Braddock Road Multimodal Improvement Project

On November 29, I joined VDOT for their second public information meeting on the **Braddock Road Multimodal project**, which focused on discussing options for the critical intersections at Rolling Road, Burke Lake Road, and Wakefield Chapel Road/Danbury Forest Drive. The plan to improve Braddock Road from Humphries Drive in Burke to Ravensworth Road in Annandale is the result of nearly a decade of community engagement, beginning with the formation of a

citizen task force in 2014. That task force, comprised of representatives of the neighborhoods in the corridor, rejected options to widen Braddock Road, due to concerns about environmental and quality-of-life impacts. Instead, they developed a plan to improve key intersections and add contiguous shared-use paths to both sides of the road. My predecessor, Supervisor John Cook, and the Board of Supervisors at the time endorsed that plan after significant community outreach and dialogue.

A study conducted in 2018 demonstrated that if we do nothing to improve this stretch of Braddock Road, delays due to traffic congestion will increase 30 percent by 2045, and it will get progressively more dangerous for pedestrians and bicyclists. A community survey conducted in early 2022 showed that 63 percent of the nearly 600 respondents said they either currently walk or run in this corridor or would like to. Fifty-five percent of respondents said they currently or would like to travel along this segment of Braddock Road by bicycle.



Finalizing this plan to improve the corridor in a way that balances the need to reduce congestion and improve pedestrian and bicycle connectivity while minimizing the environmental and neighborhood impacts is a huge challenge that we can only overcome if we work together. Those of us who primarily drive will have to think of those — including those with mobility difficulties — who want to walk or bike safely to activity centers or to their bus stops. Those of us who are fortunate and don't have to

travel the corridor during rush hour will have to think of those who do. And those of us focused on making it easier to drive or walk will have to think of those living adjacent to Braddock Road who will experience the impacts of project construction. And all of us will have to think about completing the project in a way that minimizes the impact on our natural environment.

To that end, VDOT is accepting comments on the information presented at the recent meeting until December 14. Please visit the **project website**, and click on "Nov. 29 Virtual Public Information Meeting Info" to review the presentation. Use the form at the bottom of the page to respond to the poll on whether you support the proposed pedestrian bridge just west of Burke Lake Road and submit your thoughts and suggestions. You may also email your comments to **meetingcomments@vdot.virginia.gov** with "Braddock Road Multimodal Improvements" in the subject line.

Citizens of the Month

Judy Nitsche and John Weidner



We are pleased to recognize two dedicated members of the Friends of the Kings Park Library, Judy Nitsche and John Weidner, as our Citizens of the Month.

Judy has been Chair of the Book Sale for 14 years. John joined as Book Sale Co-Chair just a few years later. On November 5, they concluded yet another very successful event. After years of dedicated service, they are stepping down from these roles.

The Kings Park Library book sale is held in both the spring and fall. Thanks to Judy, John, and the many volunteers, the Kings Park Library is widely

recognized as having one of the best—and best organized—book sales in the area. Work begins well before the first day of each sale. In their roles, Judy and John ensure the daily collection of donated books, making sure volunteers are available to receive the books, identify any which are not suitable for sale, and sort and pack the rest to put into temporary storage. As book sale time approaches, Judy solicits volunteers and creates a schedule to make sure everything is covered. She gets students from throughout the area who volunteer to meet their community service goals. As Treasurer of the Friends of Kings Park Library, Judy focuses on more of the administrative and financial functions, while John is in charge of the operational side. He works to ensure that tables are set up, books are distributed for sorting, and all of the books that have been donated are sorted by category to make it easy to find what you want. This goes well beyond the wide groupings of fiction and non-fiction to sub-categories such as biographies, science fiction, travel, history by time period, classics, romance, and humor.

Gross sales for each of the two yearly book sales has consistently exceeded \$10,000, a number which has grown over the years and remained consistent when sales resumed after the pandemic. The funds raised go toward the Summer Reading Program, preschool/youth/teen and adult programs, furniture and computers, 3D printer, magazine subscriptions, book collection, display and electronic items, volunteer appreciation events, Fall for the Book, and the Fairfax Library Foundation.

