Meeting Goal

Provide feedback on ideal Economic Advisory Commission objectives and structure to develop bylaws

WHY CONSIDER THE STRUCTURE NOW?

- Part of county-wide review of all boards, authorities and commissions
- Very large body 70 members
- Current economic shifts, challenges and opportunities looking to the future

Over-Arching Goals of EAC Structure Review

- Ensure the best structure to meet objectives
- Ensure value to EAC commissioners, the county, and staff

CURRENT EAC COMPOSITION

- Established in 1992. Reconstituted in 2008 via Board Matter
- Stated mission:
 - To advise the Board on economic development and related issues
 - To provide policy level recommendations to the Board of Supervisors on matters related to the development and expansion of the County's economy

2008 Board Matter Seat Allocation: 44

- 17 'Government' (Board of Supervisors, 3 towns, CEX, RHA, Planning Commission, FCPS)
- 12 Residents (appointments from each district, 3 at-large by Chairman of the Board)
- 15 Business and Community Partner Organizations

Seats added since 2008: 26

- 23 residents/at-large
- 2 Business and Community Partner Organizations
- 1 BAC (small business commission)

Current Total Seats: 70

COMPOSITION & PARTICIPATION

Current Sector Representation

Based on organization or company affiliation, including for at-large members (includes 'holdover' seats)

Average Participation Rate: 56%

REVIEW OF SIMILAR ENTITIES

Loudoun County Economic Development Advisory Commission

- Objectives: Act in advisory capacity, recommending policies and procedures, provide business intelligence
- Membership: 31
 - Voting Members (23) based on target industry clusters
 - Non-Voting Standing Advisory Members (8) government and related institutions (no elected supervisors on commission)
 - Chair and officers elected annually (by commission)
- Recent topics:
 - Workforce Development
 - Housing
 - Zoning Ordinance Rewrite
 - State of Dulles Airport

REVIEW OF SIMILAR ENTITIES

Cook County (IL) Economic Development Advisory Committee

- Appointments by County Board President
- Objectives / focus: Advise the county and the Bureau of Economic Development on strategic activities
- 25 members
 - Private sector Chair and Vice Chair
 - C-suite / executive appointments
 - Private-sector, non-profit, institutional, government
- Recent topics
 - Incentives and financial tools (vote)
 - Small business grants and capital
 - Manufacturing reinvented
 - Bureau strategic plan

EAC MEMBER FEEDBACK

What is working

- Networking connecting with staff and Board of Supervisors
- Mixed group in the room receiving same information
- New knowledge on important topics
- Pre-work or meetings to address a specific issue

Areas to manage / improve

- Focus on the topic at hand
- Experts and member participation and impact
- Anticipate, prepare and adapt to market changes

Opportunities to Explore

- Higher-level, cross-cutting topics
- Decrease size, increase engagement
- Earlier start-time, more networking

CONSIDERATIONS: OBJECTIVES & FOCUS

Maintain overall purpose/mission:

- To advise the Board on economic development and related issues, including economic diversification and resiliency
- To provide policy level recommendations to the Board of Supervisors

Objectives:

- Provide <u>business intelligence</u> to the board and to county agencies
- Provide recommendations or response to economic development policies or programs

CONSIDERATIONS: STRUCTURE

Reduce the total number of EAC seats to approx. 25

- 10 Board of Supervisors (including Chairman)
- 8-10 private-sector member appointments
- 5-7 standing seats economic and business development organization

Appointments based on industry and/or function

- Executive / C-suite
- Specified by industry diverse range
 - Seek Geographic Diversity
 - Include Young Entrepreneurs

CONSIDERATIONS: MEETINGS & OUTCOMES

Topics & Experts

- Additional experts invited to meetings to provide input on specialized topics
- Ad-hoc meetings established for specific needs
- Meetings structured to focus on <u>receiving business intelligence</u> from members and experts and input on specific programs, policies and topics

Time and Location

- More networking opportunities
- Longer meeting time (for example, 9am-11am)
- Consider alternative location in the Government Center

NEXT STEPS

- Based on Board feedback, develop bylaws
- Share draft final EAC structure with Board via NIP
 - Discussion and feedback
- Bylaw creation and adoption at a future EAC meeting
