Dear Neighbor,

With the new school year approaching, I wanted to share highlights from a recent study of education funding in Virginia that provides important context for Fairfax County's budget and highlights the challenges we face in continuing to provide the high-quality education that every child deserves. The State's Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission's (JLARC) 18-month study on <u>Virginia's K-12 Funding Formula</u> found that Virginia:

- Severely underfunds education relative to other states, best practices, and an expert workgroup's model.
- Systemically underestimates compensation needs, especially in high-cost-of-living communities like Fairfax.
- Has failed to restore more than \$500 million of cuts imposed during the Great Recession, when today's high schoolers were in pre-school.

Across much of the Commonwealth, this failure to invest in our most valuable resource – our kids – means that children attend crumbling schools and teacher pay is far below the national average. In fact, in 2021, Virginia ranked 41st of 50 states in per-pupil state spending on education, just barely above Mississippi.



Here in Fairfax County, we're able to maintain high-quality schools by providing additional local funding. 69% of the Fairfax County Public Schools budget is funded by Fairfax County, with the remainder provided by the state and federal governments. While we will always make investing in schools our top priority, shouldering the additional burden created by state underfunding limits our ability to invest in other areas, including public safety, mental health and substance abuse treatment,

economic development, environmental initiatives, and more.

The JLARC study recommends that Virginia increase state funding for education by \$3.5 billion to bring us into line with other states and to better reflect the realities of what it costs for the General Assembly to meet its constitutional obligation to establish and maintain a high-quality public school system.

As Chairman of our Board's Legislative Committee, I've been working closely with our delegation to the General Assembly and, thanks to their efforts, we have made some small progress in recent years. But this new study should be a wake-up call that much more is needed.

The good news is that Virginia recently reported a \$5.1 billion surplus, providing an opportunity to make real progress that could bring Virginia's education funding to the top of the nation, where it belongs. I hope that Governor Youngkin and General Assembly leaders will make this a priority during their ongoing budget negotiations.

Back to School

Children's Safety

As the beginning of the new school year approaches, here are a few safety reminders from the County's Department of Emergency Management and Security (DEMS):

- Stop and wait for school buses to safely load and unload children
- Slow down and take extra care in school zones and in neighborhoods
- Make eye contact with drivers and pedestrians at stoplights and intersections before proceeding
- Make sure children know who to call in case of an emergency, their home address, and a parent/guardian's phone number

August is National Back to School Month

Include preparedness in your back to school planning! Ensure that they know who to call if an emergency occurs, and the address of their home.

Earlier this week, DEMS hosted a webinar on Preparing Youth for Emergencies: Back to School Safety. You can <u>watch a recording</u> of the presentation on preparing to go back to school, how to best talk to children about preparing, and practicing for an emergency.



Braddock Road Multimodal Improvements Meeting

The Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) recently hosted a public information meeting on the Braddock Road Multimodal Improvements Project during which they shared updates on changes they have made in response to community feedback. If you weren't able to attend or would like to review what was presented, please go to the **project webpage**. It hosts the presentation in several formats, including **voice-over** and **PDF**, and is also available in **Spanish** and **Vietnamese**.

At both previous meetings and in written comments, residents raised concerns about the amount of tree loss that would result from earlier plans. I encouraged VDOT to be flexible and creative in the design to minimize impacts on trees and surrounding neighborhoods. I was



pleased to see that they have made significant progress in preserving trees by:

- Incorporating segments of the existing trail into the new shared-use paths
- Consolidating stormwater management facilities into fewer locations (10 as opposed to 21 in the November 2022 design)
- Using retaining walls in key locations to reduce the need for grading and preserve tree buffers for adjacent neighborhoods
- Committing to provide new/replacement landscaping, including street trees

These changes will increase tree preservation by 68% (from 28% to 47%) within VDOT right-of-way.

I was glad that VDOT made large <u>display boards</u> available at the meeting so residents could take a closer look at some of the project details, including the locations of stormwater management facilities, retaining walls, existing and relocated bus stops, limits of construction, and the proposed shared use paths. If you are unable to view these online or would just like to see a larger version, there is a set of boards from the meeting available for review in my office.