John stated, "The people are what make it worthwhile, those who work and those who come to the sale." He recounted stories of an art teacher who was able to find art books for his students to use, a young man who always wanted an atlas and finally got one, and the children who walk out with a stack of books and a smile on their face.

We thank Judy and John for their dedication to the community and hard work to raise hundreds of thousands of dollars for the Kings Park Library. We will certainly continue to see them around. As Judy put it, "I am not quitting the book sale, just quitting being in charge."

Solid Waste Management Issues

Haulin' Trash LLC Ceases Operations

On November 29, 2022, in response to a surge in resident complaints about missed collections, the Solid Waste Management Program (SWMP) made contact with Haulin' Trash LLC, a licensed trash collector here in Fairfax County serving these residents. SWMP was advised that the firm was experiencing operational and financial difficulties and was exploring options for addressing the missed collections and related compliance concerns.

On November 30, 2022, the SWMP was notified that Haulin' Trash LLC filed Chapter 7 Bankruptcy and would cease all business operations effective December 1, 2022.

SWMP understands Haulin' Trash LLC notified all of their customers via email of the closure of the business on November 30, 2022.

Affected single family home residents (subscription customers) with items curbside awaiting collection



will need to obtain a new service provider for collection of any set out materials or self-haul the waste to a SWMP drop-off location (I-95 landfill or I-66 transfer station). A list of licensed collection companies can be found at **SWMP's webpage**.

Affected HOA residents (typically, these are collected under a contract arrangement) should contact their HOA representative or property manager for further information regarding obtaining a new service provider. Solid Waste collection companies that can provide contract services are denoted on SWMP's <u>website</u>.

Residents seeking assistance with reimbursement for service should contact Consumer Affairs Branch, Cable and Consumer Affairs at (703) 222-8435 or <u>file a complaint online</u>.

Compliance Corner

Running Bamboo Ordinance in Effect January 2023

On January 1, 2023, regulations on running bamboo will become effective in Fairfax County. Although the Department of Code Compliance (DCC) will not be taking running bamboo complaints until the regulations take effect, this month will preview the regulations for constituents. The following resources are available:

- Fairfax County's running bamboo topics webpage is available at <u>fairfaxCounty.gov/topics/running-bamboo</u>. This page includes flyers as well as a video and information on running bamboo containment options.

Basic Things to know about Running Bamboo Enforcement

- Running bamboo will be enforced by DCC on a complaint-only basis. Starting January 1, 2023, complaints about potential running bamboo violations can be made on the DCC website, www.fairfaxCounty.gov/code, or by telephone during regular hours at (703) 324-1300.
- Even without a complaint filed against them, citizens are expected to be aware of the bamboo on their property and to voluntarily take measures to contain it to ensure that it does not spread onto adjacent properties or into the public right-of-way.
- There is no requirement to remove the bamboo, only to contain it.
- A citizen is only responsible for containing the bamboo on their own property. They are not responsible for bamboo that may have spread onto an adjacent neighbor's property.
- The County will work with citizens and provide ample time for them to contain their bamboo, with fines reluctantly sought only as a last resort for those who do not voluntarily come into compliance.

Transportation Updates



VDOT Announces Resilience Plan to Provide Sustainable Future for Transportation Projects and Infrastructure

The comprehensive plan prepares the state agency for regional and global challenges

RICHMOND, Va. – The Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) has unveiled a statewide Resilience Plan — a comprehensive, formalized framework to incorporate resilience strategies into transportation planning, project development and delivery, operations, maintenance, and asset management.

The Resilience Plan outlines strategies to anticipate, prepare for, and mitigate hazards that can put the transportation network at risk of disruption and deterioration, such as recurring flooding and extreme weather events.

"It is our responsibility to ensure that Virginia's transportation network continues to move people and goods safely and efficiently for generations to come," said **VDOT Commissioner Stephen C. Brich, P.E.** "While the results of the Resilience Plan will take time to fully realize, it is an important step for the agency, as we support the Commonwealth's goal of increasing resilience statewide and join our counterpart DOTs in working towards increasing transportation resilience across the nation."

