supervisors' authorization to revise the maximum annual financing for the Master Lease Agreement from \$30,000,000 to \$60,000,000. Staff requests this increase primarily to provide flexibility in meeting the County's environmental goals and initiatives. Specifically, this will provide for a strategy to finance the replacement and electrification of the Fairfax County Public Schools (FCPS) and Fairfax Connector bus fleets.

RECOMMENDATION:

The County Executive recommends that the Board of Supervisors approve the proposed revision to the Master Lease Agreement.

TIMING:

Board action is requested on February 22, 2022.

BACKGROUND:

Since its inception in 1994, the Lease Purchase Program has proven to be a valuable tool to acquire school buses, public service radios, computers, and other assets. The Fairfax County Public School (FCPS) system has used the program to stabilize and manage the replacement of aging equipment within the County's debt guidelines to relieve stress on the budget and create a stable source of funding. The County's Ten Principles of Sound Financial Management allow for up to three percent of the respective County and Schools operating expenditures to be used to support lease purchase agreements secured by vehicles and equipment and is consistent since the program's inception in 1994.

The Lease-Purchase Program has provided the County and FCPS with rapid access to capital with low rates, streamlined legal reviews, and standardized documents. The program is currently operating under an agreement with Banc of America Public Capital Corporation via county contract number 4400009651, as authorized by the Board of Supervisors on March 10, 2020. FCPS has historically been the primary user of the Master Lease Program for its bus and equipment (e.g., computer related devices)

replacement needs, whereas the County has had minimal usage of the Master Lease Program.

Transportation activities are a significant source of carbon emissions and the Community-wide Energy and Climate Action Plan (CECAP), Operational Energy Strategy, and Joint Environmental Task Force (JET) recommendations include strategies to reduce emissions by reducing vehicle miles traveled through optimization of public transportation options and conversion of the bus fleets to electric vehicles. Specifically, the JET recommended the Connector diesel bus fleet transition to electric alternatives by 2030, and the FCPS fleet by 2035. Also, no diesel buses will be purchased after FY 2024 without further Board discussion.

FCPS has been successful in utilizing a portion of its federal stimulus funding toward equipment purchases to support virtual instruction and will continue to use the master lease program for future programmed purchases of electric vehicles and equipment.

County staff also recommend leveraging the Master Lease Program to support the Connector transition from diesel buses to electric buses. The County has relied primarily on one-time balances and reserves in transportation state aid for its Fairfax Connector bus replacement plans. These sources have proven to be very useful in offsetting county general fund and local transportation funds. However, this approach is not sustainable for the future, because these revenues have been depleted. The Master Lease program provides the County a more feasible option to leverage the bus replacement needs with a manageable cash flow model. The Master Lease Program can also be used for County non-bus fleet replacement needs.

The master lease program carries a maximum annual financing limit. This amount has varied through the years from \$60,000,000 (2009-2014) to \$45,000,000 (2015-2020), and \$30,000,000 under the current contract. However, given the consensus recommendations for the electric bus fleet transition for both FCPS and the County and an insufficient cash flow to continue to pay cash for County buses, staff recommend increasing the maximum annual financing available through the contract from \$30,000,000 to \$60,000,000. This will provide ample annual flexibility for FCPS and the County to meet out-year electric fleet requirements and the higher acquisition costs compared to traditional diesel buses; the related infrastructure components; and other programmed equipment needs. The County and Schools are currently both well within their respective three percent targets, and conservative out-year projections with the revised annual cap remain under the three percent targets.

Banc of America Public Capital Corporation has been the provider of the master lease program since 2020. Staff have confirmed they can accommodate the revised maximum annual financing of \$60,000,000 and there will be no change to the current

index and interest rate formula. The basis for the interest rates established in this agreement remains the Intercontinental Exchange Swap Trade Index ("ICE Index"), which is a commonly used index by banking institutions for comparative master leasing programs nationwide. It should be emphasized that the County will not be engaging in interest rate swaps or any other derivative transactions. Currently, this index is used to determine the County's lease rates under the Master Lease. As of January 21, 2022, the lease purchase rate based on this index ranged from 1.61 percent to 2.36 percent, depending upon the lease term selected for the financing, which can range from three to ten years. Lease purchase rates and terms are monitored by County staff and its financial advisor and may be adjusted from time to time by the Purchasing Agent with consent of the master lease provider.

The Fairfax County Department of Tax Administration has verified that Banc of America Public Capital Corp possesses the appropriate Fairfax County Business, Professional, & Occupational License (BPOL).

FISCAL IMPACT:

Lease financing will be determined by the length of the lease term, the amount requested to be financed, and market conditions at the time of the proposed acquisition. Lease payments incurred for County equipment or vehicles will be paid by the County, and lease payments incurred for FCPS equipment or vehicles will be paid by FCPS. The County and Schools are currently both well within their respective three percent targets, and conservative out-year projections with the revised annual cap remain under the three percent targets.

VDOT is pursuing this request to remove the old alignment portion of Richmond Highway from the Virginia Highway System.

WHEREAS, the subject portion of Richmond Highway was no longer necessary and was removed from the Virginia Department of Transportation's Primary System of Highways; and


WHEREAS, a new alignment of Richmond Highway has been constructed and replaced the abandoned old alignment; and



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




Route 1 Abandonment

ACTION - 9

Approval of a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) Between the Washington
Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA) and Fairfax County to Formalize the
Process of Providing Emergency Bus Support During Metrorail Disruptions at Metrorail
Stations in Fairfax and Loudoun Counties

ISSUE:

Board approval of a MOA between WMATA and the County to provide emergency bus service to Metrorail patrons during Metrorail service disruptions in and around Fairfax County.

RECOMMENDATION:

The County Executive recommends that the Board approve the attached MOA with WMATA, in the substantial form of Attachment 1, and authorize the Director of the Department of Transportation (FCDOT) to execute the finalized agreement in substantially the form of Attachment 1 on behalf of Fairfax County.

TIMING:

Board action is requested on February 22, 2022, to allow the WMATA Board time to review and approve the MOA before Phase 2 of the Metrorail Silver Line opens later this year.

BACKGROUND:

Prior to the opening of the Metrorail Silver Line Phase 1, WMATA and the County created a MOA to provide emergency bus services using Fairfax Connector resources, during a Metrorail disruption at Metrorail stations located within the boundaries of Fairfax County, as well as the Van Dorn Street and Eisenhower Avenue Metrorail stations located within the City of Alexandria. The Board approved that MOA on June 3, 2014, and the MOA was executed on July 23, 2014.

In anticipation of beginning revenue service on Phase 2 of the Silver Line, WMATA, Fairfax County, and Loudoun County opened negotiations in March 2021 to develop a new MOA to provide emergency bus services between the new Silver Line stations. The Silver Line Phase 2 extension will include three additional Metrorail stations in Fairfax County (Reston Town Center Station, Herndon Station, and Innovation Center Station) and three new Metrorail stations in Loudoun County (Dulles Airport Station, Loudoun

Gateway Station, and Ashburn Station). Since emergency bus services may originate or terminate in Fairfax County, Fairfax County staff negotiated with Loudoun County and WMATA to determine areas of responsibility and developed a revised MOA to include the new Silver Line Metrorail stations. WMATA is entering into similar agreements with each of the participating jurisdictions. The intent of this MOA is to formalize this process to ensure full recovery of the County's expenses for providing emergency bus services assistance in the future.