I want to thank all the community members who have participated in the process and helped improve this project. If you were not able to attend the meeting, if you have a specific question that wasn't addressed, or if you would like to provide comments, the public comment period will be open until **Monday**, **August 7**. There are several ways you can provide feedback:





Upcoming Deer Management Season

Each fall, the Fairfax County Park Authority (FCPA), Fairfax County Police Department (FCPD), and other regional public landowners conduct a whitetail deer management program in select Fairfax County parks. The goal of the program is to protect human health and safety, reduce damage to the environment, and to conserve healthy, sustainable deer herds. If you live adjacent to one of the deer management zones, you either have or will soon receive a letter explaining the program. It provides contact information you can use to contact FCPD if there are any issues or violations occurring in or around your home. Please be cautious during this season and be sure to keep your dogs on leash per county code and park rules. If you need to enter a deer management zone, be sure to make yourself seen.

Remember to Follow Park Rules

As you and your families enjoy the parks and trails this summer, please remember to follow the Fairfax County Park Authority (FCPA) rules. Lists of all the rules can be found on the FCPA website. In general, remember:

- Deposit trash in trash receptacles
- Alcohol is not permitted on park grounds or in Park Authority buildings without a pre-approved permit
- Remove all private property from park land when you leave
- Pedestrians have the right-of-way on trails
- Do not disturb vegetation or wildlife
- Trails and parks close at dark

Task Force on the Future of Lake Accotink Update

On July 10 and 24, the Task Force on the Future of Lake Accotink held their second and third meetings at the Fairfax County Government Center. Over the course of these meetings, County staff have given presentations outlining the engineering studies and research that had been undertaken regarding dredging, alongside their consultant, Arcadis, as well as comparing the Accotink Creek Watershed with other watersheds in the region that have had successful dredging operations. Task Force members were given opportunities to ask questions and discuss the



issues. Subcommittees have been proposed to partake in more in-depth investigations in three areas: the value of Lake Accotink and Lake Accotink Park to the County; impacts of and issues with the County staff recommendation to not dredge, allow the lake and wetlands to return to nature, and proceed with a replanning of Lake Accotink Park; and options to consider other than traditional full dredging.

The next meeting of the Task Force will be held on Monday, August 7 at 7:00 p.m. in Conference Room 11 at the Government Center. It will include presentations on the Lake Barcroft Watershed Improvement Project and on managed wetlands. Toward the end of the meeting, the Task Force will break into subcommittees to begin their work.

The biweekly meetings are open to the public and interested community members are welcome to attend to observe the Task Force's work or live stream the meetings on <u>Channel 16</u>. Fairfax County Adopts Commercial Property Assessed Clean Energy Program (C-PACE)

In early July, Fairfax County was the latest locality to adopt the Commercial Property Assessed Clean Energy (C-PACE) program. C-PACE is administered by the Virginia PACE Authority with support from the Virginia Department of Energy (Virginia Energy).

The program allows for energy efficiency improvements to be made to commercial and industrial properties by having access to low-cost, long-term financing. Property owners may invest in energy efficiency,



renewable energy, and water efficiency improvements. By passing ordinances for C-PACE, Fairfax County can use the program as an economic development tool for new construction, as well.

Compliance Corner

Sign Removal from the Right-of-Way (ROW) – Are you seeing more signs along major roads, such as in medians and near sidewalks? If so, relief is coming. The County started its Illegal Sign Removal Program in 2013, under an agreement with the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT). We remove signs placed along roads for advertising, realtors, political campaigns, and more. The program covers ninety-nine (99) roads, most of which are major routes, like Richmond Highway. Removal of signs from other roads doesn't happen as part of the program.

Due to staff shortages, sign removal stopped in Summer 2022. Fortunately, the County was successful in supporting a new Virginia law passed to allow contractors to remove signs from the roads in the program. It took effect July 1, 2023. As of mid-July, a contractor has begun removing these signs. The Department of Code Compliance (DCC) continues to administer the program and issue fines to repeat violators.

How does DCC administer this program?



- Our signs team drives the designated roads and documents all illegal signs. Unlike other issues we handle, we don't respond to complaints or concerns related to signs in the ROW, but please be assured roads are checked several times each month.
- We coordinate our inspection schedules with the contractor. The day after our inspection, the contractor will remove all signs.
- First time offenders will receive a courtesy letter instead of a fine. After the courtesy letter, there are fines of \$110 for each sign.

