Dear Neighbor,

The CDC estimates that there is a death by suicide every eleven minutes in the United States.

September is Suicide Prevention Month, a time to raise awareness of the issue and promote prevention methods. It's a time to spread messages of hope and compassion to those suffering and to reassure them that we are here to help. My office will share resources and information throughout the month of September via our newsletters and social media.

On October 2, Supervisor Smith and I will lead Team Fairfax in the annual American Foundation for Suicide Prevention (AFSP) <u>Out of the Darkness Walk</u>. This event raises support for scientific research, evidence-based resources, training, and advocacy. AFSP does life-saving work and I invite you to <u>register today</u>. If you or someone you know is in an emergency, call <u>The National Suicide Prevention Lifeline</u> at 800-273-TALK (8255) or call 911 immediately. There are resources available to help.

COVID-19 Cases in Schools

I've heard from a number of families concerned about the volume of COVID-19 cases identified in schools, the safety protocols in place, and the process for placing and releasing a child from "pause" or "quarantine."

There has been some frustration regarding communication to families whose children have been "paused" and the amount of time it is taking to conduct contact investigations and allow children to return to school. Braddock School Board Member Megan McLaughlin and I have been working with FCPS officials and the Fairfax County Health Department to find ways to improve the process and I hope you'll take a few minutes to review the following updates.

I want to thank our teachers, FCPS support staff, Fairfax County Health Department staff, families, and students who are working to make this unprecedented school year as safe and productive as possible. While there have been frustrations and will almost certainly be more as the year progresses, I'm inspired by the way so many have come together to make this school year happen.

Yard Waste Delays and Modification

The national shortage of CDL drivers continues and has, unfortunately, made it impossible for both private haulers and Fairfax County to collect yard waste consistently and on schedule. For the handful of neighborhoods in the Braddock District who are serviced by Fairfax County, <u>we</u> <u>are experiencing delays that may continue into the foreseeable future</u>. Please leave your yard waste at the curb and it will be collected as soon as possible.

For the vast majority of neighborhoods serviced by private haulers, Fairfax County has instituted a temporary change allowing haulers to collect yard waste with refuse collections. In other words, they are allowed to mix refuse and yard waste. This decision will be revisited in mid-October. As always, please consider <u>alternative methods to minimize and manage your</u> <u>yard waste</u>.

Active & Thriving Community Grants Program

The Active and Thriving Community Grants Program, funded through the Federal American Rescue Plan Act, helps small businesses and nonprofit organizations negatively impacted by COVID-19 to remain in business and retain employees. The program will also help vulnerable residents by supporting programs and services that provide a social safety net and promote positive childhood environments.

The total amount available for the grant program is \$10 million.

A webinar for prospective applicants was held on August 19 and August 24, and <u>the</u> recording and <u>transcript</u> are posted online.

The FAQs below provide additional details about the grant program:

Which business sectors are eligible for the grants?

To be eligible, an applicant **must be a small business or 501(c)(3) non-profit organization** operating in one or more of the following sectors:

- 1. Childcare, which includes regulated centers and family childcare homes.
- 2. Community-based organizations providing safety net services in one or more of the categories outlined in the Consolidated Community Funding Pool.
- 3. Youth athletic programs within County-based organizations.
- 4. Out-of-school-time programs for youth grades K-12.
- 5. Outdoor community pools located in HOAs and apartments/condominiums, as well as at community membership-based pools.

What is the application period for the grants?

Grant applications will be accepted from August 31 through September 14, 2021. The application portal is now open and will close at 11:59 p.m. on September 14. Applications will be available in English and Spanish, and translation support will be provided. Learn more about the **Active and Thriving Community Grants Program**.



Three Elly Doyle Winners Announced by Park Authority Board

Despite the constraints of the pandemic, volunteers across Fairfax County found a way to keep giving and to support the Fairfax County Park Authority. Volunteers working at Observatory Park at Turner Farm, Lake Accotink Park and Accotink Creek will be honored for their outstanding service contributions as recipients of the Fairfax County Park Authority's 2021 Elly Doyle Park Service Awards.