FISCAL IMPACT:

There is no fiscal impact to the County budget if this item is approved. The agreement requires WMATA to fully reimburse the County for any emergency Fairfax Connector bus services operated under this agreement.

MUTUAL AID AND ASSISTANCE AGREEMENT

This Mutual Aid and Assistance Agreement ("Agreement") is made by and between the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority, an interstate compact agency of the District of Columbia, State of Maryland, and Commonwealth of Virginia ("WMATA"), and Fairfax County, Virginia, a political subdivision of the Commonwealth of Virginia (the "Local Government")(collectively, the "Parties", and each a "Party). This Agreement is effective as of _______, 2022 (the "Effective Date").

Recitals

WHEREAS, this Agreement sets forth the manner in which the Local Government will provide emergency and related transit support to WMATA during Metrorail disruptions at Metrorail stations located within the boundaries of Fairfax County or the Fairfax Connector service area; and

WHEREAS, this Agreement establishes the parameters for reimbursement to the Local Government if emergency and related transit support is provided;

WHEREAS, under this Agreement, all services supplied to WMATA shall be provided under the terms and conditions set forth in the agreement(s) between the County and its bus service provider(s); and

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the promises contained herein, and for good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, and with the intent to be bound, the Parties agree as follows.

Section 1 - Scope

The Local Government support shall be limited to the provision of rolling stock and operators, including drivers and supervisors, to provide Bus Bridges in response to WMATA's requests for assistance for Metrorail Disruptions. These services will be provided under the terms and conditions set forth in the agreement(s) between the County and its bus service provider(s).

Section 2 – Definitions

As used in this Agreement, the following terms shall apply:

- A. "Days" shall mean calendar days.
- B. "Metrorail Disruption" shall mean an unplanned or emergency disruption in the transit service

- offered by WMATA in Fairfax County or the Fairfax Connector service area due to transit service stoppage not planned or coordinated in advance by WMATA.
- C. "Bus Bridge" shall mean the provision of bus transportation between two Metrorail stations (the "O/D Pair"), including, upon WMATA's request, making stops at one or more Metrorail stations located between the O/D Pair on headways requested by WMATA substantially on the routes, headways, and other parameters shown in the Fairfax County Bus Bridge Guidebook ("Guidebook").
- D. "Guidebook" shall refer to the operations plan to execute the emergency bus bridges which may be amended from time to time to reflect changes to field operations.
- E. "Call Chain" shall mean the numbers for WMATA's Rail Operations Control Center (ROCC), Bus Operations Control Center (BOCC), and Fairfax Connector's Bus Operations Communication Center (BOCC) which may be amended from time to time to reflect personnel changes.

Section 3 – Personnel and Vehicles

- A. The Local will use best efforts to provide the requested transit resources and support, without causing a major disruption to normal Local Government service. The Local Government reserves the right to deny the request for support if it deems that the resources requested are beyond those identified in the Guidebook and or the provision of support would cause an excessive disruption to normal Local Government service.
- B. The Local Government will use standard heavy-duty transit vehicles (buses) equipped with a Local Government public service radio system and ADA equipment (2 wheelchair securement areas per bus) for Bus Bridges.

Section 4 – Providing Support

A. WMATA's notification shall:

- 1. give the Local Government's Bus Operations Control Center as much notice as the circumstances permit by implementing the Fairfax County Bus Bridge Call Chain ("Call Chain"); and
- 2. include in such notice, at a minimum, (1) reason for the support; (2) the location(s) to pick up passengers; (3) the final destination(s) of passengers; and (4) any other pertinent information.
- B. When providing service, the Local Government:

- shall implement those portions of the Guidebook applicable to the Metrorail Disruption described by the WMATA notification or provide an explanation to WMATA as to why the anticipated resources are not available.
- 2. shall use best efforts to comply with the Guidebook, but may make reasonable deviation from the Guidebook in the event of road or station access closures as a result of roadway maintenance, law enforcement or emergency response activities, utility repairs, or other such activities and actions that are beyond the control of the Local Government.
- 3. shall not charge customers for the use of the Bus Bridge; and
- 4. shall use its best efforts to maintain accurate counts of patrons using the Bus Bridge and shall report those counts to WMATA within seven (7) calendar days of the end of the Bus Bridge.
- C. WMATA will notify the Local Government, pursuant to the processes established in the Guidebook and Call Chain, when the Bus Bridge is no longer needed.

Section 5 - Incurred Cost Reimbursement

- A. The Local Government shall, within thirty (30) Days of the publication of its annual budget, provide notice to WMATA of its then-current fully allocated operating costs, if any, per hour for the provision of bus service, ("Hourly Rate").
- B. When providing a Bus Bridge, the Local Government shall track the number of hours of service provided (on-duty and available for passengers) in support of WMATA's request and pursuant to the Guidebook.
- C. Within forty-five (45) Days of the provision of a Bus Bridge, the Local Government shall invoice WMATA for the services provided. Such invoice shall include the total hours provided, and a certification that the work was performed and that the billing is accurate and correct.
- D. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this Agreement:
 - 1. the Hourly Rate authorized for payment under this Agreement shall not exceed the then-current Local Government approved budgeted hourly rate for the current fiscal

year;

- 2. if the Local Government collects fares or receives other renumeration from any source for Bus Bridge services, the revenues received by the Local Government shall be a credit against the costs charged to WMATA; and
- 3. WMATA shall pay for a minimum of three (3) hours at the then current Local Government Hourly Rate for each bus used to provide Bus Bridge services.
- E. WMATA shall pay the invoice by the then-standard payment methodology (currently ACH transfer) within thirty (30) Days of receipt of the invoice.
- F. All revenues received by the Local Government from any event arising under this Agreement will be credited as an expenditure credit to the accounts maintained and managed by the Local Government.

Section 6 – Limitation of Liability

In no event shall either Party be liable to the other Party under this Agreement for lost revenue, loss of use, loss of operating time, business interruption or punitive damages resulting from, or arising out of this Agreement.

Section 7 – County Insurance

Fairfax County / Fairfax Connector bus is self-insured with a combined single limit of not less than \$20 Million per occurrence. Upon commencement of this Agreement, Fairfax County shall acknowledge possession of insurance to WMATA evidencing the following:

A. Commercial General Liability – with the following minimum coverage and limits on a per Occurrence basis: \$20,000,000 Per Occurrence, and in aggregate, for bodily injury and property damage arising out of ownership, maintenance, or use of any covered premises.

Commercial Auto Liability insurance – in compliance with any and all statutes requiring such coverage in the Commonwealth of Virginia, covering the operation of Fairfax Connector buses. Fairfax County shall obtain and keep in force throughout the duration of this Agreement policy of Commercial General Liability with limit of \$20,000,000 per occurrence, and in aggregate, and Commercial Auto Liability Insurance, with the limit of \$20,000,000 per occurrence. This insurance will provide defense and indemnification for covered claims, suits or actions brought against Fairfax County on account of injury or damage sustained to any person, or to the property of any person, while utilizing the Fairfax Connector buses or as a direct result of utilizing the Fairfax Connector buses.

