



Where Does The Money Go?









LEADERSHIP & MANAGEMENT OVERSIGHT

- » Sheriff and two Chief Deputies provide guidance and vision to agency staff in four divisions that carry out the mission of the Sheriff's Office.

Staffing

- Adult Detention Center population is declining but State,
 Federal and accreditation requirements are increasing staffing needs.
 - Step-Down/Level System for restrictive housing population
 - Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA) coordinator
- Housing for inmates with mental illness and/or substance use disorders requires more staff supervision.
- Approximately 20% of staff are eligible for retirement.
- Current DHR pay equity study hopefully will address compensation issues as they relate to attrition and hiring.



STAFF TRAINING

- Due to high priority, funding was internally reallocated in FY 2016 to allow Sheriff's Office to immediately commence Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) training, while requiring no additional funding to do so.
 - > \$375,000: Cost for CIT training 25% of sworn staff - 125 deputies.
 - > \$15,225: Cost for Mental Health First Aid.





COURTS PHYSICAL SECURITY


- Ensure safety and security of 32 judges,40 courtrooms and the Courthouse complex.
- » Ensure safety and security of all who work in the Courthouse, have business before the courts and general public 5,000 daily.
- » Ensure safety and security of all prisoners.

LEGAL PROCESS SERVICE


- » Abide by Constitutional rights of due process.
- » Serve subpoenas, writs of possession, summonses, notices, motions and warrants.
- Execute
 garnishments,
 levies,

 distresses.





LEGAL PROCESS SERVICE

- » Served 544 protective orders in FY 2015.
- » In partnership with Domestic Violence Action Center, notify petitioners once protective orders have been served.
- » Improved efficiency of service by placing wireless printers in cruisers.




Community Labor Force Savings to the County




Average Daily Jail Population




Adult Detention Center Security System

- System controls doors, cameras, intercoms, elevators, alarms, emergency keys and movement in and out of ADC.
- Was built in 1978 and expanded twice, but expansions were not integrated, resulting in three independent security systems.
- Life expectancy for any jail security system is 15 years. A 2006 study declared the current system obsolete.
- With 16,000 door movements every 24 hours, the chance for total security failure is of great concern.
- Funding is available for study and design, but construction phase is not yet funded.




ADC Security System: Searching for Parts

















SAFE & SECURE MENTAL HEALTH HOUSING


- » At least 40% of inmate population suffers from mental illness.
- » Services are provided in ADC for this population, but not treatment.
- » Separate male and female mental health units with individual cells, day rooms and dormitories.





Mental Health


- » National trend shows both percentage of those with mental illness in jail AND severity of mental illness are on the rise.
- » In the process of adopting Ad Hoc Commission's mental health recommendations.
- » Providing state-certified Crisis Intervention Team training for 25% of sworn staff.
- » Providing Mental Health First Aid training for 100% of sworn and civilian staff.
- » Implemented telepsychiatry in ADC to communicate with Merrifield Crisis Response Center staff 24/7.





Mental Health

- » Assigned CIT deputies to Merrifield Crisis Response Center for security, transfer of custody and transport.
- » Responsible for all transports to facilities outside Northern Virginia.
- Leading efforts in mental health reform, diversion programs, staff training and inmate reentry.





LOOKING FORWARD

- Develop a new program in the ADC to transfer incarcerated individuals with mental illness to community-based treatment.
- Continue working with Board of Supervisors and partners on adopting and implementing Ad Hoc initiatives and recommendations, including Diversion First.
- Complete the study, design and implementation of ADC security system upgrade.
- Measure and evaluate impact of inmate reentry programs on recidivism rate.
- Update technology to become more efficient and cost effective, including inmate video visiting and electronic health records.
