## **Response to Questions on the FY 2012 Budget**

- **Request By:** Supervisor McKay
- **Question:** What is the amount of stimulus funds allocated to the County's human services programs? How were they allocated? What are the plans to support these programs once the stimulus funds are gone?
- **Response:** The County has received approximately \$18.2 million in funding as a result of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA). ARRA funding was consistently identified as non-recurring and much was designated for one time or transition uses (such as the Public Housing Capital Fund Program, CDBG-R, and TANF as detailed below). The attached table details the specific human services program, associated funding award and status of funding.