Section 8 – Sovereign Immunity and Force Majeure

Nothing in this Agreement shall be deemed to be an express or implied waiver of any immunities of the Local Government or WMATA, including but not limited to each Party's respective sovereign immunity. The Local Government shall not be held liable in the event of terrorism, an act of God, fire, floods, war, acts of war or insurrection, work stoppage, strike or other labor disturbances.

Section 9 – Annual Appropriations

- A. All requirements for funds to be borne by Local Government shall be subject to annual appropriations by the appropriate body of Local Government
- B. All requirements for funds to be borne by WMATA shall be subject to availability of funding and authorization of expense in the annual budget by the WMATA Board of Directors.

Section 10 – No Third-Party Benefit

This Agreement shall not be construed as creating any personal liability on the part of any officer, employee, or agent of the Parties, nor shall it be construed as giving any rights or benefits to anyone other than the Parties hereto.

Section 11 – Amendments

Any amendments to this Agreement must be made in writing and signed by the Parties.

Section 12 – Term of the Agreement

The initial term of this Agreement shall be for a period of three (3) years commencing on the Effective Date. The term shall automatically be renewed for successive three (3) year periods. This Agreement may be terminated by either Party by providing the other Party with ninety (90) Days prior written notice.

Section 13 – Miscellaneous

- A. This Agreement shall in all respects be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia. Where Virginia law conflicts with the WMATA Compact, the WMATA Compact shall control.
- B. Each Party shall provide the other with relevant contact information as soon as possible after staffing changes occur at either agency.
- C. Nothing in this Agreement shall change any agreement on handling emergency responses by first responders or emergency response.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the Parties have caused this Agreement to be executed by their respective duly authorized officials.

Consideration of Approval of the Economic Incentive Program Application of LMC Alexandria Crossing Holdings, LLC (Mount Vernon District)

ISSUE:

Board consideration of an application for the Economic Incentive Program (EIP) for an assemblage and redevelopment of property located in the Penn Daw Community Business Center within the Richmond Highway Corridor EIP Area. Approval would result in the development being designated as a "Qualifying Property" under the Economic Incentive Program Ordinance.

RECOMMENDATION:

The County Executive recommends that the Board approve the application by LMC Alexandria Crossing Holdings, LLC for eligibility in the EIP.

TIMING:

Board action is requested on February 22, 2022, which will provide sufficient assurances that the applicant is entitled to program benefits as it continues to proceed to obtain all approvals and permits needed for the completion of this project.

BACKGROUND:

On September 15, 2020, the Board adopted an amendment to the County Code that added a new Article 29 - Incentives to Encourage Economic Growth. The ordinance established an EIP for specified areas of Fairfax County. Specifically, the EIP applies to all five of the County's Commercial Revitalization Districts (CRDs), which are Annandale, Baileys Crossroads/Seven Corners, McLean, Richmond Highway and Springfield; and the County's Commercial Revitalization Area (CRA) of Lincolnia, as well as logical extensions of the Richmond Highway and the Springfield CRDs (see Attachment 1). The EIP provides regulatory and financial incentives to private sector developers who assemble and develop properties in accordance with the adopted ordinance and consistent with the vision of the Comprehensive Plan.

In order to qualify for the program, an applicant must demonstrate that their development project meets the eligibility criteria of the program. To be eligible, an applicant would need to have newly assembled a minimum of two parcels not previously approved for the same rezoning or site plan that collectively would comprise at least two

acres in size, be located within the territorial limits of an EIP area, be zoned to permit commercial, industrial or multifamily residential development, be in conformance with all laws and policies related to the provision and preservation of affordable housing, and be in conformance with the uses and consolidation recommendations in the Comprehensive Plan.

The application property is located within the Richmond Highway Corridor EIP Area. The property is comprised of 16 parcels of land held by two property owners: Penn Daw Properties LLLP and Michael Strasburg. The consolidated property totals 7.31 acres, of which Penn Daw Properties is contributing 13 parcels totaling 6.37 acres and Michael Strasburg is contributing three parcels totaling 0.94 acres. The eligibility process requires the applicant to submit a formal application with all owners as parties to the application. The EIP application meets that requirement.

The property is currently developed with five single-family dwelling units and a one-story commercial building. The proposed redevelopment would replace all existing structures and construct up to 46 new stacked townhouses, up to 35 townhomes, and up to 385 multi-family dwelling units in a mid-rise building for a total of up to 466 dwelling units. Pursuant to the adopted EIP Ordinance, the multi-family portion of the intended use is an eligible use, while the single-family attached development and condominiums uses are not eligible. While it is permissible to have some non-eligible uses as part of an overall development plan, only eligible uses may receive the real estate tax abatement. Thus, only the 3.84-acre portion of the property associated with the multi-family residential development (designated as Phase I in the zoning application) can receive the real estate tax abatement and only that portion of the site can be used to calculate the real estate tax abatement amount.

The proposed assemblage has not been previously rezoned for the proposed uses. Thus, staff finds that the proposed development constitutes a new rezoning not previously approved by the County.

The Comprehensive Plan recommends that the Penn Daw Community Business Center (CBC) be redeveloped into a high-quality, pedestrian-oriented, mixed-use community that is accessible to a planned future Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) station on Richmond Highway. The majority of Land Unit E, in which the subject property is located, is planned for mixed-use development and is recommended for up to 1,600 dwelling units and 700,000 square feet of non-residential uses. The Comprehensive Plan states that development proposals should reflect a single integrated project or a project that allows for future coordination with other projects and should achieve substantial consolidation of parcels. Portions of Land Unit E that are located along Quander Road are planned for residential use at a density of 5-8 dwelling units per acre with parcel consolidation. The Comprehensive Plan states that homes should be clustered to minimize impacts on

steep slopes in the area and vehicular access points should be consolidated and/or limited to reduce congestion within the Richmond Highway and Quander Road corridors.

As discussed fully in the staff report for the rezoning of the property (RZ/FDP 2021-MV-008), staff has concluded that the proposed development is in conformance with the Comprehensive Plan recommendations for proposed development. The applicant is providing Affordable Dwelling Units (ADUs) in accordance with the Zoning Ordinance. The applicant also is providing 10 percent of the applicable dwelling units as workforce dwelling units (WDUs) offered at an income tier of 80 percent of Area Median Income (AMI), while the County's new WDU policy calls for 8 percent of the rental units to be offered at 60 to 80 percent of AMI.

In conclusion, the development is located within the territorial limits of an EIP Area, constitutes a new rezoning not previously approved by the County, and complies with the assemblage, size, and ownership criteria of the EIP. The staff has concluded that the development is generally consistent with the Comprehensive Plan regarding uses and consolidation requirements.