Since 2012, Dr. Jeffrey Kretsch has logged more than



1,784 hours as a volunteer on duty at Observatory Park at Turner Farm. As part of the volunteer group from The Analemma Society, an organization devoted to promoting the study of science through astronomy, Kretsch and the team host regular observation programs at the park's observatory that are free to the public most Friday nights. During the pandemic, he helped the Park Authority transition to virtual programming and personally led virtual lectures and encouraged other volunteers to do the same. He also spent considerable time helping the Park Authority prepare an application to become an international Urban Dark Sky place.

Over the course of the past year, volunteers from the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints D.C. South Mission have cleared an area at Lake Accotink Park in Springfield of invasive plant species, and then planted native plants. The group worked every Saturday morning, painstakingly removing invasive plants that have overrun the area, sometimes working squarefoot-by-square-foot to remove intricate root systems. In addition, the numerous volunteers have done everything from cutting back invasives to making protective wire "cages" to prevent deer browse to ensure the success of the young trees. With the group's assistance, more than 360 native plants were planted over two fall plantings.

The Friends of Accotink Creek has utilized a variety of means to protect the watershed, educate future environmental stewards and make positive change in the natural world. One of several things The Friends of Accotink Creek has recently done is sponsor a speaker to visit the area and monitor the local vernal pools where frogs and salamanders breed. The group filmed the event to distribute short videos to local teachers. The group addresses climate change at a grassroots level by removing invasive plants and planting dozens of native trees, which supports Fairfax County's commitment to reduce carbon emissions. Volunteers have removed more than 1,500 bags of trash from the local watershed. The group aims to protect environmental and recreational areas, while ensuring that there is also an educational component.

The award winners will be honored at a virtual ceremony in November.

The Elly Doyle Park Service Award was established by the Park Authority in 1988 in recognition of former Park Authority Board Chairman and member Ellamae Doyle's years of outstanding service toward the preservation of parkland and establishment of natural and recreational areas for the benefit of Fairfax County residents. The purpose of the award is to publicly recognize a volunteer or group of volunteers for outstanding contributions to Fairfax County parks.

Election Day High School Student Program

Are you at least 16 years old, live in Virginia, and enrolled in a high school civics class? Would you like to learn more about the electoral process and earn service-learning hours?

The Office of Elections is offering you the opportunity to serve inside a Fairfax County polling place as a volunteer **election page** for the upcoming November election.

The Office of Elections also encourage students fluent in Spanish, Korean, and Vietnamese to apply. If you are under the age of 18, you must have the approval of your parent/guardian to participate in the election page program. Please note the High School Page Program only applies to November elections.

As an Election Page, You Will

- Complete the required online training class and pass the quiz.
- Serve an 8-hour shift inside a Fairfax County polling place under the direct supervision of the Chief Election Officer.
- Arrive on time and remain at the polling place during your assigned shift.
- Maintain impartiality while serving--not discussing politics, candidates, or issues.
- Dress appropriately: no shorts, sweats, or t-shirts.
- Use appropriate language and behavior at all times.
- Not receive compensation for serving.

In recognition of service provided, you will be sent a "Certificate of Appreciation" following the election.

Please note: If you will be 18 on or before November 2, 2021 (Election Day), and if you register no later than Monday, October 11, 2021, you may work as an Election Officer. Additional election officer information and applications can be found at Working at the Polls.

What is Redistricting?

Redistricting is the process of drawing new electoral boundaries to ensure that election districts have roughly the same number of people. Redistricting is required by law, and it takes place every 10 years after the Census.



What Districts Are Affected?

Fairfax County will draw new electoral districts that will apply to both the:

- **o** Board of Supervisors
- **o** School Board Representatives

Learn about the legal and policy requirements for redistricting.

Redistricting does not change school boundaries. The County also will not draw new election districts for lawmakers in the Virginia General Assembly and U.S. Congress. The state's <u>Virginia</u> <u>Redistricting Commission</u> is currently redrawing these electoral maps.

How Will New Lines Be Drawn?

The County appointed a community advisory group to draw proposed new districts with input from the public. The group will send its recommendations to the Board of Supervisors. The board will then hold a public hearing this year on the proposed new district boundaries and ultimately vote on the new electoral maps to be adopted.

How Can You Participate?

Your input is critical! There are four ways to be part of the process:

- 1. Draw your own proposed election boundaries using Fairfax County's online mapping tool that will be available soon.
- 2. Comment on proposed district maps created by the committee or the public.
- 3. Tell the Redistricting Advisory Committee **what you think**, including where lines should be drawn, how many districts there should be, and what's important to your community.
- 4. Testify at the public hearing that the Board of Supervisors have currently scheduled on November 9 on the proposed new districts.