The Resilience Plan includes six primary objectives:

- **1. Promote Data-Driven Decisions** VDOT will develop a data and research plan to ensure transportation decisions are informed by the best available data and research regarding vulnerability, current and planned assets, and identified current and future conditions.
- **2. Engage and Partner with Stakeholders** VDOT will establish and implement a coordination and outreach plan that will help leverage existing efforts, maximize benefits, and ensure decision-making is coordinated with statewide policy.
- **3. Identify At-Risk Infrastructure and Prioritize Needs** VDOT will establish a risk-based methodology to measure the vulnerability across current and planned transportation infrastructure assets to support the prioritization and application of resilience efforts.
- **4. Survey Resilience Measures** VDOT will establish a suite of resilience measures that will be available for incorporation into planning, design, operations, and maintenance programs. The measures will include (i) adaptive design criteria based upon the best available, forward-looking data; (ii) physical enhancement measures;

- (iii) nature-based resilience measures; (iv) operations, maintenance, and emergency management enhancement measures; and (v) other administrative/policy measures.
- **5. Utilize Feasibility and Cost Effectiveness Analyses** VDOT will develop feasibility and economic analyses that are compatible with existing processes to ensure appropriate selection of resilience measures for application to a particular asset.
- **6. Incorporate Resilience into Current Funding Policies** VDOT will identify new funding opportunities that are available for resilience projects and initiatives and identify and implement steps to incorporate resilience into current investment processes and programs. The ultimate deployment of resilience measures relies on the effectiveness of incorporating resilience into the agency's decision-making processes for funding programs and opportunities.

The Resilience Plan was developed with the support of VDOT leadership and is the first statewide transportation resilience plan in the Commonwealth.

To ensure the successful implementation of this plan, VDOT will continue to engage with partners and stakeholders to allow for a coordinated effort across the Commonwealth.

The seat will be properly re-installed if necessary, and you will learn how to install the seat properly in the future. 



Planning Commission Hearing on Comprehensive Plan Amendment for Fairfax County Government Center Campus Scheduled for December 8

LACM VA, LLC, a subsidiary of Lincoln Avenue Capital, was selected by the Fairfax County Redevelopment and Housing Authority (FCRHA) to help address the critical shortage of affordable housing in the County by using a portion of the under-used surface parking on the Government Center campus to develop affordable housing units. LACM VA, LLC has proposed constructing two multifamily residential buildings with a total of approximately 279 affordable dwelling units, 15,000 square feet of secondary uses (a child care facility and other community space), together with surface and structured parking. This would be constructed in the area identified as Parking Lots G and H, which was conveyed to FCRHA in 2020 for this use. The redevelopment of this site would require both a Comprehensive Plan Amendment and a Proffered Condition Amendment, because the Government Center campus is currently planned



for office mixed-use up to an intensity of 0.35 floor area ratio (FAR). This planned intensity does not afford enough development potential for the proposed project.

The Comprehensive Plan sets broad, general parameters that guide use of particular land areas. Plan Amendment 2022-III-FC2 would authorize an increase in the planned intensity on the Government Center campus to 0.4 FAR to allow construction of this affordable housing and related uses. The Plan Amendment also contains editorial revisions to reflect existing development in areas historically linked to the Government Center plan, but which have been separately developed over time. County staff proposed this amendment after seeking feedback from various County agencies. They also gathered public input through a community meeting

held by Supervisor Walkinshaw on September 28 and at meetings with the Braddock District Land Use and Environment Committee.

County staff is recommending that additional affordable and/or workforce multifamily residential development may be appropriate on Parking Lots G and H, provided that such development advances the Plan's vision for the area. Redevelopment should utilize the highest quality building materials and design, integrate seamlessly into the existing Government Center campus, contribute to the sense of place, utilize compatible architecture, and ultimately enhance the quality of life for residents. Redevelopment should not encroach on the campus amenities or natural areas. The proposal adds that additional stormwater management controls should be provided above the minimum standards to mitigate the impacts of the development. The full **staff report** is available on the PLUS website.

The Planning Commission will hold a hearing on the Comprehensive Plan Amendment for the Government Center campus on Thursday, December 8, in the Board auditorium. The hearing begins at 7:30 p.m., but the order of the agenda will not be determined until that evening. If you are interested in offering testimony, you should sign up in advance to make sure you are on the speakers' list. You may also submit video testimony or written comments in advance of the hearing. Information on providing testimony is available on the **Planning Commission** website.