Staff has reviewed the applicant's application dated November 16, 2021, for conformance with the eligibility criteria and issued a letter to each owner on November 24, 2021, (see Attachment 5) stating that the development as proposed appears to conform with the statutory requirements of the program and is therefore eligible for submission to the Board for consideration of approval.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Qualifying developments receive economic benefits including a reduction in site plan review fees of 10 percent, and a partial tax exemption on the real estate tax calculated as the difference between the pre-redevelopment (base) assessed value and the post-development assessed value in accordance with Virginia Code. As the County will continue to receive real estate tax revenues on the base (pre-redevelopment) assessed value of developments in the program and the single-family attached development and proposed condominiums, the partial tax exemptions of the real estate tax will not reduce the General Fund.

The Department of Tax Administration has determined that the 2021 base assessed value of the entire property is \$5,896,970, generating real estate taxes of \$74,218.84 per year, with a base tax rate of \$1.14 per \$100 of assessed value. The 2021 base assessed value of the portion of the property that is eligible (see Attachment 4) is \$2,612,870, generating real estate taxes of \$33,736.47 per year, with a base tax rate of \$1.14 per \$100 of assessed value. The applicant has estimated the post development assessed value of the portion of the property that is eligible (the multi-family residential

development and associated improvements as depicted in the Phase I plan) to be \$115,000,000 million. Because only the multi-family portion of the project is eligible for the tax abatement under the program, the partial tax abatement would be calculated on the \$112,387,130 million increment or difference between pre- and post-development values of the portion of the development that is eligible for the tax abatement. Thus, with a base tax rate of \$1.14 per \$100 of assessed value, the total tax abatement would be \$1,281,213.28 per year for a maximum tax abatement of \$12,812,132.82 over the maximum 10-year life of the program.

EQUITY IMPACT:

The Alexandria Crossing development will provide much needed rental and home ownership opportunities in a desirable area of Fairfax County where there is high demand for housing. The site is accessible by bus and a nearby Metrorail station and is within a quarter-of-a-mile of a future BRT station. The proposed redevelopment will provide ten percent of the total dwelling units as Workforce Dwelling Units (WDU) at an income tier of 80 percent of Area Median Income (AMI) and one (1) Affordable Dwelling Unit (ADU). While the applicant is proposing a higher percentage (2 percent more) of workforce dwelling units than is required under the WDU policy, it is not fully meeting the WDU policy with regards to lower-income tiers (60 to 80 percent AMI).

The Alexandria Crossing development will result in the loss of five existing single-family homes. Two to three of these homes are renter-occupied and will result in displacement of those households. The owners of the single-family homes can be expected to be compensated at fair-market value for their homes. Additionally, the redevelopment project is adjacent to an existing mobile home park (90 dwelling units), and it is possible that the redevelopment could have a destabilizing effect on the mobile home park. Additionally, the Comprehensive Plan for the mobile home property has a redevelopment option for mixed-use development up to seven stories. Staff is working with the Manufactured Homes Task Force to devise policies and recommendations for addressing displacement that may occur in the future should the County's mobile home parks be redeveloped.

The Economic Incentive Program will benefit the applicant with a partial real estate tax abatement for the multi-family portion of the property. The goal of this program is to facilitate economic development consistent with the Comprehensive Plan and is reserved for areas in the county that are striving to foster revitalization. In the case of this site, the property owners have sought redevelopment for over ten years but were strongly challenged by consolidation issues, among others. The EIP has allowed for the

redevelopment of this property in a manner that aligns with the Comprehensive Plan goals for this site, including land use, economic vitality, roadway and streetscape improvements, enhanced stormwater facilities, and provision of new park spaces – all to the benefit of the community.

While the affordable housing opportunities in the Richmond Highway corridor have been primarily rental housing opportunities, the additional affordable rental units at Alexandria Crossing will help achieve the county's goal of increasing the supply of affordable housing with a minimum of 5,000 new units by 2034 to meet the needs of working families. With Fairfax County's Area Median Income at \$129,000 (for a family of four), the delivery of Alexandria Crossing will provide crucial housing for families earning up to 80 percent of the Area Median Income (\$82,300 for a family of four). Further, the location of the proposed units in the Penn Daw Community Business Center aligns with the One Fairfax Policy, which recommends, in part, (i) the implementation of housing policies and practices that encourage all who want to live in Fairfax to be able to do so, and (ii) the providing of a full spectrum of housing opportunities across the county, most notably those in mixed-use areas that are accessible to multiple modes of transport. The Alexandria Crossing project will promote opportunities for everyone to fully participate in the region's economic vitality, contribute to its readiness for the future, and connect to its assets and resources.

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING ARTICLE 29 OF CHAPTER 4 OF THE FAIRFAX COUNTY CODE, RELATING TO INCENTIVES to ENCOURAGE ECONOMIC GROWTH

AN ORDINANCE to amend the Fairfax County Code by adopting Article 29 to Chapter 4 relating to incentives to private entities to encourage economic growth.

Be it ordained by the Board of Supervisors of Fairfax County:

1. That Chapter 4, Article 29 of the Fairfax County Code is adopted, as follows:

ARTICLE 29. - Incentives to Encourage Economic Growth.

Section 4-29-1. Title.

This ordinance shall hereafter be known, cited and referred to as the "Economic Incentive Program Ordinance" of Fairfax County.

Section 4-29-2. Purpose and Intent.

Fairfax County seeks to provide economic revitalization and redevelopment opportunities, in accordance with §§ 15.2-1232.2 and 58.1-3219.4 of the Code of Virginia, by offering regulatory and financial incentives, including partial real estate tax exemptions as set forth below, to encourage the private sector to purchase, assemble, revitalize, and redevelop real property suitable for economic development that is consistent with the vision contained in the Comprehensive Plan adopted by Fairfax County.

Section 4-29-3. Definitions.

- (a) Application means the form provided by the Director to be filed by an applicant seeking approval of the redevelopment of an assemblage of parcels and the granting of economic and regulatory incentives pursuant to the terms of this Article.
- (b) <u>Assemblage</u> means the combination of adjoining parcels, with different owners, into a single development in accordance with this Article.
- (c) <u>Commercial and industrial properties include all real property, excluding commercial condominiums, used for or zoned to permit commercial or industrial uses that are approved and designed for retail or wholesale trade, hotel, restaurant, offices, clinics,</u>

- warehouses, light manufacturing, and other such uses. Such classification of real property excludes all residential uses.
- (d) <u>Director</u> means the <u>Director</u> of the <u>Department</u> of <u>Planning</u> and <u>Development</u>, or the <u>designated agent of that Director</u>.
- (e) The Economic Incentive Program includes designated Economic Incentive Areas listed in Section 4-29-4 that operate for the purpose of economic revitalization as provided for in Va. Code § 15.2-1232.2 and for redevelopment pursuant to Va. Code § 58.1-3219.4.
- (f) <u>Multifamily residential development</u> includes apartments or any building containing more than four residential units, including live/work or senior housing units. Such classification of real property excludes single-family detached and attached residential units, cooperatives, and residential condominiums.
- (g) <u>Proposed development</u> means the proposed site design and uses submitted by the applicant(s) for approval under this Article.
- (h) Qualifying property means any assemblage approved by the Board of Supervisors under the criteria of this Article.

Section 4-29-4. Economic Incentive Areas.