September is National Preparedness Month

National Preparedness Month is an observance each September to raise awareness about the importance of preparing for disasters and emergencies that could happen at any time. The 2021 theme is "Prepare to Protect. Preparing for disasters is protecting everyone you love."

Temporary Change to Yard Waste Collection

Please be advised that Fairfax County will allow solid waste service providers to collect trash and yard waste together if they are experiencing labor shortages that prevent them from completing their routes in a timely manner. This means that some providers may not pick up yard waste separately beginning on August 31, 2021. As a result, you may observe your service provider collecting yard waste and trash together. The temporary change is in response to national labor shortages adversely affecting our region.

Refuse and recycling will continue to be collected separately

The requirement to separately collect yard waste for recycling will be reassessed in mid-October depending on workforce conditions. Thank you for your patience.

Library Equity Access Pass (LEAP)

All students (PreK-12) in Fairfax County Public Schools (FCPS) have **LEAP accounts at the Fairfax County Public Library**. These public library virtual accounts allow students to check out up to three items at a time for six weeks each (no renewals).

Why is Leap Awesome?

- A student only needs their name, not a physical library card, to check out materials.
- > LEAP accounts never charge fines or fees.
- A student can have a LEAP account as well as a standard library account (application online and in library branches). Standard accounts allow users to place holds on materials and access FCPL digital resources such as eBooks and databases.

How did Leap Happen?

LEAP began as a pilot in one school pyramid in 2019. FCPL and FCPS launched this program as a partnership to ensure that students would have access to library materials even if they don't have a traditional library card, or if that card has been blocked due to fines.

Absentee Ballots Mailer

Many concerns have been brought to the attention of the Braddock District office regarding absentee ballot applications that were received in the mail. These mailers are from third-party organizations that are not associated with Fairfax County. The application to request an absentee ballot is an official request form and may be used.

If you'd like to vote by mail, you may request an absentee ballot online through the <u>Virginia</u> <u>Department of Elections website</u>. Or, if you'd like to submit a paper absentee ballot application, here are the ways you can obtain one:



- 1. Download, print, and complete--including your handwritten signature--a vote-by-mail application

In Virginia there are **three different ways to vote**:

- 1- In-Person Early voting
- 2- Mail-In Absentee voting
- 3- In-Person voting on November 2, 2021, at your local polling place.

In Person Early Voting

Fairfax County will be offering In-Person Early Voting at numerous locations starting September 17 (please see list below). Information about early voting dates, times and locations can be found on the **Fairfax Office of Elections website**.

What You Need to Know:

Any registered Fairfax County voter may vote early at any Fairfax County early voting location.

Voting on Election Day at Your Regular Polling Place

- Polls are open from 6:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. on Election Day. If you are line by 7 p.m., you will be able to vote.

Preparing to Vote

- Before you vote, <u>check your registration status</u>
- Find your **polling place**
- Make sure you bring an <u>acceptable form of identification</u>

Ballot Drop-Off Boxes

November 2, 2021, General and Special Elections: Ballot drop-off boxes are available at all early voting locations when locations are open for voting. The drop boxes are for voted ballots which are secured in the envelope provided to the voter. All instructions in the absentee ballot must be followed.

Voted ballots may be dropped off outside the Government Center at an attended drop box during business hours. An accessible, secure drop box is installed outside the building, permitting voters to drop off their ballots 24/7.

Voted ballots may also be dropped off at any early voting site during hours of operation.

On Election Day, ballots may be brought to your regular **polling place** when the polls are open.

Opportunity to Serve on Advisory Board


Supervisor Walkinshaw is seeking a health care provider in the community to serve on the Health Systems Agency Board, one of Fairfax County's Board's Authorities and Commissions. Its purpose is to improve quality of the health services provided them, both private and public, while restraining increases in the cost of providing health services.