The Proffered Condition Amendment (or entitlement, similar to a rezoning) is also currently under consideration. The proposed development plan may be found on the <u>PLUS website</u>. Select the "Zoning" tab and enter the application number, RZPA-2022-BR-00086, in the search box on the right side. Click on the "Record Information" arrow on the left and then click on "Attachments" in the drop-down menu. The development plan should be at the end of the list. A Planning Commission hearing on the Proffered Condition Amendment is scheduled for February 1.



Community Meeting Held on Proposal to Develop Day Property on Zion Drive

On November 28, Supervisor Walkinshaw hosted a community meeting to discuss a rezoning proposal for 10121 Zion Drive, a wooded, undeveloped site known as the Day property. This 2.8-acre site is located on the west side of Zion Drive, just north of its intersection with Guinea Road and adjacent to the Burke Junction community. A Resource Protection Area (RPA) is located along the western boundary line.

The applicant has proposed rezoning the property from the R-1 District to the PDH-3 District to permit the development of six single-family detached homes. Access to the



property would be provided through an extension of James Young Way, a private street which connects to Zion Drive opposite Hillard Lake Road and links to the Burke Junction neighborhood to the south. The proposal would complete the sidewalk network along Zion Drive. Recreation amenity areas include a pollinator garden, birdhouses, benches/seating areas, and a tot lot.

Community members asked about parking beyond that in each house's garage and driveway. The applicant responded that they have added five on-street parking spaces and overflow parking is available on existing parts of James Young Way, on Zion Drive, or on Hillard Lake Road. Questions were also asked about tree removal. The applicant responded that the trees along the southern property line with Burke Junction would be removed, but the trees in the RPA at the back of the property and along the front portion of the northern property line, where a tot lot is proposed, would remain. The planned open space exceeds what is required. When asked about moving the houses to the northern edge of the property, the applicant's engineer said that was not feasible because of the location of James Young Way.



The applicant stated that they intend to make this development compatible with Burke Junction. The proffers from that subdivision state that the new homeowners could join the Burke Junction Homeowners Association if they unanimously agree they would like to do so. The applicant has not been able to reach an agreement with the owner of the property to the north, but an area would be reserved for interparcel access that would allow for future consolidation of the properties to the north.

The applicant will be resubmitting their plans on December 9 to reflect feedback they have received. Once filed, the updated plans will be available on the <u>PLUS website</u>. Select the "Zoning" tab and enter the application number, RZ-2021-BR-018, in the search box on the right side. Click on the "Record Information" arrow on the left and then click on "Attachments" in the drop-down menu. The most recent documents should be at the end of the list.

The Braddock District Land Use and Environment Committee will be discussing this application at its meeting on December 13. Their meetings are open to the public. The Planning Commission's public hearing has been rescheduled for February 15, 2023.

Three Braddock District Projects Proposed in Site-Specific Plan Amendment Process

Out of the 75 nominations submitted countywide for consideration as part of the 2022-23 Site-Specific Plan Amendment (SSPA) process, three are located in the Braddock District.

11301 Lee Jackson Memorial Highway, Fairfax – Evergreen Investment Company, LLC This vacant site at the southwest corner of Waples Mill Road and Route 50 is currently planned for office use up to 0.15 FAR with an overlay option of medium/high intensity office use at 0.70 FAR. A portion of the site may also be used to accommodate a future planned overpass at the intersection. The nomination proposes adding an option to the current Plan text to allow for residential use up to 1.9 FAR. A multi-family residential building with structured parking and up to 200 units is proposed on the property.

11727 Fairfax Woods Way, Fairfax - EQR Fairfax Corner, LLC

This site is contained in the Reserve at Fairfax Corner. The base Plan calls for residential use at 4-8 dwelling units/acre, with a redevelopment option of office mixed-use up to 0.35 FAR. The nomination proposes to construct a mid-rise multifamily building with structured parking that contains up to 405 units within an existing multifamily development. The construction of the multifamily building will result in the loss of up to 70 existing multifamily units, or a net increase of up to 335 multifamily units on the property. To accommodate this proposal, the nomination proposes adding an option to the Plan text to allow an increase in the allowable FAR from 0.35 to 0.42 FAR.