The following areas are hereby established as individual Economic Incentive Areas included in the Economic Incentive Program:

- (a) Annandale Incentive Area: the Annandale Commercial Revitalization District as established in Appendix 7 of the Fairfax County Zoning Ordinance.
- (b) <u>Bailey's Crossroads/Seven Corners Incentive Area: the Bailey's Crossroad/Seven Corners Commercial Revitalization District as established in Appendix 7 of the Fairfax County Zoning Ordinance.</u>
- (c) <u>Lincolnia Incentive Area: the Lincolnia Commercial Revitalization Area (per the Comprehensive Plan, 2017 Edition, amended through July 16, 2019; Lincolnia Community Business Center, Pg. 19, Figure 10).</u>
- (d) McLean Incentive Area: the McLean Commercial Revitalization District as established in Appendix 7 of the Fairfax County Zoning Ordinance.

- (e) Richmond Highway Incentive Area: The Richmond Highway Commercial Revitalization District as established in Appendix 7 of the Fairfax County Zoning Ordinance and the following within the Richmond Highway Corridor per the Comprehensive Plan, 2017 Edition, amended May 1, 2018:
 - Suburban Neighborhood Area (SNA) between North Gateway and Penn Daw Community Business Centers (CBCs) (Pg. 167, Figure 67).
 - (2) SNA between Penn Daw and Beacon/Groveton CBCs (Pg. 169, Figure 68).
 - (3) SNA between Beacon/Groveton and Hybla Valley/Gum Springs CBCs (Pg. 170, Figure 69).
 - (4) SNA between Hybla Valley/Gum Springs and South County Center CBCs (Pg. 173, Figure 70).
 - (5) SNA between South County Center and Woodlawn CBCs (Pg. 179, Figure 71).
 - (6) SNA adjacent to Woodlawn CBC (Pg. 182, Figure 72).
 - (7) Land Units R and Q of the Huntington Transit Station Area (per the Comprehensive Plan, 2017 Edition, amended through October 16, 2018; Pg. 25, Figure 9).
 - (8) The areas located between a Richmond Highway CRD and a Richmond Highway SNA that abut Richmond Highway, as depicted on the attached maps 1-4.
- (f) Springfield Incentive Area: the Springfield Commercial Revitalization District as established in Appendix 7 of the Fairfax County Zoning Ordinance and the Franconia-Springfield Transit Station Area, except for those areas planned for single-family residential development, i.e. sub-units Q and R and the portion of sub-unit N north of the Springfield-Franconia Parkway) (per the Comprehensive Plan, 2017 Edition, amended through March 19, 2019; Franconia-Springfield Area Land Unit Map Pg. 37, Figure 7).

Section 4-29-5. Application and Review of Eligibility.

- (a) The Director will determine and publish the procedure for submitting an application. Owners of property located within an Economic Incentive Areas designated in Section 4-29-4, may submit an application to the Director.
- (b) Such application must be submitted on forms provided by the Director and must include a plan for development as well as any additional schedules, plans, specifications, and an estimated fair market value of the proposed development that the Director requires.

- (c) Every owner of any parcel included in the application must be a party to the application. However, an individual who is the owner of an undivided interest in a parcel may apply on behalf of himself and the other owners of the parcel upon submitting an affidavit that the other owners either: (1) affirm the application, (2) are minors, or (3) after a diligent search, cannot be located.
- (d) Upon receipt of an application, the Director will determine whether the application meets the eligibility criteria under this Article, the Comprehensive Plan, and all laws and policies related to the provision and preservation of affordable housing. If the application is found eligible, the Director will forward it to the Department of Tax Administration for calculation of an estimated base fair market value based upon the initial proposed development. Any application failing to meet the eligibility criteria will be denied and will be reconsidered only after all missing criteria are met.
- (e) The Director will submit an eligible application to the Board of Supervisors for approval either in conjunction with a concurrent rezoning application or separately for a by-right development proposal.
- (f) The application must meet both general and specific eligibility requirements as set forth in Section 4-29-6, as well as Virginia and local law, before being considered for approval by the Board of Supervisors.

Section 4-29-6. Eligibility.

- (a) The proposed development must be a commercial, industrial, and/or multifamily residential development within the territorial limits of an Economic Incentive Area as described in Section 4-29-4.
- (b) An application must contain a newly proposed assemblage, not previously approved for a rezoning or site plan by the County, of at least two contiguous parcels that collectively total a minimum of two acres. The application must conform to all laws and policies related to the provision and preservation of affordable housing and the use and consolidation recommendations in the Comprehensive Plan. Smaller acreages may be considered by the Board for good cause shown, such as to facilitate redevelopment of parcels. A single parcel may contain multiple structures, but all structures must be fully contained within its parcel lot lines before approval of the application.
- (c) A minimum of two acres of the assemblage, unless modified by the Board as set forth in paragraph 4-29-6(b), must be located within an Economic Incentive Area for the entire assemblage to qualify. Some small acreage of the assemblage may lie outside of the

- delineated boundary of the Economic Incentive Area but the area outside of the boundary cannot be counted toward the 2-acre minimum requirement.
- (d) Applicants are responsible for obtaining any necessary zoning and site plan approvals in accordance with the Zoning Ordinance and state and local law before receiving incentives in Section 4-29-8(c)(2).
- (e) No improvements made to real property are eligible for real estate tax incentives pursuant to the Article unless approved by the Board of Supervisors.

Section 4-29-7. Calculation of Partial Real Estate Tax Exemption.

A qualifying property shall receive a partial tax exemption to the general real property tax in an amount that is equal to the difference between (i) the Base Value and (ii) the fair market value of the parcel including all new structures or other improvements at the time of the final inspection and valuation. The partial exemption shall also include any increase or decrease in the fair market value of the tax-exempt portion of the qualifying property as annually assessed by the Department of Tax Administration.

- (a) Following Board approval of the application and upon written request from the applicant, the Department of Tax Administration will determine a final base fair market value ("Base Value") for the qualifying property. The Base Value shall be the fair market value of the qualifying property at the time of determination plus the first \$1,000 in assessed value on the structure(s) planned to be built or repurposed on the assemblage.
- (b) Applicant shall submit a written request for final inspection and valuation by the Department of Tax Administration at any time after construction of any structure is substantially complete ("substantially complete" meaning the point where the physical shell is completed and basic components of the building are installed and improved including complete installation of elevators, electrical, HVAC, and fire prevention sprinkler systems). If the proposed development contains multiple buildings to be constructed or repurposed in multiple stages, the tax exemption shall be recalculated for each lot upon substantial completion and a final inspection and written valuation request from the applicant.
- (c) The Department of Tax Administration shall provide written notification to the property owner of the amount of the assessment of the property that will be exempt from real property taxation and the period of such exemption.
- (d) The partial tax exemption shall run with the land, and, except as otherwise provided in this Article, the owner of such property during each year of the partial exemption shall be

entitled to receive a partial tax exemption in the amount specified by the Department of Tax Administration.

Section 4-29-8. Economic Incentives.