According to the **Health Systems Agency of Northern Virginia**, the Provider positions shall be filled by individuals who are residents of, or have their principal place of business in, the health service area served by the Agency who are providers of health care and who represent:

Enabling legislation passed in the 2020 session of the Virginia General Assembly allows Fairfax County and other counties or cities in the state to adopt an ordinance imposing a five-cent tax on disposable plastic bags provided by retailers in grocery stores, convenience stores, or drugstores within its borders. **The**

legislation requires that the tax be collected by the retailer at the time of purchase, with revenue to be allocated toward:



- Environmental cleanup programs
- Pollution and litter mitigation programs
- Educational programs on environmental waste reduction
- Provision of reusable bags to recipients of Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) or Women, Infants, and Children Program (WIC) benefits

The Fairfax County Board of Supervisors will hold a **public hearing on a proposed plastic bag tax ordinance, on September 14, 2021, at 4:30 p.m. at the Fairfax County Government Center**. Fairfax County's proposed ordinance tracks the enabling legislation passed in the 2020 Virginia General Assembly, as well as any guidelines to be adopted by the state Tax Commissioner. Those guidelines are being finalized now, following the release of <u>draft</u> <u>guidelines</u> in June 2021.


Compliance Corner

September Code Compliance Corner: Keeping of Animals

The Zoning Ordinance regulates the keeping of animals, such as pets, as an accessory use to a dwelling. Certain types of animals are limited in number based on the size of the lot. There are also regulations for the structures that shelter animals. In some cases, property owners can seek Board of Zoning Appeals (BZA) approval of a special permit to increase the number of animals or a modification to location regulations of the structure(s) sheltering animals.

Common complains to the Department of Code Compliance (DCC) on the keeping of animals are about dogs and chickens. All lots may have up to two dogs, with additional dogs permitted based on the size of the lot. To keep chickens, at least two acres are required, and the total number of chickens permitted is based on the size of the lot. However, roosters are not permitted unless in association with an agricultural use.



Continuous Right Turn Lane at Guinea Rd. & 236 (Little River Turnpike) Complete

VDOT has completed the construction of a continuous rightturn lane from Guinea Rd. to 236 that will significantly reduce backups at the intersection and reduce rush hour cut through traffic through the Truro neighborhood. Drivers can now proceed through the intersection and on to 236 **without stopping, unless pedestrians are present.** An ADA compliant pedestrian island and new signage were also installed.

According to VDOT data, the previous intersection design of two right turn lanes resulted in an average wait time of 195 seconds for drivers making the right turn onto 236. This new design should result in an average wait time of 4 seconds. We encourage morning rush-hour drivers to use this new lane rather than cutting through the Truro neighborhood.

CDC Extends Eviction Moratorium Through October 3, 2021

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) announced on August 3 a **limited eviction moratorium** for renters living in communities experiencing substantial or high transmission of COVID-19, covering an estimated 80% of all U.S. counties and 90% of all renters. The new moratorium protects renters for up to two months, through October 3.

According to the new eviction protections in Virginia, landlords may not take action to get possession or evict for nonpayment of rent – if the household has had financial hardship directly or indirectly due to COVID-19 – unless the landlord:

- Gives the tenant a 14-day nonpayment notice informing the tenant about the Rent Relief Program (RRP)
- During the 14-day period, applies for RRP is on the tenant's behalf unless the tenant pays in full, enters a payment plan, or the tenant already has applied for RRP

Landlords and tenants can apply for relief. Landlords are not able to evict tenants unless:

- Tenant is found not eligible for RRP
- Tenant refuses to cooperate with RRP application
- RRP is not approved in writing within 45 days of a completed application
- For any subsequent application, RRP not approved in writing within 14 days of a completed application, or RRP runs out of money
- If a tenant is complying with a written payment plan, landlord may take no action to get possession or evict for nonpayment of rent

Basic Eligibility Requirements:

- Household income at or below 80% of the Area Median Income
- Rent amount at or below 150% of the Fair Market Rent
- Loss of income related directly or indirectly to COVID-19, or increase in expenses related directly or indirectly to COVID-19

Required documentation:

- Rental Agreement (valid lease or alternative lease documentation)
- Tenant/Landlord Ledger
- Tenant Income Documentation
- Landlord's Virginia W-9
- RRP Landlord/Tenant Agreement

Fairfax County is administering relief for renters experiencing a negative financial impact due to the COVID-19 pandemic through the new **Emergency Rental and Utility Assistance** (ERA) program. Through this program you can apply to receive funds to pay delinquent rent or utility payments back to March 13, 2020, and up to three months of future payments to maintain housing stability.