FCPD Launches Final Wave Against Reckless "Road Sharks"

The Fairfax County Police Department began their fourth and final wave of the successful "Road Shark" campaign on Monday, July 31, and it will continue through Sunday, August 6. During this



high-visibility and coordinated enforcement, FCPD will continue to deter aggressive driving, reduce crashes, and change driving behavior. Throughout the Road Shark campaign, the efforts of FCPD and Virginia State Police have been commendable due to their yielding of promising results. Through increased patrolling, traffic stops, and public awareness initiatives, officers have successfully ticketed and warned thousands of individuals engaging in speeding, hands-free violations, and highway sign violations.

During wave 3, officers issued over 5,800 citations and warnings. This campaign has resulted in over a total of 14,600 citations and warnings being issued, with 650 having been for reckless driving on our roadways.

Panhandling in Fairfax County

Every year, Fairfax County Police Department (FCPD) receives hundreds of calls related to panhandling. The calls range from traffic issues to concerns about the person who is panhandling to fears about a suspicious person at an intersection.

Here are some important things to know about the FCPD approach to this issue:

- Panhandling is a protected act under the First Amendment in public areas.
- Police officers will intervene when people who panhandling commit traffic offenses or engage in criminal activity.
- If you witness someone breaking the law, contact the FCPD. The emergency number is 911 and the non-emergency number is (703) 691-2131.
- Police officers can refer people who panhandle to available county human services but cannot force them to receive services.

What can you do?

- Refer people who are panhandling, or others in need, to Fairfax County's social services programs. The human services hotline phone number is (703) 222-0880,
- Consider donating or volunteering for one of the county's <u>nonprofit community</u> <u>partners</u> dedicated to assisting our residents in need.

REVIVE! Naloxone Training

The **<u>Community Services Board</u>** has partnered with the <u>**Virginia Department of Behavioral**</u> **<u>Health and Developmental Services</u>** to launch REVIVE!, a program that makes naloxone

available to lay rescuers to reverse opioid overdoses.



REVIVE! trains individuals on what to do and not do in an overdose situation, how to administer naloxone, and what to do afterwards. Each attendee also receives a free REVIVE! kit that includes all the supplies needed to administer naloxone. The medication itself can be acquired at a pharmacy after completing the training. Attendees also receive <u>a safety plan</u> to help individuals prevent overdose if they relapse.



Planning Commission Recommends Approval of Rezoning the Mary Day Property on Zion Drive

On July 27, the Planning Commission voted 9-0-1 to recommend approval of a rezoning proposal for 10121 Zion Drive, a wooded, undeveloped site known as the Mary Day property. This 2.8-acre site is located on the west side of Zion Drive, just north of its intersection with Guinea Road and adjacent to the Burke Junction community.

The applicant has proposed rezoning the property from the R-1 District to the PDH-3 District to build six single-family detached homes. Access to the property would be provided through an extension of James



Young Way, a private street that connects to Zion Drive opposite Hillard Lake Road and links to the Burke Junction neighborhood to the south. The applicant has stated that they intend to make this development compatible with Burke Junction.

The Planning Commission held a hearing on this rezoning application on June 21 and deferred its decision to give the applicant additional time to address concerns that were raised on issues including landscaping, tree preservation, and details on the establishment of a Homeowners Association (HOA). The applicant revised the development plan to more clearly iderntify the widths of the proposed landscape buffer along the southern border of Lots 1, 2, 3, and 5 and easement at the rear of Lot 4, which range from 5 to 8 feet. Specific language was included to clarify that construction activities on the property will not cut into the critical root zones or damage any off-site trees. This was a major concern of the residents of the Burke Junction community.

Although the proposed houses are of similar height to those in Burke Junction, they are higher in elevation due to the topography. The applicant revised the proffers to require the basements on Lots 1 through 4 to be buried a minimum of 6 feet, as opposed to at ground level or buried 2 feet, below the existing grade to lower the height of the proposed dwellings and decks and make them more comparable in appearance. The floor height of rear decks has also been limited from a maximum of 11 feet from ground level to a maximum of 5 feet above grade on Lots 1 through 4. Decks on Lots 1 and 2, which are adjacent to the Burke Junction pergola and open space, will only be permitted to extend 12 feet into the minimum rear yard as opposed to 14 feet.