- (a) Incentives shall be administered by the Director and the Department of Tax Administration in accordance with to the general provisions of this Article.
- (b) Regulatory incentives become effective upon a determination of eligibility by the Director and include:
 - (1) Expedited scheduling of zoning applications.
 - (2) Concurrent processing of a Comprehensive Plan amendment with an associated zoning application.
 - (3) Concurrent processing of a site plan and a zoning application.
 - (4) Inclusion in the Land Development Services Project Management Program.
 - (5) A lower project value to qualify for Fairfax County Land Development Services' Modified Processing Program.
- (c) Financial incentives include:
 - A 10 percent reduction in the site plan fee submitted at the time of application.
 - Partial real estate tax incentives.

Section 4-29-9. Timing or Effective Rate of Incentives.

Each Economic Incentive Area shall extend for a period of up to 10 years from the date of the initial establishment of the area as set forth below:

- (a) Annandale Incentive Area: This area shall take effect on January 1, 2025, and expire on December 31, 2034.
- (b) <u>Bailey's Crossroads/Seven Corners Incentive Area: This area shall take effect on July 1, 2022, and expire on June 30, 2032.</u>
- (c) <u>Lincolnia Incentive Area: This area shall take effect on January 1, 2025, and expire on December 31, 2034.</u>
- (d) McLean Incentive Area: This area shall take effect on July 1, 2024, and expire on June 30, 2034.

- (e) <u>Richmond Highway Incentive Area:</u> This area shall take effect on July 1, 2024, and expire on June 30, 2034.
- (f) Springfield Incentive Area: This area shall take effect on July 1, 2024, and expire on June 30, 2034.

The timeframes enumerated above constitutes the incentive period for each Economic Incentive Area. Real estate tax incentives as set forth in Section 4-29-8(c)(2) shall be effective between January 1 of the tax year next succeeding the year following substantial completion and the end of the incentive period, at which time, the real estate assessment on the subject parcels will revert to full market value. All incentives shall terminate no later than the expiration date for each Economic Incentive Area listed above.

Section 4-29-10. Failure to pay real estate taxes in a timely manner.

The incentives provided for in Section 4-29-8 shall be suspended if the real estate tax on the qualifying property has not been paid on or before July 28 and December 5 of any year, as required by Sections 4-10-1 and 4-10-2. Failure to pay the real estate tax on or before the day on which the real estate tax is due shall result in the forfeiture of any incentives in that year, and in such cases, the taxpayer shall be liable for the annual real estate tax that otherwise would have been assessed on the full fair market value of the improved real property. Late payment of the real estate tax on the qualifying property shall be subject to late payment penalties and interest in accordance with Sections 4-10-1 and 4-10-2. However, the Director of the Department of Tax Administration may waive any penalty and interest and reinstate the real estate tax exemption if the failure to pay the real estate tax was not in any way the fault of the taxpayer.

2. That the provisions of this ordinance shall take effect on September 15, 2020.



Adoption of Bylaws for the Fairfax County Agricultural and Forestal District Advisory Committee

ISSUE:

Consideration of the adoption of bylaws for the Fairfax County Agricultural and Forestal District Advisory Committee (AFDAC).

TIMING:

Board consideration is requested on February 22, 2022.

BACKGROUND:

The Agricultural and Forestal (A&F) District program is designed to preserve and protect open spaces, forested areas, and agricultural lands in Fairfax County. The program allows property that meets certain criteria to be taxed on the use value of the land rather than on the market value; in other words, the value of the land for growing crops, or in a conserved state, rather than as fully developed property. A&F Districts may either be of Statewide Significance or of Local Significance. The authority for the establishment of A&F Districts is derived from Title 15.2, Chapter 43 of the Code of Virginia (Statewide Significance) and from Title 15.2, Chapter 44 of the Code of Virginia (Local Significance). On June 30, 1983, Fairfax County enacted supplemental legislation regarding A&F Districts in Chapters 114 and 115 of the County Code. The Fairfax County AFDAC was established by the Board of Supervisors of Fairfax County, Virginia, pursuant to Title 15.2, Chapter 43 of the Code of Virginia and Fairfax County Code Chapter 115. AFDAC is comprised of a combination of agricultural and non-agricultural landowners, the County's chief property assessment officer, and one member of the local governing body. The Fairfax County AFDAC meets several times a year to review and provide recommendations to both the Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors on applications for establishment or renewal of Agricultural and Forestal Districts.

The AFDAC has been operating without adopted bylaws since its establishment. Staff worked with the AFDAC to create draft bylaws for review and approval using the County model bylaw template. The AFDAC unanimously approved the draft bylaws at its December 14, 2021, meeting. Adoption of these bylaws is generally consistent with those of other County Boards, Authorities and Commissions who maintain similar bylaws.

8	ARTICLE I – NAME
9	
10	The name of this organization is the Fairfax County Agricultural and Forestal District
11	Advisory Committee, hereinafter referred to as the "AFDAC."

13	ARTICLE II – PURPOSE
14	
15	The AFDAC has been established by the Board of Supervisors of Fairfax County,
16	Virginia ("Board of Supervisors"), pursuant to Title 15.2, Chapter 43 of the Code of
17	Virginia and Fairfax County Code Chapter 115 entitled "Local Agricultural and Forestal
18	Districts Ordinance" for the purposes stated therein. These bylaws shall be effective as
19	of XXXXX.

21	ARTICLE III – MEMBERSHIP AND TERM OF OFFICE
22	
23	Appointments. Membership and appointments to the AFDAC shall be made by the
24	Board of Supervisors, and members shall serve for such term or terms as established by
25	the Board of Supervisors.

27	Resignations and Vacancies. In the event a member cannot serve or resigns from office,
28	then the chairperson, the clerk or the secretary, or the County staff coordinator shall
29	advise the Clerk for the Board of Supervisors of the vacancy in writing.

31	<u>Holdovers.</u> In the event a member completes his or her term of office, remains qualified
32	to serve as a member, and the Board of Supervisors has not reappointed that member to
33	another term or appointed a successor member, then that person may continue to serve
34	until such time as the member is reappointed or a successor member is appointed.

36	ARTICLE IV – OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES
37	
38	Elections. The AFDAC shall be served by three officers: a Chairperson, a Vice-
39	Chairperson, and a Secretary. The Chairperson shall be elected in accordance with the
40	voting provisions of Article V by the AFDAC members annually and such election shall
41	be scheduled at the first meeting of each calendar year. Two months prior to the election
42	meeting, a slate of candidates shall be nominated during a meeting held pursuant to
43	Article V. After nomination, each candidate shall be polled on his or her willingness and
44 45	ability to serve as Chairperson of the AFDAC. At the election meeting, the Chairperson
45 46	shall be elected from among the willing nominees in accordance with the voting
40	provisions of Article V. At the meeting immediately following the election of the

Chairperson, the Chairperson shall nominate the Vice Chairperson and Secretary. After nomination, each candidate shall be polled on his or her willingness and ability to serve as an officer of the AFDAC. The Vice Chairperson and Secretary shall then be elected from among the willing nominees in accordance with the voting provisions of Article V.

<u>Chairperson.</u> The Chairperson presides over meetings of the AFDAC and is eligible to vote at all times. The Chairperson has the authority to delegate appropriate functions to AFDAC members and to request assistance from the County staff supporting the AFDAC.