How to Access Emergency Rental and Utility Assistance

All residents experiencing financial hardship should call **Coordinated Services Planning** at (703) 222-0880. Specialists provide assistance in multiple languages and can help link residents to basic needs assistance, including housing payments (rent, mortgage, fees, security deposits) and utilities, including electric, natural gas, and water. Landlords can also apply on behalf of their tenants through the **Landlord Portal**.

Continue Testing for COVID-19




 Comprehensive Plan Amendment for NW Corner of Lee Highway and Waples Mill Road – September 22 at 7:30 p.m. – Board Auditorium

Board Of Supervisors Hearing on Kenilworth II Proposal Scheduled for September 14

On July 14, the Planning Commission recommended approval of the zoning application submitted by Christopher Land, LLC for approximately 4.43 acres of land located just south of the Kenilworth community at Caprino Court and Braddock Road.

This property is currently developed with one single-family home built in 1955 that will continue to be occupied by the current owner and would be included in a subsequent phase of the project. The applicant is requesting to rezone this land from the R-1 District to the PDH-3 District to build 12 single-family detached dwelling units at a density of 2.71 dwelling units per acre. Nine houses would be constructed in phase one, and an additional three houses would be part of phase two, when the existing house is vacated and removed. The houses would be similar in appearance to those in the existing Kenilworth subdivision. Access to the new development would be provided by connecting Banting Drive and Caprino Court at a "T" intersection with a three-way stop. A portion of the project will be served by a private street that must be maintained by the future homeowners. An underground stormwater management system would handle stormwater runoff.

During a site visit in late April by members of the Braddock District Land Use and Environment Committee, the Braddock District Planning Commissioner, and staff, a previously unidentified wetlands area was discovered. The wetlands are located near the center of the site on the eastern side, in an area the developer plans to fill to build the road connection and use for the underground stormwater detention facility. Staff determined that the wetlands would not be avoided with an alternative layout, lower density, or even with by-right development, leading the focus to shift to mitigating for the loss of the wetlands. The applicant proffered additional green infrastructure, trees, and plantings in the buffer and amenity areas, as well as biofilters, bioretention, and bioswales.



During the Planning Commission hearing in June, residents from the Penns Crossing neighborhood stated their strong opposition to the development based on the connection of Banting Drive and Caprino Court to Braddock Road. The residents cited safety concerns, including narrow streets, increased traffic, and speeding vehicles. County staff and the Virginia Department of Transportation continue to emphasize the need to connect Banting Drive and Caprino Court. VDOT adopted a connectivity policy over a decade ago in order to provide for a network of publicly maintained streets and to address concerns with cul-de-sacs and dead-end streets. The State Code requires that when new streets are dedicated, they must be connected to road and pedestrian networks with the existing and future transportation network. Connections provide flow for both vehicles and pedestrians within local developments rather than requiring people to go onto a larger collector road to access neighboring houses. Connectivity is vital in providing timely access for emergency vehicles. It is also important for school buses, trash collection, street maintenance, and snow plowing. The original proffers for both the Penns Crossing and existing Kenilworth neighborhoods contained a requirement that if the parcels now under consideration were developed, the roads would connect. The standard road width, "T" intersection with stop signs, and additional "Children at Play" signs are intended to help reinforce slower driving speeds.

The new houses must be constructed to achieve either Energy Star® or Earth Craft green building certification. All landscaping is to be native to Fairfax County, and invasive plant species are to be removed from the tree save areas. The applicant has proffered to provide recreational facilities on adjacent HOA land, including benches or a fire pit and seating area in Penns Crossing or playground equipment in Briarwood, provided that the new homeowners will have the right to use those facilities. Funds would also be contributed to provide recreational features in Kenilworth I.

A staff report on this application was published April 7 and is available at the County's **Land Development Website**. An addendum was published June 9 and is also at the **County website**. The Board of Supervisors will hold a hearing on the Kenilworth II rezoning application on September 14 at 3:30 p.m. Groups and individuals who are interested in providing testimony for the hearing are encouraged to do so. Information on how to testify may be found on the website of the **Clerk of the Board of Supervisors**.