9350 Braddock Road, Fairfax – Trustees of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Episcopal Land in the Olley Lane corridor between Braddock Road and Athens Road is planned for low-density residential use, which generally should not exceed one dwelling unit per acre to retain the contou8r of land to preserve existing mature trees. The nominator proposes adding an option to the current Plan text to allow for residential use up to a density of 2-3 dwelling units per acre. The church would remain on a portion of the site.

County Planning Division staff are reviewing the nominations to ensure they are all clear and complete in preparation for formal acceptance by the Board of Supervisors at the December 6 Board meeting. Community meetings on the Plan Amendment nominations will begin in January. Following that, there will be public hearings by the Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors. Look for additional information in future issues of the Braddock Beacon.

George Mason University Studying the Feasibility of a New Multi-Purpose Cricket and Baseball Facility at the Fairfax Campus

George Mason University issued a press release on November 29 announcing the following:



Major League Cricket (MLC) and its Washington, D.C.-based investor Sanjay Govil announced today the approval to work with George Mason University (Mason) to study the feasibility of a new multipurpose cricket and baseball facility. The ballpark would be designed to host Major League Cricket matches, Mason baseball games, and other events on the University's Fairfax Campus in the Washington D.C. region.



Funding support for the study and plan development comes from Govil, a founding investor in MLC, the Founder and Chairman of Infinite Computer Solutions and the CEO of Zyter. The effort represents part of MLC's long-term strategic plan for American cricket, which also includes the launch of the first U.S. professional Twenty20 cricket league.

With a goal to be operational by Summer 2025, the ballpark at Mason would be home to a MLC franchise in the heart of one of the largest cricket-loving populations in the United States and feature an international-grade pitch. The pitch would meet International Cricket Council (ICC) accreditation and allow the ballpark to host the highest level of international cricket competition.

"This study with Mason is an important milestone in a new era for Major League Cricket and international matches in the United States and brings new athletic resources to George Mason University and the region," said Govil. "We look forward to taking the next steps to fully realize a vision for the first international cricket venue in the northeastern United States."

"Mason is the educational, economic and cultural hub of one of the most dynamic regions in the country and is the most diverse public university in Virginia," Mason President Gregory Washington said. "This opportunity would bring the second-most popular global media sport to the greater Washington, D.C. metropolitan area and base it at a location known for attracting international students and audiences. At the same time, this proposed facility would enhance the Mason athletic experience for our student-athletes, alumni network, and fan base."

Mason's main campus is located in Fairfax County, VA, home to more than one million people, with a thriving global community and adult and youth cricket leagues which provide a significant base of grassroots support for cricket in the area.

In collaboration with Mason on an innovative cross-functional design that would maximize facility utilization, MLC is working with internationally renowned architects HKS, one of the nation's leading architecture firms which is developing multiple cricket stadium concepts for MLC nationwide.

"Major League Cricket is grateful to George Mason University for working with us to plan an innovative facility that can maximize use for the venue during the college season for Mason baseball and then host world class cricket in the summer months," said Sameer Mehta, co-founder, Major League Cricket.

Update on Construction at Erickson Living's Woodleigh Chase Project

If you regularly drive by Erickson Living's Woodleigh Chase community on Braddock Road, you have seen how quickly their work is progressing. Retaining walls are being constructed around the buildings, and grading for permanent staff and visitor parking is continuing. The new guard house at the entrance is also taking shape.

At Emerson Square, the community building in the center which will contain a kitchen, dining facilities, a pool, fitness center, offices, and some residences, drywall work is continuing throughout the building. The shotcrete (sprayed concrete) for the pool was installed. Some of the mechanical equipment has been set on the roof and siding work on the exterior of the building continues.

At Fulton Landing, the residential building on the west, roof installation has started and brick veneer is continuing to be installed around the building. Mechanical, electrical, and plumbing rough-ins continue and they plan to start pre-rock drywall installation this week.