Regarding HOA membership, an interpretation request submitted by the applicant determined that the current owner or future owners of the application property are not precluded from joining the Burke Junction HOA subject to the provisions in the Burke Junction HOA governing documents. Based on that, the proffers for the Mary Day property have been written to allow for either annexation of the new development into Burke Junction or establishment of a separate and independent HOA. The applicant will contribute money for either the relocation of the new community if they do not merge.



At the July 27 hearing, community members continued to express concerns about the timeliness of receiving information from the applicant, how the new houses relate to the existing Burke Junction community, elevation and the grading plan, preservation of the existing treed buffer, privacy, and suggested reducing the number of houses to provide better flexibility in the layout.


A Staff Report analyzing the previous proposal was published on February 1, and memos updating the Planning Commission on subsequent revisions were issued on May 17, June 14, July 20, and July 26. Reports and project plans are available on the <u>PLUS website</u>. Select the "Zoning" tab and enter the application number, RZ-2021-BR-00018, in the search box on the right side. Click on the "Record Information" arrow on the left and then click on "Attachments" in the drop-down menu. The most recent documents should be at the end of the list. Application Filed for Adult Day Care Facility at 8003 Forbes Place

Friends Adult Day Care has filed an application for a Special Exception to operate an adult day care facility on the third floor of an existing office building at 8003 Forbes Place in Springfield, near the intersection of Forbes Place and Port Royal Road and south of the Ravensworth Shopping Center. The property is zoned to the I-5 District.

The applicant had operated an adult day care within the Calvary Church of the Nazarene in Annandale and now proposes to relocate and enlarge its operation. They are proposing to convert the third floor, or approximately 15,329 square feet, of the office building to adult day



care use for up to 200 adults, with the first two floors of the building remaining occupied by office uses. A grassy area measuring approximately 20 feet by 170 feet would be used for outdoor recreation, consisting primarily of walking. Four standard picnic tables would be located in that area. Approximately 40 employees will be on site at any one time. Operating hours would be 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Mondays through Saturdays. The applicant has stated that there would be minimal traffic impact because the majority of clients will arrive by buses or minivans. The daily impact is estimated at 100 trips, primarily at 7:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.

A hearing before the Planning Commission has been tentatively scheduled for November 15. A Board of Supervisors hearing has not yet been scheduled.

Braddock District Land Use & Environment Committee Meeting

The Braddock District Land Use and Environment Committee will not meet in August. Their next meeting will be held in person on Tuesday, September 19, at 7:00 p.m. in Braddock Hall. Braddock District Land Use and Environment Committee meetings are open to the public and interested residents are encouraged to participate.

Update on Construction at Erickson Living's Woodleigh Chase Project

Much of the current work at Erickson Living's Woodleigh Chase campus on Braddock Road is in the interior of the buildings. At Emerson Square, the community building at the center of the three current buildings, the contractor is completing "punch list" items in both residential units

and the common areas. Balcony screens are also being installed. You may see site landscaping underway around the buildings.

At Fulton Landing, the residential building connected to Emerson Square, flooring is being installed in second floor units and countertops and cabinets are being installed in units on the upper floors. At Stafford Glen, the residential building to the east, subflooring is being laid and floor tile is being installed for showers and bathrooms. The final exterior stairs are being framed and will be poured in the coming weeks.





Update on Ilda's Overlook Senior Residences on Braddock Road

The Arlington Partnership for Affordable Housing has chosen the name "Ilda's Overlook Senior Residences" for its affordable senior project on Braddock Road. This name was selected to recognize some of Fairfax County's Black history. Matilda Gibson Parker was the daughter of Horace Gibson, who folklore claims he affectionately called Ilda. Horace and fellow blacksmith, Moses Parker founded Ilda, a community located along Little River Turnpike. For more

information about the history, see **Ilda Historical Marker** and **The Plantation and the Pizza** Hut: A Suburban County Reconsiders Its History.