<u>Vice-Chairperson</u>. In the absence of the Chairperson at a meeting, the Vice-Chairperson shall perform the duties and exercise the powers of the Chairperson. In the event that neither the Chairperson nor the Vice-Chairperson is available, the member present with the longest tenure on the AFDAC shall act as Chairperson.

<u>Secretary.</u> The Secretary, or a duly appointed agent, shall be responsible for recording the minutes of meetings.

 <u>Replacement Officers.</u> If an office becomes vacant for any reason, it shall be filled by an election at the next regular meeting having a majority of members present. The newly elected officer shall complete the unexpired term of the officer succeeded. Prior to the election of any replacement officer, all members shall be provided with notice of the proposed election before the meeting at which the replacement is elected.

ARTICLE V – MEETINGS

<u>VFOIA.</u> All meetings shall be open to the public except as provided under the Virginia Freedom of Information Act, Virginia Code § 2.2-3700 *et seq.*, as amended ("VFOIA"). Pursuant to Virginia Code § 2.2-3701, "meeting" or "meetings" means the meetings including work sessions, when sitting physically, or through electronic communication means pursuant to § 2.2-3708.2, as a body or entity, or as an informal assemblage of (i) as many as three members or (ii) a quorum, if less than three, of the constituent membership, wherever held, with or without minutes being taken, whether or not votes are cast, of any public body. The AFDAC may hold public hearings and report its findings to the Board of Supervisors on AFDAC issues that affect the public interest.

Notice and Agenda. Notice and the agenda of all meetings shall be provided as required under the VFOIA. All meetings shall be preceded by properly posted notice stating the date, time, and location of each meeting. Notice of a meeting shall be given at least three working days prior to the meeting. Notice of emergency meetings, reasonable under the circumstances, shall be given contemporaneously with the notice provided to AFDAC members. Notices of all meetings shall be provided to the Office of Public Affairs for posting at the Government Center and on the County Web site. All meetings shall be conducted in public places that are accessible to persons with disabilities.

- 92 <u>Frequency.</u> The AFDAC shall meet monthly or as determined by the Chairperson.
- Meetings shall be held at a time agreed to by a majority of the AFDAC's members, and at a place arranged by the staff of the supporting County department.

Voting. A quorum is necessary for a vote. A majority of the membership of the AFDAC
 shall constitute a quorum. In making any recommendations, adopting any plan, or
 approving any proposal, action shall be taken by a majority vote of AFDAC members
 present and voting. Upon the request of any member, the vote of each member on any
 issue shall be recorded in the minutes. All votes of AFDAC members shall be taken
 during a public meeting, and no vote shall be taken by secret or written ballot or by
 proxy.

<u>Conduct.</u> Except as otherwise provided by Virginia law or these bylaws, all meetings shall be conducted in accordance with *Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised*, and except as specifically authorized by the VFOIA, no meeting shall be conducted through telephonic, video, electronic, or other communication means where the members are not all physically assembled to discuss or transact public business.

<u>Public Access.</u> For any meeting, at least one copy of the agenda, all agenda packets, and, unless exempt under the VFOIA, all materials furnished to AFDAC members shall be made available for public inspection at the same time such documents are furnished to the AFDAC members. Pursuant to the VFOIA, any person may photograph, film, record, or otherwise reproduce any portion of a meeting required to be open, but such actions may not interfere with any AFDAC proceedings.

Records. The Secretary or an appointed representative shall ensure that minutes of meetings are recorded as required under the VFOIA. Minutes shall include: (1) the date, time, and location of each meeting; (2) the members present and absent; (3) a summary of the discussion on matters proposed, deliberated, or decided; and (4) a record of any votes taken. Such minutes are public records and subject to inspection and copying by citizens of the Commonwealth or by members of the news media. The supporting County department shall provide staff support to review and approve records and minutes of the meeting.

Attorney-Client Privilege. Records containing legal advice from counsel to the AFDAC, and advice provided in closed session by legal counsel to the AFDAC, are protected by the attorney-client privilege and from disclosure under the VFOIA. Any such records or advice should not be disclosed by members of the AFDAC to any third party, or the privilege against disclosure may be waived. Questions regarding the handling of records or advice subject to attorney-client privilege should be directed to the AFDAC's legal counsel.

ARTICLE VI - ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION

Any AFDAC member who misses three consecutive meetings or more than half of the scheduled meetings within a 12-month period, or who fails to participate in the work of

138	the AFDAC without good cause acceptable to a majority of the other AFDAC members
139	may be subject to removal from the AFDAC.

142	ARTICLE VII - REMOVAL
143	
144	Any AFDAC member(s) may be recommended to the Board of Supervisors for removal

147	recommend removal under these bylaws neither limits nor waives the Board of

163	ARTICLE IX – ANNUAL REPORT

165	The AFDAC shall prepare an annual written report that describes the actions of the
166	AFDAC and plans for future actions and activities. This report shall be provided to the
167	Clerk to the Board of Supervisors for distribution to the members of the Board of
168	Supervisors and to the County Executive.

171	ARTICLE X – COMPLIANCE WITH LAW AND COUNTY POLICY

173	The AFDAC shall comply with all Virginia laws, including, but not limited to, the
174	VFOIA, and the Virginia State and Local Government Conflict of Interests Act, Virginia
175	Code § 2.2-3100 et seq., as amended, with all County ordinances, and with all County
176	policies concerning the activities of its boards, authorities, and commissions. In case of a
177	conflict between a provision of these bylaws and any applicable ordinance or law, the
178	provisions of the applicable ordinance or law, as the case may be, shall control.

180	ARTICLE XI – AMENDMENT OF BYLAWS

182	These bylaws may be amended by the AFDAC by adopting the proposed amendment or

Public Hearing to Consider Amendments to *The Code of the County of Fairfax Virginia* (County Code), Chapter 119 (Grass or Lawn Area) to Establish Regulations on Running Bamboo and to Add a New Article 4 to Establish Civil Penalties

ISSUE:

Board of Supervisors consideration of an amendment to County Code Chapter 119.

RECOMMENDATION:

The County Executive recommends that the Board approve the proposed County Code amendment.

TIMING:

The Board is requested to take action on February 22, 2022. On January 25, 2022, the Board authorized advertisement of this public hearing. If approved, this amendment will become effective at 12:01 a.m. the day following adoption.

BACKGROUND:

Running bamboo is an invasive species to Virginia that is characterized by aggressive spreading behavior. Virginia Code § 15.2-901.1 authorizes Fairfax County to adopt an ordinance to require property owners to contain running bamboo on their property and to impose civil penalties on property owners who allow running bamboo to spread to adjacent properties or any public right-of-way. Under this proposed ordinance amendment, the Department of Code Compliance (DCC) would be responsible for investigating complaints of uncontained running bamboo and seeking civil penalties against property owners who fail to contain their running bamboo within 30 days after receiving notice of the violation. The amendment would create a new Article 4 to establish a civil penalty of \$50 for the first violation or violations arising from the same set of operative facts. The amendment would also create a civil penalty of \$200 for each subsequent violation not arising from the same set of operative facts within 12 months of the first violation. Each business day in which the same violation exists would constitute a separate offense. Total penalties may not exceed \$3,000 in a 12-month period for each set of operative facts.