Planning Commission Hearing on Comprehensive Plan Amendment for NW Corner of Lee Highway & Waples Mill Road Scheduled for September 22

On January 28, 2020, the Board of Supervisors approved Supervisor Walkinshaw's motion to authorize consideration of a Comprehensive Plan Amendment for a portion of Fairfax Center Sub-Unit J3, the northwest corner of the intersection of Lee Highway and Waples Mill Road. This came about as the result of a proposal by Public Storage to expand their existing self-storage use onto the adjacent corner residential parcel, which contains a vacant house and outbuilding. Expanding self-storage would require rezoning the corner property to industrial use, which is not currently supported by the Comprehensive Plan recommendations. This area is planned for office use with an option for office/mixed use should it be redeveloped. The intersection is also planned for a potential grade-separated interchange after Shirley Gate Road is extended to the Fairfax County Parkway.

The proposed Plan Amendment would add an option that would allow self-storage use on the two parcels, subject to consolidation and other conditions, in order to allow Public Storage to construct a new five-story self-storage building. While the current Plan language would generally not support the expansion of the existing industrial use, allowing it would achieve many of the Plan's goals. Consolidation of the corner lot and existing self-storage property would limit access points on Lee Highway and Shirley Gate Road and allow removal of the small section of service drive, which is currently being used for parking of commercial vehicles, including food trucks and contractors' equipment. It would also facilitate connection of pedestrian trails across the site and offer the potential for new parkland and community amenities.



In order to integrate the self-storage use into the vision of the mixed-use suburban center context, staff has proposed that the new multi-story structure be designed with the general size and appearance of an office building. Under this proposed Plan Amendment, expansion of the existing self-storage use may be considered under the following conditions:

- Building height would be limited to 65 feet.
- The architecture of the multi-story building should resemble an office building, using neutral or muted colors and high-quality building materials.
- Signage is to be compatible with the surrounding area and avoid adverse visual impacts.
- A minimum 40-foot setback should be provided from each street, similar to nearby residential and mixed-use buildings.
- Parking should be screened from view from the roadways.
- Extensive landscaping is recommended to screen the building, present an attractive appearance, and add visual interest.
- The property would be subject to current stormwater management regulations.
- Trail improvements and connections, lighting, and public art should be provided to create a pedestrian-friendly environment.
- A community park should be developed, which would include amenities such as a dog park or other community-serving features.

 The developer is expected to contribute to the Fairfax County Housing Trust Fund to compensate for the loss of potential affordable or workforce housing units that may have been developed under the mixed-use option.

The staff report on the Plan Amendment has been published and is available on the <u>County</u> <u>website</u>. The Braddock District Land Use and Environment Committee will discuss the proposed Plan Amendment at its September 21 meeting.

The Planning Commission will hold a hearing on the proposal on September 22 at 7:30 p.m. To testify, visit the **Planning Commission's website**. A hearing before the Board of Supervisors is scheduled for October 19.



Proposed – Waples Mill Road, looking south toward intersection with Lee Highway


A concurrent application was filed by Public Storage Southeast One, Inc. to consolidate the corner parcel with their existing self-storage property and rezone the corner lot into the I-5 District. On August 31, the company submitted slightly modified plans based on feedback from staff. Public Storage is proposing to remove the older house, demolish one row of its existing single-story self-storage bays, and construct a climate-controlled five-story, 63-foot tall self-storage facility of approximately 150,000 square feet on the southeast corner of the property (see illustration). The building would be red brick with stucco accents and spandrel glass windows to resemble the nearby multifamily residential buildings. Orange brick and an orange metal panel behind the signage would be used as corporate branding. The area near the existing office and lighthouse at the south end of one of the existing single-story buildings would also be demolished and a new office with up to 1,500 square feet and reconfigured parking area would be constructed.

The applicant is proposing to develop a new pocket park, which will be open to the public, adjacent to the existing pocket park on the interior portion of the block. It would include a dog park with seating. The existing service road along Lee Highway, currently being used for parking of commercial vehicles, including food trucks and contractors' equipment, would be removed and replaced with landscaping and a pedestrian pathway. Additional landscaping with would be provided around the new building. The doors of the existing single-story building along Waples Mill Road would be painted a brick color. A path with public artwork would lead from Waples Mill Road to the new park and dog park. The details of this revised application are being reviewed by county staff. A Planning Commission hearing on the rezoning application is tentatively scheduled for November.

Child Care Facility Proposed for 12019 Lee Highway


A Special Exception application has been filed by NLD Fairfax, LLC to permit a child care center at 12019 Lee Highway. This 2.32-acre site is located south of Lee Highway between Spruce Avenue and Marymead Drive. It is currently developed with a single-family dwelling, with the remainder of the property as open space.