This week, the contractor completed masonry work for the monument sign in front of the building, began pouring concrete walks, and continued installing siding. The first-floor corridor and common space drywall was hung. On the second floor, drywall in the units and doors have been installed, along with water heaters. Shelving was installed on the third floor, and cabinets and interior door hardware were installed on the third and fourth floors. As you can see from the interior photo below, the units are really beginning to take shape. In the next few weeks, the contractor will continue placing countertops, install ceramic tile tub and shower surrounds, and begin installing toilet and bathroom accessories.







Update on The Main at One University Student Housing Development

The developer has made a good deal of progress in the last month on The Main at One University, the student housing development at the northwest corner of Ox Road and University Drive. They are currently hanging drywall in some areas while installing trusses for roof framing in other areas. Windows are being installed around the building, and they have also started hanging exterior finishes. Below are bird's eye views of the two interior courtyards, which provide unique perspectives of the project.







Update on One University Affordable Housing Development

Masonry and siding on the senior affordable housing building masonry is approximately 75 percent complete. Units have been drywalled and primed for painting, and tile work is ongoing while corridors are being finished. In the family building, drywall work in ongoing on the third floor, mechanical-electric-and-plumbing rough-in work is ongoing on the second floor, and exterior masonry is approximately 40 percent complete. Masonry work on the single-story community building between the senior and family buildings is complete and mechanical-electric-and-plumbing rough-in work is ongoing. The delivery of electrical switchgear remains impacted by supply chain delays.





Cases Filed with the Board of Zoning Appeals

The Fairfax County Board of Zoning Appeals (BZA) hears and makes decisions on requests for variances (relief from specific zoning regulations such as lot width, building height, or minimum yard requirements) and Special Use Permits. It meets on Wednesdays beginning at 9:00 a.m. BZA meetings are aired live on the county government's cable TV Channel 16. Residents who have concerns about an application are encouraged to submit a letter for the record or testify at the hearing on the case in person, by telephone, or by pre-submitted video. For information on how to submit comments or testify, please visit the **Board of Zoning Appeals website**. These matters will not come before the Board of Supervisors but will be decided by the BZA. Staff reports are normally available online a week before the scheduled hearing.

Access to information on BZA cases is available through the Planning and Land Use System, or PLUS. This system allows users to create and submit applications online, pay fees, track the status of applications, and receive electronic notifications. It also offers more information to the public than the previous system and does so in real time. Visit the <u>PLUS website</u> for more information on this land use platform.

Nandor Szuprics & Erika B. Szuprics – 4800 Treasure Court, Fairfax SP-2022-BR-00184

The applicants are seeking a reduction in setback requirements to permit an open deck to remain 4.8 feet from the rear lot line. The applicant is requesting approval to expand a home childcare facility to care for 12 children. Arrival times would be between 7:00 and 8:00 a.m. School-age children would be transported to school via the daycare van at 8:40 a.m. and returned to the site after school at 3:30 p.m. Pick-up times would be between 4:45 and 6:00 p.m. The BZA hearing on this application has been scheduled for September 20. Farzaneh Hajiaghabozorgi and Nini Daycare LLC – 5002 Wheatstone Drive, Fairfax

SP-2022-BR-00177

The applicant is requesting a Special Permit to expand a home childcare facility to care for 12 children and a reduction in setback requirements based on errors in building location for an accessory structure to remain 0.0 feet from a side lot line. The childcare is open from 7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. Arrival times would be between 7:30 and 9:15 a.m. Pick-up times would be between 2:45 and 5:00 p.m. There would be four employees, two for the morning shift and two for the afternoon shift. Parking would be in the driveway and along the street. The BZA hearing on this application has been scheduled for September 20. Ste. Bernadette Catholic Church and School – 7600 Old Keene Mill Road, Springfield SP-78-S-276

The applicant is requesting to amend their Special Permit previously approved for a Place of Worship, Private School of General Education, and Child Care Center to allow for modifications to site and development conditions to permit construction of a fellowship hall, and to make condition modifications. A new two-story building with 13,500 square feet of gross floor area would be added to a portion of the existing parking lot and connect to an existing church building. The first floor would include meeting rooms, classrooms for church programs, and administrative facilities. The second floor would include a fellowship hall. Although the number of parking spaces would be reduced, the total would exceed the requirement under the previously granted parking reduction.