This proposed ordinance amendment would be included in Chapter 119 of the County Code, which currently restricts the height of grass and associated growth. Chapter 119

would be renamed Vegetation to reflect the addition of restrictions related to uncontained running bamboo. Chapter 119 would continue to govern the height of grass and associated growth. The proposed amendment would also make other editorial revisions to Chapter 119 for clarity.

<u>Public Hearing on a Proposed Zoning Ordinance Amendment to Chapter 112.1 Re:</u> Minor and Editorial Revisions

ISSUE:

Following the adoption of the new Zoning Ordinance on March 23, 2021, which became effective on July 1, 2021, a number of necessary revisions have been identified. The proposed changes correct typographical or editorial errors or provide for clarification of certain provisions.

PLANNING COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION:

The Planning Commission held a public hearing on January 19, 2022, and voted 11-0 (Commissioner Jimenez was absent from the meeting) to recommend to the Board adoption of the proposed Zoning Ordinance amendment, as set forth in the Staff Report dated December 7, 2021, with the two additional edits as further described below.

RECOMMENDATION:

The County Executive concurs with the Planning Commission recommendation.

TIMING:

The Board authorized advertisement of the public hearings on December 7, 2021; the Planning Commission public hearing was held on January 19, 2022, at 7:30 p.m.; and the Board public hearing is scheduled for February 22, 2022, at 4:00 p.m.

BACKGROUND:

On March 23, 2021, the Board adopted a new Zoning Ordinance that took effect on July 1, 2021. Since that time, based on staff use of the Ordinance and feedback from other users, staff has compiled a list of changes that are needed to correct errors, resolve inconsistencies, and provide clarification of certain provisions, which are the subject of this proposed amendment. The proposed amendment is included on the Zoning Ordinance Work Program for Fiscal Year 2022. Staff will continue to review the new Ordinance on an ongoing basis for future updates.

In addition to typographical and editorial revisions to correct references and grammatical errors, the amendment includes the following:

- A standard that had been inadvertently omitted from the previous Ordinance is restored, requiring approval of a nonresidential use permit (NonRUP) for the continuing care facility in a PCC District (Planned Continuing Care) before issuance of a NonRUP for any secondary use.
- The amendment deletes the requirement in the R-A District (Rural Agricultural) for a single-family detached dwelling to be allowed only in conjunction with an agricultural operation. This revision was discussed as part of the agritourism amendment and was intended to be addressed with that amendment or with the new Ordinance. There are approximately 95 acres of land in the R-A District. The majority of these properties are vacant land or have a single-family detached dwelling without an agricultural operation. No change is proposed to the minimum five-acre lot size for the R-A District. In addition, the standard that requires a minimum of 75 percent of the lot area to remain as either an agricultural operation and related uses, or as open space has been clarified to indicate that open space is a permitted use of the 75 percent area.
- Consistent with long-standing interpretation and practice, the amendment revises standards for fences or walls to exempt a fence or wall that is an integral component of an electric substation from the fence or wall height standards. In addition, fences or walls associated with accessory structures such as tennis courts are treated as an integral component of the use. They are allowed to exceed the maximum fence height if located in the side or rear yard, if the required setback based on the height of the fence is provided. The proposed amendment deletes a swimming pool as an example of an accessory structure that is permitted to have a higher fence as an integral part of the structure. In accordance with the International Swimming Pool and Spa Code, a barrier surrounding an outdoor swimming pool is required to be at least 48 inches above grade. This standard can be met within the maximum allowed fence height permitted in all yards without the need for an increase in height.
- The amendment clarifies several standards under the accessory keeping of animals. It is now specified that the keeping of more than four animals not owned by the resident is considered a kennel or animal shelter. In addition, it clarifies that the types of animals allowed under Ch. 41.1 of the County Code may not be modified by special permit. Finally, an animal shelter has been added as an activity, similar to a kennel, that may not be approved under the keeping of animals provisions as an accessory use. Kennels and animal shelters are subject to separate standards under the Ordinance.
- Consistent with interpretation and practice, the amendment adds stacked townhouses under subsection 5101.4.D(3)(a) for the affordable dwelling unit (ADU) calculation when the Comprehensive Plan recommendation is based on Floor Area Ratio (FAR) instead of dwelling units.
- This amendment aligns the home-based business special permit plat submission requirements with those for a home day care facility. It also aligns the requirements for a special permit plat for an increase in building height or cumulative square footage of a freestanding accessory structure with the

requirements for a reduction in setback application, for consistency with similar application types.

A more detailed discussion of these proposed changes is contained in the Staff Report (Attachment 2). Additionally, the Planning Commission recommended two edits to the text presented in the Staff Report. Under item #4, the word "granted" would be replaced with "issued" regarding the nonresidential use permits; and under item #15, "for a fee" would be repeated in the last sentence as a clarification regarding the keeping of more than four companion animals not owned by the resident.

REGULATORY IMPACT:

The proposed amendment enhances existing regulations by correcting errors, resolving inconsistencies, and clarifying certain Zoning Ordinance provisions.

FISCAL IMPACT:

None.

<u>Public Hearing on the Acquisition of Certain Land Rights Necessary for the Construction of the Little River Turnpike Walkway (Westbound) From High Place to Pinecrest Parkway (Mason District)</u>

ISSUE:

Public Hearing on the acquisition of certain land rights necessary for the construction of the Little River Turnpike Walkway (Westbound) from High Place to Pinecrest Parkway, in Project 5G25-060-043, Pedestrian Improvements – 2014, in Fund 30050, Transportation Improvements.

RECOMMENDATION:

The County Executive recommends that the Board of Supervisors (Board) adopt the attached resolution authorizing the acquisition of the necessary land rights.

TIMING:

On January 25, 2022, the Board authorized advertisement of a public hearing to be held on February 22, 2022, at 4:00 p.m.

BACKGROUND:

The County is planning to construct pedestrian improvements along the northern side of Little River Turnpike, Route 236, to include an 8' foot walkway, including Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliant crosswalks and curb ramps. Improvements will also be made to the pedestrian crossing and existing bus stop located on the southern side of Little River Turnpike, Route 236, located at Conwell Drive.

Land rights for these improvements are required on seven properties, four of which have been acquired by the Land Acquisition Division (LAD). The construction of the project requires the acquisition of Deeds of Dedication, Grading Agreement & Temporary Construction Easements, Dominion Utility easements and Verizon Utility Easements.

Negotiations are in progress with several owners of these properties; however, because resolution of these acquisitions is not imminent, it may become necessary for the Board to utilize quick-take eminent domain powers to commence construction of this project on schedule. These powers are conferred upon the Board by statute, namely, Va. Code

<u>Ann.</u> Sections 15.2-1903 through 15.2-1905 (as amended). Pursuant to these provisions, a public hearing is required before property interests can be acquired in such an accelerated manner.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Funding is available in Project 5G25-060-000, Pedestrian Improvements – 2014, in Fund 30050, Transportation Improvements. This project is included in the <u>FY 2022 – FY 2026 Adopted Capital Improvements Program (with future fiscal years to FY 2031).</u> No additional funding is being requested from the Board.