The applicant has proposed an Everbrook Academy, operated by child care provider Learning Care Group, Inc. The facility would be approximately 13,000 square feet



with a 12,500-square foot play area to the rear of the building. Access would be provided from the Lee Highway service road. Enrollment would be up to 151 children at any one time, and they would have 26 employees. Thirty-six parking spaces are proposed. Hours of operation would be from 6:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

During a community meeting in June and again at a meeting of the Braddock District Land Use and Environment Committee in July, community members expressed concern about traffic movement and safety at the intersection of Marymead Drive and Lee Highway. The service road along Lee Highway that would provide access to the site is now used by clients of the neighboring Sparkles! child care center. Because the intersection does not have a traffic signal, residents find it difficult to make a left turn onto Lee Highway from Marymead Drive and they are concerned that the additional traffic generated by the proposed use would worsen the situation.



In late August, the applicant submitted updated plans for the site to address access and safety concerns. The revision proposes that the new child care facility and Sparkles! share access to Spruce Avenue and Marymead Drive through connected parking areas. The revision proposes removing the existing service road connection at Marymead Drive and relocating access for the new facility further south on Marymead, across from an existing drivway, and away from the intersection with Lee Highway. This would limit vehicular conflicts at the intersection, provide space for vehicles exiting from Lee Highway to slow down before entering the parking lot, and prevent vehicles exiting the child care facilities from ending up diagnoal across the intersection by giving space for them to straighten out prior to

the intersection with Lee Highway. The applicant has also proposed removing the service road connection to the west of Marymead Drive and using the space to create a right turn lane from eastbound Lee Highway onto Marymead, with the goal of slowing vehicles and reducing the likelihood of rear-end accidents with turning traffic. Additional revisions address tree preservation, landscaping, stormwater management, and green building practices. The applicant has reached out to the community, and staff, including Fairfax County and Virginia Department of Transportation staff, are reviewing this resubmission.

A Planning Commission hearing previously scheduled for November 3 has been deferred until December. The Board of Supervisors hearing has not yet been scheduled. 29

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Application Filed to Redevelop Mckenzie Avenue Properties

Sekas Homes, Ltd. has filed an application to rezone 6.51 acres of land located along McKenzie Avenue, south of its intersection with Lee Highway in Fairfax. The land consists of four properties developed with three single-family homes, two of which are not currently occupied. The applicant has proposed rezoning the property from R-1 to R-2 Cluster to allow 11 new lots developed with single-family dwellings. Access would be provided through a public street extending from an existing stub off Robertson Farm Circle. Stormwater management is proposed to be handled through installation of an underground vault facility.

A Planning Commission hearing has been scheduled for December 1. No date has been set for a hearing of the Board of Supervisors.



Update on One University Construction Schedule

On August 10, Supervisor Walkinshaw held a virtual "Pardon the Dust" community meeting to discuss construction plans for the One University project, which will provide 120 affordable family units, 120 affordable age-restricted units for seniors, and 333 units of purpose-built housing with up to 798 beds to serve George Mason University students at the northwest corner of the intersection of Ox Road and University Drive.

Based on the Noise Ordinance and specific proffers in the project approval, outdoor construction is limited to 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Friday, and 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturdays. Sunday construction will only be permitted in very limited circumstances with prior approval by the Director of Fairfax County's Department of Land Development Services and is restricted to noon to 5 p.m. for the student building and 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. for the affordable housing buildings.



Demolition is expected to begin later this month and continue through the end of the year. The Housing building will be removed first, followed by the old Robinson Square townhouses. Excavation for underground parking will begin after the existing structures have been removed and be followed by initial concrete work, anticipated to start in October. The student building is planned for completion in August 2023, in time for beginning of the school year. The affordable family and senior buildings are planned for completing in January 2024.

Utility work is beginning this week. This will be done in phases and includes stormwater pipes, extension of sanitary sewer lines, and work to extend Washington Gas and Fairfax Water lines. The work will require closure of the sidewalk on the north side of University Drive, west of Ox Road, along the frontage of the new building. Street parking along the north side of the street will also be temporarily restricted. Pedestrians are encouraged to use the south side of University Drive. The contractor will provide a path as necessary in places where no sidewalk currently exists. This work is being coordinated with George Mason University. A six-foot security fence will be erected around the perimeter of the site for safety.
