- 261 Leadership:** Office of the Executive Director; Office of the Deputy Directors.
- 262 Operations Management:** Office of Compliance & Risk Management; Strategy & Performance Management; Informatics; Facilities Management; Enterprise Services & Administrative Operations; (medical “back office” and patient assistance including medication procurement).
- 263 Prevention, Partnerships, & Consumer Affairs:** Wellness, Health Promotion, & Prevention Services; Communications; the Office of Consumer & Family Affairs (Human Rights, peer supports); the Volunteer & Intern Program; Office of Partnership & Resource Development (housing collaboration); Northern Virginia Regional Projects Office.
- 264 Psychiatric and Medication Services:** including pharmacy.
- 265 Engagement, Entry, Assessment & Referral:** PATH (Program to Assist in Transition from Homelessness) a federally-funded grant program specifically targeted to serve the most vulnerable homeless persons who experience mental illness and substance use disorders, who would otherwise not engage in appropriate services; the Assessment Unit (appointment or walk-in); the Call Center.
- 266 Emergency and Crisis Services:** Mobile Crisis Unit including three rapid response teams (Hostage/Barricade, Critical Incident, Disaster Response); Civil Commitment Program; Woodburn Place Crisis Care offers individuals experiencing acute psychiatric crisis an alternative to hospitalization as an intensive, short-term (7-10 days) residential program for adults with serious mental illness, including those with co-occurring substance use disorders; Fairfax Detoxification Center.
- 267 Adult Residential Treatment Services:** A continuum of residential services from intensive “beds” to supervised apartments. A New Beginning and Crossroads serve adults with severe substance use disorders and/or co-occurring mental illness who have been unable to maintain safety and stability on an outpatient basis, even with extensive supports; New Generations provides specialized treatment program for women and their children up to age five; Cornerstones serves individuals with both serious mental illness and severe substance abuse; Residential Treatment Support Services provides outpatient case management/case coordination to people on the waiting list for residential treatment programs.
- 268 Infant and Toddler Connection:** Part of a statewide program (www.infantva.org) that provides federally mandated early intervention services to infants and toddlers as outlined in Part C of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). The CSB serves as the fiscal agent and local lead agency for the program, with advice and assistance from a local interagency coordinating council.
- 269 Youth & Family Outpatient and Day Treatment Services:** Provide assessment, therapy, case management, and crisis intervention services to youth, ages 4 to 18 (and their families), who have mental health and substance use disorders. Provides day treatment at the Merrifield Center for youth ages 13-18 with mental health and/or substance use issues, whose treatment needs cannot be met with office visits at an outpatient site. Also operates the Virginia Independent Clinical Assessment Program (VICAP) program required by the Department of Medical Assistance Services

(DMAS) to provide independent clinical assessment as part of the service authorization process for Medicaid and FAMIS children's community mental health rehabilitative services (CMHRS). This includes children and youth up to the age of 21 enrolled in Medicaid and FAMIS fee-for-service or managed care programs.

- 270 Youth & Family Care Coordination and Court-Involved Services:** High-Fidelity Wraparound Program as an alternative to placement in residential care, the program serves youth ages 3 through 18 and their families, and receives referrals directly from the Comprehensive Services Act utilization staff via all youth-serving agency case managers; Youth and Family Resource Team partners with various CSB teams and other youth-serving agencies to provide case management services and behavioral health expertise and consultation; Juvenile Forensics provides mental health diagnostic services to youth who come before the Juvenile and Domestic Relations District Court.
- 271 Adult Behavioral Health Outpatient and Case Management Services:** Outpatient counseling, case management, and continuing care services for adults with serious mental illness, substance use disorders and/or co-occurring disorders, provided at five Fairfax County sites: Merrifield, Gartlan, Northwest Center-Reston, Northwest Center-Chantilly and Springfield, and in the community.
- 272 Adult Behavioral Health Day Treatment Services:** Adult Partial Hospitalization provides intensive, recovery-oriented services to adults who have serious mental illness or who are experiencing acute crisis, some of whom may also have co-occurring substance use disorders. Substance Use Disorder (SUD) Adult Day Treatment Services provide daily intensive treatment for individuals who have a serious substance use disorder, some of whom also have other co-occurring mental health diagnoses.
- 273 Support Coordination Services:** Provide a continuum of case management services for people with intellectual disability (ID) and their families, engaging with them to provide a long-term, intensive level of service and support. *Note: DD population to be added 7/1/16.*
- 274 Adult Behavioral Health Employment and Day Services:** Group and individualized supported employment; psychosocial rehabilitation; and Turning Point, a specialized program for late-adolescent and young adults experiencing their first episode of psychosis.
- 275 Intellectual Disability Employment and Day Services:** Developmental (Day Support) Services, Sheltered Employment, Self-Directed Services, Group Supported Employment, Individualized Supported Employment, Cooperative Employment Program (CEP), Transportation Services.
- 276 Adult Long-Term Residential Services:** A continuum of needs-based, long-term residential supports for individuals with intellectual disability and for individuals with serious mental illness and comorbid medical conditions who require assisted living. Includes a 24-hour assisted living facility (ALF) that supports individuals who have serious mental illness or co-occurring mental health and substance use disorders, as well as significant health issues. The ALF is a collaborative effort of the CSB and a contracted, private, nonprofit service provider, and has been in operation since 1999.

- 277 Adult Community Residential Services:** A continuum of residential services with behavioral health supports of varying intensity that help adults with serious mental illness or co-occurring substance use disorders live successfully in the community. Individuals live in a variety of settings (treatment facilities, apartments, condominiums and houses) across the County and receive different levels of staff support.
- 278 Adult Intensive Community Treatment Services:** Serves individuals with serious mental illness and/or co-occurring substance disorder who are chronically or episodically homeless and/or forensically involved, to engage, support, and link them with services, and to provide the supports needed to live in the community without repeated hospitalization or incarceration. Includes Jail Diversion, Mandated Psychiatric State Hospital Discharge Planning Service, Program of Assertive Community Treatment (PACT), Intensive Case Management (ICM) Teams, Forensic Transition Services, Mandatory Outpatient Treatment (MOT), Outpatient Restoration, and Not Guilty by Reason of Insanity (NGRI) coordination and monitoring.
- 279 Adult Jail-Based Services:** A unit of CSB behavioral health professionals at the Adult Detention Center works to identify incarcerated individuals who have mental illness, substance use disorders, and/or or intellectual disability; assess for risk, safety, and placement needs; provide psychiatric treatment and behavioral interventions during the incarceration; and reduce recidivism by helping individuals with these special needs make a successful re-entry back to the community. The jail based service is the third intercept point in the County's Diversion-Oriented Systems of Care Collaborative known as "Diversion First."