At Stafford Glen, the residential building on the east, similar progress is being made. Framing and stair installation is continuing around the building, and mechanical, electrical, and plumbing rough-in work is underway. They are beginning the unit balcony footing foundations.

APAH Breaks Ground on Braddock Senior



On November 18, Supervisor Walkinshaw joined Chairman McKay, representatives of the Fairfax County Redevelopment and Housing Authority, Arlington Partnership for Affordable Housing (APAH), Erickson Senior Living, and others in breaking ground for Braddock Senior, which will provide 80 units of agerestricted affordable housing on the site of the former Northern Virginia Training Center's group houses on Braddock Road. The apartments will serve independent older adults ages 62 and above with household incomes at or below 60 percent of the Area Median Income. This facility will allow seniors to continue to live in the

community where they have family friends, and strong social connections.

Work to prepare the site for construction began several months ago. The building pad was graded, curb and gutter in the parking lot was installed, and base paving was done. Foundation work is underway, including underground plumbing. During the next month, APAH expects to continue that work, begin installing concrete masonry for the stairs and elevator, waterproof foundation walls, and begin underground electrical work. They will also be preparing and pouring the slab on grade, followed by structural steel. Watch for updates as this important project progresses.



Update on DMV's Braddock Road Customer Service Center

Acting Virginia DMV Commissioner Linda Ford reported that they are continuing to make progress behind the scenes regarding permits and supplies for the Braddock Road Customer Service Center. She said that they are working around the easement issue that has held up construction and residents should begin to see some movement on the site. The contractor will do as much work as possible during the colder winter months, with activity picking up in the spring. They are working on finalizing the construction timeline. We appreciate the updates and will continue to keep the community updated as information is available.

Update on One University Project Construction

Concrete work at the One University site, at the northwest corner of the intersection of Ox Road and University Drive, is approaching completion. Because concrete deliveries account for much of the daily traffic to and from the site, area residents will no doubt welcome that news. The elevated deck for the affordable housing portion of the site is 95 percent poured. The final two concrete pours are scheduled to be completed within the next week. Three masonry stair towers/elevator shafts are complete, and plumbing and electrical piping is ongoing in the

garage. Wood framing on the buildings is scheduled to begin in January. The student housing portion of the site being developed by RISE is on a similar schedule. They anticipate the final concrete pours in January and will soon start wood framing.

Cases Filed with the Board of Zoning Appeals

The Fairfax County Board of Zoning Appeals (BZA) hears and makes decisions on requests for variances (relief from specific zoning regulations such as lot width, building height, or minimum yard requirements) and Special Use Permits. It meets on Wednesdays beginning at 9:00 a.m. BZA meetings are aired live on the County government's cable TV Channel 16. Residents who have concerns about an application are encouraged to submit a letter for the record or testify at the hearing on the case in person, by telephone, or by pre-submitted video. For information on how to submit comments or to testify, please visit the **Board of Zoning Appeals website**. These matters will not come before the Board of Supervisors but will be decided by the BZA. Staff reports are normally available online a week before the scheduled hearing.

Access to information on BZA cases is available through the Planning and Land Use System, or PLUS. This system allows users to create and submit applications online, pay fees, track the status of applications, and receive electronic notifications. It also offers more information to the public than the previous system and does so in real time. Visit the **PLUS website** for more information on this land use platform.

Johnny Wen & Joanna Wen – 4807 Marymead Drive, Fairfax SP-2022-BR-00100

The applicants requested a Special Permit to add an Accessory Living Unit containing greater than the permitted 800 square feet in floor area and a reduction in setback requirements to permit an addition 15.6 feet from the northwest side lot line. The applicants are seeking to amend their Special Permit to modify the Development Conditions to increase the number of students, increase the number of employees, and expand the hours of operation. The maximum weekday enrollment would be increased from 99 students to 230 students, including approximately 115 students ages 2.5 to 4 and approximately 115 students ages 5 to 12. In addition, the applicants are seeking to

provide overflow capacity for before- and after-school childcare for up to 25 students from the nearby Wakefield Forest Elementary School's School Age Child Care (SACC) program. These students would be ages 5 to 12. The proposed number of employees is anticipated to be 25 to 30.
